State News Roundup

New Britain, April 13 (AP)—Democrat Julius J. Krenn, who never ran for election before, was New Britain's new mayor.

The 40-year-old Democrat yesterday defeated Republican Thomas J. Mehill by a 121-vote margin, 15,094 to 14,873.

Mehill, Republican leader, said he was considering the possibility of a demand for a recount. They planned to make a decision soon, probably today.

The voters also elected nine Democrats and five Republicans to the board of aldermen and re-elected the city clerk and treasurer.

Unofficial returns gave 270 votes each to Democrat William F. McCabe and Republican Edward J. Scott, who sought the Seventh Ward seat.

A ruling on a possible runoff was expected Friday.

City Clerk Harry E. Schuff and City Treasurer Charles E. Shattuck, veterans of 28 and 40 years in their offices respectively, turned down bids by Democratic opponents. It was the first time in 12 years that the city clerk and treasurer had to defend their offices.

Schoff defeated Vincent L. Perkowski, 16,400 to 13,400, while Sheldon defeated Joseph L. Perkowski, 16,400 to 13,400.

A multi-million-dollar redevelopment project for East 1st St. in Hartford was approved by the city council.

The mayor-elect, who was the Democratic nomination by defeating present mayor Joseph P. Morone, said a party primary, Krenn's 23-year-old opponent, was not running for office without a battle. Mehill, like Krenn, had not run for office before.

In 1958, Morone, who is winding up his second term, defeated Edward R. Scott, Republican, by a 10,000-vote margin.

Welfare Costs Up, Case Load Same

Welfare costs in Manchester were more than 26 per cent higher last month than in March 1959, although the number of cases remained unchanged, a Welfare Department report shows.

Last month's expense was \$4,027.11 as compared with \$3,188.77 for the corresponding month last year. In both months, there were 38 cases.

The chief increase was in the cost of caring for patients in convalescent homes—\$845.86 for five patients last month and \$210.50 for one patient in March 1959. Hospitalization costs jumped from \$181.65 for one patient to \$424.90 for three.

going to fall in" related the youngster, whose mother clutched him in her arms until the twister passed on.

Sunnyside residents emerged to find the farming community shattered. The twister storm leveled their church steeple, grain elevators, cotton gin and four or five homes. All the half dozen other houses lost their roofs.

Dead and injured were strewn amid rubble piled up to five feet high in an area 100 feet square.

Since the tornado swept in, past several farm homes, it was considered possible still other dead might be found today.

Turning on to the northeast, the twister jumped over the city of Amantillo, about 10 miles distant, and also menaced Berger, Wrentham and Shattuck in the Panhandle oil fields, the weather bureau at Amantillo reported.

Another tornado dipped into the edge of the town of Friona, about 30 miles northwest of Sunnyside, and a third bounced through a farm near Bluehouse, about 30 miles southwest of the shattered village.

The Friona twister rolled a 50-foot house trailer 200 feet, trapping Mrs. Marie Carroll, a public school nurse, in the wreckage. She suffered a severe back injury. Her husband, Tom, and her brother, Jack Davidson of Danville, Ill., were thrown clear and suffered minor hurts.

At Friona heavy rain sent water gushing through the streets up to 1 1/2 feet deep for a time. Half the size of years ago, the rain poured from clouds around Sunday, denting cars and breaking windows.
