If medals were handed out for brilliant plays, West would have received a big gold medal for his opening lead in today's hand. What he actually received was more like a custard pie, square in the face!

South opened with two clubs and showed a game-going bid, suit necessarily with a real club. The hand was played in a Farisian bridge club where most of the good players follow this style of bidding.

Dr. Pierre Jais jumped to five clubs with the West hand, more to cover the bidding than with any hope of stealing the hand. North made a fine, delicate Nig of five spades, inviting South to bid a slam in his last suit. South obliged and that was the end of a brief but interesting auction.

Dr. Jais wondered how to get the lead to his partner and how to convey the idea that a heart return would be welcome. Finally, he hit upon a brilliant idea—10 leading the deuce of clubs.

East won the first trick with the ten of clubs much to his amazement. He looked at the trick, looked at his long spades suit and made the mistake of looking at his partner. From the stars start Dr. Jais concluded that he was supposed to do something.

All he could think of was the old what-ifs: "What if only one club were in East's hand? What if a million bridge players in France had said right, 'I had to get this one as my partner'?"

South Windsor Many Oppose Standard Set for 'Flood Zone'

A proposal to designate landkeeping the location in the Math south of Newbury Pt. from R. 3, and south to the town line as a "flood zone" some aroused considerable opposition at a well attended public hearing before the Town Plan and Zoning Commission at the high school last night.

All who spoke against the proposal objected to the stigma attached by naming an area as "flood zone". Many felt that much of the land so characterized would be prevented from serving a useful purpose.

Flood control projects north of the river were cited as improving the local situation, and some objected to the level set as too high. Vice questioner Lincoln stated that a neighboring town forbids building at or below the 20-foot level.

No objections were expressed to the idea of preventing subdivisions on such land. Considerable concern was expressed over the fact which would be incurred if none of this area could be built on.

Lincoln explained that owners of such property would still be able to construct homes on an individual basis.

Commission to Set Figure

Chase LeBarry finally resolved the matter to the apparent satisfaction of all concerned by proposing that the building inspector forbid buildings above an elevation to be designated by the committee.

A proposal to designate part of the Main St. area as a Rural 20 zone with subdivisions prohibited was unopposed. Several property owners in the area involved stated that the plan seemed quite reasonable and logical for this section.

During the discussion of the town's future growth Lincoln predicted that Waning Center and Buckland Rd. would become the future civic and educational center of the town. He based this prediction partly on the fact that an interchange between the South Windsor bridge highway and a north-south expressway will furnish considerable traffic through this area.

A number of speakers expressed hope that the tempo of building activity can be slowed down. Several plans were advanced for limiting the area which could be subdivided each year. The commission was advised to seek the opinion of the town attorney concerning the legality of such proposals.

Daniel J. Cavanaugh said the town is faced with the need of a new high school which will cost in excess of two million dollars. He said the present borrowing capacity of the town, he has just been informed, is \$1,000,000.

A picture was shown to the gathering which Jan Shepard had drawn up in a new post office building to be located on a parcel of land he owns just north of the Town Hall. Settlement favored.

Fire Department Asking \$307,555

The Town Fire Department has submitted a budget request to General Manager Richard Martip asking for \$307,555. Of this, \$214,940 would go for salaries and wages and the remaining \$92,615 for other expenses including maintenance and annual replacement of equipment.

The total request is \$184,475 greater than the current budget of \$200,000 and is almost \$20,000 greater than the \$227,500 estimated at the beginning of the current fiscal year.

The wage and salary request shows the biggest jump of all items. It exceeds by \$36,840 the current appropriation of \$178,000. Last year's estimate was \$177,200.

Fire Chief W. Clifford Mason explained the jump is the result of the addition of three new men to the department during the year and also the result of automatic wage increases expected at the beginning of 1969.

Mason pointed out this rise has been offset by the absence of \$10,000 in the current budget for a new fire engine and item contained in the present budget.

\$2,000 Approved for Wing
At Firehouse on Notch Rd.

The Bolton Board of Finance approved \$2,000 for architectural fees and preliminary plans for a new addition to the firehouse on Notch Rd. The appropriation was approved by a town meeting.

The volunteer fire department (there are no paid personnel) was organized about 1940 and the firehouse was built in 1942. A pumper truck was obtained shortly thereafter and a \$2,000 tank truck was bought in 1955.

Although much equipment has been obtained since then, including generators, a vacuumator, Scott Airpaks and other items, no major expenditure has been made since acquisition of the tank truck.

The volunteer group is operating on a budget for the 1958-59 year of \$3,660. Ten years ago it was \$1,248. The ground for the firehouse was purchased in 1942 for \$15,000. Ten years ago, it was \$2,354.29.

In other action last night, the Board of Finance increased the appropriation for town council services in the selectmen's budget by \$300. It was originally \$400. It was reported that costs of legal services in connection with the purchase of the John S. Bolton farm were \$207. In addition, the selectmen had a conference on Feb. 23 to discuss the fiscal year of 1959.

It was noted that \$3,700 has been expended for snow removal this year through Feb. 18. The appropriation in this account is \$5,000.

The Board of Finance has appointed H. N. Alexander and Co. of New London to audit town records again this year.

Art Gives New Life
To Ancient Town

By ERIC GOTTGREUT
Haifa, Israel (AP)—Marcel Yanku is a pioneer.

In Switzerland and Germany more than 40 years ago the British authorities were somewhat worried. To have an empty village close to one of the main roads and rail lines of the country didn't seem expedient. They decided to build the place.

Then Yanku stepped in. Working at that time for the Town and Country Planning Department of the Israel Ministry of Interior, he had been charged with a survey of possible sites to be kept as natural preserves. Ain Hod with all its romantic beauty was just what he was looking for.

He settled it himself. "You may keep the place if you find enough madmen to live there. We give you two weeks." An appeal went out to the 100 members of the Israel Artists Association. Seven took the trouble to look at Ain Hod. Three said they would live there.

But Ain Hodism was contagious and others followed the first three. The Ministry of Labor paid a group of workers to clean up the place. The Haifa Municipality "adopted" it and helped out by building a road and a water reservoir and installing a telephone. The artists themselves did much to make the village homely.

A Workshop Town. Some artists have jobs in town and come to Ain Hod only for a prolonged weekend; but others live there permanently. This is true particularly for those occupied in one of the Ain Hod workshops, such as ceramics, weaving, jewelry making, olive wood carving or even lithographic arts.

A fine album has just been issued with lithographs by Ain Hod artists. Some are among the best of the country—though it would not be correct to speak of a specific "Ain Hod school."

It's a success. For those in good numbers. For those in a hurry, a good selection of the paintings, sculptures and workshop products of Ain Hod is always on show in the cooperatively administered art gallery on the plaza of the village opposite the hospitable cafe terrace.

Doctor Says

It was only about 30 years ago that two or three dozen physicians, who had a special interest in rheumatic diseases, organized the American Rheumatism Association. This is a voluntary medical society designed to encourage study of the rheumatic disorders.

The name "rheumatism" covers a number of different diseases. The most important of these are rheumatoid arthritis, rheumatic fever, degenerative joint disease, fibrositis, gout, muscular rheumatism, spinal arthritis, juvenile arthritis (Still's disease), bacterial arthritis, tuberculous arthritis, and osteoarthritis.

In many of these the cause is not known. In some it is still uncertain as to whether the diseases are truly different or only different forms of the same disease.

During the past few years a great deal of information has been obtained on almost all forms of rheumatic diseases. Encouraging reports have appeared on a test which can be used with reasonable success in the early diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis.

Shortly after I first became interested in this field I went to Vienna. While there, the world-famous pathologist to whom I had a letter of introduction, asked me what I was working on. I replied that it was arthritis, but I found progress exceedingly slow.

He patted me gently on the back and said, "Young man, rheumatism is all the easy problems in medicine have already been solved."

Building Up the Herd: One piece of lack of realism and lack of faith combined continues to play a dominant role in the argument over German policy

Building Up the Herd: The argument in question is this: that if by some unwise stroke of his power diplomacy in the East Germany are brought into closer association with one another, on the way toward eventual unification, it will be the 17,000,000 Germans who have been living under Communism in East Germany who will prove the irresistible technological magnet to the 55,000,000 Germans of West Germany.

Building Up the Herd: The Communists are cleverer than he. They would play upon the naive political mind of the German people, have a propaganda campaign, they would take over the entire country.

Building Up the Herd: Therefore, the 55,000,000 West Germans must be kept safe under Chancellor Adenauer's protecting wing. Therefore, any reunification of Germany is something to be avoided.

Building Up the Herd: The same people who use this argument have other arguments for other audiences, for other angles of the German problem.

Building Up the Herd: These other arguments, they point out that reunification because of the wealth and prosperity of West Germany as compared to the poverty of East Germany. In these other moments, they boast that only Communism's force of arms keeps the East Germans in line. In these other moments, they prove its superior attractiveness of the West German way of life by citing the continuing stream of people leaving their homes in East Germany. In short, most of the time they are citing the remarkable blessings of life in West Germany.

Building Up the Herd: Then, when they think they have a moment for the opposite kind of argument, they forget all this and say that, in any trial of ways of life between the 17,000,000 East Germans and the 55,000,000 West Germans, it would be the 17,000,000 East Germans who would carry the day for Communism.

Building Up the Herd: Then they go back to proving that these 17,000,000 East Germans are so distressed and oppressed by Communism that only Russian troops can keep them in line.

Building Up the Herd: Nonetheless, what survives in such a misguided argument must be recognized for what it is. We have all been struck by Communism for a long time, and when we are afraid of anything, we tend to imagine it has all kinds of powers and appeals. It has held a psychological hegemony for a long time, and we often, in our imaginations, concede it unequal powers in any equal combat.

Building Up the Herd: And frequently such a psychological concession of superiority amounts to conferral of such superiority in tactics. And if we continue to insist that 17,000,000 East Germans could take over 55,000,000 West Germans, we might conceivably even bring it to pass.

Building Up the Herd: But the time ought to come when we declare psychological independence, and combine a natural confidence in our own way of life with a more realistic appraisal of the Communist way of life. George Kennan, certainly one of the world's best authorities on Communism, makes bold to proclaim that Communism as an ideology is already dead. That may be a bit bold, and yet much closer to the truth than any argument which says we must act as if Communism always automatically has the drop on democracy.

Washington, Feb. 25 (AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday set aside its ruling in favor of the federal government for argument next fall the dispute between the federal government and the five Gulf states over ownership of submerged oil lands. The court said the cases would be heard on Monday, Oct. 12, which is the second week of the court's 1960-61 term.

U.S. Court to Hear Tideland's Oil Case: It is also the one day on which the court customarily calls for argument in new cases. The states involved are Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

The five states have long claimed historic boundaries extending as far out in some instances as six leagues, or 20 miles.

Washington, Feb. 25 (AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday set aside its ruling in favor of the federal government for argument next fall the dispute between the federal government and the five Gulf states over ownership of submerged oil lands. The court said the cases would be heard on Monday, Oct. 12, which is the second week of the court's 1960-61 term.
