Cost of Living At New Peak

Washington, May 25 (AP)—Living costs rose four-tenths of one per cent in April to an other record high.

The rise was the largest for any month since last June. In reporting the increase today, the Labor Department said the index rose 0.4 per cent from 125.7 in March, the previous record.

The index rose just a half point, translated into the closest percentage terms the department figure was 0.4 per cent.

The change in an index and the percentage change are never precisely the same except when the movement of the index is from an even 100.

The department's consumer price index rose to 126.2 per cent of the 1947-49 base period, the highest since the war.

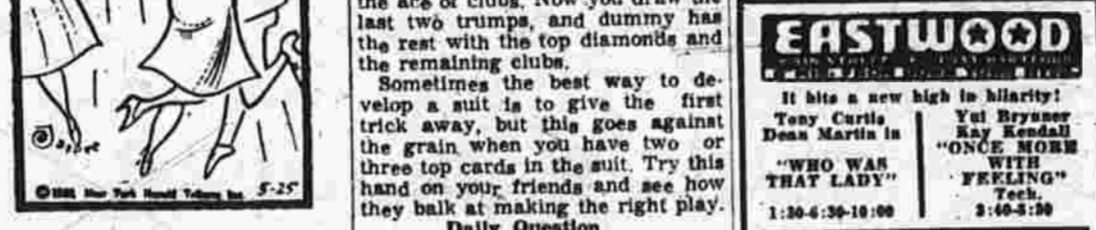

diplomatic assurance that the flight had been suspended and that it would not be resumed, but despite this the Soviet Union used the U2 to break up last week's East-West Four summit conference on the nations of the world had built up to much hope.

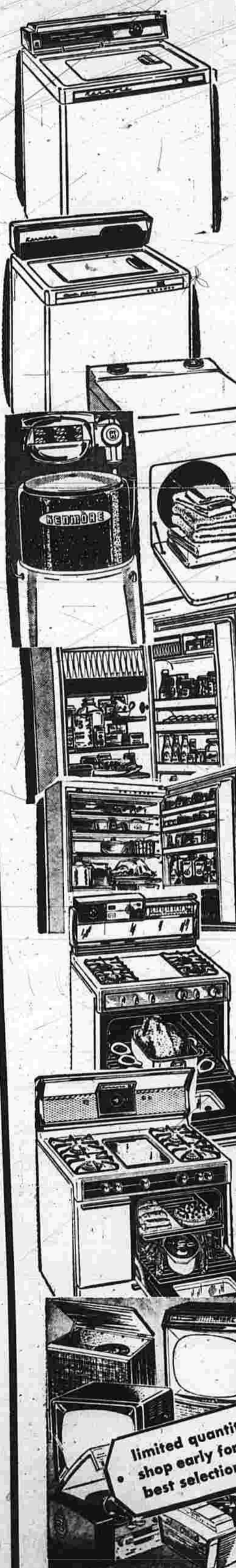

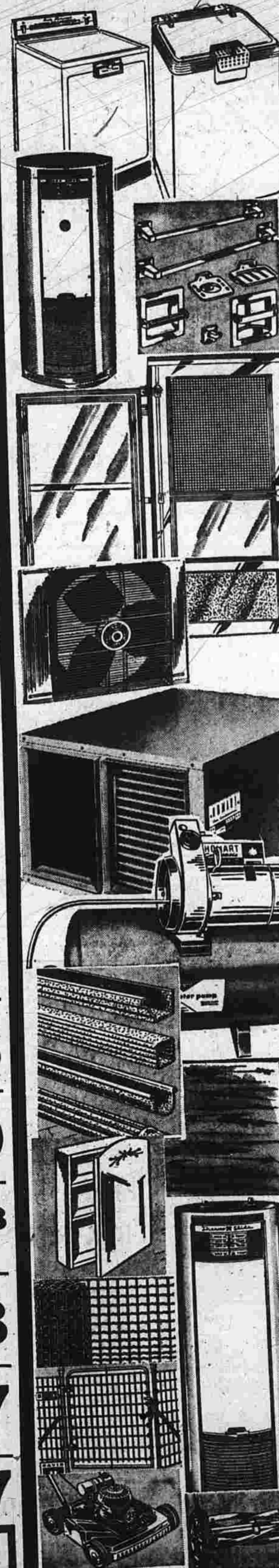

## Japs Opposing Ike's Visit Hit By U.S. Envoy

Tokyo, May 24 (AP)—U.S. Ambassador Douglas MacArthur II yesterday accused the Japanese Socialists of propagandizing against his visit to Japan beginning June 15.

MacArthur made the charge in a tense, one-hour verbal exchange with Socialist party chairman Inejiro Asanuma. The Socialist called on him to present an open letter to the President urging he call off his trip because of the current Japanese political crisis over the new U.S.-Japanese security treaty.

"The U.S. embassy in a statement said the ambassador told Asanuma the letter and the call were 'primarily for propaganda purposes.'"

He called Asanuma's action "unprecedented" but added it was not surprising because he seemed simply to have followed the example of Mr. Khrushchev.

MacArthur told Asanuma he hoped he would retract his past remarks that "American imperialism" was Japan's enemy but Asanuma refused, the embassy said.

Asanuma predicted they might be widespread disorder and agitation if the President visit Japan at this time. MacArthur replied that as a result of the 14 years here he felt an overwhelming majority of Japanese are friendly toward America.

Japanese news accounts, based on reports of Socialists present at the embassy meeting, said MacArthur at times pounded on the table.

Later, the Socialists held a press conference for foreign newsmen. They said they did not consider it right for Eisenhower to visit Japan until Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi resigns, the Diet (parliament) is dissolved and elections held for a new government.

The political crisis exploded last week when Kishi's Liberal-Democrats called police into parliament to dislodge Socialists blocking the House Speaker's office and jammed ratification of the U.S.-Japanese treaty through the lower house of parliament.

The pact has for months been the target of leftwing attacks because it would keep U.S. forces based here for the next 10 years at least. The Socialists and other opponents fear Japan would be attacked if U.S. forces based here were used elsewhere in a Far East war.

Demonstrations against the U.S.-Japan treaty continued for the fifth day since the lower house vote.

Some 800 professors from 17 universities and actors, writers, Buddhists and representatives of other cultural groups quietly paraded past the prime minister's office. They also marched to the parliament building and signed petitions opposing the treaty.

Several hundred Socialists and Communist party members, wearing red armbands identifying their respective parties, held separate rallies near the prime minister's office.

Kishi has made clear he does not intend to resign or dissolve parliament until the treaty comes into effect.

The pact becomes law June 19 even if the Upper House—in which the prime minister's Conservatives have a majority—fails to act on it.

A group of 800 Leftist students unannounced past the prime minister's office, chanting rhythmically, "Down with Kishi!" They did not attempt to force their way into the building.

L. Ellsworth Stoughton, a direct descendant of the Revolutionary War colonel, will unveil a plaque at the site.

Capt. Lemuel E. Stoughton, who is in charge of the battery, will accept the installation on behalf of the men who will man it.
