New Soviet Push Seen By Herter

Washington, May 27 (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter warned congress today that in the aftermath of the summit conference collapse the United States must be prepared to withstand aggressive pressures from Russia in Berlin and elsewhere.

Opening a full dress news conference to discuss the summit failure and the related spy flight row with Russia, Herter said the most important lesson of the Paris summit failure was "a fresh realization of the dangers we face" and the need for the Allies to close ranks.

At the same time he advocated a "calm and resolute" posture toward the Soviet Union. He urged the nation avoid "frustration and damaging recommitments" over what he called "a series of setbacks."

No Change In Alliance With West

ISTANBUL, Turkey, May 27 (AP)—Turkey's armed forces today took over control of the nation in a bloodless coup d'etat sparked by mounting public dissatisfaction with the strongman rule of Premier Adnan Menderes.

The military rebels promised to hold free elections and lift ban over the government to the winners.

The army move followed a month of unrest which began with student demonstrations against Menderes and his government's oppressive measures against the press and political opposition. The Republican People's party of former President Ismet Inonu.

The rebels were quick to assure the West that Menderes' approach meant no change in Turkey's staunch alliance with the West against Soviet communism.

Despite the word from Turkey that the coup was bloodless, a report to the British Foreign Office said the takeover was preceded by a period of unrest.

Lodge Hints Red Woes

United Nations N.Y., May 27 (AP)—Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge charged today the Soviet Union deliberately manufactured the current crisis over spy planes flight because of internal political difficulties.

The U.S. delegate told the U.N. Security Council Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko had distorted President Eisenhower's address to the nation Wednesday night in order to keep the crisis boiling.

Lodge spoke as the 11-nation council heard a vote—and a possible Soviet veto—on a small nation resolution calling for renewed East-West negotiations with the aid of the United Nations.

Lodge vigorously denied that Eisenhower had said the United States was prepared to continue a policy of espionage and sabotage. Gromyko had declared that the President had placed man-

ning on the brink of war by firing on the Soviet foreign minister. "That is what the Soviet foreign minister said about Dwight D. Eisenhower whose love of peace is a household word throughout the world," Lodge said. "Any honest reading of the President's speech shows that he said so nothing. One thing the United States has never engaged in is sabotage. Mr. Gromyko cannot cite one instance of sabotage by the United States."

Lodge asked why Gromyko continues to talk as though he regrets Eisenhower's declaration halting U-2 flights over Soviet territory.

"For some reason, emanating from the Kremlin and the Chinese Communists on matters of foreign policy," Gromyko took the floor later to press for a series of Soviet amendments to the small-nation resolution. Despite Leftist Protests Invitation to Ike Stands, Kishi Regime Tells U.S.

Tokyo, May 27 (AP)—Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's government today informed the United States that its invitation to President Eisenhower to visit next month still stands despite growing leftist demonstrations demanding that he be called off.

Kishi's cabinet met this morning at a meeting in which the United States and other left-wingers demanded that the U.S. Embassy Foreign Minister Akira Fujiyama told newsmen: "At the present time there is no intention here of asking for a delay or cancellation of the President's scheduled visit. To do so on grounds of security would be a mistake."

However, Fujiyama's use of the words "at the present time" was interpreted as an indication that the visit might be changed if the public opinion continued.

Eisenhower's visit has been linked with the new Japanese mutual defense treaty, which the Socialists and other left-wingers insist oppose, contending that it may open Japan to attack if the United States is involved.

Daily left-wing demonstrations began after Kishi's majority in the lower house of parliament ratified the pact last week. As the demonstrations have picked up, they have demanded cancellation of the Eisenhower visit as well as Kishi's resignation and the rejection of the treaty.

Yesterday about 100,000 Japanese demonstrated in Tokyo for the night, shouting fears for the safety of the President, and Emperor Hirohito when they rode through the city in an open car after Eisenhower's arrival June 28.

Tokyo newspapers today sharply attacked both Kishi and the Socialist opposition for dragging the President's visit into the controversy over the treaty. The papers were particularly harsh in their criticism of Socialist party leader Inagawa Asanuma, who on Tuesday called on U.S. Ambassador Douglas MacArthur II and demanded that the visit be called off.

Asanuma was denounced as a "country bumpkin," a mediator in diplomacy and discourteous to invited guests.

"The influential newspaper Asahi denounced the Socialist-backed government's petty plots, president Eisenhower's visit has now been made to look as if it is closely tied up politically with the new security treaty."
