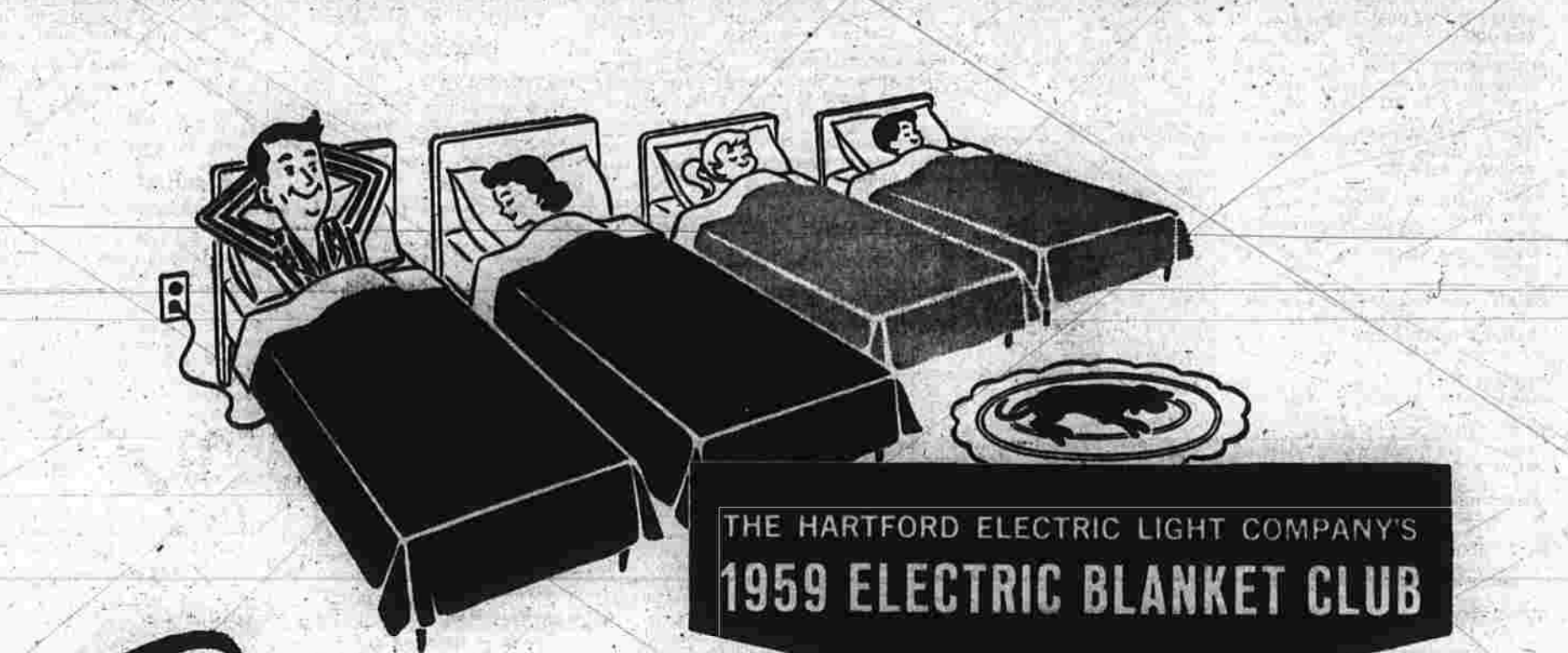

of that cranberries from that state are free of contamination. Massachusetts growers nearly had the total output.

Cranberry growers generally have denounced Fleming for starting the big cranberry scare. They contend that even if there is some antibiotic present, it won't harm humans. Fleming has stood his ground, saying it was the kind of information the department couldn't sit on.

A number of Congressmen, some of them Republicans from cranberry-growing districts, have criticized Fleming's actions but Rep. James Roosevelt (D-Calif.) denounced the Secretary last night.

Speaking in Denver, Roosevelt said: "There are many of us in this country who do not condemn him but honor him for taking what action he did."

Fleming said as late yesterday PDA laboratories had tested 3 1/2 million lbs. of cranberries, with 334 proved free of contamination. Only four lots definitely were tainted, and the others are being rechecked.

Of the lots with a clean bill of health, Fleming said, 159 came from Massachusetts; 53 from Wisconsin, 44 from New Jersey and 27 from Washington. The origin of the other 41 lots has not been established.

Duo Pianists Play at UConn

Whitmore and Lowe, duo pianists were heard last night in another of the University Concert Series at the University of Connecticut. A vast capacity audience awarded their generous and discriminating applause, responding to a program that was, in general, well-chosen and well-executed.

The first group to be played included Schubert's "Valse noble" and Ravel's suite, "Ma mere l'Oye." The Ravel was not exactly the performers' "cup of tea," but I am uncertain whether any duo piano team can do it better.

By contrast, the original version by the duo is more convincing than in its more commonly heard orchestral garb.

The extremely difficult ensemble playing for two pianists is limited to the soft, vague effects demanded in French impressionism. This was the problem the performers faced, and they failed to solve it.

Their ensemble suffered in the "Pavane" and in the opening of "The Garden of Fountains." More rhythmic portions of the suite lost the delicate fantasy on Walker St. He has been a ZBA member since 1955.

Rockville-Vernon \$442,805 Budget To Go to Voters

A city budget totaling \$442,805, approximately \$75,000 more than last year's budget, will be presented to voters at the November 23 annual city meeting Dec. 2.

The budget proposed for the city's fiscal year which began yesterday is about \$300,000 more than the aldermen thought it was last night when they voted approval and then adjourned.

The \$130,000 difference was in mathematical error in the hastily prepared copy of the budget. Several aldermen who were called to the City Council room to check the budget were found questioning the accuracy of the figures. The city clerk would have to recheck the figures before the budget could be presented to voters.

A fund of \$7,500 will be used for miscellaneous traffic surveys. The money for this fund will come from a parking meter fund of \$2,500, as provided for in the Health Department Budget, and \$5,000 for rent of the city building.

Columbia Youth Count Totals Listed

Mrs. Lucius W. Robinson Jr. has completed the annual child enumeration figure for the Columbia Community.

This work is passed on to the State Department of Education and gives a graphic study of the youth population of the community.

Mrs. Robinson, who took over the work from her mother, Mrs. Marion Hubbard, has been doing it for three years. She found this year that there are 34 more children 17 and under than there were last year. The report showed a total of 796 as compared with 762 last year.

In this year's total, 472 are in public school, 61 in non-public schools and 263 are out of school. There are 44 infants, 5 more than there were in 1958; 47 two-year olds as compared to 43 last year; and 48 three-year olds as compared to 56 last year.

You Should Know . . .

Harry Frederick Smith

The man who is greatly responsible for the success of the new program for mentally retarded young adults at the Bunce Center first decided to be a teacher when he was a mess sergeant in the Army during World War II.

Harry Frederick Smith was recruited in Alabama in 1944 from the effects of an antipersonnel bomb which had exploded on some unnamed, unnumbered island in the Pacific.

While he was undergoing treatment on the left leg, he was given the job of preparing for battle a unit of cooks headed for the European Theater. Besides teaching them to cook, he had to teach them to camouflage their stoves. Keep a meal hot as close to the battle line as possible, and send food to men under fire.

"The enlisted men could throw some pretty good meals together, but they couldn't read," he said. So he taught them to read, and from that experience learned that he wanted to be a full-time teacher.

Came Here in 1948

When he was discharged in 1945, having been in the service since 1938, he applied to Boston University. There he completed four years of undergraduate work in business education in about two and a half years, graduating in 1948.

He came immediately to Manchester to begin teaching social studies at the high school. With the further help of the GI Bill, he obtained his master of education degree in secondary education from Springfield College.

His teaching career at the high school, according to his own account, was pretty ordinary until three years ago when he was offered a chance to teach an exceptional class that is a group of slow learners.

Principal Edson Bailey, retired assistant principal Chester Robinson, and former assistant school superintendent Raymond Stinchfield interested him in the program. Dr. Stinchfield suggested to the Soroptimist Club that a scholarship be given to Smith for special study at the University of Connecticut.

With this scholarship and another one from the Hartford Association for Retarded Children, Smith took courses in the teaching of exceptional pupils. He became so interested in the subject he decided to work on special education for his master's thesis.

New Field of Work

Because the students' need for help was so much greater, he felt a much greater enjoyment from seeing them progress. A new field of work opened itself to him, in addition to his regular teaching.

He took on a class of mentally retarded adults in Hartford last year. The class was held at night in Hartford Public High School, and was sponsored by the city.

During the day he also taught a class of slow learners in business education at MHS.

This past year he has his third class when he volunteered to help John Craig and Mrs. Katherine Orcutt conduct the new evening program for mentally retarded young Manchester adults.

"First we try to get them to open up to speak. A lot of them are afraid to," he said. "In fact, they have had poor experiences with adults and people their own age."

The program emphasizes social and vocational activities, and includes a little academic work for good measure.

Smith's wife, the former Miss Victoria Deane of Medford, Mass., has become interested in the subject, too. She's so interested that if things work out all right with his advanced education, she will begin studying for her college diploma, specializing in slow learning elementary school children.

Mrs. Smith was an assistant teacher in Boston when she and her husband met. She had attended the Boston University College of Practical Arts. The couple was married in Medford in 1943.

Four Children

The first of their four children, Betty, now 15, was born during the time Smith was doing his undergraduate work at BU.

The other three children, Mar-

Rockville-Vernon Interest High On Language For Children

Interest in a foreign language program for elementary schools was shown here last night when nearly 100 school administrators, teachers and parents attended a Rural Vernon School Assn. meeting on the subject.

Mrs. Betty Peck, foreign language teacher in the Glastonbury school system, discussed cost, implementation and value of the experimental program.

Cost is dependent upon the personnel involved, whether they have dual teaching assignments, teach foreign languages exclusively, or teach only part-time, Mrs. Peck said. In Glastonbury Mrs. Peck is the only full-time elementary language teacher. Others teach regular subjects as well as languages.

The program in grades three to five is entirely audio-lingual, hearing and repeating. In Grade 6 this method is still emphasized, but some reading preparation is added. Drills on formal grammar begin in Grades 7 and 8, and full-fledged reading, writing and grammar are taught in high school. However, conversation is still highly emphasized.

French and Spanish are just beginning languages at that level. French and Spanish are just being introduced into the Glastonbury system in Grade 3. Elementary work with children following through on their foreign language and allowed to select the other language in high school.
