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### South Windsor Pressures Mounting For More Park Land

Town officials and local citizens have become deeply disturbed and pressures are mounting for more park land in South Windsor.

Local citizens are concerned about the lack of public parks and playgrounds in the town. The Park and Recreation Committee, appointed to select areas able to accommodate the mushrooming population of the town, has searched for available sites which could be purchased.

One location now being considered, according to First Selectman Thomas L. Burgess, is Spring Pond Park on Pleasant Valley Rd. The 15-acre park did not open this year because of the illness of the owner, Mrs. E. H. Cowles of Pleasant Valley Rd.

The area featured a swimming pond which was drained this week, with water from Pombe Brook dammed by an embankment and spillway. The property also includes a ball field, pavilion with refreshment stand, joke box, and bath. The school fields are not big enough to accommodate the swarms of eager men and women, both young and older, who seek to participate.

Local constables and other officials are noting that the so-called juvenile delinquency problem is often merely a failure of adults to provide an adequate outlet for the expenditure of youthful energy.

Blocking the acquisition of public parks and recreational areas is present, according to town officials, in the limited borrowing capacity of South Windsor, which faces a tax rise next year largely caused by the inflationary cost of town government and erection of the new high school. The town population has more than doubled in the last 10 years, reg-

### Alcoholics Anonymous Marks 25th Birthday

(NOTE—For a quarter century Alcoholics Anonymous has helped persons in their battle with alcoholism. Here, as this remarkable organization celebrates a milestone, is a report on its methods and accomplishments since its founding.

An old proverb has it that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

Today there's a Gamblers Anonymous for the compulsive player, a Narcotics Anonymous for the addict, Youth Anonymous for the delinquent, even Potties Anonymous and Divorcees Anonymous.

All take their cue from the success of Alcoholics Anonymous—the nucleus of clubs that started with the idea that people who are in the same serious fix are best equipped to help one another.

The two men who founded A.A. were hopeless alcoholics. One a New York stock broker, the other an Akron, Ohio, surgeon. They found they could stay sober by helping each other. From this odd partnership grew the society, which now claims 300,000 members.

Perhaps 10,000 or more of these members—joined by wives, husbands and children—will gather at Long Beach, Calif., beginning July 1 in a 5-day commemorative of the society's 25th anniversary. That A.A. should have survived 25 years and grown so spectacularly is a remarkable achievement, considering how often such other organizations, like no other, recruit members. It uses no public figures to attract members. It conducts no fund-raising campaigns. It does not permit publication of names or photos of its members.

### Sheinwold on Bridge

(KEEP THINKING AT LOW CONTRACTS) Part seven contracts are not very dramatic, but they have their importance. You can't afford to let an opponent take a hand you want. West opened the queen of hearts and East took the ace and returned the deuce. South won the king of hearts and lost a diamond to East's ace. Black came a heart and West took his trick.

West then shifted to the pack of spades, and dummy won. East signaled encouragement with the seven of spades, but this was hardy needed since dummy's spade discard on the fourth heart had made it clear that South didn't hold the queen of spades.

Declarer next led the jack of clubs from dummy and put up the king of clubs from his own hand. West played on this trick with the ace of clubs, thinking South had misguessed a deuce with club headed by K-10 rather than by K-Q.

Fatal Error This was a fatal error, for now South could win the rest of the tricks. He got four clubs, two diamonds, a heart and a diamond, making the contract with an over-trick.

How could West tell South had the queen of clubs? He already knew East had started with both red aces and the queen of spades. If East had the king of clubs, would he have passed three times? No, very likely.

West could afford to refuse the first club trick for then South would be left with the king of hearts, two spades and two diamonds. Even when the contract is only a part score a defender's strategy is to defeat the contract.

Daily Questions Partner opens with 1 NT (16 to 18 points) and the next player passes. You hold: Spades—5 2; Hearts—4 6; Diamonds—4 3 2; Clubs—Q 10 8 4. What do you say? Answer: Bid 2 NT. You have 8 points in high cards and should count another point for the length of your suit.

### Dad Ship's Doctor While Family Visits U.S. Democrat Leading North Dakota Vote

Wives have a way of getting their husbands involved in their activities in any country and in any language.

Mrs. Eleanor Randall, leader of the Danish Girl Scout troop now visiting Manchester, got her husband involved in two trans-Atlantic crossings, including a voyage to Iceland complete with a job during her summer vacation.

When the Danish Scouts had scraped together almost enough money to passage to the United States after several years of working for the trip, Mrs. Randall went to the Copenhagen office of the Swedish American Lines to make advance arrangements.

The Danish Scout leader asked representative of the line if they had a ship's doctor for the trip. Their son, Johan, 13, will visit his mother and sister in Copenhagen and attend Boy Scout camp while his mother and sister are in the U.S. He'll be back in time to meet his father at the ship's doctor.

Dr. Hans Wandall, director of the Institute of Experimental Surgery at the University of Copenhagen, knew nothing of his wife's "plan" with the ship line until he received a letter from Johan, asking him to sign on for a "cruise" as ship's doctor.

The "cruise" permitted Dr. Wandall to take Dr. to Iceland, Finland, Sweden, Ireland and Scotland, and back to New York. The return trip home will be via the St. Lawrence Waterway to Bermuda, and the ship's doctor will arrive back home in Copenhagen next week.

Meantime, after his visit in Washington, Johan will attend Charter Oak Junior Boy Scout Camp at Stonington and will live in Lebanon farm of Richard Smith, brother of Miss Emily Smith, Troop 1 leader.

### Gain Reported In UAC Talks With 2 Unions

The U.S. State Department decried the action against "Texaco" as "a naked seizure of property in contravention of forms of conduct by responsible governments." The U.S. Congress was expected to pass the Texaco act, which empowers the president to cut the quota of U.S. purchases of Cuban sugar for which the United States now pays a premium above the world price of about \$150 million a year.

In taking over the Texaco properties, Castro accused the company of violating a 1938 law directing all refineries in Cuba to be processed by Cuban officials at the orders of the government.

Three foreign companies in refusing the Russian oil said they had obligations to their traditional suppliers, in this case Venezuela. The government already owns the companies an estimated \$40 million in foreign exchange for Venezuelan oil they have refined and sold in Cuba.

Castro contends he can buy Soviet crude for \$1 a barrel less than the Venezuelan price. But oil dealers source do not believe the Russians can supply the entire Cuban market. These sources say the Soviets lack the tankers to get the oil to Cuba.

**Castro Seen Grabbing Last, Big U.S. Firm**

(Continued from Page One)

The British-Dutch Shell Co. has refused to process Russian crude oil bought from the Soviet Union with Cuban sugar.

Cuba's National Institute of Petroleum was ordered to intervene in Cuba equal to confiscation unless the plant's operators accepted 20,000 barrels of Soviet oil for processing. When officials at the refinery refused, Petroleum Institute officials took over the plant in virtual control of the refinery.

Clifford Drake Jr., Texaco general manager in Cuba, said government intervenors subsequently took over all company operations and resources on the island.

Similar action was expected against Esso Standard and Shell. In New York, Texaco board chairman Augustus C. Long said business conditions in Cuba had become more and more intolerable and the seizure was not entirely unexpected.

# Ryan in Russia—4 Equality Theme Hits Sour Note in Soviet

(Continued from Page One)

The Russian students seem to consider themselves a privileged class. They must be financially privileged to afford this state-run university. The living allowance for a Russian student in the first year is only 250 rubles monthly (\$25 at the tourist rate). A student cannot live on that. Since the institution of working one's way through school is virtually unknown, he must get money from home.

The system appears to have produced a social group dedicated to the status quo—keeping things as they are. There seems to be little political enthusiasm among university students. Lives and activities are fairly well controlled by units of the Komсомол (Young Communists League).

The attitudes of Russian students have produced adverse reactions from many a student from countries in the underdeveloped world, where communists in most instances are young people wearing blinders, unwilling to look at outside ideas and satisfied to surrender individually to the state.

Students from Asia, coming from families accustomed to high living standards, express shock at the low level they have noted in the USSR. Some resent Russian attempts to use them for political purposes, such as endorsements for this or that slogan or propaganda circus. Others resent what they see as the obvious aim of the "People's Friendship University"—indoctrination of young people from underdeveloped areas.

Western students in Moscow say it is practically impossible to penetrate the minds of most of the Russian students. They have been indoctrinated in Soviet dogma since birth and are accustomed to the rigid discipline of life in a Communist society.

There are some indications that educated young Russians resent the more obvious crudities of Premier Khrushchev on the world stage. Like many an average student, the students, too, place their hopes for a prosperous future to better relations with the United States. Khrushchev's blasts at President Eisenhower have had little discernible effect upon the friendly attitudes of the students toward Americans.

The students display a lively interest in one phase of life abroad: The West's living standards. They express eagerness for the day when they will be able to travel independently and see it for themselves. And it seems highly likely they harbor some resentment against the regime for its restrictions on that sort of travel.

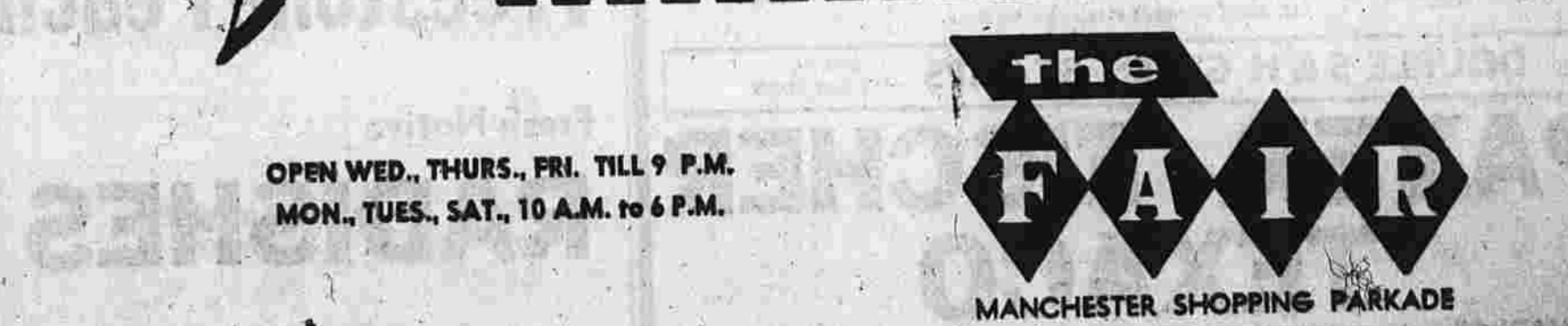

### Machine Vote Plans Attacked at Meeting

The town will vote July 18 on three ordinances which were discussed for more than two hours at a town meeting held last night at the Community Hall.

Unable to take any other action regarding the machine vote, the town meeting asked the Selectmen to obtain an opinion from Town Counsel Harold Garrity on the legality of the proposed ordinances and an interpretation of how they would be administered.

The request to obtain the opinion included provision that a public hearing be called to discuss the town counsel's report at the meeting. It is understood that the hearing will be held on July 11 if possible.

The ordinance asks to provide that a machine vote will be held in the future on (1) any proposed ordinance, (2) any proposed expenditure of \$10,000 or more not included in the annual budget, and (3) any proposed purchase of land, any construction of building, or any addition or improvement to land or buildings.

A petition to submit the proposals to the town meeting was presented by Bruce G. Ransom of 500 Center Rd. A second petition to require a machine vote on the proposals also was initiated by Ransom.

John C. Rothwell claimed these were slurs against town officials whom he had not found dishonest. He said if the people felt that officials were dishonest, they should get rid of them rather than to pass ordinances which would only make them more dishonest. He said the proposed ordinance were typical of the things born of a petulant and spiteful mind.

Raymond E. Cooper maintained state law provides no opportunity to invoke a machine vote whenever a petition is presented to the town meeting on the petition of 200 voters, the law also provides that any town meeting may vote to utilize any machine vote whenever it seems necessary to obtain a petition. He also pointed out that town meeting will become effective Sunday at 10:00 a.m. and that any request to the Selectmen, and must be done by petition of 20 voters.

Some of those present last night also saw in the proposed ordinance an end to town meeting as written would send most issues directly to the machine vote. No provision was included for a town meeting before the 1961 annual meeting.

Hartford, June 30 (AP)—The home-made houseboat which capsized in Wethersfield Cove May 29, causing the death of a 15-year-old girl, was poorly constructed and overloaded, it was stated today in a report by Coroner Louis W. Schaefer.
