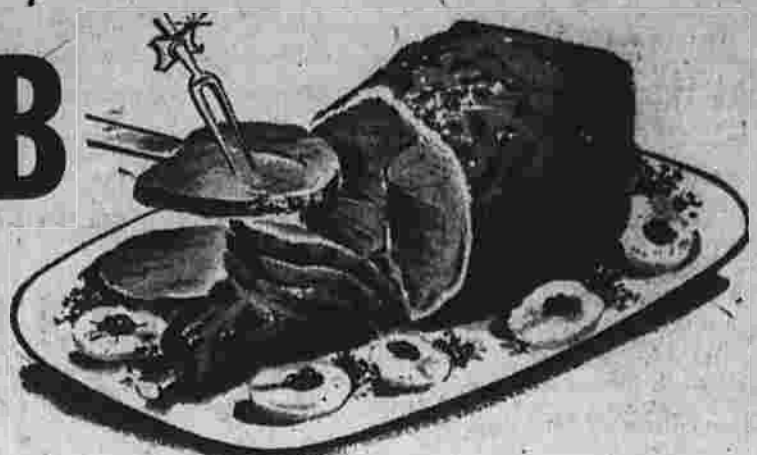

Under some authoritarian regime have been moments of weakness and demoralization. France can always carry the torch for the intangible political ideas. It is not under a tablet for making them work.

This, this week, the debate in the French National Assembly featuring references to the necessity to "maintain the state according to the laws of liberty and the Republic."

Those Christians who have made their mark upon the world in days gone by knew a great spiritual secret. Those men of God who live in our own day, many of whom never make the headlines, who are blessing and helping so many people also share this vital secret.

How do men grow in spiritual stature? What is it that produces a power of constancy in Christians, while many others congregate as spiritual infants who are years? What is the secret of the deep serenity and calmness that they possess?

What we need most as Christians is a personal life of prayer and Bible reading each day. It is a waste of time to go to church each day, and keep it there most of us fall. The sad truth is that to fall here, is to fall everywhere.

Major E. Walter Lamm, U.S. Army, has taken the assignment of directorship that of their own army, with more gratitude than rebellion. The French people are probably not today, that de Gaulle is there to ask and receive these new extraordinary powers of his. But if he were not there, it is doubtful that they would wage any struggle of their own against anyone.

Now, let us think of this: If you find an athlete, they take him and it's a national responsibility to train him and build him up until he's the best there is in the world. If they can make him such a star.

Now, we have a free enterprise; we place above all other values our own individual freedom and rights, and we believe, moreover, that the operation of such a system in the long run produces more not only happiness, more satisfaction and pride in our people, but also more goods, more wealth.

"Now, let's remember that dictators have been very efficient. Time and time again, look how we were over-ruled, almost, by Hitler's early years in his war against over-running Poland and then over-running the West, and for going into Africa, that is, the way of course, we talked about this efficiency.

"But we are talking of a democracy we hope is an enduring form of government. We are therefore trying to do these things at the same time we keep these things."

As we observed in this space yesterday, it was not the comic strip, Lippmann, who took this "second best" hatchwork of the moment and gave it an examination from any basic, enduring point of view.

Best With The Torch... Because there was once a French revolution, because the same ideas which produced it had also played a role in the American Revolution, because France gave the world some of its great slogans of liberty, because France gave us a Statue of Liberty, and because France as a fountainhead of liberty and democracy has never been consistently capable of either.

The French Revolution isn't because and Panama reject any such dictatorship. The historical moments since when France has not been saved from itself.

"Hereby, or Worse" Senator George Aiken of Vermont is perhaps becoming one of the few men left in public life who combines an ability to shoot off his mouth with occasional common sense. We have plenty of characters who dare say anything that pops into their heads, but whose heads are like breezeways. Aiken has at least been thinking before he speaks.

He came out with something the other day that he himself predicted many Americans would undoubtedly regard as "heresy," or "heresy." It was a recommendation that the time had come for the United States to explore "disparateness" the idea of internationalizing the Panama Canal.

His reading of the future is that the world is moving toward a new era of internationalism. We are going to come to a moment when we have to decide whether we will hold the Canal by fighting to hold it, a course which would be politically disastrous, or getting it together, which would be desirable either.

So his suggestion is that, before this day gets any closer, start studying some formula for internationalizing the Canal and thereby multilateralizing the problem attendant upon it. If some hemisphere organization is running it, we won't be the target, and the growth would be cut from under agitation by Panama itself to take over the Canal itself.

Not Stale, But Sanitary President Eisenhower has none of the smooth style of a Walter Lippmann. Nonetheless, he managed, in the press conference yesterday, to take the very kind of advice of our possibly being "second best" in something which was the great lack in Lippmann's comments on the same issue the other day.

"We cannot be satisfied," wrote Lippmann, "to accept the position of second best." At the press conference yesterday, the question of what might happen to us if we did get off second best was put to Eisenhower. He talked for a long time in giving his answer. His sentences never had wobble structure. Many of them weren't even sentences.

But the thought, however awkwardly it tumbled out, still had the balance and perspective so sadly lacking in more polished comments on the same issue.

"Well, I think here and there you have," the President began, "can find that in a country like Russia, you are going to be a certain second best, didn't they win the Olympic Games last time?"

"Now, let us think of this: If you find an athlete, they take him and it's a national responsibility to train him and build him up until he's the best there is in the world. If they can make him such a star.

Now, we have a free enterprise; we place above all other values our own individual freedom and rights, and we believe, moreover, that the operation of such a system in the long run produces more not only happiness, more satisfaction and pride in our people, but also more goods, more wealth.

"Now, let's remember that dictators have been very efficient. Time and time again, look how we were over-ruled, almost, by Hitler's early years in his war against over-running Poland and then over-running the West, and for going into Africa, that is, the way of course, we talked about this efficiency.

"But we are talking of a democracy we hope is an enduring form of government. We are therefore trying to do these things at the same time we keep these things."

As we observed in this space yesterday, it was not the comic strip, Lippmann, who took this "second best" hatchwork of the moment and gave it an examination from any basic, enduring point of view.

Best With The Torch... Because there was once a French revolution, because the same ideas which produced it had also played a role in the American Revolution, because France gave the world some of its great slogans of liberty, because France gave us a Statue of Liberty, and because France as a fountainhead of liberty and democracy has never been consistently capable of either.

If some hemisphere organization is running it, we won't be the target, and the growth would be cut from under agitation by Panama itself to take over the Canal itself.

Father Plans Appeal
New Britain, Feb. 4 (AP)—George Dubovak, who refuses to have his 7-year-old son inoculated against polio, plans to appeal his conviction for violating the state compulsory school attendance law.
A \$5 fine was imposed yesterday on Dubovak, who promptly announced his intention to appeal. Dubovak has said previously that he will carry his fight to the State Supreme Court of Errors if necessary.

His son was expelled from school last Dec. 11 after Dubovak served notice that he would not permit the boy to be inoculated.
Like many other communities in the state, New Britain, requires polio shots for school children. Exemptions are made only for reasons of health or religion.

Each day since the expulsion, Dubovak has taken his son to school. But the boy was denied admittance each time.
Dubovak was arrested on seven counts of violating the state's school attendance law. Four of the counts were dropped yesterday and two were withheld.

Under state law, a parent may be fined \$5 for each week he keeps his child out of school illegally.

Hearing Aid Licenses
Hartford, Feb. 4 (AP)—Persons who are hard of hearing are in danger of being "killed" by unscrupulous hearing aid dealers, a state agency has been told.

A subcommittee of the State Legislative Council yesterday heard suggestions that the state set up a licensing system or create standards for those who deal in hearing aids.
Beymour Sloan of Bridgeport, a hearing aid dealer, told the public hearing that the hearing aid industry is full of "snake-oil" products and that many "abominations" are at the hands of certain dealers who are not qualified to fit hearing devices.

Shooting Held Accident
Hartford, Feb. 4 (AP)—The fatal shooting of Joseph Ropik Jr., 7, of Cooper Mine Rd., Farmington, Dec. 29, was accidental, it was held today by Coroner Louis W. Schneider.

Joseph, his younger brother, Theodore, and a friend, William Kulas, 7 1/2, also of Cooper Mine Rd., obtained a .22 caliber, single shot rifle belonging to the Ropik boy's father from a barn, the coroner related.
They went to an area near a spur railroad to do some target shooting. Joseph fired one shot at some birds and missed. Then he pointed at the weapon and handed it to the Kulas boy.
A train whistle caused all three boys to turn suddenly and the rifle discharged. The bullet struck Joseph in the heart and killed him instantly.

"That these boys used the gun without permission," said the coroner, "and that they had little knowledge of its use or the danger inherent in careless handling of it does not support a finding of criminal neglect."

Work Given U.S. Premiere By Symphony

For the second time this season, the Hartford Symphony Orchestra has given the first United States performance of a European composition.

Last evening, the work was a "Concerto for Piano and Chamber Orchestra" by the Norwegian composer, Fartein Valbye.
The solo part of this composition was played by Robert Hestling, a concertist of the composer, who performed with sensitive regard for the music. Valbye was an avowed disciple of Schoenberg, and the piece is consequently steeped in the harmonic structure. It is, however, more than an exercise in the 12-tone scale, as so many compositions of this nature turn out to be.

Written in the conventional three movements, the first is rhythmically controversial; the second broadly horizontal, and the third characterized by figurative of the soloist against a modulated atonal fugato. Instead of being a mere exercise, as is so frequently the case with composers of this school, the work is remarkably atmospheric, and in spots contemplative.

Mr. Hestling and Mr. Mahler gave a sensitive and apparently definitive reading of the composition. The soloist had previously been heard in the more familiar Concerto by Grieg, likewise a Norwegian. Mr. Hestling has an excellent technique which is shown to advantage in his bravura passages. He likewise has a fine pianissimo, but he lacks a convincing middle ground in the field of dynamics.

His conception of the Grieg provided nothing new until the finale which he made impressive despite the obvious weakness of the score. The audience was enthusiastic and recalled him several times, until he responded with an encore in the form of Grieg's "Norwegian Bransle in Vorubersheim."
The program last night opened with the "Arioso" from Bach's Overture in D, played in memory of Hans Greenwald, known for his educational activities with the orchestra in Greater Hartford.

This was followed by a Capriccio from the pen of the modern French composer, Gertrud Eimmert. Billed as a first performance in Hartford, it will likely be its last performance as well. The work is trivial and disorganized, relying for its effect on means of orchestral tone color. It would appear to have its genesis in the music of German night clubs, and believe me, they're had enough without experimental treatment by a full orchestra.

To conclude the program, Mr. Mahler offered the Tchaikovsky Symphony No. 2 in C minor. This was excellently played, and was in fact, the high point of the program. I have seldom heard the orchestra and Mr. Mahler in better form. The audience was enthusiastic and accorded musicians and conductors tumultuous applause at the close.
