Rockville-Vernon Kulo Drops Contempt Action Against City in Dump Cases

A contempt action concerning the Rockville City dump was dropped from the Toland County Superior Court calendar today by Kulo and city officials, defendants in the case.

Here 'n There

"Economic Highlights," a one-page circular put out by the U.S. Dept. of Commerce, included an interesting story in its Dec. 14 edition about the incongruities of federal money for soil banks and for irrigation and dams that seem to fit well in this Christmas season.

According to the circular, "The Department of Agriculture estimates \$76 million to remove lands from production, the Commodity Credit Corp. budgets nearly \$2.5 billion to remove surplus produce from the market, and the U.S. Department of Interior requests \$10 million for dam building and irrigation programs to add more to the productive capacity of the country. And advocates of this philosophy seem to find vetoes by Congress more of it."

Now, scaling these astronomical figures down to where we can understand and relate them, we find Christmas shopping at its mathematical merry-go-round existing in our home. All year long we've budgeted carefully to buy the essentials and make repairs to things that are broken. But the budget went out pretty well until, suddenly, Christmas arrived. The budgeted money for gifts and decorations was used up long ago. Now we see my side of the picture. We buy toys for our nieces and nephews, besides our own and clothes for their parents and our own. It wouldn't be fair to reveal what we are buying, but nine chances out of ten, the recipients of these gifts already have more than enough of what they'll get from us on Christmas Eve. The season of giving, and we should give. We will, but we should give wisely.

The government apparently doesn't realize its right hand is doing one thing and its left the other. The sad part of this business one

\$4,150 Awarded In Accident Suit

A Hartford man who claimed nervous injuries in an auto accident on Manchester's Hartford Highway three years ago was awarded \$4,150 damages by a Superior Court jury in Hartford yesterday.

Williams was arrested after the crash and was charged with evading responsibility, driving while intoxicated, and driving in violation of a limited license.

According to police, Feldman was driving east on Hartford Highway near Palm St. when Williams approached him, driving erratically.

Williams attempted to pass a car and continued on his way. Williams was picked up about half an hour later after Feldman had asked a passing motorist to get his license number.

Williams appeared in Town Court March 9, 1957, and was fined \$200 for driving while intoxicated and \$200 for violating a limited license. The court found him innocent of evading responsibility.

Grade 7 Compared In National Test

By JUDITH ARBAREL

Half of the 847 seventh graders in Manchester are at least one year ahead of average other seventh graders in the country, and some are as much as two or three years ahead of their contemporaries.

Results of a standardized test administered in October have been disclosed by Superintendent of Schools Arthur H. Illing.

The test was compiled by the Bureau of Educational Research and Service of the University of Connecticut.

On the composite score of all the language and arithmetic units of the test, 435 pupils scored at the eighth grade level or higher, and 161 scored at their own seventh grade level.

The other 121 pupils scored below their grade level, none as low as the fourth grade level.

The scoring was also done on a percentage basis, and on this basis 48 pupils ranked in the 90th percentile or scored higher than 90 per cent of all the pupils in the country who took the test.

One hundred and twenty-two pupils ranked in the 90th percentile and above. Nineteen pupils ranked below the 40th percentile. Children who took the test in other parts of the country included those from the best preparatory schools and from the children of academically underprivileged Alabama and Louisiana.

High Verbal Level

The Manchester pupils showed a consistently high level of achievement in every test related to reading and vocabulary, and a moderate to poor level of achievement in the arithmetic test.

The reading comprehension, language skills and vocabulary tests showed many children with seventh grade achievement levels, and a few with twelfth grade achievement levels.

Illing said that the cultural level of the community has a bearing on the results of language tests. Children in a community like Manchester have "better home opportunities" than children in some other communities where the test was administered. He said, and these opportunities raise their level of achievement in language.

On the language skills test, 21 pupils ranked in the 90th percentile, doing eleventh grade work. Four hundred and seventy-two pupils ranked in the 80th percentile or above. Twenty-five were doing barely seventh grade work and the rest were below grade level.

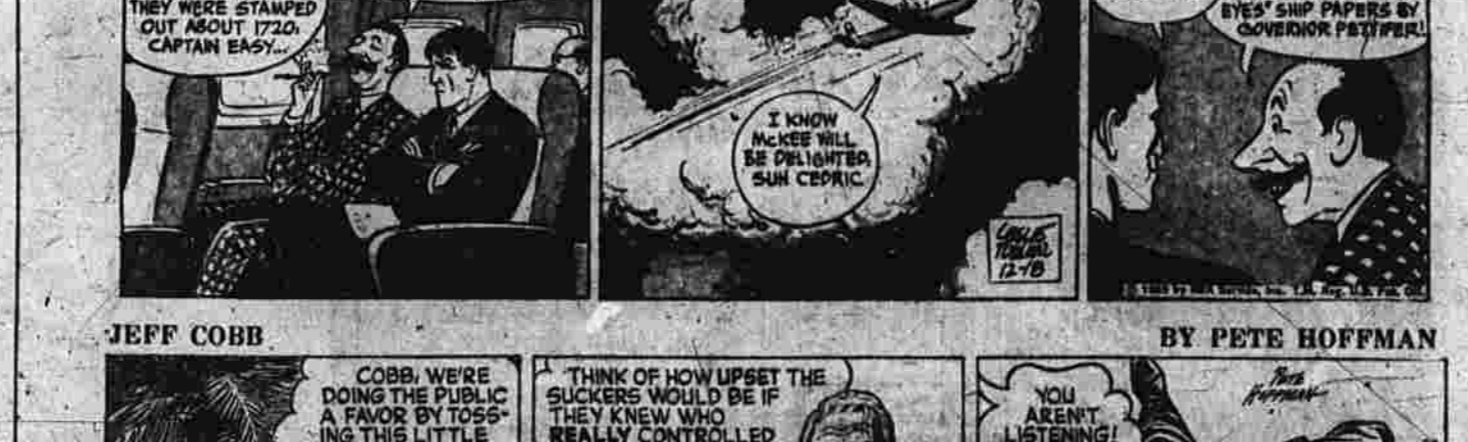
