Belgian foreign ministers stressed the need for continuing consultations before any final decisions are taken at the summit.

Turkish Foreign Minister Fatin Ruhi Zorlu expressed doubts that the Soviet Union has the necessary intentions to proceed. He said more time was necessary.

Lloyd said that even on disarmament, no agreement would be made without approval of any nation concerned. Sources said the allies appeared reassured by the pledges and the meeting closed harmoniously.

It was reported authoritatively that the United States considered the West's proposals for a series of summit conferences as mainly a psychological move in order not to be out of step.

The United States does not believe the proposal for a series of summit conferences in any way commits the West to more than the Paris meeting proposed for April. It was reported on high authority.

The best of whether any future summit meetings will be arranged will be the shrewdest to watch at the first conference.

The NATO ministers were informed that the first summit meeting is likely to be a probing operation. If it succeeds, a second summit will be held in Moscow, London and Washington.

parties to the proceeding and there was no question of his own rights being involved.

The latest case sought to bring up new points not previously ruled upon by the court and sought to get a clearer ruling on constitutional grounds.

Superior Court Judge Frank T. Healey ruled for the state and the Supreme Court ruled on the appeal from that verdict. The state defended the case by saying the laws already had been decided.

The three women plaintiffs—Mrs. Jean Doe, Mrs. Pauline Poe and Mrs. Hanna Roe—contended that prohibition of the use of contraceptive devices denied them their right as patients to a physician's prescription.

Mrs. Doe, 25, said a condition developed when she was three and one-half months pregnant that brought her to the brink of death. Her condition now is such that conception and any pregnancy would be exceedingly dangerous to her life.

She claimed a right to live a normal married life with her husband, and said she needed competent medical advice on how to avoid conception.

Mrs. Poe, 29, and Mrs. Roe, 26, respectively, contend Mrs. Poe has borne three children, the youngest of whom lived more than 10 weeks. Dr. Burton said she had genetic but their inheritance program makes the prospect of another pregnancy extremely dangerous to Mrs. Poe and her fetus.

Mrs. Roe has four children, none of whom live. She contended their poor health is responsible for her positive blood and she has had to have several operations. Because of this, she said, they need Dr. Burton's medical advice on how to prevent conception.

Three appeals were denied because no exceptions were provided in the revised law banning use of contraceptives.

"Courts cannot," the opinion said, "by process of constant legislative abrogation, express or implied, substitute their own judgment as to what is unambiguous language as fortified by the intent of the legislature, in the light of judicial interpretation, to change it."

"Both my feet and legs are very painful—my feet are blistered—and this has slowed me down on the road."

This was her sixth day on the road and she was covering about 2 1/2 miles an hour.
