



Smokers Warned artford, July 14 (A)-A warning against the risk of lung can-cer involved in cigarette smoking, sounded by the National Tubercu-losis Assn. recently, has been ap-proved by an arm of the Connec-ticut Tuberculosis and Health

Assn. The association's Committee of Medical Education and Research voted approval of the following statement by the NTA, and rec-ommended an education program to make it known: "There is an alarming increase in deaths from lung cancer. Cig-arette smoking is a major cause of lung cancer. The risk of lung cancer increases with the number of cigarettes amoked.

of cigarettes smoked. "Giving up smoking reduces the risk of lung cancer. Recent studies show that cigarette smoking is a factor in such cripping lung dis-eases as chronic bronchitis and emphysical

emphysema. "There is not a single cause of all lung cancers. Breathing pol-luted air may also add to the risk of lung cancer. No present method of treating tobacco or filtering the smoke has been proved to reduce the harmful effects of cigarette
