Voters Grant Addition To Bolton Firehouse

A proposal to build an addition to the firehouse on North St. was approved at a special town meeting last night.

The meeting voted to appropriate \$2,000 for an architectural plan, including plans, estimated costs and provision for an addition to the firehouse. The meeting also voted to create a reserve fund to be used at such time as the town chooses to adopt a Uniform Fiscal Year.

About 30 people turned out for the session despite yesterday's storm and bad traveling conditions. A motion to adjourn to another date when more townspeople could be expected to attend was defeated.

The suggestion that an addition was needed at the firehouse was apparently accepted by the meeting but a discussion of how much was needed in the requested appropriation to cover architectural fees lasted for an hour. The original motion asked \$2,000 and was changed several times before finally being passed.

Amendments included a reduction to \$1,000 which was withdrawn; a reduction to \$150 which was also withdrawn. The next amendment deleted the word "preliminary" from the motion which had included the phrase "to prepare preliminary plans." This amendment was voted.

Using a possible cost of \$15,000 for the addition, the meeting then considered an amendment changing the amount of the appropriation to \$1,500 which recognized a 1 per cent fee for the architect. This motion was defeated.

It was then voted to appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for all architects fees which will include plans, estimated costs and supervision for an addition to the firehouse.

Motion to authorize the fire commissioner, Paul Mangrigna, Peter Mascolo, J. J. Roberts and Stuart Wells, to administer the appropriation was voted.

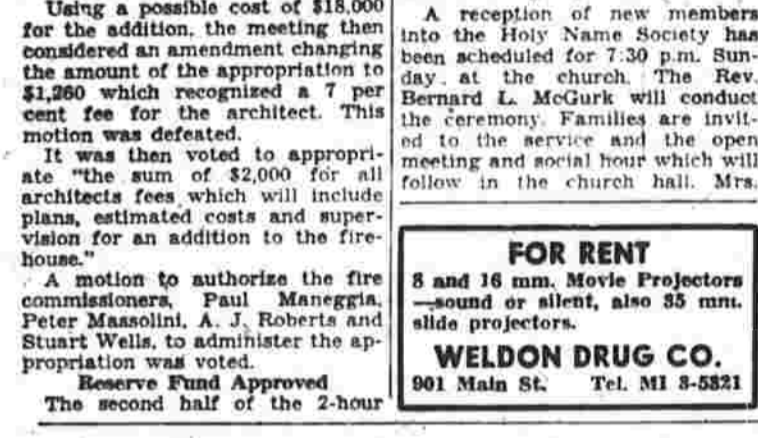

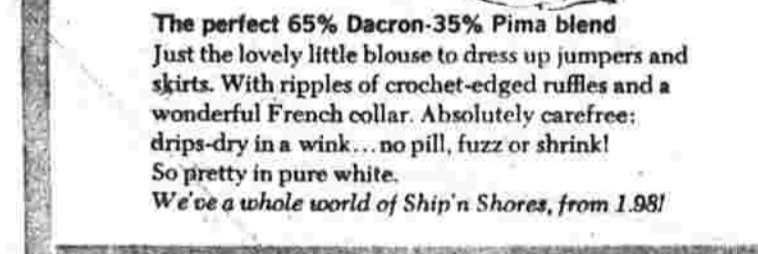

Columbia Public Nurse Topic of Talk

The Columbia P.T.A. Executive Board will discuss the topic of a Public Health Nursing service for the community. No date was set for this meeting.

Mrs. Cassandra Carlegio, public health nursing supervisor for the State Department of Health, spoke to the group Tuesday. She showed a film which outlined the services which a public health nurse might handle during the course of her day on duty, including bedside nursing and being members of a family learn how to handle this responsibility over an extended illness of one of their number.

The Rev. George K. Evans, chairman of the health and welfare committee of the Lions Club, was responsible for this program and had arranged it because of the concern here for the withdrawal of state sponsored programs under which well-child conferences and pre-school clinics were discontinued.

Some seemed to think the Public Health Nurse did not need such a time to handle the duties now carried for by a school nurse. This, it was reasoned, would help defray costs connected with the Public Health Nurse.

Mrs. Carlegio said the two could very well be combined. If it was so desired, she was not ready to quote costs but did verify the statement that the state would contribute up to 70 per cent of the costs in a town of this size. People using the service would also be expected to pay as they are able.

However, Mrs. Carlegio indicated that that part was before the board in this situation and that it should first be decided by a study committee whether or not the town people wanted and would support such a program.

This committee, she said, should include the town's health officer, the school physician, representatives from the Board of Education and from civic and church organizations, and the principal of the school. If the need was indicated, then a sponsoring unit would be chosen. At that time any help needed from her and the school department could be had for the asking. She did say, however, that the town seemed small for a full time nurse and that sometimes it was advisable to buy the service from another town with an agency already set up.

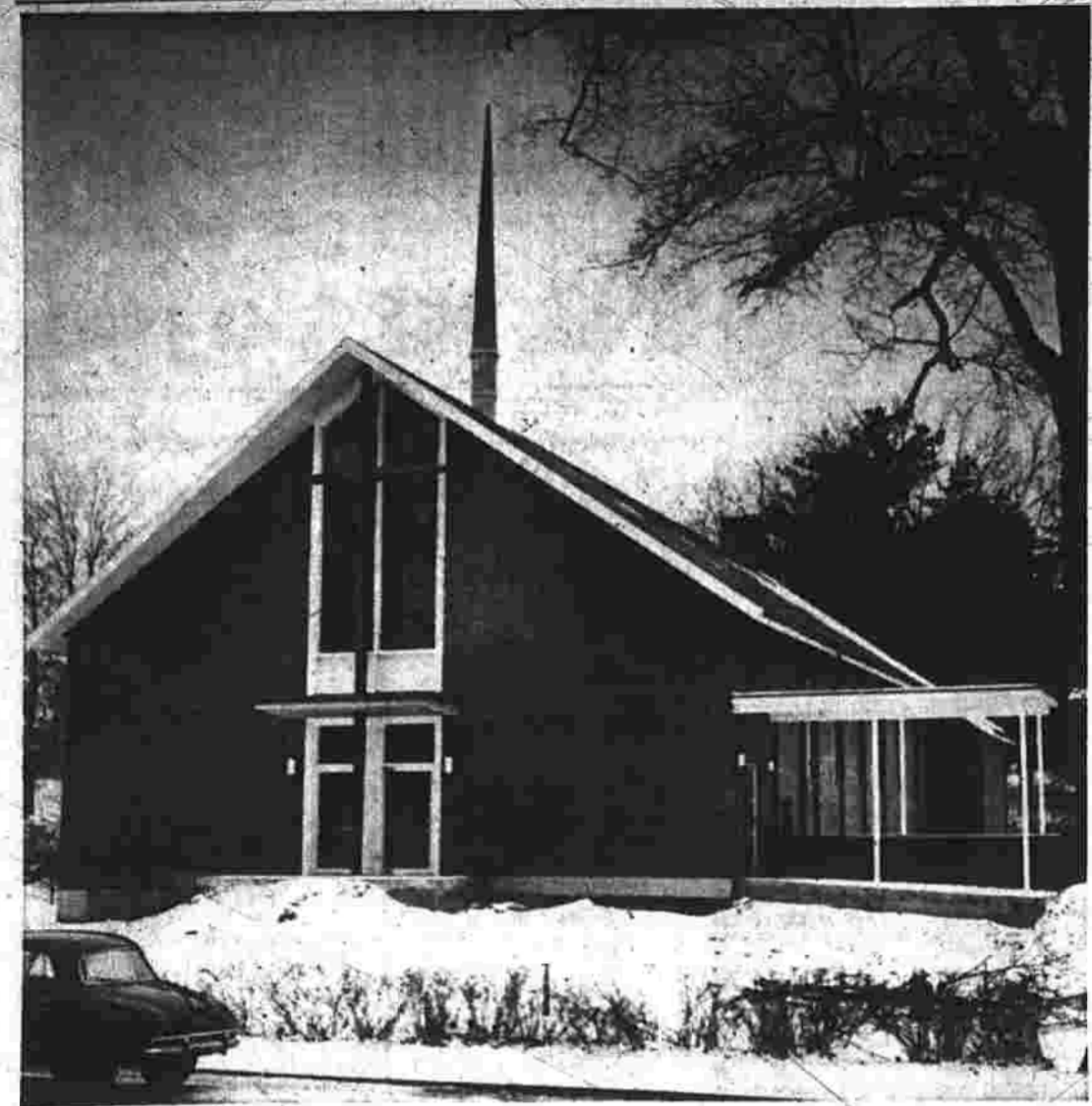

Baptist Dedication Sunday

The Sunday, 117 years after churches of Hartford Baptist was sold and its membership disbanded, a new \$100,000 house of worship will be dedicated. Ceremonies will be held at 3 p. m. in the Community Baptist Church at 585 E. Center St. for the red brick church was done April 13, 1842 by the Congregationalists. The church is highlighted by a 35-foot redwood cross affixed to the front of the church and extending from the roof to the front steps, piercing the canopy over the door.

Two Levels
The interior of the church is on two levels. The sanctuary on the upper level seats 400 and features a stadium type of balcony and an 18-foot cross in the chancel. Behind the chancel is the choir rehearsal room and robing rooms for both levels.

Near the front door of the upper church, just off the narthex, is a small room which may later be used as a chapel open for worship around the clock.

On the lower level is Fellowship hall with a seating capacity for 250 persons, and a kitchen which will be equipped by the Woman's Baptist Mission Society of the church.

After long consultations with Baptist agencies they voted to establish an American Baptist Church in Manchester. Sponsoring the venture were the Central Baptist Church in Hartford, the Connecticut Baptist Convention, and the Home Mission Society.

The latter two agencies underwrote a \$40,000 loan to enable the new church to buy two parcels of land in August 1952 on E. Center St. where the present parish house and the new church building now stand.

The first service was held Sept. 14, 1952 with Dr. Maxwell delivering the sermon.

The congregation officially became a church Nov. 5, 1952, when its 93 worshipers were received into membership. Charter members served until Nov. 23, 1952 when the Rev. Earle W. Darrow became interim minister, serving until the end of January 1953.

The Rev. John R. Newbert became the permanent pastor Feb. 1, 1953, having been called from Central Park Baptist Church in Buffalo, N. Y.

Among those who have worked toward constructing the new building were those on the new building council, including Chairman Edward Kirkham, A. Wimbush, Ballard Russell, R. Grammie, Mrs. Robert M. Jones, Richard Yerks, Joseph A. Koveil, Harold A. Good, Edwin Lawrence, Harold K. Livingston, Mrs. John R. Newbert, and George M. Russell.

At the dedication ceremonies Sunday the invocation will be given by the Rev. Clayton F. Smith, senior minister of the Central Baptist Church in Hartford. The dedicatory reading will be done by the Rev. Mr. Clark; and the dedicatory address will be made by Dr. Wadsworth.

An open house will be held in Fellowship hall following the dedication ceremonies.

that the West should try to get Russian accord to a thinning out of military strength in some "sufficiently large area," controlled and inspected, as a first phase toward general disarmament.

Such a proposal has long been advanced by the West and rejected by the Russians.

This military measure would be undertaken only if there were corresponding agreements on political disputes between East and West. It has been made clear that this was but one of several ideas the western powers are mulling over as possible themes to be taken up at the conference table with the Russians.

Both spokesmen emphasized that military thinning out did not mean "disengagement."

Both Hope and Von Eckardt said "disengagement" implied a simple withdrawal of forces, leaving a vacuum of territory not subject to inspection or controls.

Yesterday the British took pains to say Macmillan was misunderstood in his joint statement with Soviet Premier Khrushchev suggesting a possible reduction of forces and arms in "an agreed area."

British worries about all these are based more on a strong feeling of dependence on U.S. economic leadership than on hostility or animosity.

Sir David Eccles, president of the British Board of Trade, has criticized U.S. policy heavily in the four specific cases. But he is recognized by U.S. businessmen in Britain as one of the strongest supporters of economic interdependence between the two countries.

British officials appreciate that political pressures in the U.S. Congress can work against liberal economic policy. Board of Trade experts also emphasize that American recession doubtless made U.S. economic policy last year much less liberal than President Eisenhower predicted it would be.

Specialists in the board of trade say Britain herself is making substantial moves toward trade liberalization and that this is one reason British is opposed to what it regards as American departures from liberal policy.

An example of British business sentiment on the U.S. wool quotas, for example, comes from C. J. Bellantyn, president of the Scottish Woolen Manufacturers' Association in Washington, he says, "as the wool manufacturers are American producers of Japanese synthetic materials and the manufacturers of mass produce plain cloth goods."

"Scottish cloth and British woolen cloth in general in no way harm American producers, few of whom have ever aimed at the quality market."

The feeling in Britain about U.S. trade policies has produced a movement within powerful economic circles for strengthening the British economic position in Washington. This is considered likely to happen soon.
