

Ike, Aides Ponder Possible Steps on Situation in Cuba

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—President Eisenhower talked for 40 minutes today with Secretary of State Christian A. Herter about possible moves to offset worsening relations with Cuba.

The White House and Herter declined afterward to say anything about the meeting, which was attended also by Ambassador Philip W. Bonsal and assistant secretary Roy Rubottom, who is in charge of Latin American affairs.

The meeting came after Herter met for 90 minutes yesterday at his home with Bonsal, who has been summoned from Havana for consultations, and Rubottom.

As he left the White House today, Herter told newsmen "any statements will have to come from the President."

The Secretary ignored a question about when Bonsal would return to his post in Havana. Nor would he say whether the White House planned to issue any statement.

The White House conference was believed to have focused on recommendations Herter put forward on how to deal with Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro, who has been stepping up attacks against the United States.

Herter has favored a cautious policy in the past. But he is known to be upset with Castro's most recent denunciations and is under some congressional pressure to take a tough stand.

Some senators and congressmen have urged Herter to consider economic reprisals against Cuba, including steps to cut back the amount of sugar the United States buys annually from Cuba. These sales provide some \$180 million to Cuban producers.

The unusual Sunday meeting at Herter's home came less than 24 hours after Bonsal returned from consultations. Rubottom described the meeting as a preliminary conversation to be continued today.

All three were unimpressed after yesterday's conference and would not say what had been discussed.

Bonsal said on his return late Saturday that relations with Cuba were seriously deteriorating and that there were no indications of any Cuban desire for conciliation.

The envoy said it was hard to tell what the objectives of Castro might be in his stepped-up attacks on the United States. He added, however, that there still is a warm feeling in Havana for Americans.

Bonsal said he did not know how long he would remain here, but that he hopes to go back to Cuba. His wife returned with him.

Castro's ambassador to Washington, Dr. Ernesto Dihigo, went home for Christmas and hasn't come back.

Officials here emphasized that Bonsal's return does not imply any plans to break off diplomatic relations with Cuba. They said it implies only a strong protest against what Herter termed "most unimpressive" statements by Castro.

CAB Boss Assailed, Defended

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—CAB Chairman James R. Durfee was both assailed today as having unethically accepted hospitality from commercial airlines and praised as a man of the highest integrity.

The criticism was made by Sen. William Proxmire (D-Wis.) at a Senate judiciary subcommittee hearing to consider Durfee's nomination as a \$25,000-a-year judge on the U. S. Court of Claims.

Proxmire said that as Civil Aeronautics Board chairman, Durfee violated the CAB's own code of ethics in accepting free air rides and hospitality on three occasions from the Flying Tiger, Overseas National, Eastern, and Trans World Airlines.

E. R. Quesada, administrator of the Federal Aviation agency, testified that he had worked intimately for two years with Durfee.

With the white haired Durfee sitting at the same table, Quesada said:

"I've always found him to be helpful, sincere, judicial and in my opinion a very, very fine public servant."

A former CAB member, Joseph P. Adams a Democrat, also praised Durfee, a Republican.

"In my opinion, the chairman's integrity is of the highest," Adams said.

The subcommittee, after hearing briefly from Durfee himself, recessed until tomorrow. The Senators did not ask him about the questions Proxmire raised.

Proxmire opposed Durfee on both ethical grounds and what he called Durfee's lack of judicial qualifications.

Durfee said only one newspaper in Wisconsin had criticized him. He did not name the newspaper, but Proxmire had quoted at some length from stories in the Madison Capital-Times.

As for his judicial qualifications, Durfee said "A large number of persons have called me and said I was qualified for the job."

This was the first public outline of Proxmire's specific complaints but Durfee, with apparent advance knowledge, had replied in advance.

De Gaulle to Push Policies in Algeria Despite Fighting

1,000 at Barricades On Algiers Streets

Rome, Jan. 25 (AP)—A Trans World Airlines pilot said tonight the U. S. Consulate in Algiers has ordered the evacuation of Americans working for French firms in Algeria.

A. L. Heath, captain of the first civil airliner to depart from Algiers since yesterday's rioting, said he was told by American friends at Algiers airport they were ordered by telephone to pack up as quickly as possible.

Paris, Jan. 25 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle declared tonight he is determined to press forward with his Algerian policies despite bloody protests by French settlers in barricaded Algiers.

As the hostile right wing settlers and government troops faced each other across the barricades in the strife-ridden Algerian city where 21 died yesterday, De Gaulle and his cabinet met in Paris.

A brief communique afterwards said the government was "resolved to maintain the Algerian policy it has adopted and to assure a return to public order as rapidly as possible."

Troop reinforcements poured in to the North African city where from 1,000 to 3,000 French soldiers were barricaded behind barbed wire and ripped up paving stones.

There were reports that an effort at negotiation was being made despite the fact that the insurgents held parts of the city in defiance of government orders.

The word came after bloody clashes last night between 10,000 and 153 wounded. The fighting broke out when police tried to disperse a stubborn crowd of about 20,000.

The uprising against De Gaulle's policy of self-determination pitted Frenchman against Frenchman in a territory groggy from a 5-year revolt of Algerian nationalists.

The immediate trigger of the trouble was De Gaulle's dismissal of Gen. Jacques Massu, paratrooper commander and governor of the Algiers area who has been quoted as criticizing the De Gaulle policy.

Massu was a key leader in the 1958 rebellion in Algeria that brought De Gaulle to power.

Leaders of the rebellious French group admitted they were fighting a losing battle. The supreme commander of the French forces in Algeria stood firm behind De Gaulle and warned that "the mutiny will not win."

A government spokesman said it has been "definitely established" that demonstrators and not police fired the opening shots that touched off yesterday's armed clash.

The order for a general strike was being followed in Oran, Constantine, Sidi Bel Abbes and other cities.

Adm. Philippe Auboyneau, French fleet commander in the Mediterranean, broadcast an appeal for calm and called on the insurgents to cease a "mad adventure which is pointless."

New U.S. Defense Picture

No Deterrent Gap, Air Secretary Says

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr. said today the revised U. S. evaluation of military intelligence about the Soviet Union is based on actual knowledge of Russia's capabilities, not guesses as to its intentions.

Gates, who touched off a wide discussion on the subject with his testimony before a House Defense Appropriations subcommittee last week, indicated he feels his earlier remarks have been misinterpreted.

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—Will Russia have a ready-to-go missile that the United States in any period through 1963?

"They might, I think it is doubtful, but they might... but in no way will we have an overall deterrent gap," says Secretary of the Air Force Dudley C. Sharp.

Over-all deterrent strength is the important point, Sharp said yesterday in a prior interview.

"It isn't whether they have a few more missiles than we have. The important thing is that our total overall posture is such that they wouldn't dare attack without receiving such a formidable attack themselves that they would never want to do it," he added.

How big might the missile gap be?

"There is one, Sharp said, it will be smaller than the 3-1 superiority which former Secretary of

Defense Neil McElroy said a year ago the Russians might move in long range missile superiority. Sharp declined to give a more specific estimate.

The Pentagon's view that there is no deterrent gap got support yesterday from Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.). He said in a radio interview "I do not agree that there is this great missile gap."

Saltonstall, senior Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, said "We are ahead of the Russians in the general opinion on certain parts of the missile problem... they are ahead of us in the question of thrust."

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), Senate Democratic leader, mentioned what he called "the missile gap" in strongly criticizing Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr.

Johnson was out of town last week when Gates said in Capitol Hill that prior U. S. intelligence estimates of Soviet missile and military power had been revised downward. Gates said this was done by basing estimates on "what the Soviet Union probably would do as opposed to former estimates which were made on what they were capable of doing."

Johnson issued a weekend statement saying Gates had adopted a dangerous new method for esti-

Gamble Home, Twice Refuses To See Father

New York, Jan. 25 (AP)—Dr. James Douglas Sharpe says he will take legal action if necessary to see his daughter, Gamble Benedict, 19, the heiress who has been returned here after running away with a married chauffeur.

Sharpe, a Brattleboro, Vt., psychiatrist, was turned away twice yesterday from the East Side mansion of Miss Benedict's grandmother, Mrs. Katherine Godes Benedict.

"This is typical," Sharpe commented after the rebuff.

Miss Benedict's brother, Douglas, 21, and Mrs. Benedict's attorney, Robert Hoffman, returned the defendant to her grandmother's home Saturday night. They flew her home from Paris on a court order from French authorities.

The Roman-born chauffeur, Andre Pourmbeanu, 35, with whom Miss Benedict sailed on a freighter for an escapade in Paris, remained there in mournful seclusion. He and the girl had said they wanted to marry after he could get a divorce.

The New York Daily News said in a copyrighted story that he talked Friday by phone with Miss Benedict.

Sharpe, who gave custody of the girl and her brother to Mrs. Benedict after the 1946 suicide of the children's mother, Mrs. Josephine Benedict Sharpe, insisted that he has "every right" to see his daughter.

After he and his present wife, Marilyn, were turned away at the door of the Benedict mansion, his son told newsmen:

"My sister does not want to talk to my father. She told me that as emphatically as possible. She doesn't want any help from her father—his help is not wanted. He does not deserve that privilege."

Situation in Algeria Seen As Grave Crisis for World

France's crisis in Algeria is also a world crisis.

What happens there will have a decided impact upon the future fortunes of France's Fifth Republic under President Charles de Gaulle. It can have grave implications on the course of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The Algerian situation also is bound up with the future of the Middle East. Peace in Algeria would tend to deprive eastern Europe of one of the most important sources of oil in the world.

Many elements are at work in the Algerian crisis. There are the Pan-Arab Nationalist followers of Gamal Abdel Nasser, whose violent propaganda six years ago gave added momentum to the developing Algerian Nationalist revolt.

Nasser has a stake in opposing peace on any terms short of total independence from France.

There are, of course, Communist elements and Communist propaganda, seeking to capitalize on Arab nationalism and interested primarily for some time to come, in sustained chaos. Without some measure of peace in Algeria, De Gaulle will be difficult for his NATO partners to deal with in matters affecting unified commands for the defense of western Europe.

There are the supporters of De Gaulle, who believe there is a possibility that Algerians and the French can find a way to live together in peace under some form of local autonomy falling short of the evicting of all French authority.

There are millions of moderate non-European Algerians, weary of the six years of cruel warfare and apparently willing to seek at least a temporary accommodation with the French.

And there are the "Colons." They are of French extraction, but they call themselves Algerians. They believe dogmatically in the doctrine that Algeria is not a place apart but actually part of metropolitan France. The Colons were born in Algeria, and their fathers and grandfathers before them. They rally to the slogan, "Long Live French Algeria." They have built their homes and their futures in Algeria, sunk their roots there, raised their children.

Their agitation is understandable. France came to Algeria in the era of colonialism about 135 years ago, when there was almost nothing there, Algeria never existed as an independent nation, nor did it ever have its own identity before the French rule. Everything, modern which was built in Algeria—its fine capital, its roads, its industries, its agriculture—all is French.

De Gaulle came to power in France in the wings of another Algerian crisis in May 1958. The situation was a bit different then. The Colons had the notion De Gaulle would save them from Paris. They intended upon selling them out in order to liquidate the enormously expensive revolution. The army was all with De Gaulle. But De Gaulle himself had to accept up to realities. There would be no future in Algeria save endless (Continued on Page Thirteen)

None Start Bandwagons

Democratic Leaders Silent on Nominees

Washington, Jan. 25 (AP)—Democratic leaders controlling major blocs of party power remained uncommitted on a party nominee today after a weekend parade of presidential hopefuls.

With former President Harry S. Truman setting a "give 'em hell" pace, four major and several minor contenders for top place on the ticket tried out their personalities and oratorical persuasion on 2,500 party members at a \$100 a plate fund raising dinner here.

The upshot of the performance seemed to be that nobody staked any bandwagons rolling. This was confirmed by a check of the men in a position to control the big vote delegations likely to have the final say in any down-to-the-wire contest that develops in the Los Angeles convention.

Truman, who retains strong influence with a minority segment of the party, dealt something of a blow to the incipient candidacy of Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) when he told the group he has no commitments on any presidential aspirant. Symington, who has said he would like to be president, has been counting heavily on Truman's support.

Truman also took what appeared to be an indirect swipe at Adlai Stevenson, the man he wanted as a candidate in 1952 and died in 1955. Stevenson won the nomination but lost the election both times.

Truman said that, in addition to having the necessary qualifications for office, the man he supports is going to have "the ability as well

to arouse the support of the people to vote him into office."

Kennedy Launches Granite State Tour

Nashua, N. H., Jan. 25 (AP)—With pledges of solid support from all the New England states at the Democratic national convention in July, Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) made his first pitch today to clinch these delegates.

He has a round of speeches, receptions, rallies, and handshaking tours of factories here and in Manchester on the program for his one day stand.

His wife, Jacqueline, is taking the stump with him.

New Hampshire has only 11 votes in the national convention. The campaign here is important since New Hampshire's primary is the first in the nation on March 8.

Party leaders from all six New England states assured Sen. Kennedy last night at a Boston dinner that he will have a solid New England bloc of 114 delegates when he goes to Los Angeles in July.

Kennedy was handed a check for \$50,000—part of the net proceeds of a record \$174,000 raised by Massachusetts' Jefferson-Jackson Committee at a \$100 per plate affair.

Nike Soldier Escapes U.S. Prison Term

Pfc. Edward J. Jansen, 18-year-old Manchester based Nike soldier convicted of taking more than \$1,000 from a Manchester bank, has escaped a federal prison term.

U.S. District Court Judge J. Joseph Smith today suspended imposition of sentence on the young man and ordered 3-years probation, to begin when Jansen is separated from the service.

The lightness of the sentence was based on evidence that Jansen was mentally disturbed when he entered the Manchester Branch of the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. Nov. 14 and took \$1,061.65 from tellers' drawers.

Judge Smith spoke of the youth's age, his intoxication, and his mental condition at the time of the break.

Jansen's counsel, Atty. John L. Calvoconeri, said Jansen will return to the bank about \$200 to make up for stolen money which has not already been recovered.

Most of the sum was recovered when two boys found a bag containing coins hidden in the woods near the Nike base on Line St. The bag, with Jansen's name on it, led to the youth's arrest.
