A Thought for Today

However, it was never without the greatest sense of awe that we would go into the field where grew a rather wily and cunning game of trying to throw back at somebody all the mud that he has been throwing at him, and it did not seem to have any effect on his violent and bitter condemnations of Eisenhower behavior out of its usual denials.

Politics And Peace

Some Calm Answers

A candid and dispassionate analysis by C. L. Sulzberger in the New York Times, of what Khrushchev has been up to recently among his satellites, leads us on to some very curious and important conclusions. That first, the Suburber presentation.

There is an unusual lack between the amount of time Khrushchev has recently devoted to satellite affairs," writes Sulzberger, "and the resurgence of dictatorial forms in Eastern Europe. It is as if there is no gathering crisis within the Soviet empire. But just as a result, Khrushchev intends that there shall be no such crisis at the end of next year's summit meeting."

"The 1959 summit, more or less affirmed an armistice in the war that one dared to fight. Nevertheless, it did not seem to have produced only a mere with a rim on it, this halo was the appearance of an easier world atmosphere. Together with the relaxation of the military Union of the Stalinist type of dictatorship, this inspired a wave of popular optimism among the Soviet satellites. And that optimism eventually led to explosions in Poland and in Hungary."

"The Polish and Hungarian upheavals almost destroyed the Soviet empire and almost cost Khrushchev his job. He managed with ruthless efficiency to restore what he considers order. But, in so doing, he exposed the blatant fact that no matter how much his interpretation of Communism might seem to differ from Stalin's, it was built on the same foundation of force. This was a damaging admission for Moscow to make just as it sought to persuade other lands of Russia's benign new look."

"Obviously Khrushchev intends to take no risks this time that a second summit conference might inspire a second wave of troubles in Eastern Europe. . . . Khrushchev is a pragmatic approach. He wants merely to strengthen existing administrations, check up on their internal security arrangements, and make certain that all the lids are firmly clamped on any simmering pots of trouble."

Thus Sulzberger: "Reading this, we found ourselves asking curious, calm questions. Do we want Khrushchev to be in control of his situation while he negotiates? The answer, we think, is yes. Do we want the people of Eastern Europe to stage a dramatic revolt while the summit meeting is in progress? The answer is no. Or, to ask another question which may explain our answer to the others, do we want a repetition of the Hungarian revolution of 1956?"

We do not want such a repetition for we know, as perhaps Khrushchev also knows, that it could not be a mere repetition. This time, it would have to involve us all.

After a summit meeting has been held, perhaps with interesting results, do we want the satellites to grab freedom for themselves? The answer is that we don't want to have them grab for more than the Boss Eisenhower is away. It was kind and thoughtful of Governor Rockefeller to offer Vice President Nixon such an opportunity for distinction, particularly since it can be imagined that, if Nixon should take it and succeed in it, he might well clinch the nomination for himself.

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Connecticut Yankee

When the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council, a public service organization which grew out of the Department of Finance, suddenly indulges in something like public moralizing, it is likely to get a wider and more active response than it is entitled to.

The public moralizing in the Expenditure Council's report appeared as an editorial in the November-December issue of the Council's Taxpayer News. In which the editor discussed the advisability of having Connecticut look to the question of a possible "conflict of interest" law.

The editorial begins in this unglorious way: "Should the public wait until the exposure of a major scandal before enacting conflict of interest laws?"

The editorial concludes as follows: "Here in Connecticut, we should face the issue squarely and before individuals or the public are hurt."

"Legislation is not the only way to solve the problem. The best way of protecting against conflict of interest, is the personal integrity of the legislators. It is the personal integrity of this state, is the most certain guarantee against damaging con-

ditions of personal and public interest. Nevertheless, we should not assume our own household, and if deemed necessary, appropriate steps should be taken, either through departmental regulations or through appropriate laws. It is the responsibility of the legislature to guarantee that the public interest will not be sacrificed."
