Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Feb. 10 (P)-Alojzije Cardinal Stepnac, a symbol of the Roman Catholic Church's resistance to mmunism, died today in Krasic, the home town to which he was confined by President Tito's Red regime. He was 61. Long ailing, Cardinal Stepinac was stricken with a cold this week. His personal physician, Dr. Branislay Bogicevic, said yesterday his condition was not serious, but precautions were necessary because of his age and previous ill

Church sources said the Cardinal, spiritual leader of Yugo-slavia's seven million Roman Catholics, contracted the cold because he insisted on praying more than four hours daily in Krasic's unheated little parish church. Cardinal Stepinac had been confined to Krasic since his re-

lease in 1951 after serving five years of a 16-year prison term imposed by a Communist court. He was convicted on a charge of collaborating with Nazi Germany in World War II. His death came at 1:30 p.m.

Motorboats Peril Whooping Cranes By J'SE WING New York, Feb. 10 (P)- The moorboat boom may be the latest threat to the existence of the whooping crane. Only 33 of the big white birds made it back this winter from the Canadian wilds to the Aransas refuge on the coast of Texas: Not only was this a drop of one from last year, but the number included only two youngsters, compared with a record crop of nine fledglings a year ago. On the fledgling rop, the ultimate fate of the spe cies depends. In the 70-square mile Aransas preserve, the birds are finding things different Last year for the them so much that they gave up their age old habit of staking out family territories and defending them against all comers. Instead they banded in flocks. Whether this change in habit will affect their courtship and sur vival pattern is something now worrying the experts. As it is they are vulnerable to any natural disaster, even though the hunters have been very cooperative.
