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### Rockville-Vernon District Scraps Plan For New Firehouse

Architect's plans for a fire-district of only \$500. The men consulted last night when more are contributed materials, he said. Three members of the building committee resigned immediately after the meeting. Chairman Howard Huelmann submitted a written resignation stating reasons of health. Huelmann, who was hospitalized briefly last week, said he had planned to resign regardless of how the vote went. Committee Chairman Donald Lovrin said the commissioners will fill the vacancies on the committee, but noted that the committee has no money to pay which to work. He doubted that a district meeting to provide an appropriation would be called before the annual meeting in July.

Only about half a dozen persons attended the firehouse after more than 30 minutes of debate. The building committee was criticized for working with only one architect and for limiting the cost to the \$40,000 maximum the voters expected to spend. Huelmann explained that the cost over the interior of the building was designed to meet the needs of the firemen of Co. 1, which would occupy the new structure. He said the exterior could be changed but the committee did not want to build a "cave" in the center of town.

Frank B. Cornell, of Baker Road, Vernon, said the committee should have found out what he, as a taxpayer, wanted in regard to the firehouse. He questioned whether the \$50 grand asked for the building would give the district better fire protection or just a building and spoke strongly in opposition. Architect William Milne, a Vernon resident, was chosen to design the building after the committee asked his advice in early planning and found, we got along with him," Kingsbury explained.

A complaint was registered by Clement Watson, a builder, who said local contractors were "the most intimidated" from bidding on the firehouse "because of a wage scale spelling out union rates." Disaffection with the building design was expressed by the Co. 1 fireman who said "We didn't exactly agree that this was what we wanted." He said the firemen had looked at other firehouses in nearby towns and found one in Essex field that he thought could be built here for \$2,000.

John Otender also disagreed with Huelmann's claim that the interior of the building was designed to suit the firemen. "Room for tremendous improvement" was found in the design by Andrew P. Tricario, town fireman. Tricario said, "I don't feel the people of the Fire District can afford the subsidies architectural design." A volunteer fireman, Tricario said the district should consider its need for fire equipment, especially tankers, and not spend so much on a building. On other points, Herter told his news conference:

1. The minute relations seem to be improving a little between the United States and Cuba, the government of Premier Fidel Castro seems to go out of its way to make them more difficult again.

2. The U.S. government has decided that Soviet Premier Khrushchev has not yet actually broken his agreement with President Eisenhower at Camp David to join a negotiation on the future of West Berlin without imposing a time limit.

3. This agreement, which is the way for the summit conference to talk about signing a separate peace treaty that would give East Germany sovereignty over West Berlin and its lifelines still falls short of a total East-West economic bloc.

4. Diplomats of 10 Arab countries had what Herter called a perfect right to object to the current treaty in the United Nations. Herter said he had asked whether a complaint might be made to the United Nations, but that Arab envoys recently registered with the State Department, not very strange.

More than one-third of 4,000 high-seniority workers laid off when Packard Motor Co. closed its doors in Detroit in June 1959, are now finding another job.

In general, the skilled workers laid off were more difficult to retrain than did the unskilled and semiskilled. But the percentage of the skilled workers who were retrained was not much higher than the percentage of unskilled workers who were retrained.

The authors point out that during the recession there were more unskilled jobs available than during the boom years. It might require a skilled worker to be retrained for a job.

The interviewees asked the employers what they were doing to help them find work. About one-fourth mentioned unions. About one-third mentioned training. About one-fourth mentioned other help.

What are the authors' recommendations for the problem?

Providing extended compensation for older workers with prolonged unemployment benefits.

Encouraging special retraining and counseling for older workers.

Broadening priority provisions to provide more chances for transfers by workers affected by relocation of factories and offices.

Providing financial assistance in developing a termination pay system.

Outlawing employment discrimination based on age.

What did you spend for medical care last year?

# Children Often Don't Shed Fat

London—The idea that children's "baby fat" soon melts away is not supported by facts, British nutrition investigators have found. They checked the histories of 100 overweight hospital patients and discovered that 75 per cent had been fat as children. Thirty-three per cent were now severely overweight.

The researchers found also that not one of the persons who had been fat as children would lose enough weight in a four-month test period to get within 20 per cent of the normal weight for his or her age. On the other hand, 14 per cent of those who had become fat only as adults made significant weight reductions in the trial period.
