### Green Manor Appeals Tax

Legal papers announcing three separate tax assessment appeals by Green Manor interests have been served on town officials. Actions are being brought by the Manchester Corp., by Constantine E. Kaplan and Neil Ellis, and jointly by Paramount Exchange and Green Manor Estates. The joint appeal on assessed values of \$360,093 for land and \$1,150,088 for buildings at the Manchester Shopping Parkade is assessed at \$40,847. Apartment buildings assessed for \$465,218 at 424-444 Park St. are assessed for \$1,508 at the rear of the Parkade; land at 364 Broad St. assessed at \$18,000; and on W. Middle St. 7½ lots, assessed at \$1,008; lot 2 on W. Middle St. assessed at \$1,000; and land assessed at \$20,160 and buildings at \$29,939 at 683 Parker St. It also covers personal property including apartment house furniture assessed at \$3,320 and trade fixtures assessed at \$10,080 and \$338. Land and buildings at Pine, Pleasant and Cedar Sts. assessed at \$205,128 are owned by the Minterburn Corp. Constantine E. Kaplan and Neil Ellis own land and buildings at 342 Broad St. assessed at \$49,976. All foregoing figures are those of the assessor's grand list of Oct. 1, 1958. The assessments were unsuccessfully appealed to the Board of Tax Review. The plaintiffs who claim the assessments do not represent "true and actual value," will be represented by the legal firm of Rubinow and LaBelle in the Hartford County Court of Common Pleas actions. Four other assessment appeals have been taken from the 1958 grand list to that court.

The five inmates held the hostages—13 guards and two civilians—for four hours before surrendering meekly, their eyes swollen by their chances of getting out. From the start, were hit by Lt. John C. The troopers, wearing helmets and carrying riot guns and ballistics, with bayonets, carbines and tear gas charges. 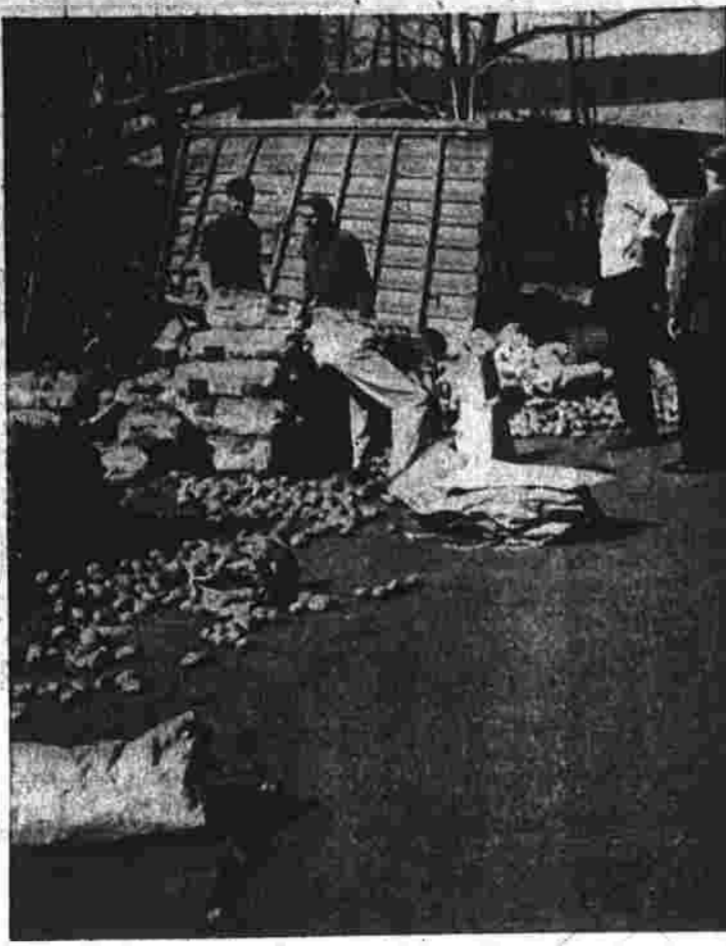
### Rockville-Vernon State House Approves Bill On Town-City Consolidation

The State House of Representatives yesterday passed a bill that outlines procedures for setting up a consolidation commission and writing a charter for Rockville and Vernon. Representatives voted 124 to 111 on the bill after an hour-long debate. It is expected to pass the Senate without difficulty.

Rep. A. Seitz Finney, Republican minority leader, led the opposition to the bill based on the belief that it was an "escape action" circumventing the Home Rule Act. Reps. Harry Hammer and Raymond Spelman of Vernon pointed out that the Home Rule Act did not fit the needs of this community. Majority leader, Samuel George, Democrat, agreed that the Act was "cumbersome" and there should be an alternative procedure. The bill, if passed by the Senate and signed by the Governor, will provide the first legal steps including a consolidation procedure for the town, city and fire district. Within 90 days of the passage of the bill a town meeting must be called in Vernon at which a consolidation charter and a consolidation commission shall be appointed. ### Rockville-Vernon Speaker at B-E Day Urges More Guidance for Students

The school systems in this state are in a "transition" of the type of guidance, and more science awards for the teachers instead of the students.

This opinion was given by Roy Wood Hoover, radiological engineer, before some 200 teachers and businessmen at Rockville High School Tuesday.

Hoover, of Combustion Engineering Co. of Windsor, was speaking on the relationship of the school system to business and education at an Education-Business Day sponsored jointly by the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce and the school system of Vernon, Conn.

The speaker deplored the fact that many persons are getting degrees without knowing what type of work they are going into and often enter a field for which they were not specifically trained.

"The presentation of science awards to the best science pupils would develop competition among the teachers to work harder, Hoover asserted. He stated that in a recent judgment of science exhibits he found a paper which had been copied directly from a textbook.

Emphasizing the need for science research, Hoover said, "We do not know some of the basic fundamentals about such things as welding, stainless steel and plumbing." He suggested that if the school systems could develop some people to get science degrees, they would become more economical. At present the cost per kilowatt hour in electricity is six cents, compared to nuclear power costs ranging in estimates from 12 to 30 mills.

Hoover suggested that the trouble with research scientists is that they have far gone conclusions on experiments. "I think many of the experiments that are made today, especially with cosmic rays, are especially with cosmic rays about what the next generation will be like.

"The amount of benefit which the nuclear age will bring about is certainly much greater than any risk which we must take upon going into it," Hoover concluded. Discussion of the length of time spent in school highlighted a panel talk in which six professional educators participated after Hoover's speech.

The question was first raised by John MacVeagh, principal of Crystal Lake Elementary School and Ellington Junior High School.

He pointed out that the curriculum in high schools is being changed to sign languages specifically.

"Where does the school day end and year end?" he asked.

Dr. Howard Mason, superintendent of Ellington schools, said he has long promulgated lengthening the number of years in elementary education. This would not only reduce the time spent in securing an elementary education but would reduce the cost, he said.

Mason said, methods and content of subject matter must be changed. He expects more stress to be put on human relations, needed to offset the mental stresses and strains of human beings.

"We must redouble our efforts to get faith in the spiritual non-utilitarian values," he said.

### God's Work Topic of Talk By Dr. Goff

With simplicity and flashes of humor the Rev. Dr. Charles Goff spoke on the theme, "The Continuous Work of God" at the spring meeting of the Norwich District Board of Lay Activities Wednesday evening in the South Methodist Church.

Taking his text from the third chapter of John, Moffett translated, "My father has continued working to this hour, and I work, too," the minister was a person of faith.

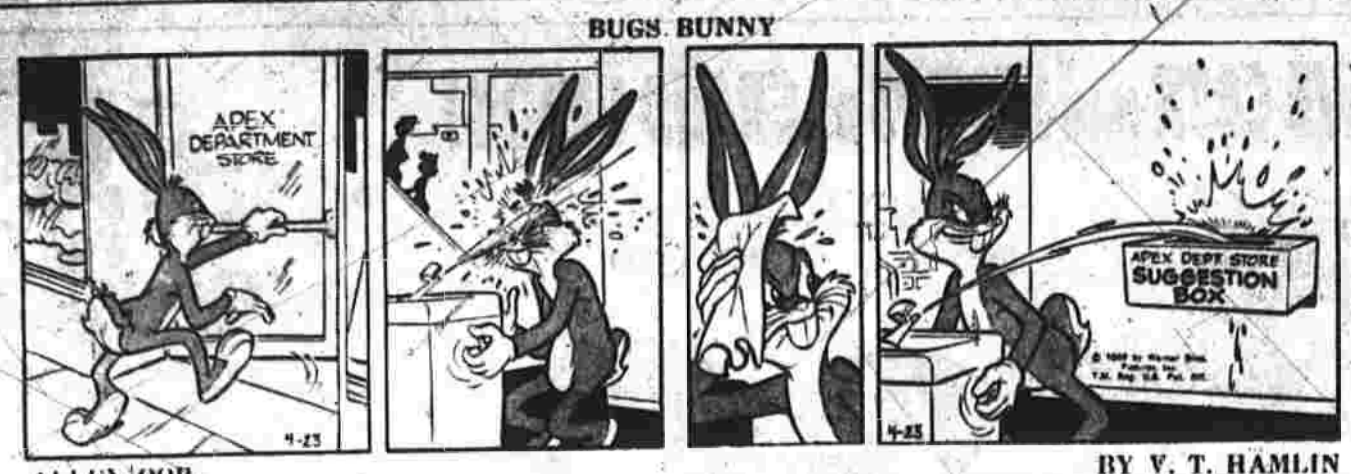

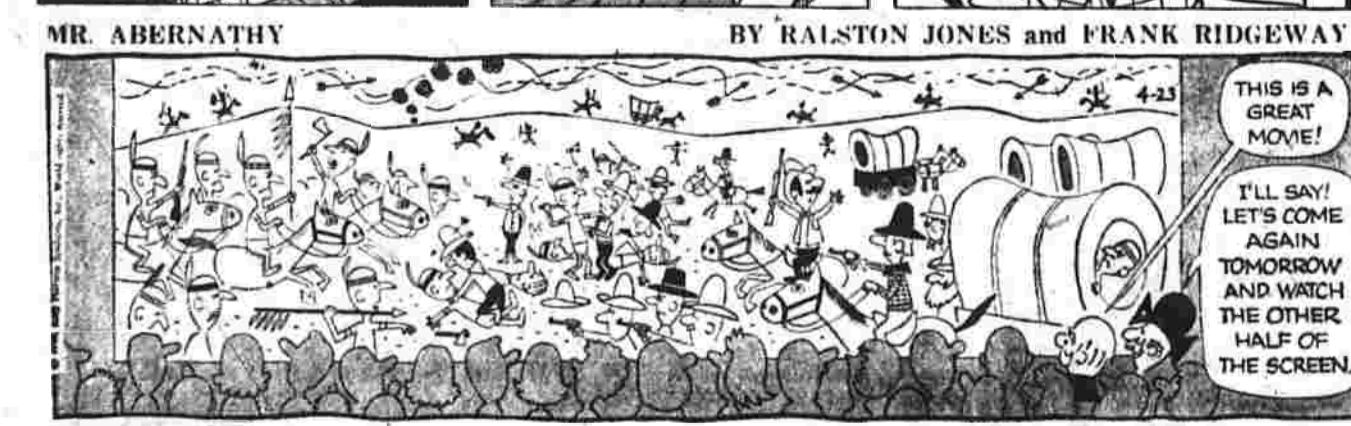

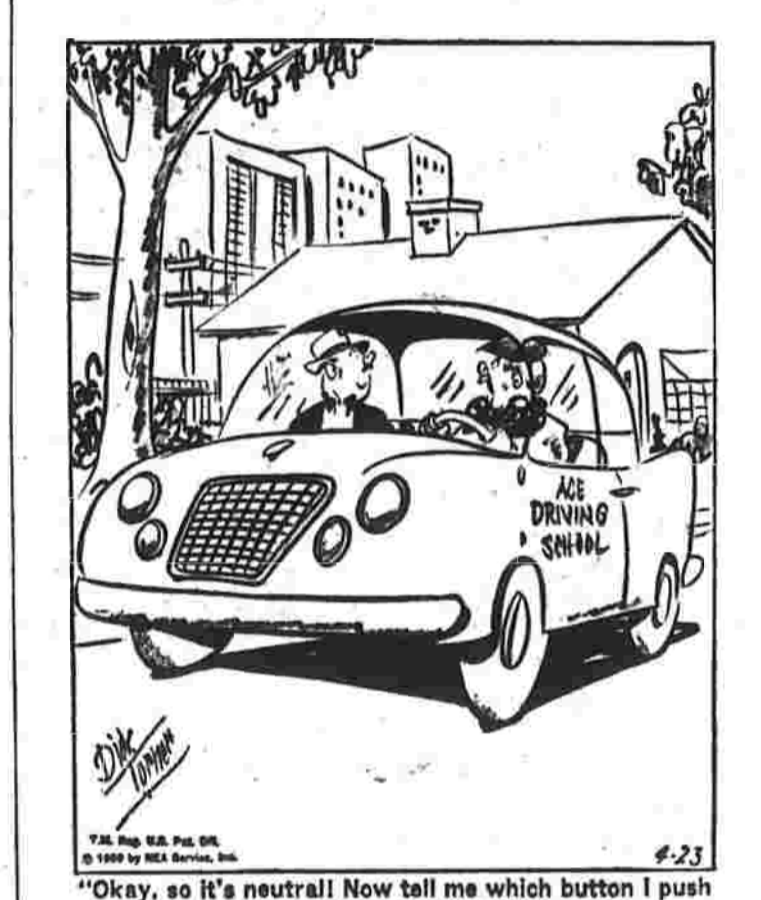

Chicago, April 23 (AP)—Slashing Spider Webb has spun himself into a corner as far as the middleweight title is concerned. Webb last night won his 33rd victory against four opponents with a fourth-round technical knockout of Neal Rivers, but it got him nowhere in his pursuit for Sugar Ray Robinson's 160-pound championship.

Webb, who studied Chicagoan from Idaho State, lived with Fullmer last night, although he had one job before he made Referee Gene White call a halt on the fourth round.

In the third round of the second match, Webb floored his Las Vegas, Nev., foe for a light 18-count with a searing right to the head. Rivers, however, climbed back on his feet and exploded a right fist to the chin with sent Webb reeling from the middle of the ring.

Webb shook off the desperation punch, grinded and came back to carve Rivers' gory visage.

Webb, who was 4-1 favorite, weighed 158 and Rivers 150.
