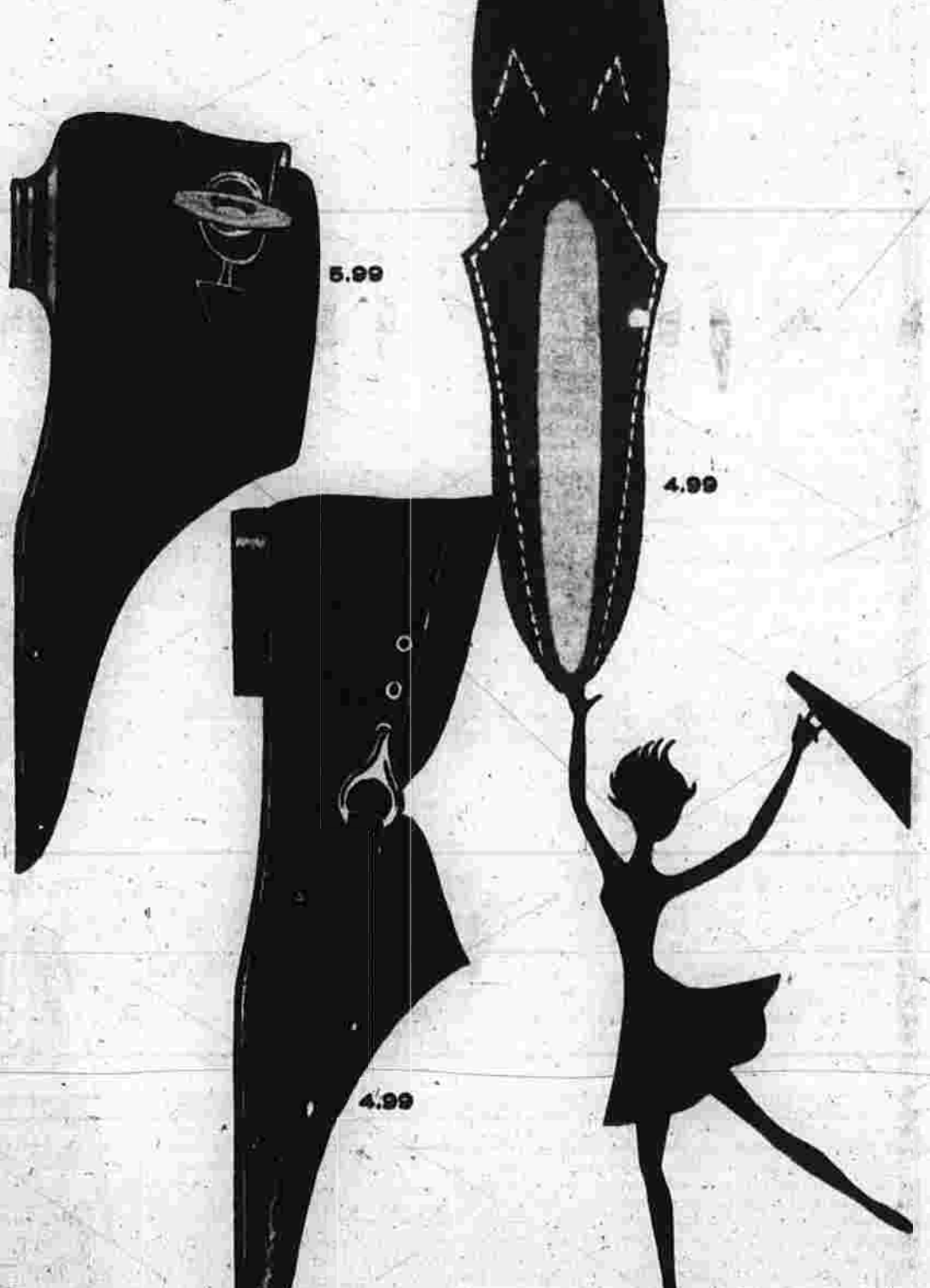

Ike Studies Agenda for Nikita Talk

(Continued from Page One)

Khrushchev and Khrushchev discussed the agenda briefly and generally in days ago, a few hours after the Soviet premier arrived in this country. Since then the topics have been put in order by Herter and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko in preparation for the two days of Khrushchev-Khrushchev talks starting late tomorrow at Camp David.

Informal administration officials said it was impossible to say now whether or not Khrushchev and Khrushchev would find any new approach for tackling specific issues.

The one thing on which the two men seemed to agree most firmly is that war in the nuclear age would be an devastating for all countries that some way may be found to avoid it in spite of the wide ranging conflicts which divide the communist and noncommunist world.

To the American view the source of these conflicts is the expansionist nature of the Soviet Union. Khrushchev looks to Khrushchev to come up with what he has called "constructive ideas and suggestions" for removing negotiation on the great East-West problems.

In welcoming Khrushchev here, Eisenhower's special envoy, Premier's tour would improve chances of settling the world's problems. He said Khrushchev would find that the American people have no ill will toward other people, want no territory and seek no additional power.

"I most sincerely hope," Eisenhower said, "that as you come to see and believe these truths about our people there will develop an improved basis on which we can together consider the problems which divide us."

But officials who have followed the series of speeches and off-the-record remarks by the two men at the White House, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and the Iowa farm belt have their doubts.

They have concluded that if Khrushchev did in fact make any new ideas about the United States the ideas have not yet had any real impact on his firm belief that sooner or later the political and economic systems of the east and western countries will collapse and communist will take over.

Khrushchev, Eisenhower was described as hopeful in advance of the Camp David discussions. He understood that he was not to press upon the Soviet leader the Communist military campaign against the pro-western governments of Laos which he is expected to bring to a halt.

shortly to issue another \$5 billion worth of mortgages, supplementing authority which was exhausted last June.

Major money provisions of the bill include \$50 million over a 2-year period for slum clearance and redevelopment, grants to cities, \$20 million for college dormitory loans and \$25 million to the Federal National Mortgage Assn. for buying mortgages on cooperative housing. An additional \$50 million was authorized for loans for homes for the elderly, but an appropriation will be needed to make this effective.

Included over Eisenhower's protest was authority for \$7,000 more units of low cost housing. The bill also extends the FHA home improvement loan program for one year to Oct. 1, 1969, and the military housing program two years to Oct. 1, 1961.

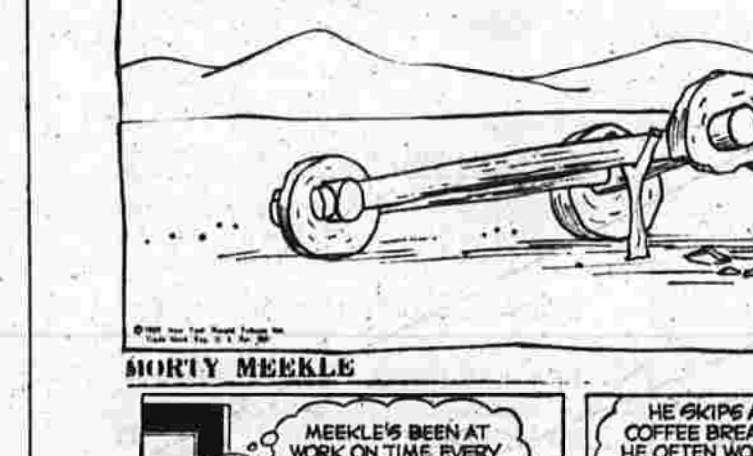
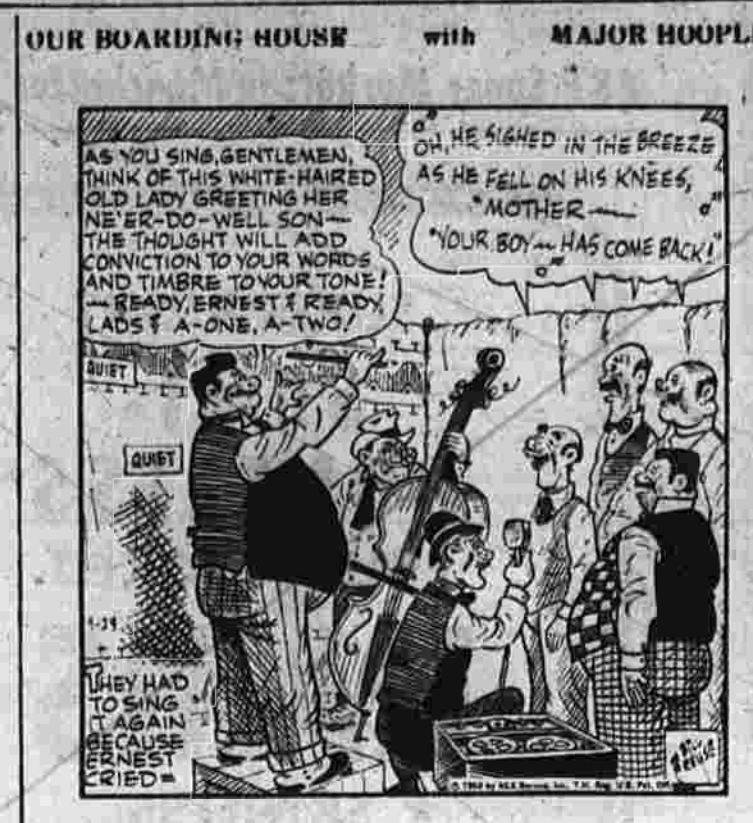

The Doctor Says

Doctors Make Advances in Physical Treatment, Too

By EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D.

Way back in ancient times, the kings, nobles and rich men of the day often had themselves treated with hot baths, packs, or massage when they were ill. The cure, they must frequently have felt better from such treatments or they wouldn't have continued it.

Today such treatment by physical methods (as differentiated from treatment by drug or surgery) has become more scientific and whole fields of specialists devote their efforts to that, called "Physical Medicine."

There are many new kinds of physical treatment which are available now, and they are not the special privilege of the rich. Various forms of electricity can be used, of which the most valuable appears to be electrotherapy.

This is a method of carrying heat deep into the tissues and is often of great value in relieving muscles and deeper tissues to heat. Certain forms of light have also been found helpful. It has been reported, for example, that ultraviolet light aids in recovery from a form of tuberculosis involving the peritoneum (lining of the abdomen) or the intestines.

The use of physical methods in treatment covers a wide range. There are massage, baths, whirlpool, baths, specially equipped gymnastics for stretching, massage and getting joints back into shape. All these are used in many diseases and after many kinds of injuries.

Not to be forgotten are the older methods: heat and cold, whether applied by water, or in other means act on the circulation by expanding or contracting the flow of blood through the arteries and veins.

Obviously the proper application of these methods can affect the body's physiology in many ways. Just for example, hot packs are usually used in early paralytic poliomyelitis or under-water exercises—both falling in the field on physical treatment—are frequently used in later stages of the disease.

Massage also has its place in physical treatment. When it is indicated and skillfully done, it frequently results not only in relief of pain and discomfort, but also in real improvement in the condition. By all these methods, and with increasingly scientific precision, the contribution of physical medicine to the healing of the sick is marching steadily forward.

Boeing has reduced many of the measuring devices to thumbnail size. One thermometer is smaller than a pin head. It will be embedded in a pad of wool and worn in the ear.

An instrument to measure the concentration of saturated oxygen in the blood will work like an ear-ring and a device to measure blood pressure and pulse strikes on the wrist without the usual cuff.

For metabolism measurement, Boeing has designed a 15-pound apparatus to layer the portable typewriter compared with the 100-pound desk-top instrument in use.

A chest belt, 75 per cent lighter than a respirator, will check characteristics of the breathing pattern.

After the models are completed and adjusted to Sierra Sam, they will be turned over to another scientific team for use in simulated space flights.

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Summer Stock Group Finds Male College Ideal Locale

By JACK LANMAN

Brunswick, Me. 24—Lived in the woods and above the clouds, the members of the Brunswick College campus this week in summer stock made their debut here.

Why Brunswick, one of the oldest all-male colleges in the East? Partly because of the theater available—considered one of the finest north of New York—and partly because of the community. When Producer Vicki Crandall brought her cast to Brunswick she came home to a summer retreat of long standing. Some of her cast did theater in the community and regular circuits for a few months of Downeast life.

But it wasn't all sentiment with Miss Crandall. A quality concert pianist turned producer, the local citizenry backed her up with an invitation to give the community a cultural lift and in turn offered financial aid if things didn't go well.

There was no need of the financial lift, however. Two-thirds of the way through the season the Equity Company was playing in heavy rotary scripts and scores to packed houses and the theater was making money, "scarcely unusual for a first season," Miss Crandall says.

On the reading side, the people of Brunswick—in addition to packing the house—have taken the theater people to their hearts. Local officials say, "It's been a wonderful community inducement and trade circles say "It carried through a wet June by bringing in summer trade that would have stopped otherwise."

The theater itself is to say the least, unusual.

It is a huge, rectangular rough granite building built in 1868. It has high gothic windows with colored glass and looks anything but a theater. It was used originally as a classroom.

Inside, it is strictly modern and beautifully functional. It was the last ground for the "Betsy" Lennor lighting panels now so prevalent elsewhere. All lighting is controlled from the theater's rear. Intercom telephones connect all major production points as a classroom.

It seats 612 people in modern velvet, upholstered seats taken from New York's now defunct Century Theater. Its walls are decorated by a striking "tommy robbing" charcoal rubbing of 7th Century Tang Dynasty warrior's horses, one of the best sets out side a museum.

The building is fully ventilated and in the winter is used for college theatricals and class projects.

In major dressing rooms, the mirrors are covered by sliding blackboards for instant conversion to scholastic use. In the lounge, draped like mirrors for other dressing rooms.

High in the vaulted attic are the construction areas for flats and drops. Ultra-modern in the door high in the ceiling which allows the flats to be raised out behind the stage rather than hoisted from the ground floor.

A "winging tormentor" at each side of the stage allows the proscenium arch to expand from 20 to 46 feet depending on current needs.

All in all, both the theatergoers and players have been happy; even the chorus lovelies who dwell on the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity house.
