New Charges Face Guterman

New York, Dec. 15 (AP)—Frank Alexander L. Guterman, already on trial in federal district court in a conspiracy case, is faced with a contempt action in state supreme court.

Justice Jacob Markowitz yesterday ordered Guterman to show cause Dec. 21 why he should not be cited for contempt for failing to appear for examination in a \$112,000 judgment against him.

The contempt motion was filed by Irving M. Schwartz for the Acme Trading Co.

Court records show that Guterman endorsed a \$20,000 promissory note over to Acme last year "for a valuable consideration." Acme subsequently obtained the judgment which it claims is still due. The debt, however, has been reduced to \$9,022, said an Acme attorney.

You Should Know...

Harry S. Howroyd

Being an Alaskan explorer and a champion swimmer aren't prerequisites for being a chairman of the School Building Committee. But it helps to have a record of adventures made when the time comes to slash a \$1 million school building program in half.

Harry S. Howroyd, elected chairman of the new board in April, spent two years exploring Alaska. He and a friend, Bob Diaz of Wadsworth, went on a series of Alaskan expeditions in 1957 and 1958. They discovered uncharted volcanic craters, mapped a branch of the Blue River, and tried unsuccessfully to track down a rare species of bear.

Two summers, Howroyd lived in a salmon fishing boat and an Avioner he spent exploring and hunting in the mountains of Alaska.

He recalls one time when he and Diaz were short of cash, he sold two walrus tusks for \$2,000 for them, and bought a car for \$20 to drive back to the States.

They used to shoot eagles to collect a one dollar bounty. Howroyd said that the reason the eagles were hunted was that they ate the salmon which came to the most important industries in Alaska.

Each time Howroyd and Diaz returned to the civilized portion of Alaska, they would lecture on their adventures to raise money for Alaskan relief. When they returned to the States they attended a film, "Blue Vein", in which they made a documentary of their lecture. They wore their prospecting clothes and they had grown hair which was later killed in a plane crash.

Howroyd was an aviator, swimming champion of Alaska. He could do a 100 yard swim in 34 seconds, and he competed in the one swimming contest in Alaska one year, and won. (An Alaskan friend whose girlfriend was a good swimmer told him he covered the distance as well as the girlfriend.
