Adm. Burke States Russians Slashed Submarine Output

Washington, Feb. 8 (AP)—Adm. Arleigh Burke says Russia has cut down on submarine production, but the Soviet submarine fleet poses "one of the gravest military threats we face."

It is known that some Soviet submarines can fire missiles, the chief of naval operations told a House Appropriations subcommittee. He did not elaborate on that portion of his testimony made public today, but he said the Soviet threat extends both to sea communications and to U.S. cities.

Burke's testimony also supported current U.S. intelligence estimates based on Soviet intentions as well as Soviet maximum capabilities.

"We have made gross errors in the past by using the old system," he said.

Burke cited what he said were estimates that the Soviets could build "hundreds and hundreds of long-range bombers," but said they did not actually do so.

They actually built submarines in 1956. They had the capability to continue, but what did they do? They got a large number of submarines and then they stopped and they went into new production, but their new production is much less.

"They will build submarines at some lesser rate to replace probably the submarines they now have and keep their submarine capability about level. You can get a capability on a crash program and be completely misled."

Burke's public testimony contained no estimate of present Soviet submarine strength. Earlier estimates have ranged around 300 new or recent craft.

Rep. Daniel J. Flood (D-Pa.) told Burke "You have come up with this one (the intelligence concept) in 90 days in order to balance the budget."

Would Skip Primary Test Kennedy Aides Air Offer to Gov. Brown

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 8 (AP)—Spokesmen for John F. Kennedy approached California party officials at the Western Democratic Conference and proposed "terms" under which Kennedy would stay out of the California presidential primary.

The Massachusetts Senator's campaign aide, it was learned, expressed doubt he would enter the winner-take-all contest for the state's 41 convention votes against Gov. Edmund G. Brown's favorite son candidacy.

But the Californians were informed, the Kennedy people would like definite assurances first from Brown that he would release his delegates after the first ballot in Los Angeles. Brown has disavowed serious presidential ambitions.

Roger Kent, California Democratic state vice chairman, and Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, national committeewoman, were asked to take the message back to Brown. They did not commit themselves on the proposal.

One Kennedy staff member voiced concern that Brown might hold the delegation until it was too late to help the Senator's bid for the presidential nomination.

Kennedy said after his speech here yesterday that he would make a decision on whether he will enter the June 7 California primary within the next month. He noted the filing deadline for the California primary is May 8, after the Wisconsin primary in which he is opposed by Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota.

"I should know more then," Kennedy said.

The California situation takes on increased importance in view of the evident support for Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas in the Southwest and some western states.

Texas partisans who worked the conference lobby here credited Johnson with more than 200 of the 271 western votes at the national convention on top of the 400 they count in the South.

Kennedy forces termed the western claim as excessive.

The conference provided a western showcase for Kennedy, Humphrey, both declared candidates, and Johnson, who said he is not seeking the nomination.

It also served to widen the breach between the party's national chairman, Paul Butler, and the Johnson faction. In a statement taken by some as directed against the Senate majority leader, Butler in a speech Saturday night called for election of a liberal Democratic candidate.

Johnson may not enter any primaries, but Texas Democratic Chairman Ed Connally of Abilene commented:

"Many of the delegates at the conference were convinced for the first time that Sen. Johnson is a serious candidate for the nomination."

Kennedy's appearance at a final breakfast yesterday and his public address that afternoon climaxed the Senate primary campaign.

Reds Agree to Hunt For Missing Italians

Moscow, Feb. 8 (AP)—The wife of a missing Italian pilot, who is visiting President Giovanni Gronchi of Italy, obtained a Soviet agreement today for a new inquiry into the fate of thousands of Italians still listed as missing in World War II.

Mrs. Gronchi met with officials of the Soviet Red Cross and Crescent Society on the question that long has strained relations between the two countries while her husband was discussing world problems with Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in the Kremlin.

She obtained an agreement for a 3-man commission from the Italian Red Cross to come here for further talks between April 20 and 30.

Gronchi, his aides and Khrushchev and other Soviet leaders talked for nearly 2 1/2 hours. Then everybody adjourned to the Italian embassy for a dinner of roast pheasant and champagne.

An Italian delegation spokesman said the talks touched not only on Soviet-Italian problems but also international questions.

Gronchi's visit has been interpreted as a further chance to present his ideas to leaders at the coming summit meeting. Italy will not be represented.

Gronchi carried an attitude of frankness into the dinner at the embassy. In a toast he told the Soviet leaders the East-West curtain of the past has left other countries with some reservations about Soviet disarmament announcements.

Khrushchev took Gronchi to the Bolshoi Ballet last night and ran into another distinguished visitor everybody adjourned to the Italian embassy for a dinner of roast pheasant and champagne.

The chief American delegate to the United Nations talked briefly with the Soviet premier, who he called the day mainly "a simple family reunion." Formal talks begin today on disarmament, European security and aid to underdeveloped nations.

Mystery Sub Seen Trapped By Argentina

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Feb. 8 (AP)—Argentine warships and planes searched today for a mystery submarine believed lurking off the coast of southern Argentina.

Newspapers claimed that the submarine has been bottled up in the Golfo Nuevo, a strategic 30-by-40-mile inlet 650 miles southwest of Buenos Aires. There was no indication what its nationality might be.

Navy Secretary Gaston Clement confirmed that a widespread hunt is underway but described some of the press reports as "absolutely untrue." He refused to discuss stories saying the submarine had been hit by depth bombs dropped by planes.

The Navy secretary complained that the sensational treatment of the operation "has created a false atmosphere."

But the official cold water did not dispel public curiosity. Thousands flocked to the beaches around the gulf to wait for action.

The newspaper Democrazia said the trapped submarine had been damaged and two other submarines quickly moved into the area to divert search forces so the crippled craft could slip away. It said the unidentified submarines were nuclear-powered.

The submarine sensation first developed a week ago. The Argentine destroyer Cervantes and two patrol ships reported locating a submarine in the gulf but it got away.

More Argentine warships, including an aircraft carrier were rushed to the area.

Clement told newsmen that naval electronic devices had detected strange objects presumably submarines, several times lately. But

OAS Considers Look at Rights Of Dominicans

Washington, Feb. 8 (AP)—The Organization of American States today takes up the problem of whether to investigate alleged violations of human rights in the Dominican Republic.

The question will be put to the 21-nation OAS council at the request of Venezuela, a bitter foe of Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo. There were reports from Trujillo's country, meanwhile, that the strongman may soon return to the Dominican presidency as a show of strength.

Venezuela charged "flagrant violations of human rights by the government of the Dominican Republic" and said political prisoners there are being tortured.

The Dominican Republic is expected to respond to the Venezuelan charge with a counter-charge that human rights are being violated in Venezuela.

It also may challenge, along with other members, the right of the OAS to intervene in what it may claim are the internal affairs of the nation. The American Republics are pledged against such intervention.

The OAS has no mechanism for protecting human rights. An Inter-American Commission on Human Rights, ordered established in 1959, is still in the formative stage.

There was some speculation that the Inter-American peace committee—a 5-nation group for investigating tensions in the Caribbean—might be utilized.

But the committee, even with its special powers, could not send representatives to the Dominican Republic without the consent of the government there.

Observers in the Dominican capital reported, meanwhile, that Generalissimo Trujillo may soon again have title of president. Although he has retained his power, his younger brother, Herirot Trujillo, has been nominal president since 1951.

The reports are that he wants to regain the helm in name as well as in fact because of the recent discovery of a plot against his regime. The government claims the plotters planned to touch off about 200 bombs in Ciudad Trujillo. Dominican officials say 123 persons have been arrested in the plot and their cases are being tried.

U Nu's 'Cleans' Hold Big Lead In Burma Vote

Rangoon, Burma, Feb. 8 (AP)—Former Premier U Nu's supporters held a big lead today in the election to the National Assembly in Burma since it won independence from Britain in 1947, split two years ago. As a result of the factional feuding that followed, U Nu handed over the premiership 16 months ago to a houseleading military regime headed by Lt. Gen. Ne Win, the army commander.

Since both factions insisted on retaining the AFPFL title, the designation "Clean" and "Stable" were used in the election campaign. The Cleans claimed support of the masses, while the Stables were backed largely by businessmen and industrialists.

Loose Nut on Steering Wheel Nation's Biggest Highway Peril

Chicago, Feb. 8 (AP)—There'll be a lot of changes on the nation's highways 10 years from now, but a safety official says that loose nut on the steering wheel still will be causing accidents.

"The basic solution of the traffic problem is the driver himself," Paul Jones, spokesman for the National Safety Council, told International College of Dentists convention here.

"Poolproof highways, safer cars, electronic traffic enforcement devices are fine. But nothing will ever be devised that can keep a driver from having an accident if he himself doesn't try his level best not to have one."

Jones said the council estimates that the number of motor vehicles will have increased by half to 100 million by 1970. There will be 120 million drivers, and travel mileage will equal a trillion.

The tragic part of the projected statistical picture, he said, is that highway deaths will hit about 55,000 annually, unless great improvement in accident prevention is achieved.

The total of disabling injuries for 1970 is estimated at two million.

The 1959 traffic death toll was 37,800.

The indicated cost of accidents—\$9,000,000,000.

11 1/4 Ounce Baby Born Live, Dies

Des Moines, Feb. 8 (AP)—A 11 1/4 ounce baby claimed to be the smallest ever born alive died early this morning about 28 hours after his birth.

The child was born to Mr. and Mrs. Morris C. Vermuelen of Des Moines at 11:32 p.m. (CST) Saturday night. It died at 3:16 a.m. this morning.

The resident pediatrician at Still Osteopathic Hospital said the child started breathing about two minutes after birth and was well formed despite the fact he was three months premature.

Mrs. Vermuelen, mother of three other children, was reported doing well.

The American Medical Assn. listed a 12-ounce girl which died in Chicago 54 hours after its birth last year, and Miss Jacqueline Jensen, 22, of Palatine, Ill., who weighed 2 ounces at birth, as the previous smallest babies.

East Hartford, Feb. 8 (AP)—A bullet took the life of 17-year-old William Ramsey of Hartford while he was target shooting with two companions here last night.

Ramsey, a Bulkeley High School senior and president of the Connecticut Federation of Student Councils, was shot in the head as he examined a target in the cellar of the home of Robert Tomas, 18. Another youth was present.

The shooting was listed by police as an accident. They said Ramsey had just finished firing the .22 caliber revolver and handed it to Tomas.

Tomas was checking the cylinder, police said, apparently thinking all the shots had been fired. The weapon discharged and the bullet struck Ramsey.

Ramsey died later at Hartford Hospital.

U.S. Court To Get Plea 14th Time

Tucson, Ariz., Feb. 8 (AP)—Convict-author Caryl Chessman today was denied a stay of execution, scheduled Feb. 19 in the San Quentin Prison gas chamber.

Judge Richard Chambers, chief justice of the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, also refused to issue a certificate of probable cause for appeal.

This would have granted Chessman a hearing before the full court of appeals in an effort to reverse U.S. District Judge Louis E. Goodman's refusal to grant a writ of habeas corpus.

Chessman now is expected to appeal again to the U.S. Supreme Court, which has considered the case 13 times.

Should this effort fail, an appeal for clemency probably will be made to California Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

Chessman was sentenced to death in 1948 on charges of kidnapping, robbery and perverted sexual assaults against two young women. He has been in Death Row for nearly 12 years and has escaped seven earlier execution dates through various legal moves.

Atty. George T. Davis based the application for appeal on three main grounds:

1. An act of God brought about when the court reporter at the original trial died before completing transcribing his notes, and denied Chessman equal rights and protection.
2. Chessman had been subjected to cruel and unusual punishment by being kept on Death Row so long.
3. Section 209 of the California law under which Chessman was sentenced to death has been changed.

Judge Chambers heard Chessman's latest application for a stay of execution in Tucson Friday.

A. L. Wirin, counsel for the American Civil Liberties Union, said an immediate appeal for a stay of execution will be made to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"We have not yet decided whether we will appeal to the entire court or to a single justice," he said.

Washington, Feb. 8 (AP)—Five contest judges have accused the Metropolitan Opera of using them as "stooges" in a competition aimed at finding new talent for the opera company.

An official of the Metropolitan did not allow them free choice but dictated the winner, the judges said.

This was denied yesterday by the official, assistant manager John Gutman.

The results were arrived at by majority vote, which I thought was the good old-fashioned democratic process," he said. But he added that the rules did permit him to have final say.

The contest was the Middle Atlantic Auditions here Saturday as part of the opera's annual talent search. The winner, Miss LaVerne Monette of Baltimore, earned the right to participate in the national auditions and their chance for a try-out at the Met.

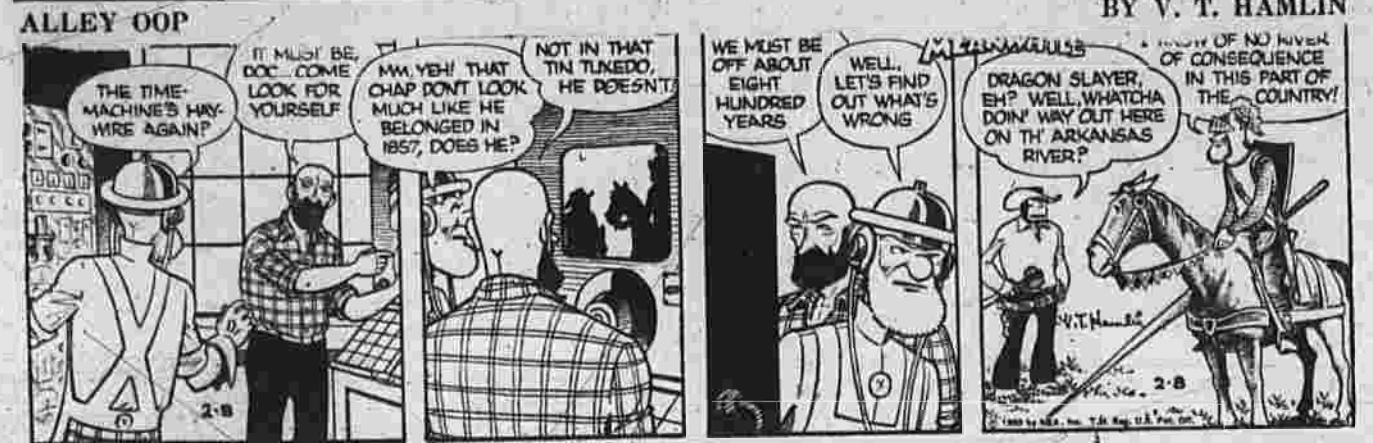

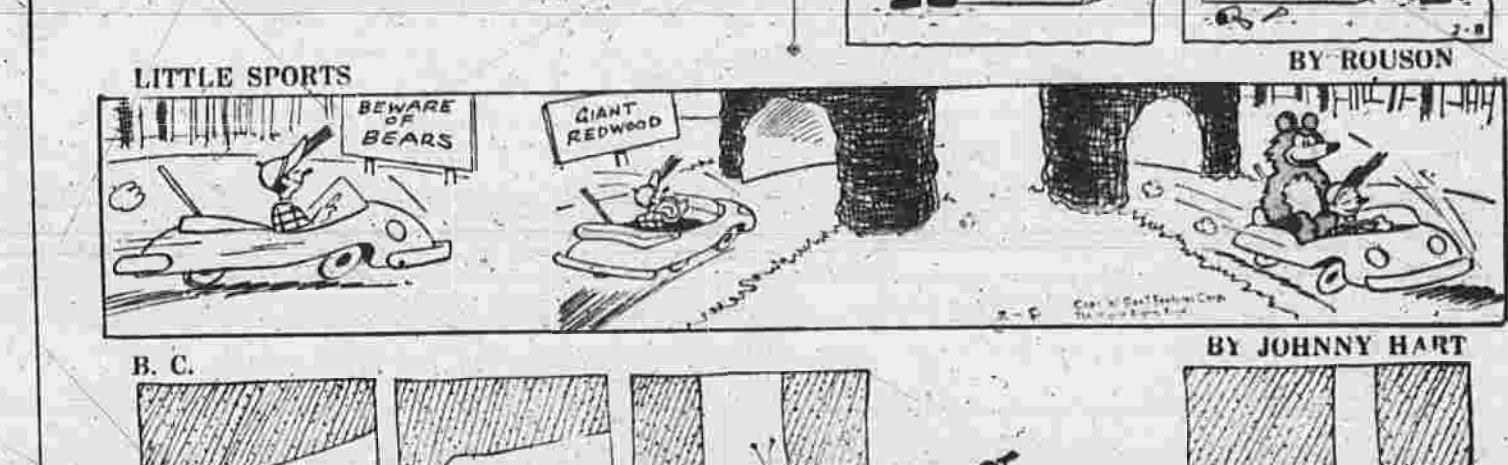
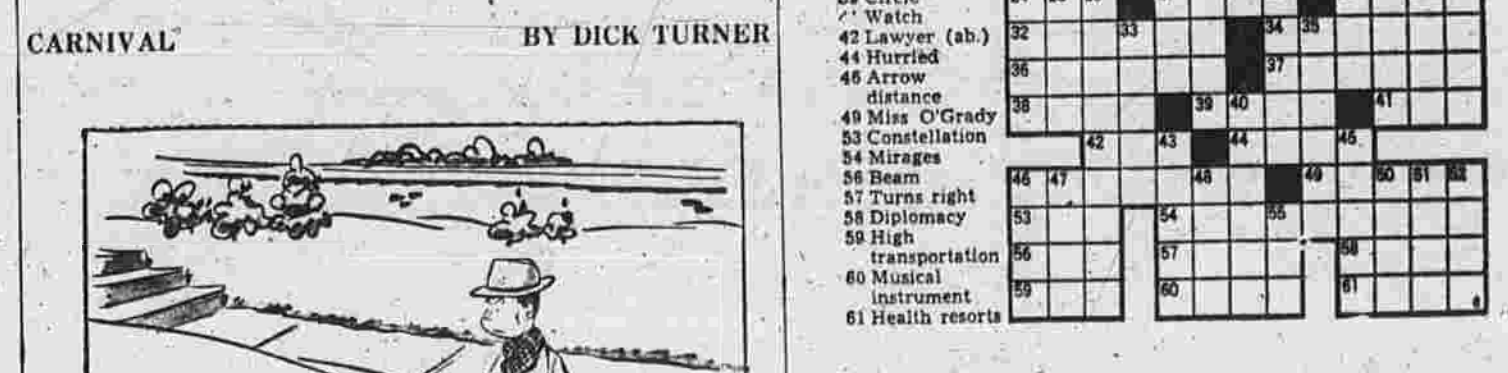
