Langtry Plan On Sidewalk Before Board

A proposed Foster St. sidewalk can be installed with a "minimum of property damage" with a change in former plans, according to Chester Langtry, deputy director of public works.

Langtry has been studying ways of locating walks on the north side of Foster St. and on the north side of E. Middle St., from Summit to Parker St. Town Directors will consider his findings at a special meeting at 8 o'clock tonight in the Municipal Building.

Langtry said property damage could be reduced on Foster St. by keeping to the 33 1/2 foot width of the street between E. Center and Pitkin.

A sidewalk installed near Ferguson Rd. last year added nine feet to the street width but Langtry said this would be a mistake.

Under the plan, a hedge would be saved if they were trimmed or if the stretches of sidewalk in front of them were made of concrete to avoid the need to cut low trees and roots and to give roots room to grow.

Both the Foster St. and turnpike proposals were protested by a number of property owners at a public hearing last month.

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Coffee Prices Dropping Again

New York, July 20 (AP)—Coffee prices are dropping again, due largely to the huge glut of coffee beans in Brazil.

General Foods Corp. today reduced the wholesale price of its regular grade, vacuum-packed Maxwell House, Rankin, Tuban and other coffees two cents a pound effective today.

The reduction was the first change in price by the largest U.S. coffee roaster since March 1959 and brings the wholesale price to its lowest point in 10 years.

Arthur E. Larkin Jr., general manager of the Maxwell House division, said green coffee prices, which remained relatively stable for a period of 18 months, now have drifted down to a point that make possible a price cut in roasted and ground coffee.

Albert Shivers, Inc., joined General Foods with a similar price cut on its ground coffee.

Other major roasters normally would be expected to follow the reduction. Soluble, or instant, coffee was not affected.

Wholesale prices normally are not disclosed, but trade sources previously estimated the general level at around 70 cents a pound. Normal retail markup is 20 to 21 cents a pound.

Extended Forecast

Windsor Locks, July 20 (AP)—The U.S. Weather Bureau issued this forecast for Connecticut today:

De Gregory Posts Bail for Freedom

Concord, N.H., July 20 (AP)—Rugby de Gregory, jailed for contempt of court after refusing to tell New Hampshire investigators whether he is a member of the Communist party, was free today after three weeks behind bars.

The State Supreme Court yesterday ordered the Hudson factory worker released on bail pending appeal. The 46-year-old De Gregory was sentenced to one year.

He is challenging the constitutionality of a 1957 law which gave Atty. Gen. Louis Wyman power to investigate subversive activities.

He said "I was not allowed to go outside for exercise once and presumably, if I had served a year, would never have been allowed outside. The old security jail at nearby Bowdoin has no outside exercise facilities."

Rockefeller enthusiasts, could follow the mathematics by which the Nixon total could be reduced below the 600 needed for the nomination by even the most vigorous sort of operation.

Rockefeller might command most of New York's 40 votes in a showdown, but where others would come from remains a puzzle.

The Governor himself said he stands by his statement of late December that those who will control the convention don't want any contest for the nomination. But he said he doesn't agree that is healthy for the party.

"Competition is the life of politics," he said. "We do not want a monolithic party."

Despite the seemingly insurmountable odds, Rockefeller's campaign moved in force. They rented most of the suites in one hotel, took over one floor of another and leased a theater building.

The public demonstrations for Rockefeller, largely carried on so far by school-going teenagers, appeared as amateurish as those arranged for Stevenson in Los Angeles.

Behind all this lurked the remote possibility that Rockefeller might be persuaded after all to take second place on a Nixon ticket.

The Governor has said he won't

reception for him with 8,000 or more guests Sunday.

Nixon will not reach this convention city until Monday.

Sen. Harry Goldwater of Arizona, whose name may go into the pot for the presidential nomination, said he doesn't have any hopes that he will wind up either with first or second place on the ticket.

"I'm afraid the Vice President and I are too far apart on philosophy of government for that," he said. "I think Dick thinks my conservatism would hurt his chances of election."

Goldwater and Rockefeller were meeting in their efforts to influence the trend of Republican platform declarations.

Rockefeller, who previously had called for a strong civil rights plank, outlined before the drafting committee a proposed "grand design" for the free world.

As something of a topper for the "New Frontier" about which Sen. John F. Kennedy, the Democratic presidential nominee, spoke last week, Rockefeller said America's task "is to build a world."

Goldwater agreed with Rockefeller that this country must maintain the most powerful military position in the world. But he said Republicans must reject "the tactics and practices of the anti-communist, elect-and-elect architect of the New Deal and the Fair Deal."

Klein got a big laugh from a crowd of newsmen when he described the draft. Rockefeller later spoke at an interesting development which indicates this is a wide open convention.

He said the Nixon camp views it as a "health" check that the Governor speaks out on his own mind and expresses his views on the campaign. He added that despite differences of opinion he expects Rockefeller to campaign for the GOP ticket in the fall.

Rockefeller is to fly to New York after testifying before the platform committee, returns Saturday. Supporters are planning a

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Native Corn Supply Good

By MILDRED SMITH

The sweet corn season has really begun now that native ears have appeared on the market. Harvesting of the earliest varieties started during the first days of July and there will be native corn all through the summer.

The recent cool nights, so welcome to us as not the other nights favorable to the growing of corn. This vegetable, along with tomatoes and various other summer crops, does best when the nights are warm, even in spite of this, however, there is going to be plenty of sweet corn.

Sweet corn prices are expected to be lower than usual. So far this season the price per dozen ears of corn shipped in from the South has been several cents lower than last year. The native corn crop looks promising that prices are likely to continue to be favorable to the consumer's pocketbook.

After sweet corn has been harvested, it needs a cool temperature. This means keeping it cool on the farm in the store and in the home. It will keep in the home eight to ten days, and in the store ten to twelve days. At this stage a heavy fluid sprout called the "sucker" stage and at this stage corn is less tender and not so sweet.

Hartford, July 20 (AP)—Troopers in civilian clothes and unmarked cars will be taken out of uniform and directed to patrol in civilian clothes.

Reds Tell Belgians Quit Now

By WILLIAM N. OATIS United Nations, N. Y., July 21 (AP)—The United States said today it will do whatever it must to keep Soviet troops out of the Congo.

U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge gave the pledge to the U.N. Security Council after Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov said "non-aligned states" would have to act if Belgian troops did not immediately leave the chaotic new African republic.

At a council meeting lasting until 1 a.m. Kuznetsov introduced a resolution demanding the withdrawal of Belgian troops within three days.

The Russian resolution was not expected to win council approval. Instead the 11-nation group probably will approve a milder resolution being drafted by Belgium and France that will call on Belgium to "proceed as quickly as possible" with the withdrawal.

The Ceylonese-Tunisian resolution was voted for introduction when the council resumed debate. Lodge welcomed a report from Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld that the new U.N. military force was moving into Congo.

Other council members, who will do whatever they can to prevent the introduction of any military force not requested by the United Nations, Kuznetsov said. "non-aligned states" would have to act if Belgian troops did not immediately leave the chaotic new African republic.

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Lumumba Will Speak Before UN

Kampala, Uganda, July 21 (AP)—Reports from tightly censored Ruanda Urundi say Patrice Lumumba has broken out there between Ruanda people who want a republic and later to join the Congo and Urundi who want a separate monarchy.

The region, adjoining the Congo on the east, is now Belgian trust territory. Messages from Belgian civilians say they are awaiting Belgian troops before leaving for Uganda and Tanganyika.

Leopoldville, the Congo, July 21 (AP)—A U.N. spokesman said today Premier Patrice Lumumba has informed the U.N. mission he will fly to New York tomorrow to address the Security Council on the Congo situation.

A meeting of the council scheduled for this afternoon may be postponed to a later date, the spokesman said.

The spokesman said Lumumba has threatened to call in Russian troops if Belgian soldiers do not leave Congo territory immediately.

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2 Launchings Of Polaris Hit In Target Area

Cape Canaveral, Fla., July 21 (AP)—Two Polaris missiles fired from a submerged nuclear-powered submarine streaked down the Atlantic firing range for 1,100 miles to hit squarely in the planned target area yesterday.

The firings from the submarine George Washington, were hailed as a big step toward operational use of a weapon that could be a giant deterrent to any enemy action.

Gliding silently beneath the waves about 30 miles off Cape Canaveral, the George Washington made the historic first launchings from a submerged submarine while below the surface.

"There was a hell of a lot of tension in the air," said a spokesman. "It was a very important day for us."

Speaking was Adm. William F. Raborn Jr., who for four years has directed the Polaris missile program.
