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De Gaulle's Fine Print

In the first flush of President de Gaulle's victory over the Algerians in Algeria, the general conclusion and hope was that this demonstration, on his part, that he could handle the French colonial and control the French Army would give the Algerian rebels the confidence to carry out his promise to them of self-determination. On that basis, there would now be a new high chance that the rebels would accept his offer, come into peace, halt the fighting, and await the vote by which the Algerians would determine their own political future.

This first hope has now been compromised to such extent that attention to the fine print in President de Gaulle's dramatic speech in such fine print may have had something to do with producing the collapse of the French Army in Algeria. What the Algerian rebels may think of these same things, as they read them and analyze them, could be all important.

In his original offer to the Algerians, last fall, de Gaulle had formalized a way for the civil war, his self-determination process could come into operation—the crucial point in the process was the regulation of a formal truce with his leaders, or simply a cessation of fighting for a period of some months. He wanted the truce to be unofficial, but which could be measured, de Gaulle then said, by the number of casualties in a year, whatever they might be.

But normally Walter Lippman, having come to such a central issue, might be precisely the man to examine it from some common point of view.

If we cannot be satisfied to accept the position of second best, is there, perhaps, anybody who can be satisfied to accept it?

How many first positions are there in anything? Can everybody who really wants to be first?

Have we ourselves never been second best in anything before?

Suppose somebody else of equal resource and intelligence is equally determined to be first in everything. What then?

Suppose, by resource and intelligence, we are actually first to be second best in something. Does that mean we are destroyed? Do all second best nations get destroyed, or fallen into slavery?

But where Lippman disappoints us most is not in his failure to examine the philosophy of prestige, but in his object acceptance of the premise that a scientific, materialistic achievement has actually become the accurate and final measurement of a civilization and a way of life.

He is in anguish before the Russian space missiles.

How is it, then, that if he proclaims these missiles make Russia first and ourselves second, he does not go all the way and have us adopt the formula and the way of life which can be first?

If this is the real proof of the pudding, why not eat the whole pudding?

The inconsistency on his part arises from the fact that he has forgotten, for the hysterical moment, the value and accomplishment by which he will really measure people and nations.

If he set about putting down these values, he might well include a capacity for keeping one's head amid circumstantial adversity, or a wisdom for realizing that no dream power ever decreed anybody should be forever first in everything, or a faithfulness to one's own ideas and values no matter how momentarily glam, around something else might appear. The Drama of Our Courts

Our trial courts are filled with drama, but not in the sense which is often emphasized. The drama in our courtroom comes from the people who play a part in a trial and the jobs they do to bring about the justice we all seek.

The main elements of a trial are the judge, the jury, the plaintiff and the defendant. The plaintiff is a person who seeks damages because he claims that the defendant has violated the law or infringed upon his rights. In a criminal case, the plaintiff is the state which claims that the criminal law has been broken to the detriment of the people.

Under our American system of justice, each party in a trial has a right to be represented by counsel. In other words, to have a lawyer present the party's case. The right to counsel is a basic right of every party to a trial. A party may also represent himself, but this is a risky business. The lawyer's function is to maintain the balance of the trial, to keep every party to his own side of the case, and to help the judge understand the case of the defendant and the plaintiff.

The plaintiff's lawyer in a civil case must present evidence and cross-examine the evidence of the defendant. 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Town Union Help Ask 10 to 25-Cent Raise

Unemployed town workers will be asking raises ranging from 10 to 25 cents an hour when they meet with General Manager Richard Martin at 10:45 budget making time. Last year a 5-cent across-the-board hike was granted.

Most school custodial workers will seek a scale of \$3,500 to \$4,500. The present scale is \$3,775 to \$4,275.

The decision to seek those increases was made at a meeting this week of Local 91, State, County, and Municipal Employees Union, AFL-CIO.

Union members are hourly rated employees in the Department of Public Works, the Water and Sewer Department, the Recreation Department, and custodial workers under the Board of Education.

Wages for most of the hourly rated workers range from \$1.85 to \$2.25. The pay for a heavy equipment operator. The pay of a few workers falls below or above that range.

At a meeting Monday, members discussed their wages in comparison to wages for similar workers in other towns. According to Ernest Irwin, union president, they found their pay low in comparison with those in Meriden, Bristol, Vernon, Ellington, East Haven, and New Haven.

Rockville-Vernon Voters Approve Park, Rec Unit

About 30 voters at a town meeting last night approved the establishment of a townwide Park and Recreation Commission despite objections of Abner L. Brooks that another inquiry would be created.

Brooks contended that city residents who already have provided their taxes, would be unfairly taxed for a town recreation program that would likely be concentrated in the rural section of the town.

However, as a result of last night's action, a Park and Recreation Commission of five members will be appointed by the Selectmen. No more than two members can be of the same political party, and the commission must include residents of both the city and the five districts.

Members will be chosen by the town's voters at a meeting of 7 p.m. on Oct. 15. A prepared resolution presented by Selectman William R. Hahn would have limited the membership to three. It would have had the selectmen choose the chairman, and it failed to provide for a second year of representation.

Amendments offered by David Berger, Grove St., in these respects, were adopted.

Before Hahn presented his resolution, Brooks moved that the matter be referred to the Fire District Commissioners. His motion was defeated. Brooks admitted that he was attempting to kill the plan. The only way to avoid it, he said, was to have the Fire District support a rural recreation program, or to consolidate with the city's program.

Note Consolidation Plan

Several persons drew attention to the fact that the town will be voting by July on a consolidation charter. Some held that a long-term wide recreation commission should be established until then, while others maintained that this would be a step toward assimilation of city and fire district activities.

Mrs. Mazy Fran, a member of Consolidation and Charter Commission said, "It seems to me we are creating another unnecessary hurdle. Must we create another commission that must perhaps be dissolved? If the charter is accepted, consolidation is no avail, then establish a townwide recreation program, but not at this time."

James Vanover, also a Charter Commission member, pointed out that gradual assimilation was considered "next best" to consolidation. The city's plan to form a commission to replace its recreation committee, was noted by Berger. Everett Gardner suggested the

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Luddecke Sees Tax Increase Of 5 to 7 Mills

A town tax increase of 5 to 7 mills for a minimum rate of 44 mills was predicted by Board of Finance Chairman William F. Luddecke today.

The Board of Finance met last night, but delayed setting the tax rate until Feb. 17 at which time it is expected that a check for \$60,000 in back taxes will be received from LaPointe Industries Inc. Without the LaPointe check, a 7 mill increase would be necessary, Luddecke said.

The Finance unit did not feel it was safe to set the tax rate until the LaPointe check is received, because the rate cannot be changed once it is set for the year. Also, by Feb. 17, the Board of Tax Review will have held its final session and the actual taxable grand list will be known.

Factors in the large increase are \$100,000 for more police protection, \$10,000 for more school children, a decrease of \$50,000 in revenue from tuition students, the first full payment on the new Lake St. School, and general operating cost increases.

Among the flexible matters to be considered by the Board in setting the tax rate, Luddecke said, are the taxes that may not be paid next year, possible additional costs for snow removal, income from building permits, use this year of funds set aside for several years for a walk at the town hall, and possible return of a "good surplus" from the High School Building Committee.

The Finance Board last night approved another appropriation for the Public Health Nursing Unit in the amount of \$2,500. This in addition to \$8,000 included in the nurse's budget. Luddecke said the public service organization's drive for funds this year fell short.

City residents pay a 15-mill tax rate in addition to the town tax rate. Fire District residents pay a 5-mill rate. They city rate is also expected to increase this year.

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Eastern Boiler Firm To Locate in Town

A new manufacturing company, Eastern Boiler Inc., will begin steel job roll forming and assembling operations in Manchester March 1, according to Edgar Clarke of the Chamber of Commerce.

The new company will locate at the site of the former Canterbury Metal Works on Canterbury St. The target date for beginning of production is March 1.

The firm, which plans to hire 20 men, will assemble and pack large steel boilers and boiler jackets and will also have a steel roll forming department for quantity metal-shaping operations.

President Arthur Godbout of Farmington said the company will not engage in assembly of most of its roller mill products but will sell the shaped stock to other manufacturers.

Other officers of the new company are J. P. Moriarty, vice president, and James Diamond, secretary.

Godbout is also president of the Manchester firm of Argo Fabrications, manufacturers of heatboard radiators, heating equipment, some control valves, electrical relays and controls. Argo markets its products on the East Coast, Canada, the South and several states in the West.

Purchased Property

According to Godbout, there will be no connection between Argo and Eastern Boiler other than the use of current marketing knowledge and experience in the sale of forming equipment for quantity metal-shaping operations.

Godbout purchased the old Canterbury Metal Works property in mid-December. Land surrounding the plant building covers about 100,000 square feet and the plant building itself contains about 5,500 square feet, Godbout said.

Board Tables Actions On Hunting, Pension

Town Directors last night tabled action on ordinances dealing with hunting and the town pension plan after public hearings in the Municipal Building.

The Board will reconvene next Tuesday at 8 p.m.

Mayor Eugene T. Kelly asked Wilbur Little, a sportsman, to Boston again with Chief of Police James Reardon on the hunting proposal. Opponents of the ordinance were residents of Burnham and other streets.

Skinner Named As Tree Warden

Howard Skinner of Rt. 44A has been appointed tree warden by the Board of Selectmen. He will fill the unexpired term of R. Kneeland Jones Jr. which runs until October of this year.

The selectmen will advertise for candidates to fill the post of dog warden and expect to make an appointment at the Feb. 15 meeting. Written applications listing qualifications will be accepted by First Selectman Charles A. Robbins up to 1 p.m. on Feb. 15.

Industrial Arts Explained

Industrial arts is the study of tools, materials, products and processes of industry and technology. Wesley Ketchum, industrial arts consultant with the State Department of Education, told the Bolton board of selectmen today that the definition was made to help distinguish today's program from old terms such as manual training, manual arts and mechanical drawing.

Ketchum said all youngsters need an industrial arts program today because of our industrial and technical society. The program is designed to give three elements of that society: Production, consumer and recreation. Industrial arts is a program which will lead to a career choice in a choice of life work.

The program covers work in wood, metal, paper, plastic, graphic arts, electricity and electronics, painting and drafting. For a small school, a general shop, 3-teacher program is recommended. This would require minimum space of 1,200 square feet for the shop and 300 square feet for a finishing room. It was estimated that furnishing such a shop with the necessary basic equipment would cost \$1,000 to \$1,200.
