**"The Way I Heard It"**

For some reason or other, it is a tradition that music critics should review ballet performances. Actually most of us know very little about the art, and while many music critics, and other, don't happen to know of any who could even qualify as experts in a ballet.

Still, most of us know a little about the subject, and that seems to be more than many of the audience do. I have noticed that on two occasions in recent years when I have attended a ballet in Manchester, the audience fell silent, as if they were in a church, and that is a very good sign. It is a sign that you should expect and know, properly to appreciate this form of entertainment.

Formalized instruction in ballet antedates formal instruction in music, in case you did not realize the fact. Louis XIV established the first school of ballet, and was himself a dancer. His appellation, "The Sun King," came from his performance of a role as Apollo the Sun God in a ballet. It was his interest in the dance that led him to have the basis of the art established as we know it today.

Since the first school was French, all the terminology re-

being danced. In this particular case, the ballerina enters, pauses for a moment, and then, "aparté," she says to the audience, "I see this is getting involved, so I am going to continue in another scene. Meanwhile, let's look at some recorded ballet music."

It may come as a surprise to you to find that this is a 3-record album. "Coppola" is a 3-act ballet with three complete changes of scenery in its original form, and to ballet in a recorded manner when performed this way.

Dellore's score is excellent; it represents the sort of music many people like, being neither profound nor trashy. The story of the "girl with the enamel eyes" is detailed on the jacket, and the performance, musically, is far better than you will ever hear from the P.O. orchestra. The choice of music is excellent, and the purely "classical" ballet is simply a vast pattern with little or no attempt at story telling, any more than there is such an attempt in a Bach fugue.

This apparently confuses the audience for ballet, just as it confuses the technique. The choice of steps and positions were long before laid down by the choreographer and the performers may have any variation in them.

If you see the "Pina de Deus" or dance for two, called the "Bluebird" dancers, you may be sure that any other couple will dance in it exactly the same manner, allowing for differences in technique. It consists of an adagio, two solo variations, and a coda, so do all "classical" dances for two performers. Within this larger form the various steps and positions are laid out the routine for the particular music.

There were about 3,200,000 registered voters. Incomplete unofficial returns gave Paz Estensoro 128,438; Guevara Arze 44,968; Gutierrez 138,438; Communist 4,238; Revolutionary Workers Party 87. The Communist ran candidates for Congress but no presidential candidate.

Outgoing President Hernan Siles Zúñiga succeeded Paz Estensoro as president when the latter was unable to make his way to the polls in election in 1956. Both are leaders of the MNR party, which has ruled since 1952.

The retiring president is expected to be offered a key cabinet post or an important diplomatic assignment. He will leave the country for a vacation in Europe.
