As You Like It

The University of Connecticut summer theater season opened last night with the performance of "The Desperate Hours," by Joseph Hayes. The play was directed by Cecil E. Hildner. Sets were by Fred Condon and lighting was by Walter Blind.

In his direction of this taut drama about a family held captive by three bandits, Hildner made great use of the spotlight scene change.

While the main set represented the interior of the Hilliard home, the right procedure was a police station call room, and the left procedure was an attic of a near-by home.

Hildner picked the action from the next through his use of lights. The technique was very effective in the last three scenes. The hands had been caught, the police and the family had time for separate meditations, but since all the action of the play seemed to have been completed, each flick of the lights seemed to be the signal for the end of the play.

A slight adjustment of the technique, dimming the lights between scenes instead of turning them out, would smooth out the continuity until such time as the theater gets an audience which is more familiar with the play.

Green Griffin, the leader of the three bandits, He did an excellent job, producing an arrogant, mouthy tough. Roy Bacon as Robson was also a great deal more with the part. The reversal of thinking in this play for Robson was interesting. He was confronted with a decent girl who suddenly became doubtful of the code by which he had lived his life. The girl's reaction to his hands was a helpful lifting of the hands.

The best performance among those who played the captive family was given by Peter Verill, who played the young son, John. Susan Dolan, who played the 20-year-old daughter, these, however, were bit parts.

Mittie Kettle, as the mother, was believable until she had to be emotional. Her line to her husband as he is about to defend his family, "You are the hub," was flat.

Frank S. Wells as the father gave a ragged performance. For the most part he acted well, in the difficult part of a man who alternated from pleading to bullying his captives. Yet Robson was in his performance, some lack of stage presence that did not ring true.

The three lawmen, Tom Winston, played by Sylvester Currell; Jesse Bard, played by Frank Simpson; and Harry Carson, played by Henry Crane, were well done. The sets were excellent.

The play is an auspicious opening for the season. It's not for children because of persistent foul language, but adults should find it good summer diversion.

Conducted by the Manchester "Berk Chop Hill," starring Gregory Peck, will open tonight at the State Theater. This is as good a war picture as "Battle Cry," if not much better. It does not show any one man's personality in depth, yet, through showing a number of first-rate men, then another, it presents a convincing composite. The most effective scene is where the platoon walks toward the hill they are to take, before the shooting begins. The spectator is appalled by the courage needed for a soldier to stand and walk in silence.

woman in her home. Attempted rape in South Carolina.
"Little more than 24 hours earlier, Martin P. Fred Davis, a native of Atlanta, was convicted by an all-white jury of raping a 41-year-old Negro woman."

Should Davis go to the electric chair, it would be the first recorded execution of a white man for raping a Negro woman.

Judge J. Henry Johnson commented last night after the jury returned its verdict in the Sharpe case.

"The verdict should establish beyond all doubt that any person regardless of race, color or creed, can get justice in South Carolina."

"I can't see how any different verdict could have been given in either case."

Sharpe was convicted of forcing his wife into the home of a Manhattan child and a child and was away and attempting to rape the child.

Publication of the name of the woman in a rape case is prohibited by South Carolina law.

A neighbor heard her screams and called police. The assistant S.D. Sharpe was picked up at his home an hour and a half later. Sheriff J. E. McTeer testified at Davis' trial that the young man, an electrician, was admitted to his home by the woman.

Davis later denied he had admitted her to his home. He said she consented.

The woman herself testified that Davis dragged her into his home near the National Cemetery and raped her.

DELICATE PLAY BRINGS OUT OPPONENT

U.S. Masters club champions. It isn't enough to look the dice if you're trying to keep somebody out. Better close the windows. The same principle applies to shutting an opponent out of a bridge table.

West opens the king of hearts and you refuse the first trick. This hold-up play is a way of closing the door to West to see what he has. You want to take the ace of hearts when East plays his last heart. The idea is to prevent East from having a heart if he wins a trick later.

How do you know that East has only two hearts to begin with? You don't. But if East has a third heart, the suit is no threat. The opponents can take only three hearts and a club. The suit is dangerous only if West has five or six hearts.

You must now develop the clubs without allowing West to gain the lead. For this purpose, you must bid a diamond to dummy. Then bid a small club towards your hand.

East cannot gain by putting up the queen; you will simply let his queen win the trick. He therefore plays a low club, and you take the king.

West leads a low club towards dummy. You win the ten, and you trick with from the dummy. You play to the queen or jack of clubs.

As it happens, East does have three clubs. He has a heart and two spades. If you had a heart and a chance, you would have a chance.

Dr. Oiler said another memorable thing: "No man is really happy or safe without a hobby, and it makes precious little difference what the outside interest may be."

Hypochondria, the morbid preoccupation with one's own health, is perhaps the most suitable of all hobbies after the age of 40—because it is the most natural. After 40 if you don't worry about yourself, nobody will.

There is little point in taking up hypochondria in youth. During that period of life all one generally suffers from is the more uninteresting complaints—such as sprained ankles, broken limbs, busted hearts.

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Ike, Kozlov Confer On Berlin Deadlock

The heads of government could discuss Moscow's demand that Khrushchev also said he expects some serious discussions with Kozlov.

Only minutes after the President's remarks, Kozlov arrived at the White House to start the talks.

The Soviet vice premier, wearing a big smile, was five minutes early for his appointment. He was accompanied by Meshkov and an interpreter.

"Good" (phonetic spelling) Kozlov called out to newsmen as he stepped from his limousine. He posed for pictures, waving his right hand before he went into Eisenhower's office.

Kozlov was fresh from a conference with Secretary Herter.

At the State Department he was accompanied by Meshkov and three aides.

Afterward the Russians said Kozlov and Herter discussed views of their governments on questions discussed at the Geneva conference.

Herter also called into the White House conference, where said Geneva news was discussed.

In contrast to the visit a few months ago of Anastas I. Mikoyan, also a Soviet first deputy premier, there were neither press demonstrations nor a curious crowd when Kozlov arrived at the State Department.

The smiling Kozlov, a top candidate to succeed Premier Nikita Khrushchev, arrived yesterday for a 3-day round of talks. He had no press stepped off his plane than he began plugging the idea of friendly cooperation between Russia and the United States as a path to enduring peace.

Vice President Nixon, who greeted Kozlov at his arrival yesterday, also was given the assignment of emphasizing to Kozlov that the Soviet Union can not force more concessions from the West.

Nixon particularly was to make clear that Eisenhower will refuse to meet Khrushchev at a summit meeting unless the East-West foreign ministers conference makes solid progress in bridging the East-West differences over Germany.

Kozlov will be Nixon's guest tonight at a diplomatic reception in the President's guest house across the street from the White House.

State to Lead In Regulating Frozen Foods

Hartford, July 1 (AP)—Connecticut will soon put into effect the first set of regulations in the nation aimed at controlling the quality of frozen foods. State Commissioner of Consumer Protection Athilo R. Prasad announced today.

The regulations will require that frozen foods be maintained at zero degrees temperature (fahrenheit) from the time they leave the manufacturer until the consumer buys them.

The regulations are to be drawn up from a uniform code adopted last month at the convention of AFOCUS, Association of Food and Drug Officials of the U.S.

Commissioner Prasad said that the regulations will be ready in 60 to 90 days.

The chairman of the committee that drew up the code is Harold Clark, chief of the state commissioner's Food Division.

"The biggest problem will be in the handling of frozen foods in transport," the commissioner said. "We will be cautioning that no transporter should leave a shipment on somebody's loading platform overnight."

Clark said that alternate freezing and thawing of frozen foods has extremely harmful effects on quality.

Long distance trailer trucks generally maintain the required temperatures, he said, but retail delivery trucks will need the most improvement to comply with the regulations when they go into effect.

The regulations will cover the retail, warehousing and transportation of frozen foods, the commissioner said.

Brink's Robbers Lose Court Plea

Bozton, July 1 (AP)—The conviction of the eight men now serving life sentences for the \$120,000 Brink's robbery, the greatest hold-up in the United States history, was upheld today by the state supreme court.

In a lengthy decision, Chief Justice Raymond S. Wilkins, the court rejected the appeal of the bandit group.

Counsel had claimed that the defendants were prejudiced by receiving a fair trial because of publicity in the press, radio and television.

The holdup took place Jan. 17, 1950 and the robbers were arrested and tried in 1956 in Suffolk Superior Court after the expiration of the six-year period for damage tender claims has been extended by a Federal manufacturing law.

Hams Check Weekend Log Of Contacts

Between 500 and 600 contacts with radio amateurs in the United States and Canada is the latest estimate of results of the Manchester Radio Club's 24-hour vigil atop Vernon's Box Mountain during the weekend.

Club Secretary Paul E. Duttale said the final figures are not available yet, but will be compiled from the club's log books shortly.

Club members originally estimated about 400 contacts had been made. The exact figures will be sent to the American Radio Relay League in Hartford, and will be evaluated with the records of other amateur clubs around the country.

About 30 Manchester ham operators braved wind and rain on the mountain top from 8 p.m. Saturday to 8 a.m. Sunday. The 24-hour session was an annual field day exercise and drill set up by the ARRL.

Despite the poor weather, the loss of an antenna and the temporary disruption of one of the transmitters, the hams said they had a successful weekend, with better than hoped-for results.

Ideal weather might not have been good for getting but it was ideal for radio transmission. There was very little interference noted, he said.

Transmitter signals on four or six frequencies, the radioemitter made contact with amateurs in such places as Florida, Massachusetts, Iowa, Ontario and other Canadian provinces. The farthest contact was with a radio club in California.

The club members set up camp at the end of Box St. and sheltered their equipment under tents. A rain puddle on the roof of one shelter caused the roof to sag and a cascade of water to swamp some of the equipment.

The Doctor Says

Old Wives' Tales Surround Subject of Hysterectomy

A series of rather complex questions is presented by a reader.

She quotes a newspaper report that a gynecologist had recommended that every woman over 40 should have a hysterectomy as a cancer-prevention measure.

She adds that among women she knows it is generally believed that it is virtually impossible to find a surgeon to perform a hysterectomy unless there is a clear and present need. Also, that the only unpleasant aftereffects are a tendency to put on weight and become hairier and that, treatment to control the aftereffects is very costly.

Finally, the writer notes a widespread fear of the effect of this procedure on marital life.

I think I should explain what is customarily meant by a hysterectomy.

Ordinarily today this consists in the removal of the womb, or uterus, leaving in place the other feminine structures, including the ovaries. Occasionally an operation is performed known as a panhysterectomy, which involves removal of the ovaries and uterus, or fallopian tubes, as well as the womb.

In the latter case the effects are likely to be more profound, since it is the ovaries which produce hormones as well as eggs.

I did not notice the press report to which the reader refers. But I believe the suggestion that every woman over 40 have a hysterectomy as a cancer-prevention step is a view not shared by the majority of students of this subject. It is an opinion which many would oppose.

The correspondent is doubtless correct that most surgeons do not like to perform a hysterectomy unless there is a definite need for it. It is, after all, a major surgical procedure and carries some, though modest, risks. Therefore it is not something to recommend lightly.

If there is a tendency to put on weight, this is warranted by the fact that the ovaries were removed in a panhysterectomy, and not the operation itself.

As to increasing hairiness, I do not believe this is warranted by the fact that the ovaries were removed in a panhysterectomy, and not the operation itself.

Treatment of the aftereffects of a hysterectomy is generally not needed. If the ovaries were removed in a panhysterectomy, it is possible that hormone treatment would be desirable. But I should doubt that this would be especially expensive.

Finally, there should be no psychological effect on marital relations from a hysterectomy. In many women there is actually improved by losing fear of unwanted pregnancy.

The East Germans scheduled a vote July 1 in East Berlin for the election of a new president. The vote was expected to be a landslide for the Christian Democratic party.

A candidate to win on the first or second ballot had to get the support of one more than half the delegates — or 550 votes. The Christian Democrats have 517 delegates, the Socialists 356 and the Free Democrats 45. The rest of the 50 votes are scattered among the small Bavarian, Rhenish and German parties.

Erhard's critics of the economic minister have brought two open breaks between them, but each time the split has been patched up, at least formally.

The electoral college is made up of the 519 members of the Bundestag, the lower house of parliament, and an equal number chosen by the 10 state parliaments.

Broiled Tuna in Summer Sandwich

My, how the life and times of the sandwich have changed. I brought into being at an 18th Century gaming table—or so legend has it—by the Fourth Earl of Sandwich, his "sandwich" was meat between bread so he could eat with his hand and hold his cards with the other.

By the time England's King, Boston put recipes for the sandwich in her famous 18th Century cook book it had only six fillings: anchovy, caviar, cucumber, foie gras, oyster and cheese.

In the United States, even as knowing and well-traveled a writer as Philadelphia's Miss Leslie gave sandwiches short shift. In her 1857 "New Cookery Book" she says: "Sandwiches are slices of cold ham, or tongue, cut very thin, and laid between thin slices of buttered bread. The meat may be seasoned with French mustard. Roll them up nicely. There are silver cases made to contain sandwiches to eat on the road when traveling."

It took 20th Century cooks and customs to go to town on the sandwich—from tea-time "slatters" to suburban. One of the best-known of present-day all-around cook books gives about 100 ways to make the sandwich.

One of our favorites for warm weather is the open-face broiled sandwich. Because all-odd menus get tiresome in summer, this quickly heated snack often is just the thing for lunch. Made from such a pantry-able staple as tuna, it's easy to prepare.

\$500 Bonus Legal For Legislators

Hartford, July 1 (AP)—State Comptroller Raymond B. Thatcher, who wanted a legal opinion before paying the members of the 1959 General Assembly the \$500 bonus they voted themselves for expenses, has been assured it's all right to start giving out the checks.

Thatcher had asked State Attorney General Albert L. Cosis for an official ruling on the legality and constitutionality of issuing the extra pay.

Cosis said Rep. Harry Williams (R-Ansonia), who was elected to replace Burdett, also entitled to the expense payment.

Cosis yesterday told Thatcher it's okay to pay the legislators the expense money. But he said the action could be challenged in the courts.

The lawmakers voted themselves the \$500 for expenses when they voted to raise the salary of legislators who serve in future sessions. Beginning with the 1961 legislature, members will get a \$2,000 salary, \$500 for expenses, and 18 cents per mile for travel to and from the capitol.

Before this raise, they got only \$600 per session in salary plus the mileage allowance.

The expense allowance for the members of the 1959 legislature will cost the state \$137,000.

Two legislators who died during the session, Rep. Gerritt Burdett (R-Danbury) and Rep. Robert Keeler (R-Ridgefield), earned the bonus too. Cosis said so the state of each will receive the money.

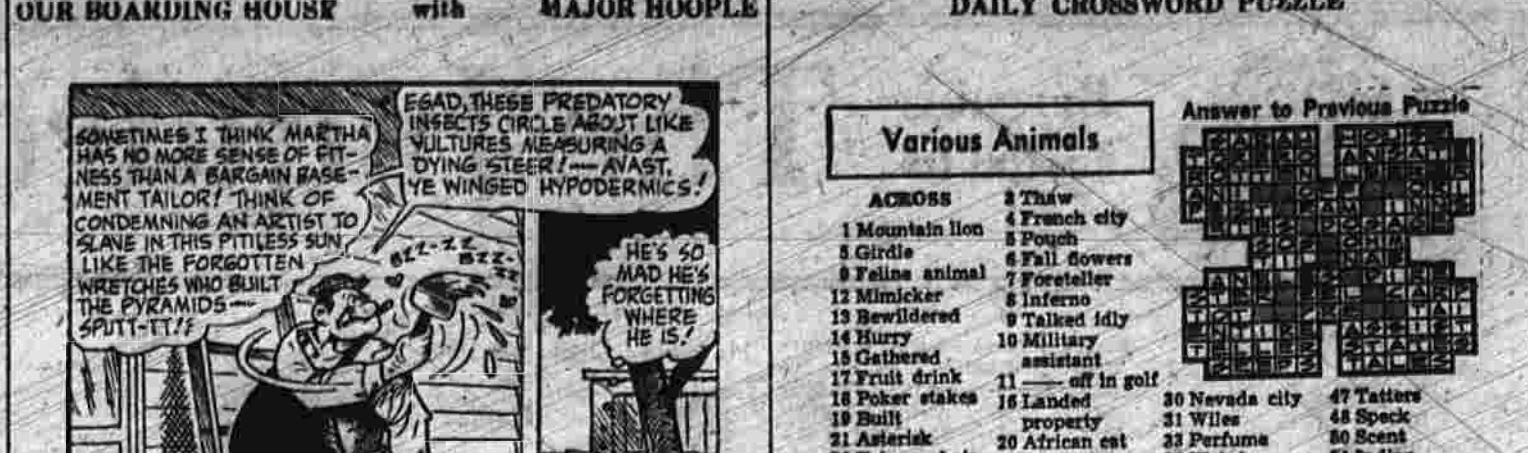

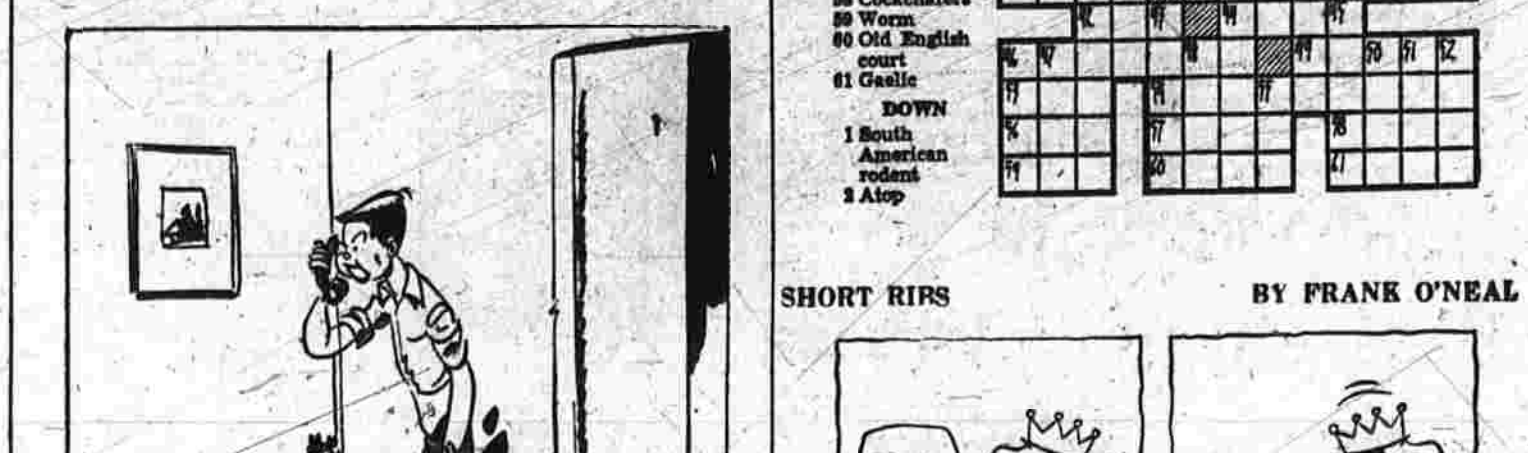

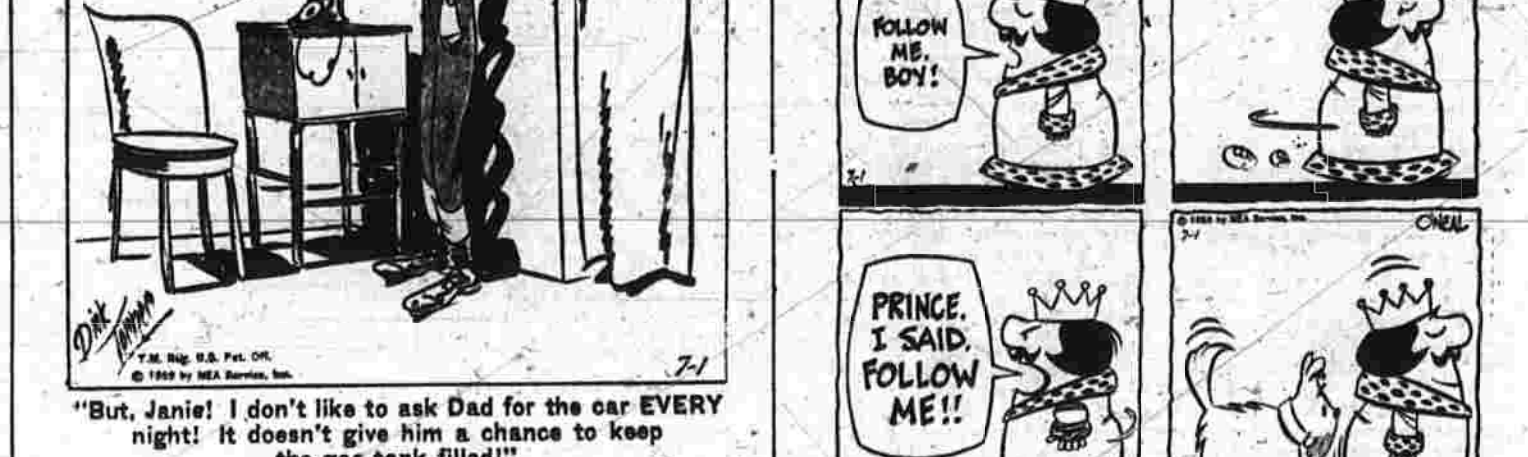

'Questionable Honor' State Welfare Deficit Blamed on Recession

Hartford, July 2 (AP)—A private research firm said today the State Welfare Department's \$13 million deficit in the last biennium was due to factors generally beyond the department's control.

The firm, in a special report issued today, said the department's average payments to welfare cases were the highest in the nation and labeled this a "questionable honor."

The 24-page study, made by the Community Research Associates, was begun at the request of Gov. Abraham Ribicoff and his cabinet members, including Finance and Control, George J. Conkling, in March.

The research group is a private organization headed by Henry O. Page. One of the members participated in the study was Bernard Shapiro, who took over the office of Connecticut's welfare commissioner yesterday.

Shapiro said in a statement he intended to carry out recommendations made by the Page company "as soon as practicable."

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Kozlov Calls for End of East-West Distrust

Washington, July 2 (AP)—Soviet First Deputy Premier Frol R. Kozlov said today the time has come to abandon once and for all the suspicion and distrust which he said mars international relations.

Kozlov called for a new era of U.S.-Soviet friendship which he pictured as a basic foundation for future world peace.

Addressing a combined meeting of the National Press Club and the Overseas Writers Club, the visiting Soviet official said that only recognition of the principles of peaceful coexistence could permit the use of atomic science for the benefit of mankind to build a period of progress "unprecedented in history."

The address was telecast nationwide by NBC. The jovial 50-year-old Soviet leader spoke in Russian. An interpreter, V. N. Kholobov, translated Kozlov's words into English.

Kozlov, whom some observers portray as the likely successor to Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, said he considered this address a matter of high responsibility. "The use of atomic science for the benefit of mankind to build a period of progress 'unprecedented in history' is a task of high responsibility."

He said the American press had talked to show that they "didn't see real proof that that Soviet relation should be built on the basis of friendship and trust, and he added that what he had seen so far in his tour of this country convinced him many Americans are convinced it is necessary "as soon as possible to eliminate causes of international tensions."
