New York, June 16 (AP)—Ted Williams, having reached the last of his personal goals with home run No. 500, has made up his mind to close out his long, brilliant and turbulent career in the fall of 1960 season.

"This is no accident decision on Ted's part," said the tall, handsome Boston Red Sox slugger, who on August 31st next will celebrate his 34th birthday, began this season with the idea that this would be his last season.

Last night, after hitting his eighth home run of the season and 500th of his career, he was asked whether he had changed his thinking.

Hollywood (NEA)—Chester? The fastest gun in the West? Well, jittery is a better word for it, I guess.

Dennis Weaver laughed over what happened while telling me about coming to the crossroads of his career and maybe bowing out of "Gunsmoke" after six years and 350 performances.

That last draw, long before he became Chester, was on the day Dennis made his film debut in 1952 in a Western movie titled, "Horizons West." The script had Dennis drawing a pair of .45s and

shooting a knife out of the heavy's hand.

Film set procedure is for the director to call "Roll 'em" for the sound man and then, after a pause, to start the scene by crying: "Action."

"Well," Dennis laughed, "I was nervous and jittery. It was my first day on a set with a brand new contract. In my desire to please I was about as relaxed as a race horse in the starting chute.

"The director said 'roll 'em' but before he could say 'action' I went for the guns and fired, spoiling the scene before it even started.

The whole company laughed and I felt like a fool."

Today Dennis is jittery only about his future.

"I'm itching," he says. "He's itching to leave 'Gunsmoke,' willing the limp and the coffee brewing to someone else. He explains:

"An actor plays the same character for six years and he gets a mental block.

"My contract comes up for renewal in December. I suppose it's par for the course for a TV series actor to make noises like he wants out to get more money for a contract renewal.

"I'm not doing that. I'm serious about leaving the show because I feel that if I don't, I'll really be pigeonholed as the Chester type for the rest of my life."

"I'm not unhappy about the show or the money I've been getting. I'm just worried about my career.

"After six years I feel like stretching my creative muscles."

There is, of course, a big "if."

Says Dennis:

"If CBS offers me some fantastic contract—which I don't anticipate, incidentally—I suppose I'll have to accept it in fairness to what it will mean to my family's increased security.

"But as an actor who wants to mature, I hope it doesn't happen.
