Challe, the supreme commander in Algeria, remained for a long period of time in the Algerian conference with De Gaulle. He was not to be removed from the command in Algeria.

Neither of the two communiques issued after the meeting made any mention of Massu. The usually well-informed newspaper, Le Monde said without qualification that he would be removed from the command in Algeria.

It was announced that Gen. Maurice Challe, the commander in chief, and Gen. De Gaulle, the government's chief civil representative, would return to their posts in Algeria tomorrow. There was no mention of Massu returning.

Massu was summoned to Paris after giving an interview to a German newspaper in which he criticized De Gaulle and suggested the army did not agree with his Algerian policy. He later made a half-hearted denial of the statements.

May 10 Humphrey hasn't decided about that one yet. Unlike Wisconsin, this primary is not binding on the general election. It amounts to a popularity contest between candidates.

The Republicans have a problem. They have no one to oppose Kennedy. The only GOP presidential candidate in sight, there is no heat of battle or clash of rivals to keep their cause constantly in the public eye.

About the only GOP news yesterday came from Republican National Chairman Thurston B. Morton, who is a senator from Kentucky. Morton told 200 young Republicans that "Republican January jubilation could turn into a November nightmare if we permit ourselves to become fat and complacent."

Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaman told the same group "I'd like to remind the Democrats that Franklin D. Roosevelt was nominated four times in a convention, nobody ever called a wide open convention." He was referring to Democrats who have been pointing out Nixon's lack of rivals for the Republican nomination.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) made an all out attack in a New York speech on racial, religious or sectional prejudice in politics.

Unlike Kennedy and Humphrey, Johnson is not an announced candidate for the Democratic nomination. But he has been striving to erase any image of himself as a purely sectional politician, a southerner. And his remarks would have been referred to Kennedy's Catholic religion, which has become a possible drawback to his candidacy.

"Personally," said Johnson, "I believe that most Americans have become tired of the constant questioning of men as to their religion, their ancestry, and where they were born."

"We must select our next president on the basis of group-adult issues. We must select the man we feel is best qualified to lead this country in the face of the communist threat. We must look to our strength and not fail."

Idle Claims Dip In Town, State

Unemployment compensation claims dropped in Manchester for the first time in six weeks last week, ending Jan. 16.

A similar decline in the state was reported by the Connecticut Bureau of Labor Commissioner Renato Ricciuti attributed it mainly to the end of factory shutdowns for inventory taking and other seasonal factors.

The Manchester decrease was due to a more than 50 per cent drop in claims made last week. But a big rise in the continued claims nearly offset this.

Total claims last week were 1,371, a decline of 13 per cent from the 1,553 the week before. New claims last week were 178 and continued claims numbered 1,149. The previous week's figures were 363 and 990, respectively.

The comparable week one year ago showed total claims in Manchester at 1,885, which was a 10 per cent drop from the week before.

Unemployment claims dropped throughout the State last week as compensation for 29,880 weeks of unemployment. The average week during the same week in 1949 was 181.425 as compensation for 36,071 weeks of unemployment.

(LOCATE THE ACE TO PLAY WELL)

Most experts would cheerfully give up all they know about squeeze and other rare plays if they could only guess the location of the missing high cards. Sometimes your contract depends on how well you guess, which opponent has a key ace.

West led the ace of clubs and continued with a club to East's king. East then returned to the queen. Who had the ace of clubs?

If West had it, South would lead a low spade intending to play dummy's king if West played low. If East had the ace of spades, however, South's only chance was to finesse through West for the ace.

Short of peaking, how do you solve a problem of this kind?

Indirect Method

The indirect method is to locate the ace by finding another. In this case you locate the ace of spades by discovering which opponent has the ace of spades.

Why should the plan work? The answer lies in the fact that East cannot have two ace side suits in addition to his powerful club suit. Since there would be several of the smaller suits, an opening bid would also serve related child suit.
