L. L. Colbert said DeSoto will remain in business "as far as Chrysler Corp. can look into the future."

DeSoto production for the 1960 calendar year so far totals only slightly more than 30,000 units. The 1960 DeSoto line is limited to six models.

Sales have slumped generally in the medium-priced field since the 1959 model year. Factors cited are falling sales in recent years.

The Edsel was discontinued after only 28 months of production. Introduced at the end of August 1957, Ford enthusiastically predicted that 300,000 would be sold in the first year. Factory sales during the 1958 season total slightly short of 110,000 cars.

Ford announced discontinuance of the Edsel line after publication of a prospectus on behalf of the Ford Foundation announcing plans to sell another two million shares of its Ford Corp. stock.

The prospectus carried a concise footnote on the Edsel. It read: "Introduced in September 1957, and discontinued in November 1958."

The company advised customers who bought the 2700 Edsel produced in the 1960 model year that they will get a \$500 certificate good for use on purchase of any domestically produced Ford Motor Co. auto.

### FDA Cites Coal-Tar Use Lipstick Firms Hit Ban on Some Dyes

(Continued from Page One)

showed that only industrial amounts of the color used in lipstick are ingested and that no hazard exists and the colors "are harmless and suitable for use."

But under the law, the government must ban the use of any coal-tar color that is harmful in significant amounts in the diet "of less than animals even though its use in smaller amounts could be safe."

There was an outpouring of objections from major lipstick makers, accompanied by demands for a public hearing.

Defending the industry faced the FDA's decision, which was made hastily and without consultation of the "consumers' interests" were felt the rates compared to what they said were infinitesimal amounts humans might swallow from normal use of lipstick.

The lipstick makers declared the colors had been used in hundreds of millions of lipsticks for more than 35 years without a shred of evidence that they have caused any harm whatever to one consumer.

They suggested cosmetics, which are applied externally, should not be linked under the law as they are now with foods and drugs.

Such widely known cosmetic brand names as Revlon, Max Factor, Richard Hudnut and Avon filed their objections.

Others, like Elizabeth Arden and Helena Rubinstein, let the Toilet Goods Assn. of New York City act for them. Their names did not appear in the protests filed, but they said "an association spoke for them."

Revlon maintained "there is not an iota of evidence that ill effects will be experienced by human beings if the colors are not forbidden from lipsticks. There is not a single instance of any harm to any consumer by reason of the use of any of the colors in lipsticks."

The same contention was made by Max Factor's chief chemist Paul W. Jewel, who wrote the FDA that the colors "have been in use for many, many years."

He said there already are far too few approved colors to permit the cosmetics industry to produce the variety of shades which the modern woman demands.

Revlon offered results of tests which it said showed the average woman if she ate all the lipstick she applied, would be taking into her system color dye amounting to only .00002 per cent of her daily diet.

Richard Hudnut challenged the FDA's testing methods as unsound and not in conformity with proper testing procedures.

All contentions, and enforcement of the FDA order would severely damage the lipstick business, Revlon said it would run it.

Revlon, in a separate petition, suggested the law be changed to permit colors used in cosmetics to be considered separately from those used in foods or drugs.

It said cosmetics industry tests are conducted as actual markets.

1959 crop, the cranberry crisis erupted.

This case history shows that no matter how carefully the government watches over the marketing of a new pesticide, some of the ultimate responsibility for seeing that it is not harmful lies with the individual who uses it.

Aminobutylol was never supposed to touch a cranberry. The manufacturer clearly specified the use on the label: if the directions had been followed, the cranberry grower would have applied their usual enjoyable Thanksgiving.

The same is true of all the other sprays on the market. The Department of Agriculture continually checks them, taking them out of the market if they are found to be harmful to man or animal.

But there is no policing of the individual farmer to see just how the spray is used. The government
