## Death Count 19 In Butane Fire

Meldrim, Ga., June 29 (AP)—An Associated Press check of all hospitals and funeral homes in the area today fixed at 17 the number of dead in the freak butane gas explosion on a freight train yesterday. An earlier report said 19 were dead.

Meldrim, Ga., June 29 (AP)—Rescue teams renewed dragging operations in the Ogeechee River today searching for more victims of a freak butane gas explosion that already apparently has claimed 19 lives. Many others were burned, at least 10 critically.

The blast occurred yesterday afternoon when two railroad tank cars spewed flaming steam on some 175 foot-seekers in a recreation area beneath a 30-foot river trestle which the Seaboard Air Line train was crossing.

No one could say whether all bodies had been recovered, but Coroner Harold M. Smith said reports that dozens were unaccounted for were greatly overdrawn.

Smith said at the time he had accounted for 17 dead. Since then two children died of burns in a Savannah hospital. They were listed as Wayne Smith, 3, and Terry Lane, 9. Their addresses were not known.

## Ribicoff Says West Primary Up to Kennedy

Hartford, June 29 (AP)—Governor Ribicoff said today it would be "presumptuous" for him to tell U.S. Sen. John F. Kennedy to stay out of a California Democratic primary.

The Connecticut Chief Executive returned to his desk this morning after a 10-day industry hunt for the cooking and heating fuel.

The Governor, chief stalking horse for Kennedy as a presidential nominee, said he was given the very definite impression that California Democrats are hopeful a presidential primary can be avoided in that state.

He said Gov. Edmund G. "Pat" Brown and other Democrats on the coast "were very unhappy over the prospect of any primary."

"This was the feeling they expressed to me," Gov. Ribicoff said, "and I certainly will relay their feeling to Senator Kennedy."

However, he hastened to add that the decision as to whether to stay away from a California primary will have to be made by Kennedy himself.

The Governor, who plans to confer with Kennedy in the next 10 days, said he felt the Bay State Senator should not make any commitment at this time on whether or not he would go into a primary, but rather await developments.

Ribicoff described the California governor as "a very capable gentleman and he felt sure the friendship developed on the trip 'will be a flourishing one.'"

He said that his junket in search of industry anxious to locate branch plants in the East was "very interesting, enjoyable and worthwhile."

He said that he had a number of private conferences with officials of California companies, "contemplating locating branch plants in the East."

As the Governor returned to his chair he rolled up a packet of 20 bills awaiting his action.

The measures are the last batch of 1,267 bills passed by the recently adjourned 1955 session of the Legislature.

## Long Will Seek Divorce, Push Political Purge

Winnfield, La., June 29 (AP)—Gov. Earl Long, refreshed after a weekend at his beloved "peach farm," heads across state to Corning today to place himself under a team of psychiatrists.

Long is also extending his political purge, divorcing his wife, planning a special session of the legislature and starting his campaign for re-election.

"I'm going to get a divorce just as fast as I can," he said of the wife, who twice committed him to a psychiatric hospital. Mrs. Long has since left the state.

Long plans to remain at Covington until Friday night. Then he will go to Baton Rouge for the first time since his commitment to Southeast Louisiana State (Mental) Hospital at Mandeville on June 18.

The 65-year-old governor discussed his plans yesterday in a 15-minute news conference on the back porch of the simple, frame farm house that his estranged wife, Blanche, calls "Earl's Shack."

The conference appeared to have been called by the governor, who must have seen the 12 to 15 newsmen gathered about 50 yards from his house. Police allowed them except when they were talking to members of the governor's official party.

The governor, clad in pajamas and a bathrobe, did most of the talking. Only about two or three questions were asked before the governor's advisors and psychiatrist, Dr. Paul Priddy, of the conference had lasted long enough.

# Excise Tax Extension Awaits House Action



## Bill Would Continue Hike for Korea War

Washington, June 29 (AP)—The House today passed the \$3 million corporation-excise tax extension bill and sent it to the Senate for approval before the deadline at midnight Tuesday.

Washington, June 29 (AP)—Congress acts today on a compromise corporation-excise tax extension bill to avert a \$3 billion drop in tax revenues for the next year.

The House acts first and the Senate must follow quickly if present tax rates are to be continued beyond tomorrow midnight.

It was the sixth time that Congress has been called on to continue increased tax rates voted initially in 1951 to finance the Korean fighting.

The bill extends for another year the Korean wartime 52 per cent income tax rate on corporation profits. It postpones a scheduled drop to 47 per cent.

It also continues for a year Korean excise, or sales, tax rates on automobiles, auto parts and accessories, cigarettes, liquor, wine and beer.

A compromise of Senate-House differences, the bill was not popular with Senators who voted last week to add other tax features. These were either killed out of the bill entirely or watered down to token size by a Senate-House conference committee.

Knocked out were Senate-passed provisions for repeal of the 4 per cent stock dividend credit allowed stockholders on dividend income over \$50, and authority for payment of \$142 million of additional welfare grants to the states.

Retained in sharply modified form were Senate provisions affecting the 10 per cent taxes on communications and passenger tickets.

But working against a deadline little more than 24 hours off, Congress had almost no time in which to haggle over revising the bill.

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Failure to extend the rate would mean a tax loss to the government of an estimated \$2,138,000,000 a year. Even the loss entailed by short delay could have serious effect on the administration's 1960 budget.

The compromise provides for repeal of the 10 per cent tax on local phone calls effective June 30, 1960, unless Congress later decides otherwise. The Senate voted outright repeal of the tax on all telephone, telegraph and cable messages, with a revenue loss of \$735 million.

## U.S. Court Voids Ban On 'Lady Chatterley'

Washington, June 29 (AP)—The Supreme Court today struck down the New York state movie censorship law as unconstitutional.

The ruling set aside a ban on the film "Lady Chatterley's Lover."

All nine Justices agreed in holding that the ban on "Lady Chatterley's Lover" was improper.

However, four Justices said the court moved too swiftly in striking down the New York law. They were Justices Harlan, Whitaker, Clark and Frankfurter.

Justice Stewart delivered the court's main opinion. Speaking of the New York law, Stewart said:

"What New York has done is to prevent the exhibition of a motion picture because that picture advocates an idea—that adultery under certain circumstances may be proper behavior. Yet the First Amendment's basic guarantee is of freedom to advocate ideas. The state quite simply has thus struck at the very heart of constitutionally protected liberties."

The movie is based on a novel by D. H. Lawrence, first published in 1928. The story concerns the intimacies between a high-born Englishwoman and a caretaker on her husband's estate.

## U.S. Charges Meddling Reds Protest Election Plans for West Berlin

Berlin, June 29 (AP)—West Germany pushed ahead today with plans for a presidential election in isolated Berlin despite Soviet warnings such a move will be viewed as a provocation.

Official Russian news agency said Communist German officials said they would look on the election 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain with "great seriousness."

## Documents Air Red-Nazi Pact To Split World

Washington, June 29 (AP)—During the Nazi-Soviet pact in the early days of World War II, Russia and Germany reached the stage of discussing how they would carve up a large part of the world.

In once-secret documents made public over the weekend by the State Department, Russia was pictured as interested in acquiring territory in Finland, Sweden, Turkey, Iran, Afghanistan and the Far East.

No definite agreement was reached between the two totalitarian countries on staking out territory, but each government was thoroughly understood the interests and the desires of the other," the papers say.

Even as these talks were going on in 1940, other reports said Adolf Hitler's staff was preparing plans to invade Russia. He did so in June 1941. Premier Joseph Stalin was said to be unwilling to go to war against Germany as long as Hitler's military might was unimpaired. The Nazi invasion forced

## Congress Told Act Now, Avoid More Inflation

Washington, June 29 (AP)—A cabinet committee has reported to President Eisenhower that Congress must take three immediate steps to control inflation.

The committee, headed by Vice President Richard M. Nixon and made up mostly of cabinet members, said in its first report that the country's economy is at a "critical juncture." Congress, it said, must take these minimum steps promptly:

1. "Make it clear that the federal government intends to use all appropriate means to protect the buying power of the dollar and recognize 'reasonable price stability' as an explicit goal of federal economic policy."

2. Balance the budget by refraining from going beyond the expenditures provided in the President's budget, both this year and in 1960 to come; and reduce the national debt.

3. Remove the interest ceiling on government bonds. Otherwise the Treasury will have to issue short term bonds "equivalent to money." There is very little difference between this and "just cranking up the printing press and rolling out greenbacks," the report said.

## TOT FOUND ALIVE, WELL

Iron Mountain, Mich., June 29 (AP)—Lost for 13 hours in Upper Michigan woods, 3-year-old Carol Vanhalla, of Saginaw, Wis., was found alive and well today. Searchers found the child in a wooded area after bloodhounds picked up a new trail this morning. That crossed a county road and went east to Norway Lake. Hundreds of volunteers had joined the search led by 80 state troopers and sheriff's men.

## INTEREST RATE COMPROMISE

Washington, June 29 (AP)—A compromise giving the President authority to fix the interest ceiling on government bonds was reached tentatively today by the administration and House Democratic tax leaders. Secretary of the Treasury Robert B. Anderson accepted the proposal as a solution to the controversy over repeal of the 14 per cent interest rate ceiling on long-term government bonds.
