

More Convicts Link Additional Police to Chicago Burglaries

Chicago, Feb. 22 (AP)—More talking burglars have joined the scandal-scared Chicago Police Department anew with fresh charges that more than 20 policemen were involved with a gang specializing in swank Gold Coast robberies.

Acting Commissioner Kyran Phelan said last night that evidence found by Irwin Cohen, head of the mayor's investigation office and Lt. John Neurauter, head of the police's hit squad, linked the policemen—hitherto untouched by the burgeoning scandal—to the ring.

Phelan said the investigation indicated that the newly-involved officers allegedly accepted bribes—at least one of them of \$1,000—to protect members of the gang.

Those newly-involved, said Phelan, were attached to the Summerdale District, scene of the early scandal, and questioned four convicted burglars. He identified the prisoners as Harry Mefford, 34, Richard Aloia, 31, Richard Kelley, 25 and Casimir Boniakowski, 31. They are serving terms ranging from one to 6 to 10 years after pleading guilty last November to burglarizing a department store.

Err on Safety Side In Defense: Kennedy

New York, Feb. 22 (AP)—Too much defense is a less dangerous mistake than too little, says Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.).

Kennedy, campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination, said yesterday he favors a "greater effort than this administration seems willing to undertake" in defense.

The United States should "err on the side of safety," he said, in setting up its defenses against the Communist threat.

Men with the same information as President Eisenhower, said Kennedy, "are extremely difficult to make a correct assessment with precision as to what a dictatorship is doing."

He later attacked the administration again during a talk before college editors at the Overseas Press Club. He said he would have gone "further than this administration in the field of limiting nuclear testing."

Sure Bet in Election Year Minimum Wage Boost To \$1.25 Hour Urged

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—It seems a fairly sure bet now that Congress will vote an election year boost in the dollar-an-hour federal minimum wage.

The main question is how much. The proposal in Congress range up to \$1.25. That level would mean a pay raise to over 3½ million workers earn less.

The Eisenhower administration has just withdrawn earlier objections that an increase would be inflationary. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell said last May an increase would cause widespread unemployment in low-wage industries.

Mitchell has just advised Congress, however, that a new study shows a "modest" increase is feasible and could be absorbed without resulting in more unemployment. Apparently, too, he doesn't feel an increase would cause price increases, as he cautioned last May.

With Democratic leaders of Congress charting action on minimum wage legislation, the administration go-ahead means an increase of some amount is definitely in the cards.

Brinkley's assistant, Howard Crockett, said arson was suspected, and that a round-the-clock guard has been posted on the grounds.

The State Fire Marshal's office said it was investigating the possibility of arson.

Latin America Sees Increase In U.S. Interest

By MORRIS W. ROSENBERG—Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Feb. 22 (AP)—Latin Americans expect the United States to show more active concern for their problems following President Eisenhower's visit to Brazil, Argentina, Chile and Uruguay.

Brazilian President Juscelino Kubitschek as recently as last November said "the United States gives evidence of lessening interest in Brazil and South America generally."

"We cannot hide our worry when we observe that in the United States there is a lack of understanding for the justified ambition of our people to accelerate the speed of development to recover great distances lost."

Kubitschek will be the first South American leader to play host to Eisenhower, who is arriving in the nation's future capital, Brasilia, on Tuesday.

Venezuela's President Romulo Betancourt, whose country is not on Eisenhower's itinerary, observed last week that the U.S. leader would find that Latin-American countries have social development problems "just as acute as European, Asian and African countries to which the United States has been dedicating its attention almost exclusively for the past 10 years."

The independent Rio de Janeiro newspaper Jornal do Brasil commented in an editorial yesterday that Brazilians will welcome Eisenhower with affection and happiness. But it added, "North Americans shouldn't think these demonstrations misled the public on U.S. defensive strength."

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—The United States has forged an indestructible force as an anchor of free world security, President Eisenhower has told the American people.

The defensive might is ample for today and tomorrow is developing to meet the needs of tomorrow, Eisenhower said last night in a nationwide radio-TV address on the eve of his departure for a 15,000-mile Latin American goodwill tour.

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Bands Ask Liberty or Join Union

San Juan, Puerto Rico, Feb. 22 (AP)—En route to South America, President Eisenhower paused in Puerto Rico today and told the islanders they provide a lesson to aspiring peoples of the world.

"As he arrived from Washington, one band of demonstrators at the airport was clamoring for complete independence for this Commonwealth while another carried banners calling for statehood. But Eisenhower did not see them."

"We are happy that Puerto Rico is a proud, free, self-governing Commonwealth, joined to the United States by her own choice," the President said. "Puerto Rico is truly unique."

"To other people now struggling to realize their aspirations and ambitions, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico has demonstrated that courage, persistence and faith in one's fellow men and a God-given destiny can open up ways through barriers and obstacles that might appear to be insurmountable."

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—The semi-federal newspaper Revolution charged today a plane from the United States raided a Havana suburb Sunday. It repeated demands that Washington take action.

An army communiqué said only that a twin-engine bomber of World War II vintage flew north after raiding the suburb where Prime Minister Castro has a villa. Eyewitnesses said the apparent target, however, were the Shell and Esso Refineries. Windows of one refinery were broken by bomb blasts, the communiqué said.

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—The body of a nun, who vanished yesterday from a home for aged and sick sisters, was found today in the Quinebaug River here. Searchers recovered the body of Sister Marie, 71, who disappeared from Villa St. Joseph. The directress of the home, Sister Rose, said the Sister had been a patient here since 1951, and that she was "sick and senile."

San Jose, Costa Rica, Feb. 22 (AP)—The Costa Rican government announced today the capture of a band of 25 Nicaraguan rebels. Members of the band, headed by Indalecio Pastor, are seeking asylum in El Salvador. They were picked up Saturday near the Rio Mechas close to the Nicaraguan border. Costa Rican previously cracked down on other Nicaraguan rebel bands operating in the country. President Mario Echandi has repeatedly stated he will not permit violations of Costa Rican neutrality.

Washington, Feb. 22 (AP)—The organ of Castro's revolutionary movement said bombings "must be terminated at all costs" and more action is required than "statements from the North American Department of State and its spokesmen, Lincoln White."

Castro was not at his villa in Havana last week, prompted by the Thursday incident at Espana Sugar Mill and subsequent actions and declarations (A. U. S. Apology) a new bombing raid from the United States would occur.

Nehru touched off the storm by accusing critics in the Praja (People's) Socialist Party of opposing any settlement between India and China. The Prime Minister denied again that he had reversed his position by inviting Chinese Premier Chou En-lai to New Delhi to discuss the border dispute.

"I am surprised no representatives of Asian and African nations have been invited to the summit. I am very surprised, indeed, that only four big nations will participate in these peace talks."

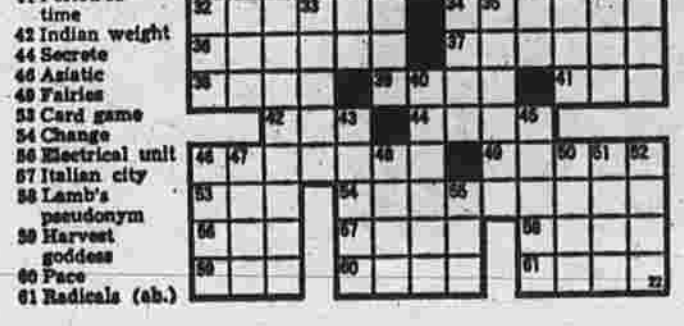

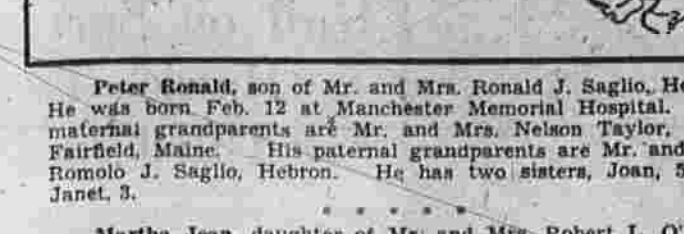

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Jobless Claims Drop 2nd Week

Unemployment compensation claims dropped for the second straight week in Manchester, from 1,294 to 1,196 in the week ended Feb. 15.

The drop was part of a State-wide decline which has been noted by State Labor Department officials for the past six weeks. Reasons given for the decline in unemployment in some manufacturing industries were given as reasons for the decline by State Labor Commissioner Renato M. Ricciuti.

Manchester claims represented 7.8 per cent decline from the week before and a more than 30 per cent decline from the corresponding week in 1959. In that week, total claims numbered 1,760.

Weekly benefit payments in Connecticut during the week ended Feb. 15 totaled \$1,192,400 as compensation for 33,230 weeks of unemployment. In the comparable week of 1959 payments totaled \$1,547,119 covering 44,652 weeks of unemployment.

Manchester statistics show 136 new claims during the week ended Feb. 15. The remainder, 1,057, being continued from the previous week.

In the State, Hartford edged Bridgeport as the city with the greatest number of claims.

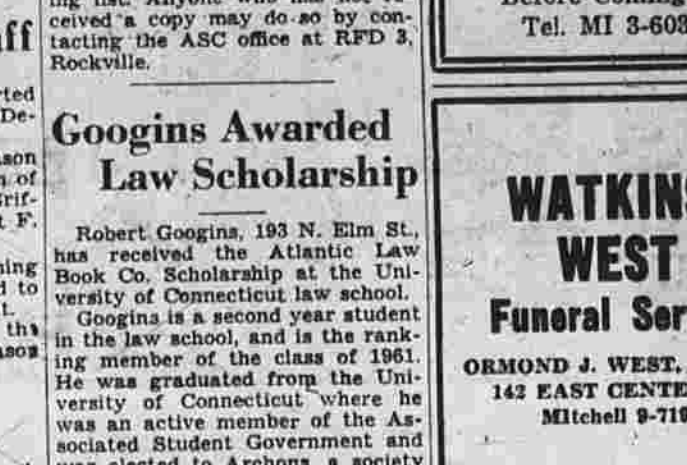
