### The Doctor Says

**Kidney Disease May Strike**  
Body in Variety of Forms

Numerous readers, including Ed. C. Ryan, have asked for a discussion of nephritis. This is a disease of the kidneys, which are also called Bright's disease.

There are several varieties of nephritis, but probably the most common and most serious is the chronic adrenergic nephritis, called by the doctor and young adults.

This goes under the technical name of glomerular nephritis. The associated inflammation can be of sudden onset and produce acute symptoms and signs, or can be chronic in nature.

Probably most cases of acute nephritis result from at least one of the following: infection of the nose, throat or upper breathing passages with germs of the streptococcus family.

In other words, this is frequently associated with sore throat, tonsillitis, rheumatic fever, scarlet fever and other disorders caused by the streptococcus. Some times such definite infection can be identified as a forerunner of acute nephritis.

The line of attack on acute nephritis is therefore aimed at the precipitating cause, if one can be identified. Thus, if a source or focus of infection, such as the tonsils, is the cause, these are often best removed.

In addition, bed rest during the acute phase of the illness is generally desirable as is the restriction of diet and other medication.

Some of the antibiotics, like Penicillin, attack certain streptococci, treatment with such substances is often considered, although the evidence for their value in many cases of acute nephritis is conflicting. A high proportion of those who have a single attack of acute nephritis recover completely.

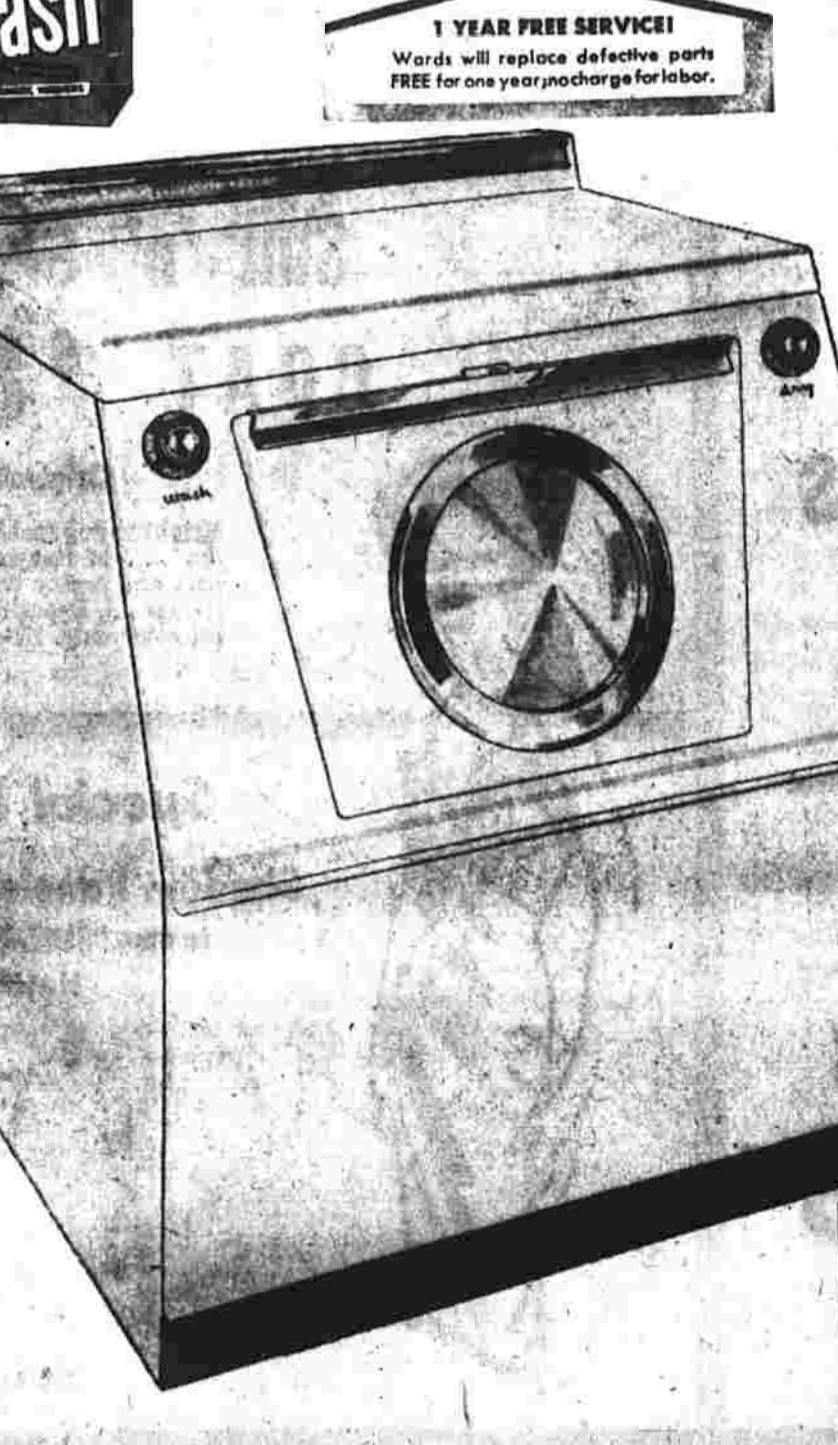

### Andover Finance Unit Sets Budget At \$299,081

A total budget of \$299,081.80 for the next fiscal year has been approved by the Andover Board of Finance for presentation at the annual town budget meeting at 8 p.m. May 2 in the Town Hall.

The budget represents a 60 mill tax rate on a Grand List of \$3,255,153, 77 approved by the voters.

This is predicated on inclusion of the Regional District school budget of \$407,688 approved at the April 13 budget meeting.

The new proposed budget of \$422,136, would mean an increase of about one and a half mills. The town's present rate is 56 mills and was 43 mills the previous year.

The two major items are the town budget of \$191,000.80 and the school budget of \$107,225. An amount of \$1,000 for additional requirements for 1959-60 and \$1,000 provision for uncollected taxes complete the total financial requirements.

The total will be financed by estimated revenues of \$317,225.84, taxation to raise \$193,310.98 and appropriation of surplus \$14,688.68.

The budget provides for increasing the salaries of various town officers as previously recommended. It is stated on a copy of the budget which will be mailed to voters, taxpayers and residents of the town. The meeting will be asked to vote on the proposed salary adjustments.

Estimated salary increases recommended for the 1959-60 fiscal year are: Selectmen, salaries from \$800 to \$1,100; Board of Finance, from \$25 to \$50; town treasurer, \$200 to \$300; tax collector, \$500 to \$750; assessors, \$400 to \$400; town clerk, \$100 to \$200; Justice and Probate courts, \$300 to \$300; and registrars of voters, \$150 to \$200.

Capital outlay items for this year include: Fire engine fund, \$70; emergency truck, \$1,000; Town Hall parking lot, \$1,000; and spreaders \$2,500; and plotting aerial maps, \$500.

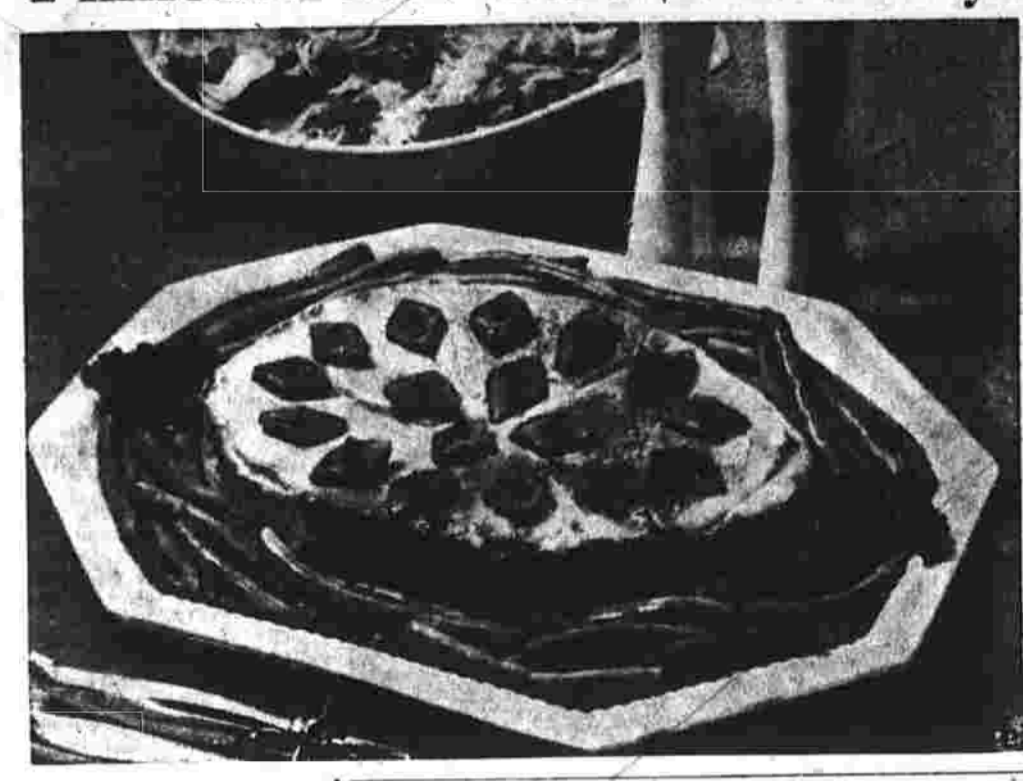

### Rockville-Vernon Hayes Sees Need for Permanent Town SBC

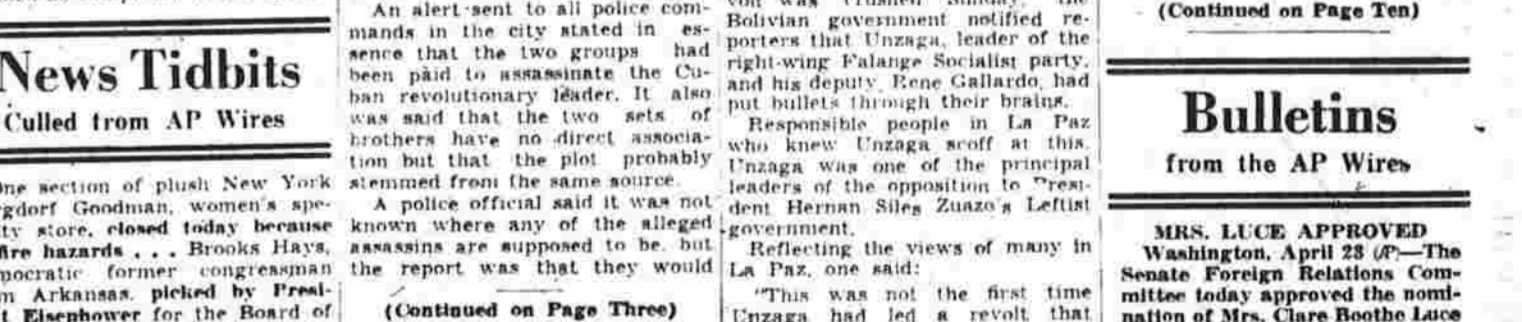

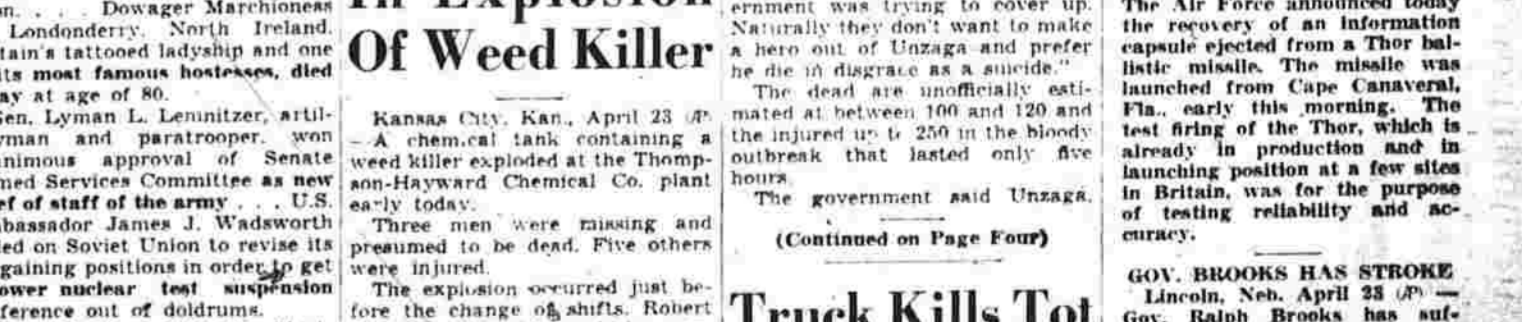
