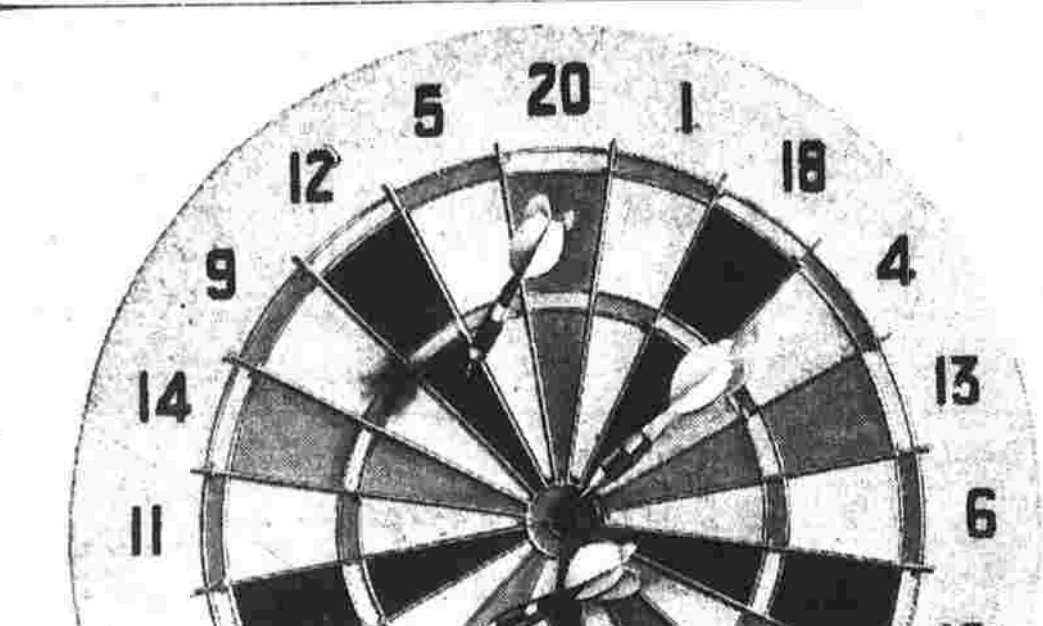

Bolton CD Room Use for Classes Ends Double Session Need

Use of the Civil Defense shelter as a classroom has apparently ended double sessions at the elementary school next year. John D. Avery, Bolton CD director, told the Board of Education Monday that there would be no objection to such use of the shelter if the floor can be cleared in an emergency.

Patient Trolley Fans Restore Relics of Past

Bradford, Conn. (AP)—Every weekend a tiny railroad station here comes alive with the nostalgic memories of a bygone but not forgotten era.

The Bears Brae station doesn't rate mention in standard railroad timetables and its 1 1/2 miles of track won't be found on most maps. Only 10 persons can crowd inside it at one time.

The tiny station's importance is that around it are 42 trolleys in various stages of restoration to Detroit interurban run. Another, its sides open to the sun, is a carry-over of a trolley from the days of the New Jersey.

Some Still Operate Some were the workhorses of the trolley era, hauling our fathers and grandfathers to work in the morning and bringing them home again at night. Most of the boys could do the job again if they had to.

The station is located a few miles from Long Island Sound. The "Bears" stands for Bradford Electric Railway Assn., the collection of memory-builders who come on weekends to restore trolleys.

The association describes itself formally as a "non-profit, educational organization operating the Bradford Trolley Museum, exhibiting a collection of street railway equipment which is complete from horse cars to streamliners, and inviting you to an enjoyable ride down memory lane."

The March Statistics

After a disappointing February, the month of March brought a startling and optimistic upturn in federal employment and industrial activity statistics.

The total of unemployed fell 387,000, down to 4,362,000, well away from the 5,000,000 mark which has become the current level of real emergency.

Once in a while headlines are related to sinus difficulty or some other physical ailment. For all these reasons the successful treatment of those who suffer from recurring headaches is not easy.

Headaches commonly arise from tension of the blood vessels in or near the brain—vascular headaches. In this type of headache the treatment consists in giving some medication which causes the blood vessels to contract.

Rapid relief has sometimes been obtained by injecting adrenalin into the veins. Also favorable reports have been made on the injection into the veins of a substance called sodium nicotinate.

Such a rule this type of headache is located on one side only. Before it starts the sufferer often has peculiar sensations. In migraine attacks the patient usually complains of a severe pain in the forehead or one side of the head.

Headaches Still Remain a Menace to Medical Men

Perhaps a good way to open a brief discussion of headaches is to quote from one of the prefaces to Monch's book on headache:

The person with a headache often finds himself a medical orphan. He is fortunate indeed if he can find himself on an excursion to the ophthalmologist, otolaryngologist, neurologist, dentist, psychiatrist, osteopath and chiropractor.

There is an undoubted reassurance in a legal aid office. It is a community place to which eligible people can be referred by lawyers, the courts, and the agencies, or to which people can come of their own accord to seek legal assistance.

Many headaches are brought on or made worse by emotional strain, and the emotional cause may be of such a nature as to require the aid of a psychiatrist or a social worker.

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Andover GOP Town Committee Hears Talk by Manchester Leader

Atty. John F. Shea Jr. of Manchester discussed "The Function of Town Committees in a Small Town" at the first of a series of monthly meetings of the Republican Town Committee in Andover.

His address that a political party should take a positive position in respect to all issues appeared a lively discussion on plans for the town election in May.

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Strong Labor Stand Urged on State GOP

Hartford, April 8 (AP)—A Republican legislative caucus yesterday was urged to formulate a strong labor program based on "faith and confidence in the free enterprise system."

Rep. Thomas F. Quinn of Washington held the caucus that was open to all Republicans in the House. Quinn said that he planned to fight on the floor of the House any Democratic labor bill that he thought would destroy jobs in the state.

He said Democratic proposals for broadening unemployment compensation and workers' compensation benefits would ultimately result in fewer jobs because the higher costs would force employers to cut back their employment.

The Democratic proposals, he said, must be evaluated on the basis of their effect 5 and 10 years from now.

"Let's forget about the reaction," he said, "in urging the Republicans not to be guided by political expediency in any state on labor questions."

Rep. John M. Lupton of Westport said the Republicans already had a positive platform.

That, he said, was a challenge to the administration on what is "going to bring more jobs and more money to the state and to keep it employed."

Plenty of employers, Lupton said, have serious problems and are thinking of vacating the state.

In a time of serious recession, Lupton said, "you don't pile up more and more benefits for those who are already working."

"If you don't have confidence in the people," he said, "you will never have a positive program to offer."

Lupton predicted that the party that faces up to the problem of labor retraining and also recognizes that labor has become capitalism in this country will have its political future made within the next 20 years.

He urged the party not to go the way of Socialist legislation hoping to win popularity that way. "Let's go the way we have to go—the way of free enterprise," he urged.

The GOP caucus was the first on labor matters this session.

Rep. Paul Andrews of Cheshire, assistant minority leader in the House, and former chairman of the General Assembly's Labor Committee, reviewed some of the Democratic proposals now before the Legislature.

He reiterated that proposals to expand unemployment compensation and increased health and accident insurance benefits would cost Connecticut business an additional \$100 million dollars.

Andrews said this figure does not include proposals to broaden workers' compensation and to tighten overtime provisions.

Cubans Set Trial For Nye Saturday

Havana, April 8 (AP)—Alvin Robert Nye, 21-year-old former U.S. Navy pilot from Whiting, Ind., will go on trial Saturday night on charges of plotting to assassinate Rebel Chief Fidel Castro.

Announcing this yesterday, Miguel Aleman, Deputy Secretary of State, said a military tribunal will hear the evidence against Nye.

Nye had insisted he came to Cuba last November only to help Castro rebel forces in their fight to topple the regime of former President Fulgencio Batista. He has repeatedly denied any collusion with the alleged plot to kill Castro.

The trial is due to start at 4:30 p.m. (EST) in the officers club of La Cabana military fortress, where Nye has been held since January.

He was first picked up by the rebels in their Eastern Cuban stronghold on Dec. 26, just before the Batista regime collapsed on Jan. 1.

Doque said Nye will get all normal guarantees at his trial, including the right to pick his own defense attorneys. He added that Nye is being held in a cell that has been advised of the trial date and presumably will contact Nye to make defense arrangements.

Joseph Sullivan, a Whiting attorney, has come to Havana to seek Nye's release. He left before Nye was taken to Havana, where he came to Cuba with a personal appeal for his own freedom.

Cuban lawyers presumably will defend Nye unless special arrangements are made to permit foreign counsel before a Cuban court.

Business Group for Tax Hike To Balance Federal Budget

Washington, April 8 (AP)—An influential business organization declared yesterday that an increase in federal taxes to balance the budget would be preferable to an unbalanced budget in the government's fiscal year starting July 1.

Championing the anti-inflation stand taken by President Eisenhower, the Committee for Economic Development said in its annual appraisal of federal budget policy.

"Any increase in expenditures above the President's budget should be matched by additional taxes," the report said.

Actually a tax increase should not be necessary, said the CED, a privately supported research organization of corporation heads and educators. It held that farm, housing, veterans and some other outlays could and should be cut while foreign economic aid is enlarged.

But if the net outcome of Congressional action this session creates a prospective deficit for fiscal 1960, taxes should be raised by one or two percent, the CED said.

From low income tax brackets, the committee said that if more federal revenue is needed in the next few years, it probably will have to come mostly from higher taxes on low and middle income consumers or from a general sales tax.

That is true, it said, because no great amount of added revenue can be raised from tax based on upper income individuals and corporations, whose maximum rates now range up to 91 per cent and 52 per cent respectively. It added:

"Every taxpayer should understand, therefore, that a tax increase would affect his own pocketbook, not just somebody else's."

The report was approved without dissent by CED's 30-member committee headed by T. V. House director of Sears Roebuck & Co. The committee membership includes such business figures as Thomas B. McCabe, president of Scott Paper Co.; Philip D. Reed, finance chairman of General Electric Co.; H. J. Heinz II, chairman of H. J. Heinz Co.; and Gardner Cowles, president of the Des Moines Register & Tribune and Cowles Magazine.

Boston Disagree

A long and vigorous dissent to the general trend of the report was filed by former Sen. William Easton, CED's chairman of the Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc., who was a founding vice chairman of CED.

The presumption that full employment will be approached this year and that the budget will be balanced "seems to me wholly unrealistic and unwarranted," Easton wrote. He held that a balance should be deferred until lidiness of plants and manpower are placed to "acceptable" levels. He added:

"I cannot agree that the total outlays for domestic programs should not be expanded greatly and at once and expanded even further in future years."

A half-dozen other members held the government should be doing everything possible to reduce purchasing power rather than to tax it up, and that monetary policy should be eased to stimulate business growth and employment.

The threat of inflation was cited by the majority report to support its basic conclusion—that the government should balance its next budget and run a surplus in subsequent years if properly controlled. Avoidance of deficit financing is of unprecedented importance, the report held. Among the reasons:

"There is the general expectation... that the price level will never again go down. Every little bit more of inflation leads only to the expectation of still more, not of a reversal."

Mayor Daley Wins Easily in Chicago

Chicago, April 8 (AP)—Mayor Richard J. Daley won a landslide victory in yesterday's municipal election, strengthening the stranglehold the Democrats have held on city hall for 28 years.

It was no contest in the mayoral race. Daley smothered his Republican opponent, Timothy Sheehan, in his successful bid for reelection as he led his Democratic ticket in the sweep.

Daley, in winning a second 4-year term, polled a near record vote margin for a mayoral election. He won by more than 450,000 voters, getting 71.36 per cent of the total ballot and out-voting Sheehan by about 2 1/2 to 1.

Daley, in a long political and backed by one of the country's most powerful Democratic organizations, made the best showing in a mayoral election since 1932.

Sheehan, no novice in the political field after four terms in Congress, ran true to pre-election forecasts. He never came close to challenge the 56-year-old Mayor Daley, who led at the outset and widened his lead in the counting of nearly 1,000,000 ballots in the city's 3,821 precincts.

The final unofficial count showed Daley 777,496, Sheehan 312,128.

The total vote of 1,089,624 was one of the lightest in nearly 25 years. That was about 60 per cent of the city's 1,841,594 registered voters.

The election will take a close look at the problems confronting our nation's family and social structure. He called for efforts to preserve the two-party system in local government, warning: "We must not let the Democrats take over the city by a mere majority for a year or two."

Sheehan, 50-year-old business man who was defeated in his bid for re-election to Congress last November, conceded the mayor's time and money after the polls.

The Republicans won some sort of consolation victory in three run-off elections.

Daley, who won his first term in 1955 with 69 per cent of the total vote in defeating Republican Sidney E. Mottman, sought reelection on his record. He termed his victory over Sheehan a vote of confidence and said he would try to

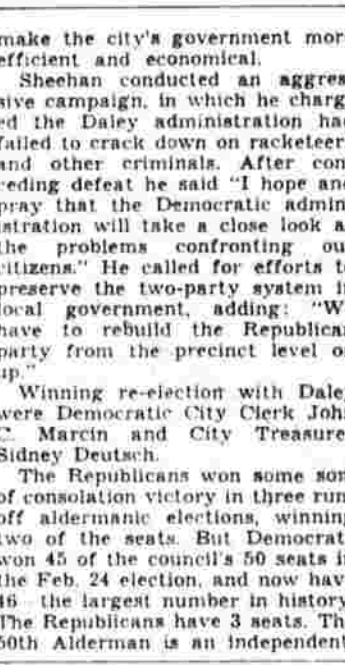

It seems Dr. Jacobson that you must have run out of what seem to you as valid arguments. You have to dig in the Governor of another state who is not a medical man. If we are to quote laymen, let us at least quote men who have the experience and the direct responsibility for the people's water, such as B. Neal, Director of Laboratories of the Department of Water Supply, N. Y. City, a man recognized throughout the world on the subject of fluorine, who states: "We are aware that fluorides are extremely toxic substances and evidence exists to show that even at the recommended level of one part per million of fluoride in drinking water, people have been harmed. We know of reputable independent medical authorities throughout the U. S. and the local area who have found evidence of fluoride damage to persons living in fluoridated communities. These medical authorities disagree with the fluoridation procedure for the entire population which includes the young, the old, the susceptible and the infirm as well as the healthy. No one has made the claim that the ingestion of fluoride can be of benefit to the teeth beyond the formative years of childhood."

'Chemical Facts'
To the Editor,
In view of the controversy regarding the use of fluorine in the Manchester water system, it seems that some fundamental chemical facts should be explained.

The element fluorine has a definite atomic structure as do other elements with which it may combine to form compounds. For example, one atom of fluorine will combine with one atom of the element sodium to form one molecule of sodium fluoride. Sodium fluoride dissolved in water dissociates into sodium ions and fluoride ions. Fluoride ions in a public water system are the same and they behave in the same way whether the fluoride is dissolved from mineral deposits or added under good chemical and engineering control in a water treatment plant.

The terms "artificial" or "chemical" are used sometimes in a misleading sense and cause confusion and misunderstanding in reference to the use of prepared or refined fluorides in treatment of water. Chemists do not manufacture fluorine or fluorides from other elements. They use naturally occurring minerals from which to prepare and refine the fluoride compounds that are available commercially.

Fluorine is one of the naturally occurring elements found in mineral form as fluorite, in some localities. The earth's crust, including rocks, soil, water and vegetation is composed of many different minerals in widely varying quantities. The same mineral deposits in most lake, river and well water as fluoride ions. It comes to these bodies of water from mineral deposits in the watershed areas. Inasmuch as these mineral deposits vary in size and chemical composition in different localities, so-called natural fluoridation of water supplies is a hit-or-miss approach to the treatment of public water systems. diplomat said, "You can feel and you can see that Bonn is not only coming right down to it, your basic job is to resist encroachment of the Communists."

British newspapers were divided in their reaction to Adenauer's plan to visit the Soviet Union. The financial Times welcomed the move; the Conservative Daily Telegraph expressed doubts. The Telegraph said the Russians would assume, rightly or wrongly, that Bonn's attitude toward a possible German settlement will become more flexible. But it said the West should not expect to see too little of the quality of the men who will take over.

The tone of the French press was that the West may suffer a considerable loss.

The leftist, non-Communist Communist Party will not affect the close French-German alliance developing since the war, but the same dialogue does not have the same impact when the persons involved change.

The Conservative Aurore said it was "not impossible" that British Prime Minister Macmillan's trip to Moscow and the forthcoming trip of Field Marshal Montgomery "gave him the impression that all the Atlantic Allies are not lining up with the same will with Germany for the defense of Free Europe."

The Soviet news agency Tass was almost alone in saying Adenauer's decision to retire came as no surprise. The Russian agency claimed the Christian Democratic party has long been discredited with him.

Commentators in Communist East Germany suggested that in taking the presidency, Adenauer might seek to change the constitution and what it termed "dictator on the style of French President Charles de Gaulle."

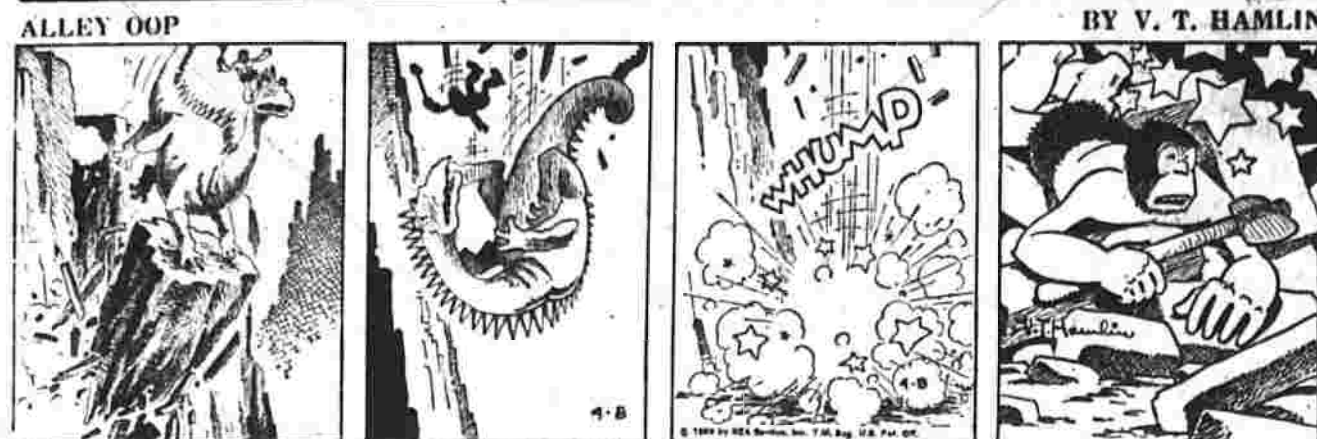

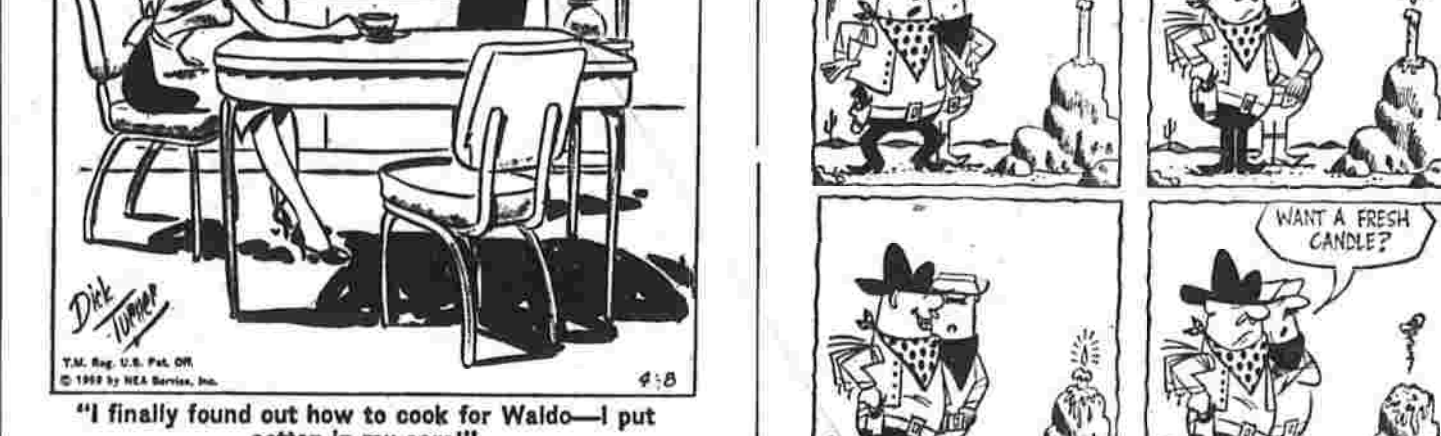

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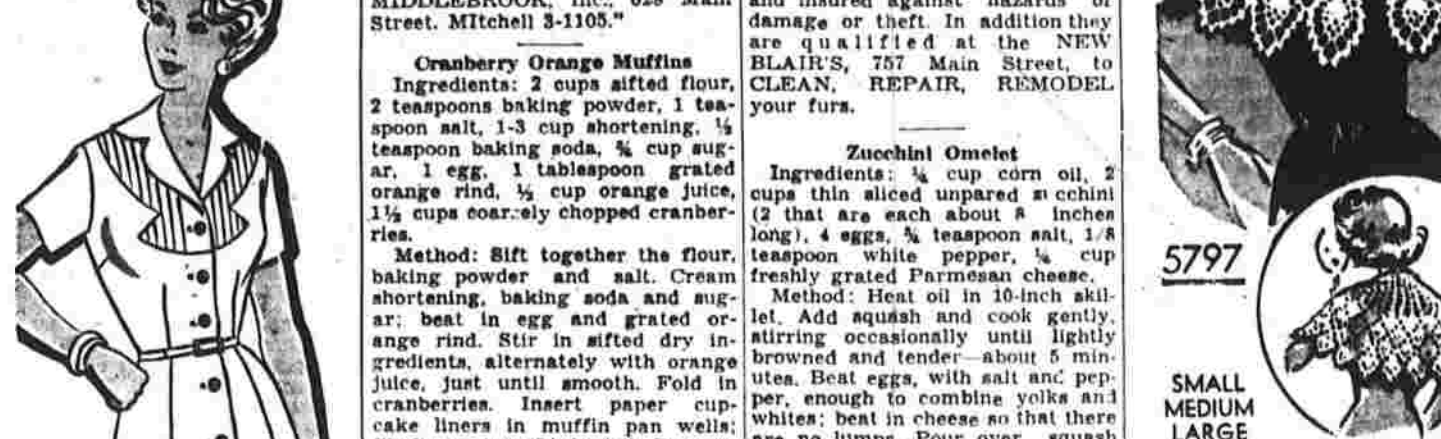
