He opened with his own... discussion of whether or not religion is going to be an issue in this campaign

"The answer to that question is that religion will be an issue in this campaign... as long as there are people who believe in God"

"Why have we been forced to behave so boldly and honestly in Korea, criticizing our own ally, more or less supporting an internal revolution against him, and refusing him the aid which might have enabled him to weather his personal crisis?"

"The answer is that we could not take, in the particular location of South Korea, the chances we still take with authoritarian regimes and other supposed 'stables of democracy and freedom. We could not take, in this location, the chance that Communism might come to seem to be the only workable alternative to an aid man's dictatorship. Of all the supposed above cases of democracy, that South Korea was won at greatest cost, and has the greatest consequences involved in its success or failure. President Eisenhower's South American thesis, that we have no use for dictatorships and that we have taken the risks of deep direct involvement, has become, in this instance, something more than a pleasant sentiment"

"Accordingly, we have taken the risks of deep direct involvement. Let us hope the extent of this can be limited, speedily, by the development of order and political responsibility on the part of the South Koreans themselves"

Charter Unit Drops Works Director Idea
A proposal to create a Manchester director of public works other than the general manager has, in effect, been disapproved by the Charter Revision Commission. Work Hours Study
Hartford, April 27 (AP) — The Legislature's Labor Committee has decided to press its study into "hours work" in mercantile establishments.

The move was taken by the committee meeting Tuesday afternoon at the State Capitol, after several legislators complained of some stores forcing their employees to work on legal holidays.

"I would like to see how employees feel about being required to work on holidays," declared Rep. T. V. Marsters, Litchfield Republican.

Rep. Joseph M. Rouke, New Haven Democrat, and an AFL-CIO official, said he was concerned about the unscrupulous business man, "knowing other competitors will be closed on holidays, running 'loss leaders' to attract customers on such days."

He said such practice takes "unfair advantage" of other stores.

Trucker Rescued
Greenwich, April 27 (AP) — A truck driver was trapped in the crushed cab of his vehicle when he crashed into the rear of a stalled tractor-trailer on the Connecticut Turnpike.

The injured driver was Jerome Wilson, 47, of 2 Milford St., Boston, Mass.

Police said Wilson was traveling west on the turnpike when his truck smashed into the rear of a truck that had stalled on the parkway.

The driver of the stalled truck had placed flares on the road and was awaiting a mechanic when the crash occurred.

The second driver was John T. Leonard, 43, of 205 English St., New Haven.

Leonard was sitting in the cab of his truck at the time, but was not injured.

Wilson was hauling leaders in a truck owned by the Griffith Lumber Mfg. Co. Leonard was carrying tires in a vehicle owned by Tomlinson Bros. of New Haven and Long Island City.

Judge Stands Aside In Suit to Remove Hoffa of Teamsters

Hoffa's proposal that William Buftalino, Detroit attorney and Teamster official, become one of the Teamsters monitors.

In this connection, Judge Letts had his clerk read a letter from Sidney, saying these charges are "untrue."

"You, of course," Sidney wrote in his letter to Letts, "know that you did not say these things to Hoffa...it is unfair to you. It is totally incorrect."

Hoffa's removal is sought by court-appointed monitors who alleged he missed some \$400,000 of union funds in promoting various personal business projects, including a Florida real estate development as a retirement village for union members. Hoffa has denied any wrongdoing.

Pending also is a decision from the U.S. Court of Appeals on Hoffa's plea that it stop Judge Letts from proceeding with the case.

Behind the court stand is a 2 1/2-year litigation that arose from charges that Hoffa rigged his own election as Teamsters president in the fall of 1957 when Dave Beck, center of widespread corruption charges, stepped out of the union helm.

The rigging charges were committed on a basis that let Hoffa take over as Beck's successor but with a 3-man board of monitors named by Judge Letts to supervise a Teamsters reform drive.

The monitors have charged Hoffa with trying to block the cleanup, something he vigorously denies.

Hoffa, a 58-year-old, especially stringent responsibilities for safeguarding union funds under the monitor arrangement, and it is on this basis his removal from office is now being sought.

Hoffa, who started working life as a boy bottling produce in Detroit, warehouses, obviously was worried at a news conference yesterday about his legal predicament. He said threats to remove him and put the union under a court receivership have caused great unrest among the union's 1,600,000 members.

Hoffa said Teamsters in one city that he declined to name will vote tonight on an strike. He said this situation was caused by employees who refused to make any reasonable contract offer to the union, feeling Hoffa will be ousted, and they could deal later on with court-appointed receivers.

Hoffa also said the Teamsters are importing 200 trial observers to Washington from all over the country. He said the union membership couldn't rely on newspaper, radio or television news accounts for "the true facts."

In Hoffa's view the proceedings against him are a grand conspiracy to throw him out of office and wreck the union, an organization which he said has over \$600 million in assets and thousands of labor contracts.

"It isn't a question of corruption," Hoffa told newsmen. "It's a question of controlling this union."

The Senate Labor Relations Investigation Committee, which concentrated several years of hearings on the Teamsters and Hoffa, has called the Teamsters boss a national menace and the protector of hoodlums. The Teamsters were expelled from the AFL-CIO in 1957 on grounds the union was corruptly dominated.

Coventry
Change in Lot Sizes Sparks Controversy

The Coventry Planning and Zoning Commission has sparked a controversy over changing 2-acre lot size requirements to 1-acre lot sizes.

Opposition to the change is being organized by a bi-partisan group of townpeople, one of whom favors appealing the decision to the Court of Common Pleas.

The 1952 Monday night vote to eliminate any reference to RT-50 zones, in these zones, predominantly in the north end of town, building lot sizes were set at 2-acre, or 80,000 square feet, minimum when the regulations were adopted several years ago.

The change now sets the minimum to 1-acre lots or 40,000 square feet.

Opposition to eliminating the RT-50 zones first developed at a public hearing March 18 when 20 residents went on record being against the reduction. Six residents, mostly large property owners and builders, spoke for the change.

The vote at Monday night's meeting went this way: Favoring the change, Chairman Nathan Miller, Laurier P. DeMara, and Ernest Truman, all Republicans, against it, John Wilkowski, a Democrat.

The other minority Democrat on the commission, Albert J. Stevenson, was not present.

In announcing its decision, the commission stated these reasons for favoring the change: The Board of Selectmen is recommending the adoption by a State Building Code, a careful analysis of the opinions of the townpeople at the public hearing; and a letter signed by 94 residents received by the commission recommending the change.

A letter was circulated, starting last Friday, and was presented to the commission Monday night before its meeting.

One of the circulators, J. Sylvester Plouffe, a builder, said 90 per cent of the letters he approached favored the change. He said several other citizens helped circulate the letter for signatures.

Trustees Court Action

Loyvin, Democratic Assistant House majority leader in the Legislature, was the first to speak in support of the change.

He said he challenged DeMara's right to sit on the commission at the executive session Monday night, since DeMara is a builder.

If he challenges his right and authority in view of the overwhelming opposition at the public hearing, it is amazing that the change was approved," Loyvin said. "This change will be appealed to the Court of Common Pleas," he asserted.

He said DeMara should have stepped aside and let one of the four alternate members sit in his place.

Using even stronger language, Loyvin said: "I feel we ought to call a town meeting and vote a motion of censure against this board." He also said the commission is "subordinating the public interest to the personal interest of builders and developers who would exploit the town for personal gain at the taxpayer's expense."

Sparks Boasters

The commission's decision has acted as a catalyst for a movement that has so far gained only limited support in Coventry. A group of residents has been meeting to discuss problems with the town, and since Monday, has rapidly grown into a near-formal organization to be known as the "Coventry Boasters Assn." Many of its new members belong to both political parties, some who have been outspoken opponents of each other.

Joseph Motyka, one of the members, urged residents interested in "well organized and future growth of the town" to join the boasters. "We don't want to make the same mistakes as in the past," he said. The group will probably meet again this week.

On the roster of the new boaster club already are State Rep. John Learned, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Douglas, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sherman, Fred Wilcox, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Rose, Mr. and Mrs. John MacQuinn, Mr. and Mrs. Dexter Wheelock, and Walter E. DeMara.

Statute Specifics

There is a question raised by one resident on whether or not all members had to be present at the executive session and vote, or whether a majority of the commission could act on the regulation change.

The State Statutes specifically say: "...such regulations or ordinances may, from time to time, be amended or changed or repealed by such zoning commission by a majority vote of the commission."

Although the commission is changing the regulations on lot sizes, it decided against permitting multiple dwellings in certain sections of town, and against changing home sizes.
