## Big-3 Plans Study On Detecting High Altitude N-Testing

Geneva, June 15 (AP)—The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union agreed today to a 3-power scientific study of the problem of detecting high altitude nuclear explosions.

A communique issued after a 50-minute meeting of the nuclear test suspension conference said American, British and Soviet scientists will meet in Geneva June 22 to go into this problem and report back to the conference by June 29.

High altitude blasts represent one of the major unresolved problems in establishing an effective control system to police a ban on atomic and hydrogen weapon explosions. The other major problem has to do with underground tests.

The high altitude study was proposed a week ago by Ambassador James J. Wadsworth, head of the American delegation.

The United States and Britain also have called for a technical analysis of the underground explosion problem and the U.S. delegation has introduced a new scientific report on this question. Thus far, however, the Soviet delegation has not committed itself to the underground study. It has simply referred to the American technical data to Soviet scientists.

## Long in Court To Start Fight For Freedom

Galveston, Tex., June 15 (AP)—Louisiana Gov. Earl Long's court bid for freedom from a Texas mental clinic exploded today into a family battle.

District Judge J. D. Godard opened the habeas corpus hearing at 10:15 a.m. today. The hearing resulted from Long's petition that he was removed from his mansion in Baton Rouge, La., three weeks ago under heavy sedation, shackled and taken to the clinic.

The 65-year-old governor's wife signed papers committing her husband to John Sealy Hospital. She claimed he was mentally and physically exhausted.

Long's flight here in a Louisiana National Guard plane followed a blowup by the governor during legislative meetings.

As the hearing opened, Adrian S. Levy, spokesman for Long's three court-appointed attorneys, challenged the presence of attorneys for Mrs. Long. The governor's wife was not in the courtroom today.

Theo Stubbs, who represented the governor's wife, claimed the habeas corpus proceeding was in defiance of a probate court order confining Long to the psychiatric clinic of John Sealy Medical Center.

The probate court on June 2 ordered Long confined to the hospital and later set a sanity hearing for the governor tomorrow.

Levy contended the question of Long's sanity had nothing to do with today's hearing—merely to decide if Long was removed from Baton Rouge against his will.

Long appeared chipper and calm as he arrived at the court house, wearing a tan straw hat, blue suit and two-tone shoes. Dr. Daniel Bobbitt, director of the hospital, an unidentified man and a woman nurse accompanied the governor as police led them through a crowd.

Long shook hands with Associate Press correspondent James McLean from Baton Rouge and

## Welfare Chief Quits At Ribicoff's Request

Hartford, June 15 (AP)—State Welfare Commissioner Christy Hanas resigned this afternoon at the request of Governor Ribicoff.

The Governor at a hastily called news conference this afternoon announced that Hanas submitted his resignation Feb. 18 leaving the effective date blank and the Governor said he filled that date in today after conferring with Hanas.

Asked if there was any reason for the resignation, the Governor replied: "I believe the problems of the Welfare Department can better be handled by someone else."

The governor said Hanas came in to withdraw his resignation today "but so far as I am concerned it is not late."

Asked if he wished to remain in office to serve for a brief time to clean up details or just to stay in office, Hanas said only:

"As far as I am concerned, I haven't resigned."

Deputy Welfare Commissioner John F. Harter has been asked by the Governor to fill in until a successor is named.

The Governor said he expects to name a successor by Wednesday before he leaves for California on an industry hunting tour.

Governor Ribicoff indicated that his decision to accept Hanas' resignation was prompted after preliminary discussions with Henry Page, outside consultant on welfare activities who is making a survey of the department, and State Finance Commissioner George J. Conkling.

"In all fairness to Hanas there are no irregularities on his part," the Governor said.

He said that when he reappointed Commissioner Hanas earlier this year he made it clear that he wanted to keep the situation "fluid."

The Chief Executive pointed out the welfare agency is one of the most important in the State "both from the interests of the recipients as well as the taxpayers."

This marks the second major resignation in the Ribicoff administration to resign in the past week. Highway Commissioner Newman E. Agraves who left his second 4-year term bowed out last week.

Two other commissioners appointed by Governor Ribicoff when he took office in 1955, State Police Commissioner John C. Kelly and State Health Commissioner William H. Horn, failed to gain reappointment.

## 'No Brutality Involved'

## Chief Juror Explains Tallahassee Verdicts

Tallahassee, Fla., June 15 (AP)—The jury which convicted four white youths for the rape of a Negro child decided against the death penalty because there was no evidence of brutality, the jury foreman said last night.

The youths, whose lives were spared by an all-white jury, will remain at Raiford State Prison until their sentencing, which is expected to take place in about 30 days.

If motions for new trials are disallowed, Circuit Judge W. May Walker is expected to order sentence investigations of the four. The judge has given no hint of the penalties he will impose.

The foreman of the jury which convicted the youths said last night the jurors decided against the death penalty because there was no evidence of brutality.

A. H. King, a Tallahassee plantation owner, described how the verdict was reached as an atmosphere of calm returned to this Florida capital city after weeks of tension.

King said that "on the basis of the testimony before us there was evidence of threats with a gun and knife but no brutality was involved."

The foreman said the case was decided "on the law and the evidence" without any consideration of race.

"We would have returned the same verdicts if the defendants had been four Negroes," King said. Four Negroes are awaiting execution in the state prison for raping white women.

One Negro pastor said refusal of the all-white male jury to send the four to the electric chair would give Negroes charged with rape a double standard talking point at their trials.

Dr. A. Joseph Reddick, pastor of the Bethel A.M.E. Church and a former state president of the NAACP, said it was his opinion the decision against a death penalty resulted from "ingrained prejudice by the white jury."

Although Reddick's comments principally were critical, he said the verdict represented some slight gain for Negroes, but not enough.

The four defendants appeared stunned by the verdict. They were whisked off to prison after the jury reported at 12:35 a.m. yesterday.

There was not a murmur in the packed segregated courtroom as the verdicts were announced. Spectators fled out quietly and dispersed. Sheriff Bill Joyce reported no disturbances over the weekend.

"I am so thankful we came through this without one bit of trouble," Joyce said of the six weeks of racial strain since the May 2 rape.

The Negro minister made references to the trial in his services yesterday. The Rev. David Brooks said prayers were offered for the code and the four.

## Industrial Output at New Peak

Washington, June 15 (AP)—The Federal Reserve Board said today that industrial output advanced again in May to a new all time high 4 per cent above the pre-recession peak of early 1957.

The board said its index of industrial production rose a two points to 152 per cent of the 1947-49 average.

The April index figure was revised upward from 149 to 150.

"Expansion in industrial activity continued in May, employment increased further and the decrease in unemployment was again considerably larger than seasonal," the board said. "Consumer incomes and business plans for plant and equipment outlays in 1959 were revised upward."

The index, which measures output of the nation's mines and factories, has advanced from a recession low of 126 in April 1956. Its high point before the recession was 146 in February 1956.

The board said activity in industries making durable goods moved to a new high in May. Durable goods production during the recession and made the slowest recovery.

Production of non-durables continued to expand and mineral output also advanced.

## Ship Afire in Atlantic, 98 in Lifeboats Saved

London, June 15 (AP)—Fire raged on a British ship today as it was abandoned by her crew which was rescued by a German freighter.

The survivors—86 crew and 12 passengers—were picked up by the German freighter *Flavia* bound for Hamburg.

Among those rescued were 10 American employees of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co.

The cable ship, the 4,534-ton *Ocean Layer*, was bound for France, stranding cable along the ocean bed as it went down in the blaze. Radio messages from the *Ocean Layer* broke out in the engine room.

Within 15 minutes of an SOS reporting the fire and asking for help, the British ship *Flavia* radioed that she had been forced to order abandonment ship.

In the scramble to get away from the flame-sept hull, two men were believed to be lost. Spotted by lookouts aboard the *Flavia*, they were taken off in a small boat.

There was no word that anyone had been injured. The sea was calm.

Hours after the rescue the *Ocean Layer* was still burning. A spokesman for the *Ocean Layer*'s owners said radio messages from Capt. Ross had given no clue in the cause of the fire.

The *Ocean Layer*, the world's second largest cable ship, was helping to lay a new Atlantic cable from Newfoundland to France. The British Post Office vessel *Monarch* also is working on the project.

The *Ocean Layer* is a former German cargo ship taken as a prize by the British at the end of World War II. It was converted into a cable ship at a cost of about 3 million pounds (\$12,800,000).

Radio messages from the *Ocean Layer* and the *Flavia* told the story.

First came a report that a small fire had broken out in the engine room of the *Ocean Layer*. Then came a second message that the blaze was getting out of control.

Finally the British ship flashed a distress call that the ship was being abandoned and appealed to all vessels in the area for help. At least three ships, including the U.S. Navy transport *Upshur*, quickly altered course and pounded the scene. The *Flavia* arrived first.

Later the *Upshur* radioed that the *Flavia* had the situation in hand and that the transport had rescued 98 survivors from the *Ocean Layer*. She is carrying 400 military personnel and 400 civilians and service dependents.

The *Ocean Layer*, owned by Submarine Cables Ltd. of London, left the Irish port of Cobh May 29. It would not be learned at once whether she was laying or repairing Transatlantic cable.

## May Suggests Ribicoff Keep Kelly as Chief

Hartford, June 15 (AP)—GOP State Chairman Edwin H. May Jr. today charged that Governor Ribicoff's decision not to reappoint State Police Commissioner John C. Kelly "throws the State Police Department into politics" and urged reconsideration.

The May statement appealing to the Governor to reverse his decision, came amid reports that State Civil Defense Director Leo J. Mulcahy, Old Lyme Democrat, has the inside track as the successor to Kelly, Ridgefield Republican.

Captain Mulcahy, who is on leave from the State Police Department, was a candidate for the commissioner four years ago when the Governor remained Kelly.

However, since the Governor has already announced that he will not reappoint Kelly when his term expires July 1, it is felt that Mulcahy will reach his long sought ambition.

"This is certainly one department which should be above partisan political consideration in the matter of appointments," May added.

"I believe the Governor's deflection casts an undesired reflection on Commissioner Kelly," May added. "The fact that the Governor has stated that he would reappoint Kelly in 1955 that he would reappoint him for only one term is actually all the Governor could say since he had no certain knowledge in 1955 that he would be making any appointments as Governor in 1959."

Furthermore, he expressed the fear that the State Police Department would be "undermined if the department is to become a vehicle of political patronage."

## 2 Toll-Free Bridges Scheduled for Oct. 1

Hartford, June 15 (AP)—The Founders and Bulkeley bridges, two of the five Hartford area toll bridges over the Connecticut River are to become toll-free by Oct. 1.

The Bulkeley and Founders spans link downtown Hartford with East Hartford. The other bridges, which will retain their tolls, are the Windsor-South Windsor, Wethersfield-Glastonbury, and Charter Oak.

Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff set the deadline for lifting the tolls on the two bridges Saturday as he announced that the state has finished the preparatory financial arrangements for bringing all five under state control.

The bridges are now administered by the Greater Hartford Bridge Authority (GHBA), which issued bonds to finance construction of the Founders, Wethersfield-Glastonbury and Windsor-South Windsor Bridges in recent years. The other two have been standing for considerably longer.

When only the Charter Oak and the Bulkeley crossed the river, the former was toll and the latter free. When the other bridges were built, tolls were put on all, including the Bulkeley.

This situation caused friction in the Hartford area, particularly in towns on the east side of the river. Residents of these towns resented having to pay to cross the Bulkeley bridge, which had been free for many years.

The recently adjourned Legislature approved the issuing of \$38 million of general obligation state bonds to take over the bridges.

## Mansfield Says Don't Rule Out Adlai, Johnson

Washington, June 15 (AP)—Don't count Adlai E. Stevenson or Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) out of the 1960 Democratic presidential contest, advises Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.).

But the assistant Senate Democratic leader said he thinks as of today the leading contestant, and noted that Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) and Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) have increased their activities.

On the other side of the political fence, Sen. Hugh Scott (R-Pa.) predicted Vice President Richard M. Nixon will win the Republican nomination easily. Scott said New York's Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller may not head the ticket chosen at some future convention.

When Stevenson arrived here to attend weekend meetings of the Democratic Advisory Council he brought along a scribbled answer for what has become to him the inevitable question: Will he be available for a third nomination?

"I am not a candidate for the nomination and will not be none," Stevenson replied when reporters put the expected query. But he said he will help the Democratic party in any way he can next year. Mansfield indicated he can agree with the first part of Stevenson's answer, but not necessarily his statement that he will not be nominated.

## 5 Persons Die In Early Hours Road Crashes

Early-morning traffic accidents brought death to five persons on Connecticut highways yesterday and today.

A crash early today at the Greenwich Toll Station on the Connecticut Turnpike involving a 3-ton van truck loaded with lobster traps and a large trailer-tractor truck killed two Canadians who were in the lobster truck.

Adelard F. Cormier of Buctouche, New Brunswick, Canada, died instantly in the crash. Clarence Cormier, 21, of St. Maurice, Kent County, N. B., died several hours later at Greenwich Hospital. Police said they assumed the men were brothers but did not know it.

Police said the trailer truck was parked in the toll station when the other truck rammed it from the rear with great force. The cause of the accident is unknown. Ernest King, 45, of New Haven, driver of the trailer truck, was uninjured.

Managua, Nicaragua, June 15 (AP)—President Luis Somoza's regime today sought proof for the Organization of American States (OAS) that the young socialites who tried to topple his regime got substantial help from other Latin American governments.

Somoza's aides stepped up their efforts after the government had staged a triumphal parade through the capital yesterday in a show of confidence that the small-scale, 2-week-old revolt was over.

Officials announced, however, that further invasion attempts by Nicaraguans might be made in the near future. This belief gave urgency to the charges and evidence being collected for the OAS investigating team expected here tomorrow.

The almost bloodless coup appeared to have sputtered out with the surrender of 16 rebel holdouts who were ambushed by National Guardsmen Saturday night when they sought to buy food in a village.

## West-3 Awaits Soviet Back Down on Berlin

Geneva, June 15 (AP)—Foreign minister of the United States, Britain and France met today with Andrei A. Gromyko late today in what would be the most critical session of the Big Four conference.

Western diplomats said that unless the Soviet foreign minister showed readiness to lift the Soviet threat to West Berlin, the talks probably would end in a few days without agreement on a summit conference. Many expected, however, that Gromyko would open some road to compromise.

The Big Four met at the villa of France's Maurice Couve de Murville after an hour-long discussion among the western ministers.

Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd of Britain returned in early afternoon from consultations with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in London. He was reported to have advocated western caution in trying to adjourn or recess the conference, now entering its sixth week.

Lloyd and Secretary of State Christian A. Herter had a private talk before the western strategy session, and the Big Four huddle.

U.S. officials said that if Gromyko came up with no new ideas today the western powers would expect the talks to go on for probably two more meetings in a search for an agreeable formula for breaking off negotiations.

Western diplomats still talked of some compromise which would lift the immediate Soviet threat to West Berlin and shove the Russian's proposed new one-year time limit on the western occupation.

Diplomatic sources in Moscow said they believed Premier Nikita Khrushchev and the Soviet Communist party Presidium were drafting new instructions for Gromyko. One diplomatic source predicted that the Geneva conference would end in an agreement preserving the Berlin "status quo" with face savers on both sides.

The western foreign ministers apparently vary in their determination to break off negotiations if Gromyko does not modify his position. Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd of Britain was reported to be far more interested in continuing negotiations than are Herter and Couve de Murville.
