**Rec Rifle Clubs To Start Monday**

The Boys' Rifle Club, an indoor marksmanship class introduced last year for the first time in Connecticut recreation circles by the Manchester Recreation Department, begins its second season Monday.

Rifle Club sessions, lasting two hours, will be held in each of the three recreation buildings one night each week. Boys 10 years old and above are eligible for participation but there is a limit of 25 boys at each building.

Instructors are members of the Manchester High School rifle team. Individual and team awards have been considered as part of the rifle club program.

The rifle club meets Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of each week at the West Side Recreation Center, East Side Recreation Center and Community Y, in that order, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. The instructors are William Kissam, Robert Murawski, Ronald Wabrek, Donald McLagan, Paul Geisler and Jason Stansfield.

**Jews Observe Yom Kippur**

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, the most solemn and sacred day in the Jewish calendar, will be observed by Jews all over the world beginning Sunday at sundown and continuing until after sundown Monday.

Yom Kippur concludes the period of 10 days of penitence which began on Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year. Most Jews spend the day in the Synagogue praying, fasting and pleading for atonement for their transgressions.

The service on Yom Kippur is known as Kol Nidre, referring to the opening prayer which deals with vows, promises and obligations. During the day, memorial prayers are read recalling loved ones together with the many martyrs who died in the name of God.

The concluding service of the Day of Atonement is called Neilah, during which a last attempt is made at reconciliation with God and with one's conscience. This service concludes with the blowing of the ram's horn after sundown, marking the end of the penitential season.

The schedule of services at Temple Beth Shalom during Yom Kippur include Kol Nidre, Sunday at 7 p.m.; Morning service, Monday 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., followed by discussion period at 2 p.m.

Also on Monday, Mincha, 4 p.m.; Yizkor, 5 p.m.; Neilah, 5:15 p.m.; Shofar, 6:45 p.m. Rabbi Leon Wind and Cantor George Wald will officiate at all services. The choir is under the direction of Frederic E. Werner, organist at the Temple.

# Wild Man from Mount Idy

Back in 1911, an "evil little boy" (to use Cliff Arquette's own words) received his first theatrical job impersonating Charlie Chaplin—at the age of six. Today, 45 years later, Cliff Arquette has grown into a "wild old man" (with Jack Paar doing the describing)—and still busy with his impersonations, this time in the form of a bespectacled, grandfatherly sort of man by the name of Charlie Weaver, who appears to have made a permanent move from his imaginary farm at Mount Idy to the cold reality of NBC's New York studios and "The Jack Paar Show."

So thorough are Arquette's impersonations that today he is known to his friends as 'Charlie' rather than as 'Cliff.' And in keeping with his characterizations, he

has become known in the industry as a man who has never said a straight line—and, for that matter, never evidenced any trouble, saying anything. Hans Conried, Jack E. Leonard and Bob Hope—to name just a few—have felt the barbs of Charlie Weaver, as he's hit them right in the middle of their ad libs. With 40 years of radio and television under his belt, Arquette seldom has to fall back on written material. "Think fast and talk slow" is his motto, and it has served him in good stead. "My brain is like an IBM machine," Cliff explains. "I listen to a conversation, but all the time my brain is sorting jokes to fit the situation." He does receive letters from his fictional wife—"the little one who runs under the tables." On a typical evening Charlie will shuffle on stage, mumble into his mustache, hitch up his sagging trousers,

and announce to "his people" that he "got a letter from Mama."

Easily Identified

In the words of Jack Paar, Charlie "has done more for this show than any other entertainer we've had on." With his letters from Mama, his baggy trousers, crumpled shirt, crooked tie and beat up hat, all have combined to make Charlie Weaver a prized possession. "I wanted a character who was as easily identified going away as coming toward the camera," Arquette explained, and Dennis Day once attested to his success by remarking during a rehearsal, "Don't shoot that scene over Charlie's shoulder, that guy can get laughs with his ears."

Success did not always come that easily, however. Starting in life as a cook in an all-night diner, and working his way downwards to a butcher's helper, Ar-

quette taught himself to play the piano by watching which keys went down when other pianists played. "I faked everything," Arquette recalled, when hired as a pianist by a radio station in 1924.

By the time he was 14, he had left school, purchased 14 derby hats for the price of one dollar, and organized a band that went under the not-too-unexpected name of Cliff Arquette and his Purple Derbies. Tours followed with various orchestras, and in time they folded and Cliff found himself starred as an elderly lady on a radio show known as "Aunt Addie, the old anemic evangelist." In a less friendly state of mind he created a singing trio known as "The Three Public Enemies"—a group which was to play the country's top houses and radio shows. "By 1935 vaudeville had died," recalls Cliff, "and we died with it. But dead vaudevillians didn't go to heaven—they went to radio, and that's where we ended up." He created the "Old Timer" as a regular with Fibber McGee and Molly, the character voice of "Grandpa Sneed" on the "Avalon Time" series which was then Red Skelton's replacement, finally becoming a whole series of characters doing seven different people in 15 minutes when he got his own shows, "Glamour Manor" and "Point Sublime." His first entry into television came doing an ad lib hobby show with Dave Willcox. NBC signed them, and they went on the network in the mornings. When that show folded several years later, Arquette played on the "Dennis Day Show" for two years, followed by a season with the "NBC Comedy Hour." Then, in a fit of misguidance, Arquette retired.

Heard Paar Seek Film

It wasn't for long. Almost two years ago, while watching "The Jack Paar Show," Arquette noticed Paar's guest was Fran Allison, one of his oldest friends. Earlier in the evening, Arquette had wired Jack "How about me gussing on your show? Have Charlie Weaver suit, Will travel." Through some form of telepathy, at exactly that moment three thousand miles away, Fran Allison was sitting in Paar's dressing room talking about him. Arquette turned on his TV set that night, and watched Paar introduce Fran. Soon they were busily reminiscing about the old timers. Then one of them mentioned his name, the camera went in for a closeup, and Paar said, "If anyone in California knows where Cliff Arquette is, please have him get in touch with me. I want him to be on our show."

Arquette's reaction was ecstatic, if unnoticed; and in spite of having an unlisted telephone number, his phone rang most of the night and all of the next day. Complete strangers managed to get hold of his number, in order to tell him what Jack Paar had said. The net results: He came to New York, appeared on a show, and was signed by Paar.

What little free time Arquette has is divided among a multitude of hobbies. He's an avid photographer, a gourmet chef, and an expert on the Civil War with a costume museum in Gettysburg. The museum, which is housed in Arquette's 140-year-old battlefield home, features carved 12-inch wooden models of soldiers dressed in Civil War uniforms. Retire again? Don't believe it. The wild man from Mount Idy is here to stay.

## High Court Agrees To Review Rule on Use of Union Dues

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—The Supreme Court today agreed to review a decision that Negroes seeking admission to North Carolina white schools must use state administrative remedies before asking help of federal courts.

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—The Supreme Court today agreed to review a decision that compulsory union membership is unconstitutional if dues money is used for political purposes without the consent of union members.

The decision was given by the Georgia Supreme Court in a suit by six employees of the Southern Railway system.

It was appealed to the Highest Tribunal by 15 unions, among them Railroad Brotherhoods at whose insistence union shop contracts have been signed by many railroads.

Under union shop contracts, employees are required to join unions within a specified time. In the Georgia case, this was 60 days. The six Southern Railway System employees said they did not want to join unions and should not be forced to pay dues when part of the money was used to support political candidates and doctrines they opposed.

A time for argument of the case before the Highest Court will be set later.

## Fact Finders Hope to Settle Steel Dispute

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—A fact finding board opens hearings today on the nation's longest steel strike, hoping to produce a settlement rather than just some advice for President Eisenhower.

Acting under the Taft-Hartley law, the President appointed the 3-man board to recommend whether he should seek a federal court injunction to stop the walkout for 90 days.

The Steelworkers Union plans to fight issuance of such an injunction.

Board Chairman George W. Taylor, who does not think much of the Taft-Hartley Law, said yesterday that he and his colleagues would use the hearings to try to help management and labor reach a voluntary agreement in the 90-day-old strike.

"I think it's our responsibility to do everything within the limits of our authority to settle this dispute," said Taylor, known as a skilled arbiter of labor-management disputes. He is professor of business at the University of Pennsylvania and was chairman of the War Labor Board during World War II.

Help from the panel was welcomed by David J. McDonald, president of the United Steelworkers Union. If the panel can help achieve an agreement, he said, "we will be most happy."

Officially the board must determine whether continuation of the strike would cause a national emergency. In the open hearings, the steel companies were expected to argue that it would, while the union was expected to argue the opposite.

The union argument apparently would follow these lines:

1. The non-union plants, 15 percent of the industry, have continued to operate and can supply the nation's defense needs.
2. Although the strike has caused unemployment of 800,000, national unemployment still is below five million, a total that the President has not considered an emergency in the past.

## Report Claims Nikita Spurred Ukraine Purge

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—Testimony of nine witnesses on purges, terrorism and man-made famine in the Ukraine during the 1930s and 1940s has been released in a new congressional report titled "The Crimes of Khrushchev."

The report, second of a series being released by the House Committee on un-American Activities, contains testimony taken Sept. 9, 10 and 11 prior to the arrival of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev on Sept. 15 for his U.S. tour.

The committee referred to the closed door sessions with the witnesses as consultations.

Nicholas Prychodko, an engineer from Toronto, Canada, testified he lived in the Ukraine during the 1930-33 famine. The Ukraine is one of the Soviet Union republics.

Prychodko said most of the Ukrainian food crop was exported on orders from Moscow because of resistance in the Ukraine to the Communists. He said that at that time Khrushchev was in the Ukraine as "one of the esteemed exponents of Stalin's genocide of the Ukrainian population."

Petro Pavlovych, former editor of a newspaper in the Ukrainian community of Vinitsa, told of the 1943 discovery there of 85 mass

## Dixie Leaders Sidetrack Bias, Talk of Money

Asheville, N. C., Oct. 12 (AP)—Southern governors today tacitly admitted that segregation is the toughest problem facing many of the states in this area.

But the issue — which was not even mentioned by name — was officially declared out of order and the 25th annual meeting of the Southern Governors Conference opened with a discussion of the multitude of problems facing the various states, most of which seem to add up to one word, "money."

Before the conference opened, there was strong sentiment among the governors against bolting the Democratic party.

In launching the brief discussion by each of the governors on "one of my toughest problems as Governor and how I have tried to solve it," the conference chairman, Gov. James P. Coleman of Mississippi, remarked "there is one problem in this section that gets more attention and publicity than anything else."

And he added, "probably all of

## Deadlocked On Security Group Seat

By MAX HARBELSON

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 12 (AP)—A morning of indecisive balloting in the U.N. General Assembly left Communist Poland and western-backed Turkey firmly deadlocked today in a contest over a seat in the Security Council.

The voting was expected to continue at an afternoon session.

Poland was leading throughout the balloting and at one point was only six votes short of the required two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

Poland's greatest strength was shown on the seventh and ninth ballots when it got 48 votes to 33 for Turkey.

On the 12th ballot, the vote was back virtually where it started. Poland received 46 and Turkey 35.

With both sides insisting they would stand firm, there appeared little chance of an early solution.

Polish Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki said Poland was in the contest to stay. Western supporters of Turkey also said they were standing firm.

Ecuador and Ceylon were elected without opposition to fill two other vacant council seats.

On the first ballot Poland received 46 votes to 36 for Turkey. The second Poland got 45 and Turkey 38.

Poland picked up two votes again on the third ballot. The vote was 43 for Poland and 36 for Turkey.

There was little change as the voting went on. Poland got 46 on both the fourth and fifth ballots. Turkey received 35 on the fourth and 34 on the fifth.

A U.S. spokesman said the United States would stick to Turkey indefinitely. Chief U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge said he was optimistic that Turkey would win eventually.

Poland and Turkey are contesting to succeed Japan, whose 2-year term on the Security Council ends Jan. 1.

Ceylon was unopposed to succeed Japan.

## Reds Training Trio For Space Voyage

Moscow, Oct. 12 (AP)—The training of Soviet spacemen has been described for the first time in some detail by the magazine Ogonek. The training appears designed primarily to simulate conditions of rocket flights up to 300 miles.

The Russians say some of their experimental dogs have returned safely to Earth as many as four times from such high altitude flights.

It has been expected here for some time that the next step in Soviet space exploration will be to send a man into the outer reaches of the Earth's atmosphere with the hope of bringing him back alive.

Ogonek's article came out this weekend as Lunik III, a 614-pound Soviet flying laboratory, was reported to have headed back toward Earth from a week's flight 291,650 miles out in space, designed to send it around the hidden side of the moon.

The magazine named three space trainees—Alexei Grachev, Alexei Belokobov and Ivan Kachur. Their program appears to resemble that undertaken in the United States by seven officers of the U.S. armed forces.

## Warsaw Vision Fails to Return

Warsaw, Oct. 12 (AP)—Tens of thousands gathered last night around a shabby Roman Catholic Church on the fringes of the Warsaw ghetto waiting to see a madonna-like vision at the top of the church steeple.

The crowds were drawn by word-of-mouth reports that a luminous figure had appeared atop St. Augustine's Church for three previous nights.

In hushed reverence, the crowd waited, but no one reported seeing the vision against the cloudy sky.

Some observers suggested the reported figure might have been the result of a freakish reflection of light from the moon on clearer nights.

The figure—miracle of phenomenon—was touched for by western diplomats and other foreigners who were attracted to the church.

"It was fantastic," said Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, who wrote a letter to the church Saturday night.

"I've never seen anything like it before in my life," said Mrs. Williams.

Roman Catholic Church authorities could not be reached for official comment but several priests

## FTC Head Asks Law To Halt TV Quiz Fix

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—The chairman of the Federal Trade Commission said today deceptive entertainment such as rigged TV shows is not something his agency can regulate.

Earl W. Kinner, the FTC head, told House investigators his agency has never gone beyond control of advertising which results in unfair business practices.

The House subcommittee on Legislative Oversight has heard testimony that questions and answers were supplied in advance to some contestants on such programs as "Twenty-One" and "The Tic Dough."

In reply to questions, Kinner conceded that this constitutes "a gray area in the law."

He said Congress could enact a law making it a criminal offense to rig a TV show, adding, "It would have a salutary effect."

Kinner also suggested broadening of the rules of the Federal Communication Commission, which is the federal regulatory body for television and radio.

As for his own agency, Kinner

## Townsend Hit Once More by Religious Woes

Brasschaat, Belgium, Oct. 12 (AP)—Religious troubles still plague the romantic life of Peter Townsend, former suitor of Princess Margaret. He now plans to wed a Belgian Heiress.

The romance with Princess Margaret foundered because he is divorced. Now it appears unlikely the handsome 44-year-old British air ace will be able to wed his fiancée, a Roman Catholic, within the church. But he says they will be wed soon, regardless.

Townsend presented newsmen to his fiancée, 20-year-old Marie-Luce Jamagne, yesterday and announced:

"I am not sure when exactly we will get married, but I hope it will be within the next three months or so."

Townsend was asked whether he planned to marry the dark-haired daughter of a wealthy Belgian tobacco executive in a religious ceremony.

"I would rather not discuss that point," he replied. "It is too delicate a question."

Townsend is an Anglican and was married in the Church of England. The wife he divorced in 1952 is still living and has remarried.

A Belgian priest said today it was unlikely Townsend could marry in the Roman Catholic Church.

"I can't see how a Catholic priest could perform such a marriage because the Catholic Church still considers Townsend's Protestant wedding valid, even though it was performed in another faith," the priest said. "The Catholic religion does not allow dissolution of a marriage except in very exceptional circumstances."

"Any decision would have to be made by the Vatican, but I expect

## March to Immortality—1 Bearded Old Man Led Raid That Ignited War

NOTE—A century ago the gulf between North and South was rapidly widening. But the smoldering animosity over slavery was yet to be ignited by one dramatic emotionally charged incident. This was provided by a stubborn, passionate man and the acting he chose was Harpers Ferry. Here is the first of two stories on John Brown's momentous raid 100 years ago.

Harpers Ferry, W. Va., Oct. 12 (AP)—The men were eager to get going. For weeks, most had been hiding by day in the farm house, venturing out only at night.

Now in the chill rain of an October evening, they loaded a wagon with a sledge hammer, crowbars and a quantity of pikes—long-handled poles with sharp metal tips.

A bearded old man with fierce, burning eyes mounted the wagon and tugged at the reins. It creaked onto the narrow Maryland road. Eighteen men fell in two abreast behind, rifles on their shoulders and two revolvers in each belt.

The date was Sunday, Oct. 16, 1859, and John Brown was beginning a march that led to the scaffold—and immortality. His

Manila, Oct. 12 (AP)—The United States today agreed to give the Philippine government a bigger say in the use of American military bases in the Philippines.

A memorandum signed by Foreign Secretary Fulbright in Scranton and Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen also recorded agreement that the 99-year lease on the bases would be shortened to 25 years, subject to renewal.
