The debris from the explosion was apparently kept from flying far by two apple trees growing close above the tank's position.
The tank had been empty for several years, police said, but apparently still contained fumes. The tank was attached to a hand-operated gas pump used several years ago to supply fuel to trucks housed in a large garage behind the house. The trucks were the property of the late Wilbur Richardson, a former contractor. The pump, now rusted, had not been used for some time.
The remaining pieces of the broken tank were removed last night and Miss Richardson had the hole filled in.

Bolton Budget Requests Explained To Small Crowd at Hearing

Only 21 people attended the public hearing held by the Board of Finance Monday night at the City Hall to explain the 1960 budget requests of \$380,000 and budget cuts, totaling \$380,000.
There was little public sentiment expressed. Most of the discussion was explanation of the various items in response to questions from those present.
Finance Board Chairman William Roberts said the budget for 1960 will be submitted to the annual town meeting regard to a special levy to help build a new school building.

As outlined by Roberts last night, the ordinance to raise two mills shall be put aside each year for the Reserve Fund for Capital and Non-recurring Expenditures. The balance of the two mills usually put aside for this purpose would be used for the Reserve Fund for the fiscal year 1960.
Last year-making session the last opportunity to become a voter for the Oct. 5 election will be tomorrow from 2 to 8 p.m. at the Community Hall. A future session of the Board of Administration of Elections on Oct. 3 is strictly limited by law to those people who are not qualified now but will be by election day.
To become a voter, a person must be a U.S. citizen, 21 years of age, a resident of the state for one year and of the town for six months. Naturalized citizens must present their citizenship papers at the Open House for Constable.

Federal Reserve Now Charges 4%

Washington, Sept. 11 (AP)—Member banks borrowing from eight branches of the Federal Reserve System today start paying a 4 per cent rate, the highest rate in 29 years.
The expected 1/2 per cent increase in the discount rate was announced last week by the Federal Reserve Board in New York, Cleveland, Richmond, Chicago, St. Louis, Dallas, San Francisco and Kansas City.
The system's other four banks are expected to start charging the increased rate before long.
Other short term interest charges have climbed sharply in the last month. The rate on 3-month Treasury bills for example, has increased since early August from just over 3 per cent to nearly 4 per cent.
The Federal Reserve Board generally keeps the discount rate as high as the bill rate to discourage banks from borrowing from the reserve in order to invest in the bills.
The increase also reflected the board's determination to discourage the banks from borrowing which could contribute to inflationary pressures.
Wall Street financial circles had expected the move for several weeks. They said "We did not get the rate hike out of the way... Today's discount rate will have a little stronger market after this."
In recent weeks, government bonds have been hitting new all-time lows almost daily. This decline reflects a "tight money" situation—meaning it is getting very expensive to borrow money.
The new rate is the highest since early 1950, when it was just above 4 per cent. The rate was 6 per cent in 1929 at the height of the post-World War boom.

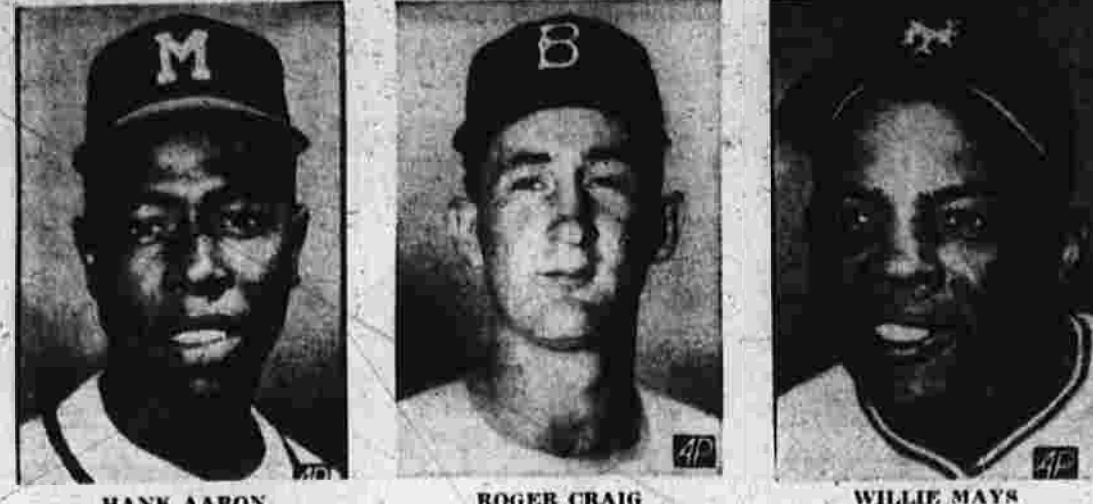

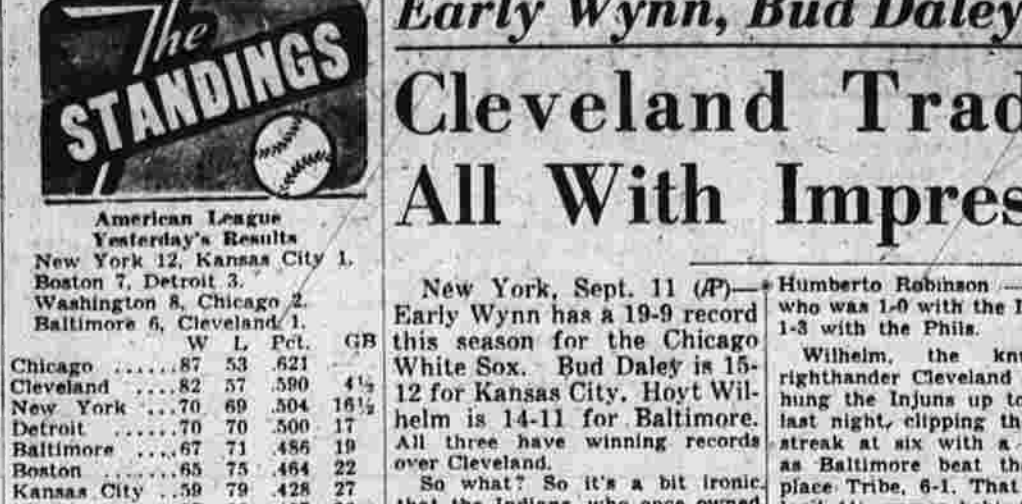

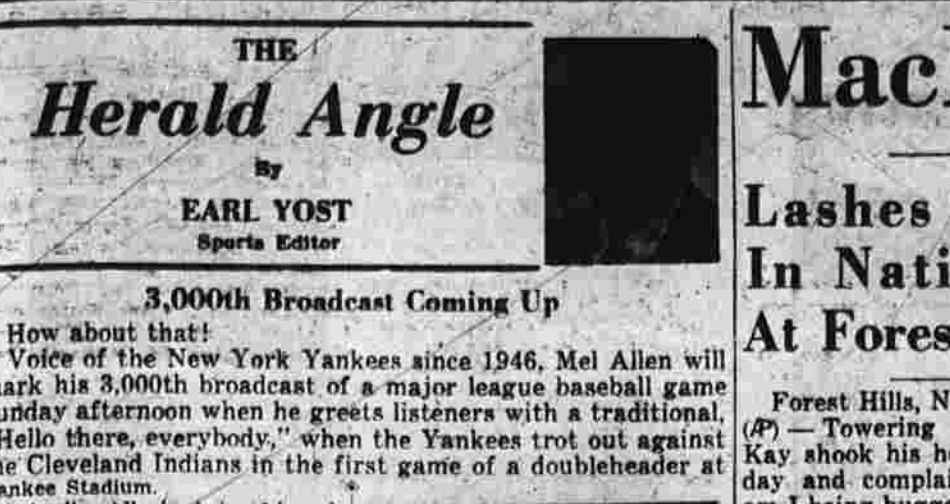
