Bush Assails Fear Of Hearing Red Chief

Washington, Aug. 28 (AP)—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson today assailed the "running away" from Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev by the administration.

"It would be a mistake for Congress to adjourn or take recess" while the Soviet leader is in Washington next month for talks with President Eisenhower," Bush declared.

"The senator saw no reason why Congress should 'flee' an address by Khrushchev before a joint session."

Bush voiced his views in an interview recorded for broadcast by Connecticut radio stations.

He cautioned all Americans to keep in mind that the kind of reaction Khrushchev receives might have an important effect on Eisenhower's reaction to Russia.

Bush added:

"In our reception of Mr. Khrushchev, we should be careful to avoid anything that would make President Eisenhower receive more difficult if unpleasant incidents occurred while Khrushchev is here. I feel sure it would adversely affect the President's reception in Moscow and elsewhere in Russia. The Communist propaganda machine would certainly see to that."

He took issue with those who want to adjourn before Khrushchev comes.

"We don't want to give the impression that we are running away from Khrushchev or that we are afraid to be in Washington while he is here," Bush said.

"We should stay in session, I believe, until the public business is completed. And there is a lot of work still to be done—so much so that I doubt it will be possible to adjourn before September 15th, and I should not be surprised if we were here for most of the month of September."

Bush said that an invitation to Khrushchev to address Congress is

specialist, aside from the downgrading announced by the Reds themselves.

Worst case is that China's steel mills can avoid capacity to reach the stated 8 million tons in 1958. How, then, it is asked, can China expand this 50 per cent this year when it has no major new steel works announced for completion in 1959?

"Peiping's grain figures, probably the most important agricultural statistic, have come under similar scrutiny.

"The Communists admitted their earlier claim of 375 million tons in 1958 was a 'mistake' and their new statistics are 250 million tons.

"For 1959, they chopped the announced grain goal from 525 down to 450 million tons.

"U.S. analysts noted the Reds compared the new statistics with amounts recorded during their first 5-year plan, 1953-7, a great leap forward plan, and did a detailed comparison with these low figures for the past three years.

"The new announcement said grain output rose an average of 3.1 per cent a year under the first 5-year plan. The question asked was: How can the new statistics do it when it means more food per person in China where the population is about 600 million, or, as this announced food supply?

"One Washington official is pointing to a new grain shortage for Peiping's new grain figures is a giant oak weighing 150 pounds, 2 feet long, a foot wide, and 13 inches deep. According to the official, it is a 'break glass in case of emergency'.

Judge Smith Gets Post in Circuit Court

Washington, Aug. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower has nominated Federal District Judge C. Joseph Smith of Hartford, Conn., to the second circuit court of appeals.

Smith was appointed yesterday for the position. He is a Democrat and a former member of Congress. He was appointed as district judge in 1951 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Judge William H. Timbers of Danbury, Conn., a Republican, was nominated to succeed Smith as district judge. Timbers, 44, has practiced law in New York City and Stamford.

Smith served four terms as the United States attorney for Connecticut's fifth district.

Six judges from New York, Connecticut and Vermont make up the second circuit court of appeals. Over the years, there have been three New Yorkers and two men from Connecticut and one from Vermont, in the circuit.

Judge Charles Clark of New Haven is chief judge of the circuit. Judge Smith is a veteran judge who has handled a wide variety of cases. He has served on the federal bench when he was 47 years old. He then took the office he holds today.

He was named to the House of Representatives in 1946, representing the 10th district. He was re-elected in 1948 and 1950. He was defeated in 1952 by a Republican.

Smith was born in Waterbury, Conn., in 1901. He graduated from his law professors at William O. Douglas, now a justice of the Supreme Court, of the United States. He was admitted to the bar in 1926. If you want to make the most of your middle-aged strength, cultivate restraint. When you are given the chance to over-run, resist and reject it.

3. "Paradise Lost," by John Milton. This is the best book on how to stop smoking, stop drinking — or start living. Best of field: "Wake Up and Live," by Dr. W. C. Sullivan.

4. "Any book by Henry James or George Eliot. If these two had married each other and collaborated on a novel, literary wood-awake would have reached the ultimate state of unconsciousness.

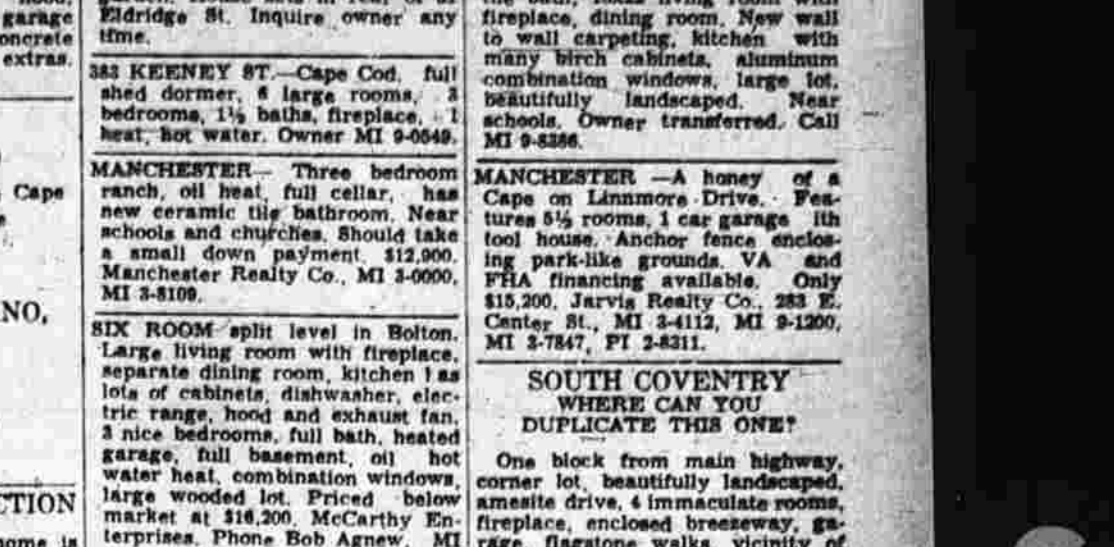
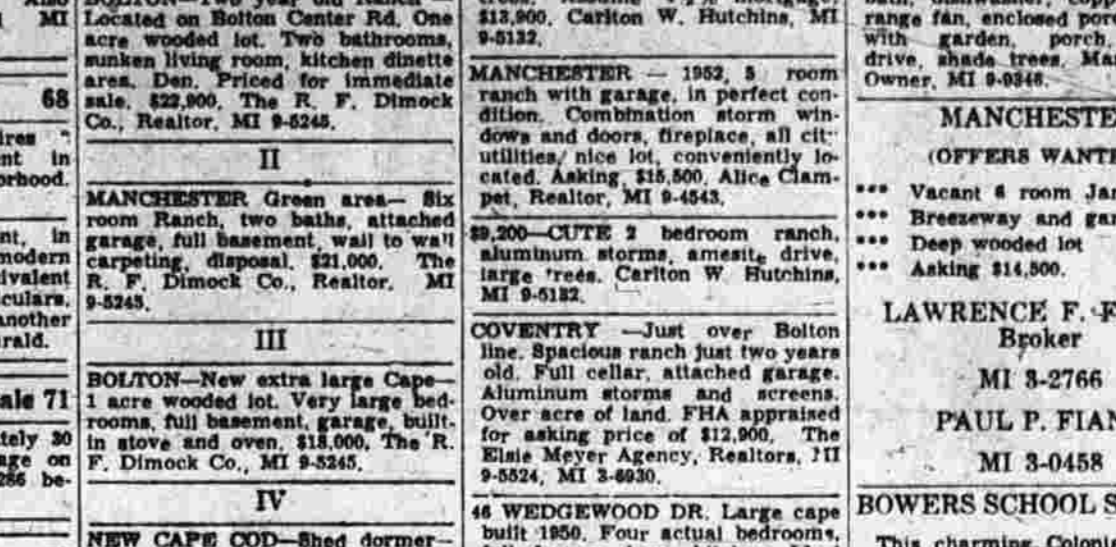
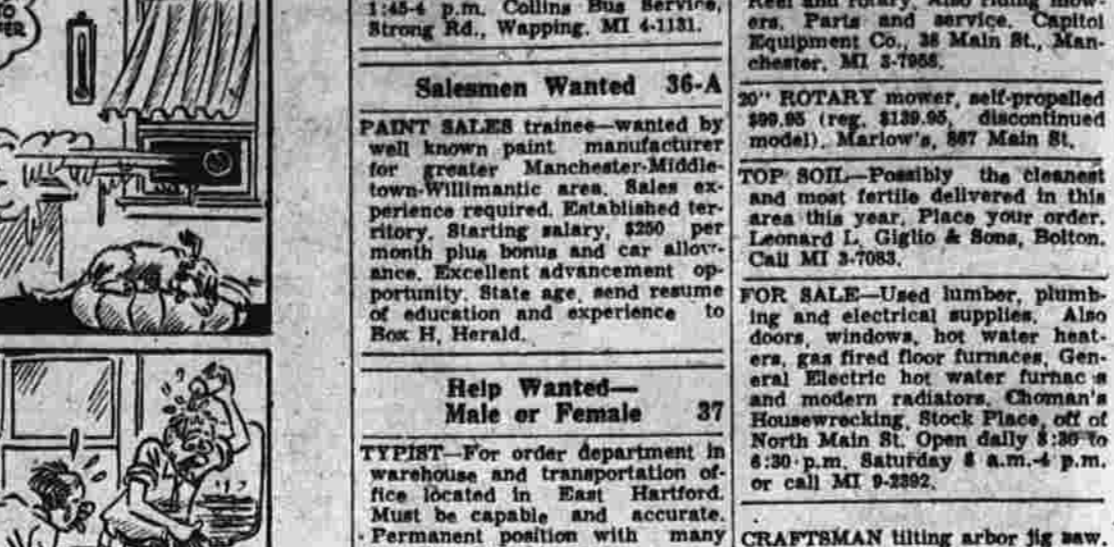

New Delhi, India, Aug. 28 (AP)—Indian newspapers today greeted Prime Minister Nehru's disclosure of Red Chinese raids across the Tibetan border into Indian territory with huge headlines and approval that a strong stand is being taken.

Several papers said the Chinese aggression appears part of a larger Communist design against the smaller nations of Asia.

The Statesman, published in New Delhi and Calcutta, said most of those nations look to India for protection.

Nothing could be better calculated to stir fear and dependency in the small countries bordering Tibet, said the paper, than the aggression by weight of numbers of small detachments of Indian police.

The Indian Express said it was glad to see the government taking the lead in this matter.

The lesson is useful to all states everywhere, said the paper.

The Hindustan Times said the Delhi said India wants nothing from China except respect for its territory which indisputably belongs to India.

"We are in a position to enforce that respect," the Hindustan Times declared. "Our defenses are not negligible and we are not afraid."

Nehru told parliament yesterday that several hundred Communist troops attacked a border town in the Ladakh sector of Kashmir, the east Frontier Agency south of Tibet.

The Indian Army has been ordered to take direct control of the 20,000-square-mile territory called the Assam Rifles.

An ultimatum was issued to the Chinese Red Army to withdraw from the Ladakh sector of Kashmir, which they had penetrated in October.
