

## West Asks Russia Submit to N-Ban Near Earth Crust

Geneva, April 13 (AP)—The United States and Britain asked the Soviet Union today to agree to a prompt controlled suspension of nuclear weapons tests on or near the surface of the earth—leaving the problem of other types of blasts for later negotiations.

Informants said the proposal provided for splitting up the test suspension problem. It was advanced as the 3-power talks resumed after an Easter recess.

First Soviet reaction was reported to be negative.

Under the new western plan, agreement would be reached at once on banning surface nuclear tests—the ones which cause dangerous radioactive fallout.

Such an agreement would not cover very high altitude and underground atomic and hydrogen weapons blasts. Such explosions—difficult to police in any event—could be covered in subsequent agreements reached after the first problem had been solved.

## Twin Firings Of Satellites Likely Today

Washington, April 13 (AP)—Launchings today of satellites from both the West and East coasts appeared likely.

The twin bill of space shoots would be a polar-orbiting Discoverer launching from California's Vandenberg Air Force Base and the first three-in-one Vanguard firing from Florida's Cape Canaveral launching base.

Until yesterday, military and space authorities had declined to say when either of the shoots would be made. Then Roy W. Johnson, director of the Advanced Research Projects Agency, said about 4 p.m. EST that the Discoverer launching would come within 12 hours.

Johnson's statement was made during an address at New Canaan, Conn.

Such a launching of the second Discoverer from the Vandenberg Base would be in line with the announced plan to send one up every four or five weeks this year. The first one was launched Feb. 28.

An industry publication, Aviation Daily, said last week the Vanguard firing was set for today. Dr. John P. Hagen, Project Vanguard director, said almost a month ago the three-way satellite would be launched "fairly soon."

Hagen said the satellite would include a plastic sphere with equipment to measure the earth's magnetic field, a helium balloon to measure drag or friction and the empty case of the third stage rocket a metal tube weighing about 52 pounds.

The satellite is 13 inches in diameter. It has an arm extending about two feet, tipped with a magnetometer to measure the magnetic fields.

The expandable balloon is 30 inches in diameter and weighs 1 1/2 to 2 pounds.

The Discoverer launchings from the West Coast are aimed at sending a satellite into a south-north orbit.

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## Hot Chili Erupts, Sets Barge on Fire

Cape Elizabeth, Maine, April 13 (AP)—A bowl of hot chili blew up and set fire to a barge offshore yesterday.

Authorities said the chili erupted on the hot stove set fire to the eating and living quarters of the crew. No one was injured.

The fishing vessel Mary J. pulled up alongside and extinguished the blaze in a shack at one end of the barge.

## Pope Broadens Decree Against Vote for Reds

Vatican City, April 13 (AP)—Pope John XXIII has signed a decree declaring Roman Catholics may not vote for legislative candidates who support the Communist cause even though the candidates profess Christianity.

The action is the sternest the church has taken against fellow travelers of Communism.

Vatican sources said the decree was a development of the 1949 communication of militant members of the Communist party. That decree warned Catholics they could no longer take the sacraments of the church if they joined the Communist party, because Communism is materialist and anti-Christian.

The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano said the Pope signed on April 2 a resolution of the Congregation of the Holy Office, dated March 25, broadening and extending the 1949 decree.

The resolution said: "It is illicit that Catholics vote for parties or for candidates who, even if they do not profess principles in contrast to Catholic doctrine, or although of Christian faith, are united with Communism and anti-Communism."

The 1949 decree was in the form of answers to questions on whether a Catholic could join or support the Communist party. The decree replied in the negative and added: "Communism, in fact, is materialistic and anti-Christian. The directors, then, of Communism, although they at times declare by word that they do not fight religion, in fact, however, with theory and action, demonstrate themselves to be hostile to the true religion and to the church of Christ."

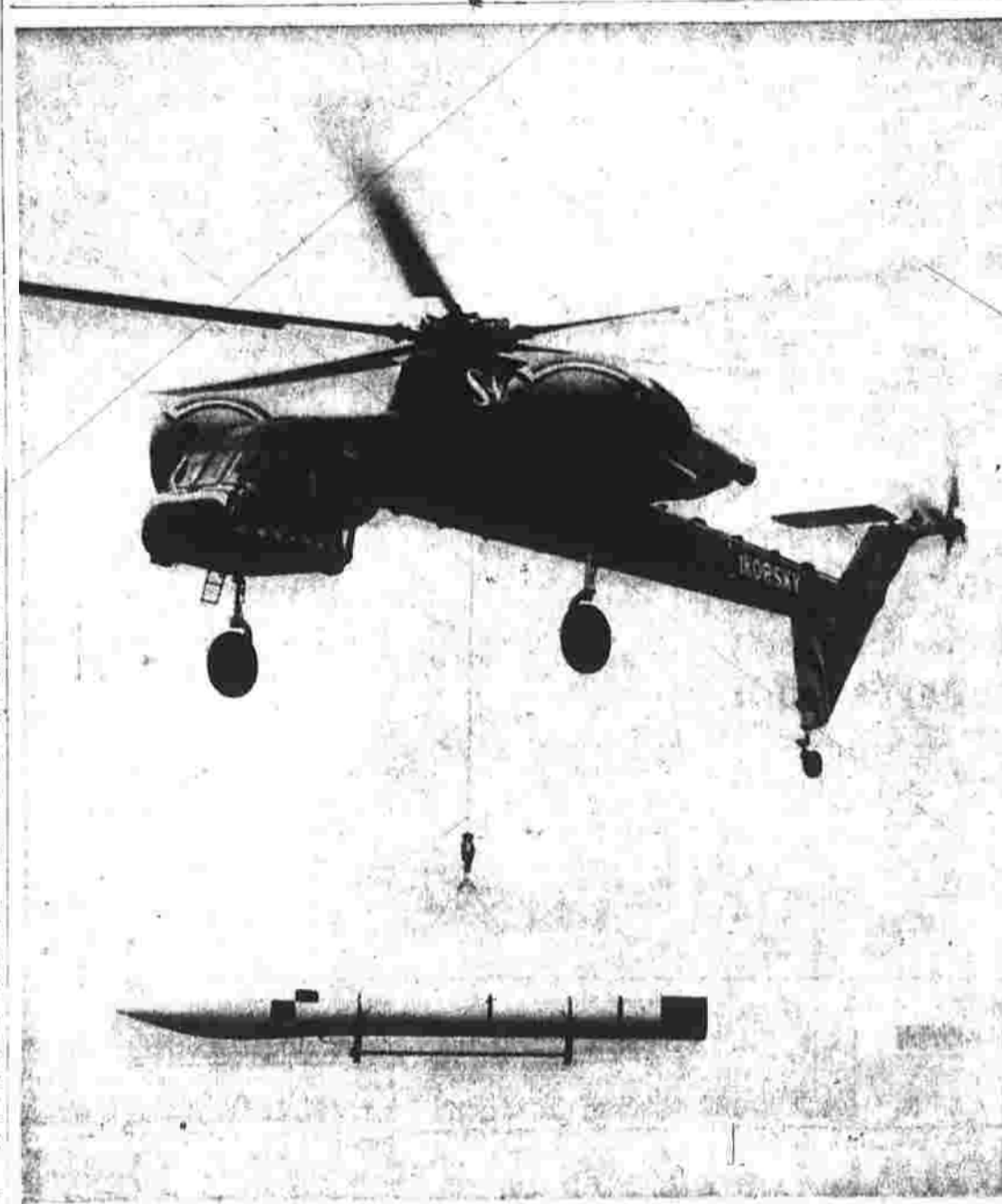
World-Wide Impletions

Vatican sources said that while the decree made public today has worldwide application for Roman Catholics, the reasons that prompted it include a recent local situation in Sicily.

This was the case of Silvio Milazzo, wealthy landowner and longtime Christian Democrat leader in Sicily, who with five other Christian Democrats last year formed a coalition with the help of Communist and neo-fascists. Sicily, largest island in the Mediterranean, has a degree of

## Two Confer 45 Minutes At Hospital

Washington, April 13 (AP)—President Eisenhower conferred for 45 minutes today with Ailing Secretary of State Dulles. They put off any decision as to Dulles' future official role pending "additional medical observation and treatment." No resignation has been submitted, the White House said.

Eisenhower flew in from Augusta, Ga., this morning and drove immediately to Walter Reed Army Hospital to see the Secretary.

After White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty made the following statement:

"The president met this morning at Walter Reed Hospital with the Secretary of State. They of course discussed the secretary's physical condition. They also discussed matters relating to world affairs."

"The Secretary of State has returned to Walter Reed for additional medical observation and treatment."

"He is expected to remain at the hospital for some days."

"Pending additional medical evaluation there will be no further statement from the President."

Dulles broke off a recuperative period in Florida to return yesterday to the hospital where he previously had spent a month and a half under-going radiation and other treatment for a recurrent abdominal cancer.

At the time Dulles went to Florida, there was no indication that he would return to the hospital for additional treatment.

Hagerty told reporters he did not know the nature of his new treatment, or whether surgery or more radiology were involved.

He said those are medical questions to be answered by the doctors.

Allen W. Dulles, head of the Central Intelligence Agency and brother of the Secretary of State, arrived at Walter Reed five minutes after the President.

Aide with Dulles

Already with Dulles were his State Department aide, Joseph N. Greene, and his secretary Phyllis Berman. They had gone to the hospital earlier in the morning. Among other things, they brought with them an electric typewriter.

## State Stores Back Stiff Shoplift Law

Hartford, April 13 (AP)—Connecticut Retail Merchants, citing heavy financial losses, today urged approval of a bill that would give them greater protection against shoplifters.

One speaker said merchants in the Bridgeport area alone lost four million dollars last year.

The bill makes shoplifting a separate offense from larceny and gives store employees added legal protection enabling them to seize suspected shoplifters in the stores.

Mark Creed, a Hartford merchant and president of the Connecticut Retail Merchants Assn., explained to the legislative General Law Committee that it is now impractical to apprehend suspects on the store grounds.

The shoplifters, though caught with the goods on their person, can argue that they intended to pay for the goods. Creed said, and the courts are reluctant to accept possession of goods alone as grounds for conviction.

Creed said the usual practice by the stores is to allow the shoplifters to leave the grounds and then seize him or her. This is often difficult to accomplish, he said.

The bill makes the finding of merchandise on a shopper's person, either on or outside the store's premises, prima facie evidence of willful concealment. It also sets up a scale of punishments less severe than for larceny.

Creed told the committee some courts were now reluctant to convict shoplifters, knowing that a felony conviction would deprive the person of voting and other citizenship rights.

## 7 Lawmakers Impressed by Skipjack Trip

Groton, April 13 (AP)—The atomic submarine Skipjack, with seven congressmen aboard, plunged off the coast of Groton today at record speeds over the weekend.

The whale-shaped Skipjack, to be commissioned Wednesday, ploughed deeper and reached speeds greater than any known submarine in history. It returned to its berth here yesterday.

Members of the joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy who made the trial run and took turns at the controls were visibly impressed.

The Navy would give no details but Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-N.M.), chairman of the committee, said in a statement:

"For security reasons I can only say that we were deeper than 400 feet and moving faster than 20 knots." He added later, "She whipped to that depth and at those speeds without effort."

The Navy, as early as four years ago, listed such speeds and depths for their first atomic submarine. Exact figures have always been classified.

Faster Than Nautilus

The committee took a similar trial run in 1955 on the atomic undersea craft Nautilus. Anderson said the speed of the Skipjack was "substantially above the speed achieved in the Nautilus."

Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, the man who envisioned the atomic sub and made it a reality, stood by proudly yesterday as the congressmen, most of them visibly awed, shared with him on the Skipjack.

Rep. Chet Holifield (D-Calif.) called the trip "one of the most thrilling experiences of my life." The Skipjack's maneuverability,

## Two Jet Engines Unveiled by P & W

Pratt & Whitney Aircraft yesterday unveiled the public two of its newest jet engines, the J-58 and the JT-3D, at the World Congress of Flight in Las Vegas, Nev.

At the same time P & W disclosed new performance data on its powerful J-75 military jet engine and announced the successful completion of preliminary flight tests of the JT-12, newest and smallest member of the company's family of jets.

The J-58, which is in the 30,000-pound-thrust class, has successfully completed preliminary tests at P & W's Florida Research and Development Center.

The JT-3D is termed a practical turbofan concept of the famed J-57.

Both engines are capable of delivering 10,000 pounds of thrust. The J-58, with afterburner, which powers some of the latest model fighters and interceptors, delivers 24,500 pounds of thrust and is the world's most powerful production turbojet. With water injection, the engine will produce 26,500 pounds of thrust.

Weights 430 Pounds

The JT-12, which weighs only 430 pounds, and produces 3,000 pounds of thrust, made its first series of flights in a B-45 test bed. Production models of the JT-12, the company said, will power small commercial airliners as well as Army drones.

Although all performance data for the helicopter is not yet available, the company said the engine is designed for high altitude and very high Mach number operating conditions.

The JT-3D turbofan, designed for both commercial and military use, provides more power, greater fuel economy and a reduced noise level. The new design, in essence, substitutes two large fan stages for the first three compressor stages now used on the J-57 (JT-3). The fan, using larger compressor blades,

## Crane 'Copter Carries Cargo From Sky Hook

Stratford, April 13 (AP)—The new Sikorsky S-60 crane helicopter, radical in construction and use, was unveiled today.

Instead of the conventional passenger or cargo cabin, the fuselage of the S-60 consists of a bridge-like boom extending from the cockpit to the tail rotor. Loads are carried externally by hoists suspended from the fuselage at a point directly under the main rotor.

The aircraft is powered by two 2800-horsepower Pratt & Whitney piston engines. It can carry a four-ton payload up to 100 miles. Its construction was a joint project of the Navy and the Sikorsky Division of the United Aircraft Corp.

Today's demonstration plans call for the helicopter to lift a two-ton utility pole and place it in a hole, span a 60-foot, 4,500-pound bridge span into place, and carry a dummy of an Honest John missile.

Lee S. Johnson, Sikorsky general manager, predicted the crane would revolutionize the transportation industry.

The S-60 can be transformed into a troop carrier by the use of detachable pods. It also can be transformed into a flying emergency hospital for the quick removal and transport of the wounded.

## Polaris Firing Sub Set for Launching

Groton, April 13 (AP)—The Nuclear Submarine George Washington, the first with a ballistic missile capability, is set for launching the 1,500-mile Polaris ballistic missile to be launched here June 9.

The launching date of the new submarine was announced today by the General Dynamics Corp.'s Electric Boat Division, which built the vessel.

Electric Boat said the 380-foot George Washington is equipped with vertical tubes for firing solid-fueled Polaris missiles from either the ocean depths or the surface.

The submarine, if said to be complemented by a torpedo firing capability.

## Fugitive Lama Talks to India About Future

New Delhi, April 13 (AP)—The Dalai Lama consulted today with an Indian government representative about the future and what he wants to tell the world.

Tibet's young fugitive spiritual and temporal leader arrived in Bomdila, near the northeast frontier to the Special Forces P. N. Menon, the Indian Foreign Office visiting, along with crowds of Buddhists who jostled each other to pay homage to the god-king.

The Dalai Lama arrived after a 62-mile trip by horseback from Twang, his first stopping place in the Himalayas after he crossed the frontier. He was expected to rest in Bomdila a few days before going by jeep to the foothills and his first meeting with men since his escape from the Red Chinese.

Prime Minister Nehru has been put in a difficult position by the contact between India and the Dalai Lama, and to his own desire to preserve good relations with the Chinese Communist government. He sent Menon to receive the Dalai Lama and to try to get him not to make any statements before a publication that might anger Peiping.

Nehru himself is expected to meet the fugitive Tibetan ruler April 23 at Mussoorie, the summer capital.

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## Pigeons May Help Find Major Heart Ill Cause

Atlantic City N. J., April 13 (AP)—Pigeons may provide new and valuable aid in the quest to solve the riddle of a major cause of heart disease a group of North Carolina scientists reported today.

Dr. T. B. Clarkson and three associates of Bowman Gray School of Medicine, Winston-Salem, reported they had discovered at least one variety of pigeons fulfilling a long and hitherto fruitless search by science for an inexpensive and readily available animal-with spontaneous atherosclerosis.

"Atherosclerosis," which is a condition in which a mushy material accumulates on the inner lining of blood vessels, thus narrowing the passageways for blood.

The condition is the cause of coronary heart attacks and cerebral strokes in man. The search for its specific origin and for means to prevent it constitutes one of the great efforts of medical science.

In laboratory research, scientists have reproduced it artificially in a number of animal species. But the ideal laboratory subject is an animal which gets the disease spontaneously—that is, naturally, as man himself can. And the few animals that do so have been expensive or otherwise difficult to procure, thus hindering research, the North Carolina doctors said.

Science Meeting Opens

They told about the pigeon find in a scientific exhibit prepared for the opening of the 43rd annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.

Researchers H. B. Lofland, R. W. Prichard and M. G. Netsky were the other three authors of the report.

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## Rockefeller Plans Off-Beat Campaign

Washington, April 13 (AP)—The same off-beat campaigning that landed the 1940 Republican presidential nomination for Wendell L. Willkie apparently is underway for Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York.

Responsible Republicans brought to last week's meeting of the GOP national committee here reports that supporters of Rockefeller are seeking to enlist political amateurs—businessmen and others—as Rockefeller backers.

A GOP national committeeman who has participated in several presidential campaigns described the tactics being employed as similar to those which helped put Willkie over. This committeeman said he has personal knowledge that bankers, lawyers, doctors, insurance men and others with influence in their communities are being urged to line up behind Rockefeller.

The first outward sign of this cropped up recently with the formation of "Californians for Rockefeller." This self-styled group of "political greenhorns," is headed by Charles Lewis, a doctor, Los Angeles businessman.

A state chairman who supports Vice President Nixon for the nomination said he knew of similar activities elsewhere in behalf of Rockefeller. He predicted Nixon's backers soon will be doing the same kind of campaigning on a wide scale.

Rockefeller Afloat

It was explained that Rockefeller himself is standing aloof from the activities being carried on by his backers. He is holding to the line that his only current ambition is to make a good chief executive for his state.

It was noticeable, however, that the governor lost no time in moving one of his closest advisers, George L. Hinman, into a seat as Republican national committee

## Death Claims Actor Gleason

Hollywood, April 13 (AP)—Actor Jimmy Gleason—the dour, long-faced actor who played character roles in scores of Hollywood films—died late last night.

He was 72. He had been in ill health for the past year. Death came at the Motion Picture Country House Hospital in nearby Woodland Hills.

His last part was a minor role in "The Last Hurrah." He was in more than two decades of Hollywood films, including "Down to Earth," "Life of Riley," "Come Fill the Cup" and "What Price Glory."

Cause of death was not immediately reported. He had been in the hospital almost a year ago, suffering from chronic asthma.

Actor Pat O'Brien termed Gleason's death "a great personal loss. Like O'Brien, Gleason was frequently cast as a detective or a Navy non-com—sometimes in the same films. Gleason was godfather to O'Brien's daughter, Mavourneen.

Gleason's wife, former actress Lucille Webster Gleason, died in 1947. Their only son, Russell, an actor and director, died in a fall from a window in December 1945. "It was Jimmy Gleason who
