U.S. Hits Nikita Call to Summit

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER

Geneva, July 30 (AP)—U.S. officials took a dim view today of Nikita S. Khrushchev's proposal that the Big Four foreign ministers "agree on what they can agree" and then stand aside for a summit meeting.

But a British official called the Soviet premier's speech "splendid stuff."

Khrushchev's speech to the Ukraine Tuesday was made public last night after East and West had not settled the Geneva talks.

High U.S. officials said the western powers will make every effort to bring the Geneva conference to a summit meeting.

But they emphasized only an end to the Soviet threat to West Berlin will persuade the U.S. to agree to the formation of an All-German government.

The British official who thought Khrushchev's speech was a good one said the Soviet leader's remarks indicated he clearly wanted a summit conference in Berlin.

Explosions, Blaze Destroy Chemical Firm in Portland

Portland, July 30 (AP)—Exploding chemicals shook two communities today and lit up the post-dawn sky as flames destroyed a chemical distributing depot.

Thirteen tanks of industrial chemicals exploded in the blaze, which a fire official said apparently began accidentally. The biggest blast, which knocked sleepers from their beds here and in Middletown across the Connecticut River, came when a 15,000-gallon tank of alcohol went off.

The flames at times burst like rocket blasts 500 feet high. Flaming debris was scattered over a wide area. Sparks showered in every direction, even landing on some private homes. The flickering rooftops were wetted down quickly by firemen.

Between 200 and 100 families were evacuated temporarily from their homes, a few aged persons in ambulances.

Eight firetrucks were hurried west they were sprayed with exploding barrels of acid. All were treated at the Middletown Memorial Hospital in Middletown and discharged.

There were no other casualties reported.

C. Albert Muford, manager of the company Phillips Brothers Chemical Inc., estimated the loss at approximately half a million dollars.

The plant is located almost under the 100-foot-high Middletown-Fairfield highway bridge, a vital link in a mid-Connecticut corridor to Providence, R. I. The bridge was closed for several hours.

Firemen said the displaced families were allowed to return to the half-mile-square evacuation area as soon as it was determined whether there was danger of leakage from a burning tank of acetic acid.

The tank sat on a railroad car adjoining the warehouse. Firemen played hoses on it.

Muford said flames from the acetic acid could be seen in the town of Middletown. There were also 3,000 to 4,000 pounds of cyanide in the plant.

Muford said he did not know if the acetic acid was used for anything but as a raw material in the production of rayon.

The fire was discovered by a passing truck driver at 8 a.m. A 245-ton explosion began when the driver saw a flash of light. Ackerman said the first explosion was a 15,000-gallon tank of alcohol. It exploded at 8:15 a.m. and killed two men from Portland. Middletown and nearby Cornwall were called to the scene, but could not get near the blaze.

Portland Fire Chief James L. Muford said "Pieces of metal would be whizzing by our heads." Several electric poles were burned or blasted down, and the neighborhoods were blacked out. A New Haven railroad freight train near the burning depot caught fire.

The flames in the depot began to diminish shortly after dawn and were contained a few hours later. Water from hydrants was short and firemen pumped water from the river.

A crop yield across the street, Charles M. Gordon said, was wrecked by the fire. One of his 150 chickens was killed and his 300 ducks and 400 geese were killed.

Most of the windows in the nearby Hubbard-Hall Chemical Co. were smashed by the explosion. The current steel shut-down makes fertilizer, also suffered heavy water damage.

Summit Time Here, Nikita Informs West

Moscow, July 30 (AP)—Soviet statements that Russia is not trying to set a deadline for the All-German government in West Berlin are not of paramount importance, U.S. officials said today.

They believe that it is high time for the heads of government to agree to the formation of an All-German government.

Khrushchev spoke Tuesday at a workers' rally in the Ukraine. He announced that the Soviet Union will support the formation of an All-German government.

"During World War II when we were commander-in-chief of the Anglo-American troops on the Western front, Mr. Eisenhower fulfilled all the terms of the agreement with us."

The Soviet leader did not suggest a time limit for ending the Geneva conference and agreed that foreign ministers had already accomplished "good work."

He said the ministers should make "frank efforts" to search for mutually acceptable solutions and agree on what they can agree.

He also complained that his prompt reply to the West was not published in full in the U.S. press.

Judge John A. Danaher concurred. Judge David L. Basson would have remanded the case to the SACB for further proceedings. In his opinion, Judge Frettyman said in part:

The facts beyond dispute are that there is a Communist party in Europe, based upon Marxism-Leninism, and in power in Soviet Russia; that our present petitioner (Communist Party, U.S.A.) was for years a member of the Communist International, and its separation from that organization was accompanied by a renunciation, either of objectives or of methods, that it is by its own choice named the Communist Party of the United States, a self-imposed description not to be ignored without reason; that it once forsook the line laid down by the Communist party abroad but, upon being severely brought to task by the foreign leaders, reconstituted itself, even to the extent of expelling its former leaders, and went back to the line; and that, save for that period of waywardness, it has never differed from the program and policy of the Communist party abroad and has always adhered to that program and policy even in sharp changes.

Berlin, British diplomats made clear that Lloyd would prefer a summit meeting to another session of the Ministers.

Western officials said Khrushchev's basic line was old, his promise to keep hands off West Berlin if the West will withdraw its garrisons and his announced interest in a summit conference.

One ranking U.S. official, speaking privately, said President Eisenhower has stated many times and emphasized again yesterday that he will not go to the summit without prior Soviet assurances lifting the threat to Berlin. No agreement is now in sight containing such assurances.

Other officials said Khrushchev has just a much poorer leverage than he would appear to have himself at a summit conference.

Khrushchev's argument that a summit conference is essential in order to make East-West deals on critical world issues is thus rejected by the United States officials, although it has been generally accepted by Britain.

Barring a sudden turnaround by Russia on matters crucial to the Berlin negotiations, most western diplomats now believe the foreign ministers meeting will break up in failure without agreement on either Berlin or a summit gathering.

The Wednesday deadline was set yesterday on the initiative of Herter, who said he is going to attend the meeting of the Organization of American States opening in Santiago, Chile, Aug. 12 and needs a few days in Washington to prepare for that conference. Lloyd and Conroy de Merville agreed to his proposing that the conference end Wednesday.

Following a long luncheon meeting between Herter and Gromyko, assistant Secretary of State Andrew H. Berling announced that "Mr. Gromyko and Mr. Herter

perennial TV studio at the exhibit was broadcast in the United States before his remarks had been fully translated into English. The video tape recording of the debate was broadcast by the three major American television networks Sunday with only minor editing. The taped version ran for about 14 minutes with an accompanying running translation of Khrushchev's remarks.

The video tape was shown on Moscow TV on Monday night with Nixon's remarks translated into Russian. The tape ran 15 minutes. In both the American and Russian showings, the interpreters had some difficulty in keeping up with the rapid-fire exchanges.

Of his meetings with Nixon, Khrushchev said: "I think we had a good talk and to good purpose, that we explained well our respective viewpoints on many issues."

Khrushchev said he told Nixon that the "tension toward safe guarding the peace prevail in all countries" but warned him the West Germans might stir up a war between the United States and the Soviet Union.

"Mr. Nixon asked: 'Are you afraid of the Germans?'" said Khrushchev.

"We are not afraid of the German savages-savages and militarists," he replied. "For a strong man is not afraid of a mad dog, yet he does not want to be bitten by it."

Khrushchev said he told Nixon if West Germany started a war, "our retaliatory blow will in a few hours wipe out West Germany and the other countries" where there are military bases spearheaded against the Soviet Union and the Warsaw Treaty countries.

Jarvis Builds Drive-in on Main St. Lot

Workmen have begun grading property on Main St. between Delmont and Hollister Sts. for the erection of a drive-in restaurant which will be leased and operated by the Burger Chef, a national chain.

The 40 by 60-foot one-story building is being erected by Jarvis Construction Co. for the 233 Main St. Corp., another of Alexander Jarvis' firms.

Estimated cost of the building, according to an application submitted to Town Building Inspector Thomas Monahan, will be \$18,000. The entire project is expected to cost considerably more, however, as this figure does not include the cost of sub-contract electrical, plumbing and other work.

A spokesman for Jarvis Construction said the building will be located 60 feet back from Main St. and will be placed on a center of a 140 by 140-foot plot. There will be 50 feet border on each side of the structure, he said.

The entire lot has 240 frontage on Main St. and a depth of 140 feet. For many years it was used as a gravel site and baseball diamond.

Plans are also being made to utilize the remaining portion of the lot but it would be "pre-mature" to reveal them at this time, the spokesman said.

In speaking further on the drive-in restaurant, the spokesman said it will have a large, glassed-in front, and there will be a considerable roof overhang. This will allow the erection of glass protective covering during the winter months, he explained.

The property is located in a Business II Zone. Recently, the Town Planning Commission granted a zone change which allowed a 50-foot wide strip of the property, formerly in a Residence A Zone, to be included in the larger portion.

Kassem Says Reds Sparked Uprisings

Beirut, Lebanon, July 30 (AP)—Iraqi Premier Abdul Karim Qasbi said today that the Red Army communist in his country was responsible for the uprisings in Iraq.

Without mentioning them by name, he accused the Red Army of sparking simultaneous uprisings in all major Iraqi cities on July 14, the anniversary of the Iraqi revolution. The only trouble developed in Kirkuk, on July 15, and the army put it down.

Kassem's government also ordered members of the popular resistance force, a Communist-dominated militia, not to wear their uniforms and said the force's duties had been abolished.

Beirut, Baghdad said Kassem told a news conference in the Iraqi capital that the revolt in Kirkuk was able to suppress trouble elsewhere in Iraq.

"As from today, no such uprisings occur again," the premier said. "We have enough force to crush them all."

The 150 photographs of atrocities, Kassem said, attacked Iraq's center 150 miles north of Baghdad "buried some persons alive." They were killing people and dragging them along the streets."

He blamed the leftist press, saying those newspapers were Communist front organizations caused the "chaos" in which the country finds itself.

Mr. Gen. Ahmed Rashid al Abdi, the Iraqi government spokesman, announced that anyone wearing the popular resistance force uniform would be arrested and would be subject to three months imprisonment or a \$10,000 fine.

Kassem said he is fighting particular individuals guilty of particular action and not any political party as such. But he made clear the Communist was his target by describing them as "those constantly talking of plans those who claim democratic forces are being persecuted and those who work for a particular party instead of the country as a whole."

Any syndicate or union which violates its true function will be dissolved, Kassem warned.

Critics of some newspapers that continue their present policies will be brought to justice, he continued.

He also told newspaper editors to cease attacking western countries. Kassem said he is a friend of western as well as of socialist countries and newspapers should stop attacking the friends of Iraq.
