Firing Squad Executes Killer Who Sought Bullet-Proof Vest

Point of the Mountain, Utah, March 30 (AP)—A sad-eyed little killer whose last request was for a bullet-proof vest, was shot by a firing squad in the windy gray dawn today.

Five anonymous riflemen fired at 6:16 a.m. and 49-year-old James W. Rogers slumped dying in a wooden captain's chair. He was executed for the 1957 shooting in a southeastern Utah mining camp.



Aide to Castro Denies Rigging Plane Incident

Schergales said in his statement he returned to Florida and enlisted Rindquist, a former U.S. Air Force pilot, for the flight. Rindquist apparently was unaware the trip was rigged.

Schergales is still being held at the headquarters of the government's military investigation department here. But he seems to enjoy special privileges, such as an airplane on the roof of the headquarters.

Rindquist, shot in the foot when he attempted to flee from the plane, is recovering at Matanzas Military Hospital.

It had been expected that the two fliers would be tried by a Cuban military court, but press criticism of the flight subsided after the fliers were taken to the United States. A diplomatic source reported meanwhile that Castro's latest target, anti-Communist TV and radio commentator Luis Conte Azabou, has taken refuge in the Argentine Embassy.

He had been rumored seeking political asylum since the prima Cuba again.

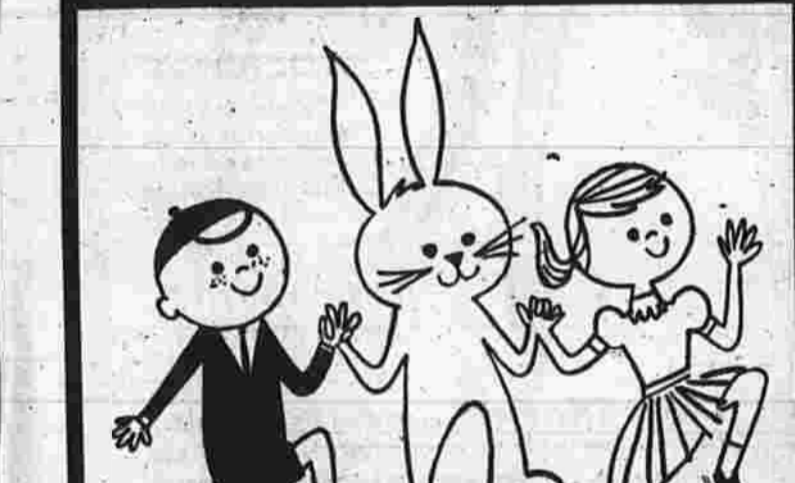

The United States regrets profoundly the loss of life in South Africa, Lodge said.

He said the United States supports the issue itself "with no false pride" in its own record on racial matters.

Sobolev declared the U.N. General Assembly had approached respectfully to the South African government to do its part in ending racial segregation policies.

Foreign Secretary Eric Louw told the South African Parliament yesterday the U.N. has no authority to deal with the issue.

A South African delegate said cryptically that whether Fourie stayed in the council chamber after his opening statement would depend on several factors. South Africa has boycotted previous U.N. assembly discussions of its apartheid (racial segregation) policy.

Industrialists Check On Radioisotope Use

New Haven, March 30 (AP)—An official of the Atomic Energy Commission today predicted that increased use of radioisotopes will bring more rapid technical and industrial progress.

E. Eugene Fowler, deputy director of the AEC's Office of Isotope Development, told a conference here that radioisotopes are "the breadwinner of atomic energy."

He said they were the foremost peaceful, civilian application of atomic energy and that their enormous potential, particularly in industry, has not yet been realized.

Fowler was one of several speakers to address a "Connecticut radioisotope workshop" at Yale University.

Greater use of radioisotopes, Fowler said, will result in increased production and profits for industry, safer work for labor, better products for the public and to participate in conferences.

He said a recent survey of 928 taxpayers found that the average savings through the use of radioisotopes was \$100,000 each.

Of 5,441 licenses issued by the AEC for use of radioisotopes, Fowler said, industry has 1,631.

Settle Down on Farm? Skip It, Slickers Told

By BILL HAWLINS
Knowville, Tenn., March 30 (AP)—Like a lot of us city slickers, you've probably banked for a long time to settle down on a farm and live the quiet life.

But speakers at a week-long conference on farm credit indicate that it's anything but quiet, and their statistics indicate it's anything but simple.

Farmers like some of the rest of us are up to their ears in debt—and if they're not, they just can't keep up with the agricultural Joneses.

The problem, as outlined by various speakers, is that farming is now a big business, and it has to be financed like big business.

But if you still have your heart set on owning a farm, there's this word from Howard G. Cossin, an associate managing director of the Farm Foundation.

There are three types of farm that we aren't going to find even by 1975—the additional product that increased efficiency in southern agriculture will bring us.

To make his point, Martin said, "Let us commence with some elementary considerations of capital."

Then, he said, "We take as the production function Y equals F(X), X, Z, X, . . . X."

This is a formula to show that farm income is related to productivity times the investment.

Remember what we said about it not being simple?

Other speakers made this point: It takes an investment ranging from \$50,000 to \$1 million to operate a farm returning an annual income of about \$5,000—more than \$500 below the median earnings of semi-skilled workers in industry.

After hearing that, agricultural economist R. O. P. Spittle of the University of Tennessee sort of threw up his hands about the business of owning a farm.
