Defeat of Johnson Angers Dixiecrats

Los Angeles, July 14 (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy, the Democratic presidential nominee, said today he hopes within a couple of hours to pick his running mate for the election campaign.

The Democratic presidential nominee gave this word to reporters shortly after 10 o'clock when he arrived at the Baltimore Hotel where he had a conference scheduled with Gov. David L. Lawrence of Pennsylvania and Mayor Richard Daley of Chicago.

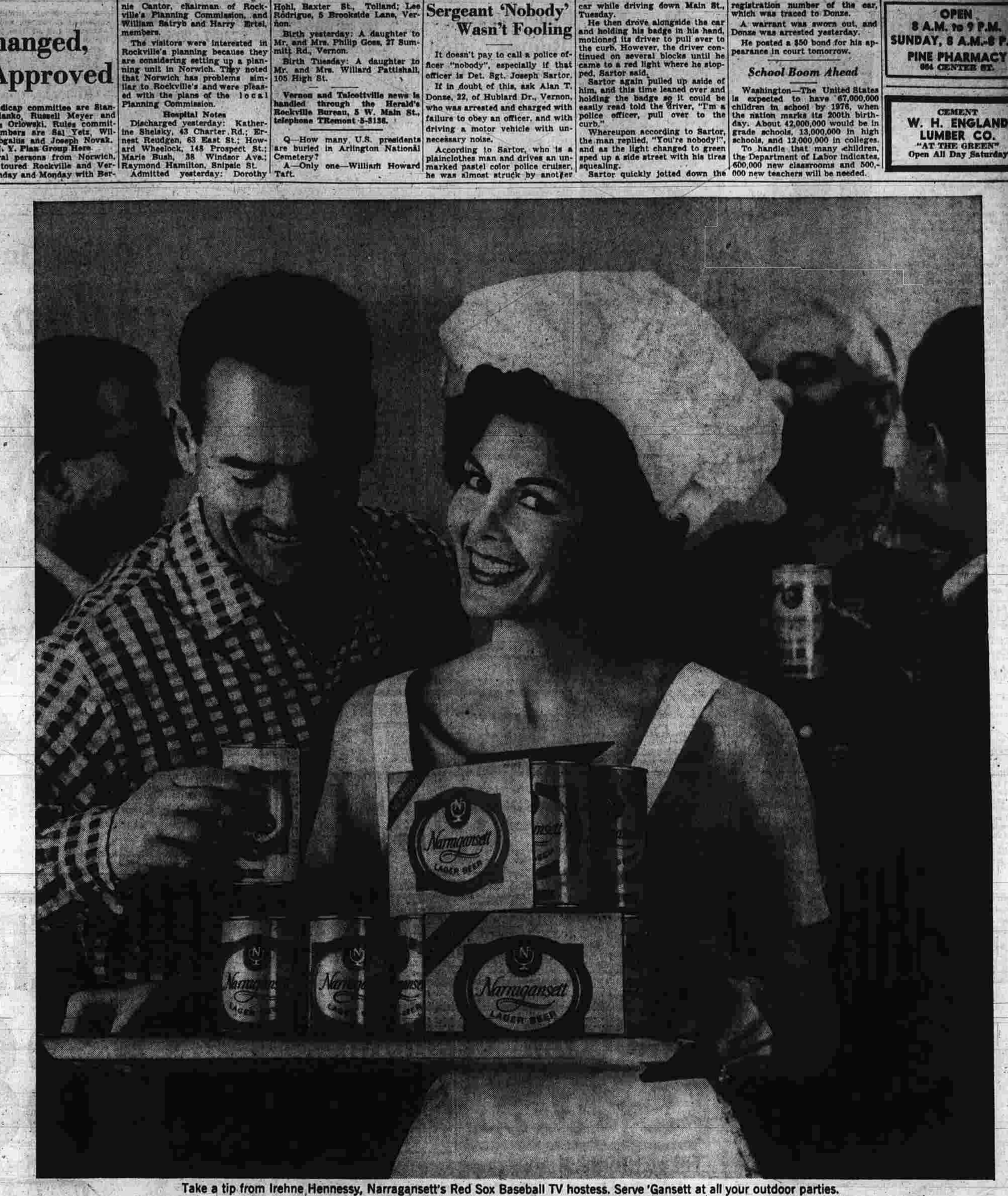

Grandfather Makes Clocks

Grandfather Stanley Hillinski is scarcely noticed in the passing of time when he is absorbed in his hobby — making grandfather clocks.

Hillinski, 67, has just finished making his sixth grandfather clock in the basement workshop of his home at 110 S. Adams St. The clock is to be shipped to a cousin in Pittsburgh as a 30th wedding anniversary present.

A widower, Hillinski has made grandfather clocks for each of his four sons, Walter Hillinski, 11 Fensdale Dr.; Stanley Hillinski Jr., 50 North Rd.; Joseph Hillinski, 80 Benton St.; and John Hillinski, Graham Rd., South Windsor, and for his daughter, Miss Regina Hillinski who lives with him. He has six grandchildren.

Always fascinated with the delicate operation of watch and clock works, the hobbyist operated his own watch and clock repair shop on No. Main St. in 1922. His business was a victim of the depression.

But he returned to his labor of love with clocks in 1940 when he made his first grandfather clock in his leisure after-working hours. He retired two years ago after more than 30 years' employment as a carpenter and mason with the Hartman Tobacco Co. in Bookland.

Born in Barawskie, Poland, Hillinski came to this country in 1911 and has lived in Manchester for 34 years.

In addition to making tall clocks, Grandfather Hillinski has finished recreation rooms for his own home and for three other homes. He has made many pieces of furniture.

He started making his first clock in April. His first clock made 20 years ago required six months to make.

His latest project has panels of gum hard plywood with mahogany finish, fluted columns of pine molding and arch pediments for which he made his own patterns. Hillinski takes greatest pride, however, in the brass weights and masses with the weights, chains and pendulum which he likes to see in movement through the glass door.

He ordered 15 jewels from Switzerland, mailed lead to fill the brass weights, and made the brass Roman numerals and brass initials dot by dot by hand for the face of the clock.

Building Estimate \$7,027,629 in Year

New buildings in Manchester during the fiscal year 1959-60 totaled \$7,027,629, according to the annual report by Building Inspector Thomas C. Monahan.

The report also stated the town picked up \$37,615 in building fees for the year.

The largest single item in the report showed \$2,354,235 worth of school construction begun during the year. Two schools, the North End Junior high school and the East Catholic High School, are representative.

There were permits issued for 135 new 1-family dwellings, estimated at \$2,000,000, and for 400 alterations and addition jobs, estimated \$1,679,495.

The department also issued 1,780 electrical, plumbing and heating licenses for fees totaling \$117,750.

But with the help of his very efficient organization, which Connecticut made its notable contributions, Kennedy methodically and effectively overcame his disadvantages.

The U.N. In The Congo. In what a Colonel Blimp might call "the good old days," there would not be quite so much cause for concern as there is today over the state of affairs in the Congo.

But the Congo is a new sovereign state, with all the rights and prerogatives of not all of the new states that go with sovereignty.

The Democratic party platform is a broad, sweeping far-ranging document, covering most if not all of the life of the nation and the world, and promising cures for them.

And the fact is, it is so far-ranging that it is probably all of the things, to at least some degree, it pledges the Democratic party to do something for everybody not only with not raising taxes but, by plugging tax-law "loopholes," collecting "billions" in taxes that go uncollected.

And although severely criticized of the Eisenhower Administration's conduct of foreign affairs, the Democratic platform does not outline any radical departure from policies now being followed.

Connecticut Yankee

While the Republicans were adopting their state platform, pledging the people of Connecticut to the political obnoxious privilege of having their taxes increased by a plan to send an emergency United Nations force, drawn mostly from African nations, to help maintain the anarchy in the Congo.

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Assailant Knives Kishi; Ikeda New Jap Premier

Used to enter the official residence.

The attack on Kishi occurred three months after another attempt to stab and injure a prominent socialist, Jotaro Kawakami, during the parliament building. The two attacks aroused fears that Japan is in for a revived right-wing revival in which the notorious rightist "Black Dragon" society played a leading role.

Kishi is the fourth Japanese prime minister of the 20th Century to be a terrorist victim. The others were: Takahashi Kore, fatally stabbed in 1921; Yoko Hamaguchi, wounded in 1930; and Tamiyoshi Inokai, assassinated by a fanatic army officer in 1932.

Democracy in Japan has not planned to make the government change tomorrow, there was possibility that the Socialist party in the lower house of the diet (parliament) might try some delaying tactic. Filled in their attempt to block the U.S.-Japan security treaty, the Socialists and other Leftists likely have been failing against the government.

The Socialists cannot prevent Ikeda's election unless they succeed in the U.S. House of Representatives where they have a 105-seat majority in the 435-seat body.

That much of the steam has gone out of the Liberal Democratic party's election campaign today, organizers of a demonstration against the incoming Ikeda government said. They might try some delaying tactic, but they are not out for three waves of marching around the diet building, the prime minister's official residence and police headquarters.

Ikeda, 61, was elected to the Liberal Democratic presidency on the second ballot by party members. The vote was 502-194, with 71 abstentions. He is chairman of the party's executive board, the lower. The party president traditionally becomes prime minister.

Ikeda, a protégé of former Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida, after his election pledged to restore Japan's international prestige, damaged by the leftist riots which forced cancellation of President Eisenhower's visit.

Ikeda also promised to work for harmony within his own party which is ridden with factional strife.

Ikeda is an advocate of continued close ties with the United States and also reopening of trade with China. He administered the U.S. occupation's unpopular anti-inflation policy and is known as a tough-minded financial expert and administrator.

In his fight to succeed Kishi, he was supported by the country's leading industrial and commercial interests but was opposed by many professional politicians inside his own party who describe him as a "human adding machine."

Ikeda's frank and lucid style has earned him a reputation for honesty and courage in the Japanese people's eyes.

Vacuum Process Removes Gases In Molten Steel

Gary, Ind.—Gaseous impurities can be removed from a 3-ton batch of molten steel in 18 minutes with a new vacuum process.

The hills are almost forgotten as Oklahoma's "Badlands" is a name they earned for sheltering some of the most notorious outlaws in recent history, including Dale Gribble, Charles "Fetty Boy" Floyd, the Dalton gang and Jesse James.

The area from Oklahoma to one of the Southwest's most popular recreation areas has been in the last two decades. Their history as a bandit haven ended in 1934 when 700 National Guardmen, federal state and county officers stormed the area searching for Floyd.

It was the greatest manhunt in southwest history and, though the hunt was not for many days, it uncovered 125 hideouts and made 20 arrests. Construction of the Tule River dam was the coup de grace for the hills as an outlaw refuge.

The dam tamed the picturesque but unpredictable Tule River and turned it into a canyon of clear water running 35 miles through the hills.

Tenkiller Lake and the modern state park built around it made recreation the best business in the area, and lured 400,000 visitors last year.

Nobody knows how much loot the hills hid, but it is estimated that the hills hid in Robin Hood tradition.

The Starr, James and Dalton gangs operated out of the hills from the 200 square miles of hills from the post Civil War era until the turn of the century.

Truck Hits Car, Damage at \$1.50

A dump-truck rolled into an automobile late this morning, but damage to the car was estimated at only \$1.50.

Police explained it this way. Both the truck, being driven by William Spivey, 55, of New London, and the car, owned by George A. Foster Jr., 42, of Lake St., Vernon, were parked along Hartford Rd. near Fairfield St.

The truck had developed battery trouble and while Spivey was trying to get it started, it rolled backward, slightly hitting the Foster car, inflating a small dent in the hood.

No one was arrested or injured.

Police said many of them burned to death were inmates locked in cells.

An undetermined number of inmates, including several classified as criminally insane, escaped during the rescue operation.

As flames ate the inner part of the building inmates screamed in terror. Staff refused to be brought out by firemen and police and had to be overpowered.

There were no casualties in the children's wards. The fire department had by that time all children safely removed.

Firemen directed fire-fighting and rescue operations throughout the night. His aides said that, except for earthquakes, the fire brought the highest casualty list ever experienced by Guatemala.

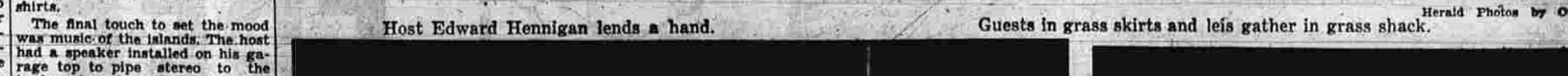
