**Business Bodies** — Dessert Specialists Since Michael A. Orfitelli Sr devised and patented, nine years ago, a metal mold in . which to cene an ice cream confection spuntoni, his Royal Ice Cream Co. has developed a market for the product extending down to New London and Norwich. With the patented mold, Orfitell copyrighted a name for the product, Banquet Spumoni. Whether adding spumoni to the company's line of products helped or not is hard to tell, but the company's fortunes have increased since then, Orfitelli said, and busi-

ness is good. Orfitelli began the business in 1931 after 18 years as manager of the Manchester Dairy on Summit st. Before coming to Manches-ter, he worked in Naugatuck and New Britain. largely in the ice cream confection business.

"It was a rough go for about 5 years," he said, referring to he initial years of Royal. As the plant grew, slowly, his two sons, Harold J. and Michael Jr., entered the business, and today manage the plant operations. Royal, located at 23 Warren St., employs seven men, has three trucks on the road. The men arrive as early as 6 a.m. during the months, when business is rushed, often work eight or nine hours a day.

Although spumoni is not pro-duced in any greater quantity than other Royal products, it is one of the more difficult confections, to make. Before patenting the mold, Orfitelli said, he did not make it. The mold, he said, eliminates "80 to 90 per cent of the hand work in making spumoni." Insofar as possible, vacations will be scheduled according to the desires of the employees. In these instances vacations will have to be adapted as necessary.

However, it will be the responsibility of supervision to insure continuous operation of each department and to meet individual production requirements.
