### Left Backs 'Fortunate One' Widow Takes Oath As Ceylon Premier

The daughter of one of Ceylon's most conservative old families of the island, Mrs. Bandaranaike, today took the oath of office as Ceylon's first woman prime minister.

The party was assured a majority of 56 votes because the government names six representatives of business interests and minorities who traditionally vote with the government.

Although she didn't need them, the woman leader can count on the support of 12 Trotskyite members, 4 Communists and 3 other Socialist-minded members from other parties with whom she had a no-contest electoral pact.

The big loser in the election was the Conservative United National party, which dropped from 30 seats to 30. The leader, Prime Minister Dudley Senarathne, handed in his cabinet's resignation when the election results were announced.

In foreign affairs, she is militantly neutral. On the major issues plaguing Ceylon, she has nothing to say so far. These include the stagnant economy, which should be expanding to keep up with the rapidly expanding population, and the explosive bitterness between the Sinhalese-speaking Buddhist majority and the Tamil-speaking minority, which has caused much bloodshed in the past.

The election gave 75 of the 157 seats in the House of Representatives to the government.

**Blueberry Cheesecake**  
1 lb. cream cheese  
2 unbaked eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
Combine ingredients listed and beat well in mixer or blender. Gently fold into the mixture 2 cups of large blueberries, and pour batter into a spring form pan or pie plate lined with a Graham cracker crust. Bake for 20-25 minutes at 375 degrees. Cool. Cover with one pint of sour cream mixed with two tablespoons of sugar and one teaspoon of vanilla. Return to 375 degree oven for 5 to 8 minutes. Fruit may also be heated directly on the crust and the batter poured over the fruit layer if preferred.

**Blueberry Almond Pie**  
1 1/2 cup blueberries  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
2 tablespoons cornstarch  
2 tablespoons confectioner or orange liqueur  
1/4 cup sliced toasted almonds  
Mix blueberries, half cup sugar and half cup water. Bring slowly to a boil and cook about 10 minutes until berries are soft. Put through a sieve or puree in a blender. Return to refrigerator. ### Andover Selectmen Act on Roads, Town Hall and Dog Pound

The Board of Selectmen discussed Town Hall improvements, town roads and the erection of a dog pound at a meeting last night in the home of First Selectman Percy Cook.

Cook reported that the furnace in Town Hall has been completely replaced in a fireproof vault with ventilation and an alarm system to conform to recommendations of the State Fire Marshal. During the past year other work done to meet the Fire Marshal's specifications includes installation of crash hardware on the hall's kitchen and dining room doors, new floors from the vestibule to the main hall, fire extinguishers and an exit sign.

The work was done by local residents, Warren Jurovsky and Russell Davidson. Davidson, a heating engineer, changed the heating ducts from an overhead location and recommended installation of dropped insulated ceiling for estimated savings of 30 per cent on fuel.

The Board voted to purchase a new fuel tank for ground installation. Davidson recommended. The tank now being used was loaned to them by an outside firm.

All other scheduled work on the hall has been completed. The wiring, the Board authorized Walter F. Merrill, Jr., local electrician, to do additional work to meet Building Code requirements and stimulate overhauling of circuits. A total of \$2,000 has been appropriated for the work.

The First Selectman also said that scheduled work on the parking lot had been completed and the rebuilding of stone wall and spreading of gravel on the driveway.

Responses to a request for use of the Town Hall for private parties, the Selectmen agreed to set a fee of \$10 for rental by residents. From this amount, a considerable sum has been contributed to the wiring. The Board authorized Walter F. Merrill, Jr., local electrician, to do additional work to meet Building Code requirements and stimulate overhauling of circuits. A total of \$2,000 has been appropriated for the work.

The Board also approved Cook's recommendation to notify the State Highway Department of plans for improvement of the remaining five-tenths of a mile of State Rd. of Jurovsky Rd., which is unimproved. The road runs from Boston Hill Rd. to Gilead Rd. and is called Krawbych on the other side of the road. During the winter one of the road crew's assignments will be to cut brush along Jurovsky Rd. in preparation for the project.

Approval of a sign specifying that the Andover disposal area is for use of Andover and Bolton dogs was authorized by the Board in response to a request from Constable Alfred Hunt, Hunt regularly patrols the area.

The Board also voted to write to Joseph N. Gill, Commissioner of Agriculture, informing him that they are prepared to erect a dog pound, providing it can be paid for directly from the funds now held for this town by the State. A similar procedure was used in the purchase of the prefabricated pound by the previous Board.

Payment of a \$184.82 State grant will be made by the Connecticut Tax Department before Sept. 1 in lieu of taxes on 57.5 acres of the Methuen State Forest which fall within this town's boundaries. The area involved is located between Bear Swamp Rd. and the Hill Rd. in the rear of private property on Whelpling Rd. and extends to the town line of Coventry.

Board of Selectmen meetings are not regularly scheduled, but are held once a month, Cook said last night.

**Church to Make Survey**  
A survey of town needs and interests will be launched Monday by a 20-member team of the First Congregational Church, the Rev. William E. Thomsen announced yesterday. The survey has been approved by the church council and will be headed by the Rev. Mr. Thomsen, as council moderator.

The initial survey will be conducted in the form of a door-to-door survey in the area bounded by Long Hill Rd. extending to the town line. This includes Boston Hill Rd., Wales Rd., Shady Hill Rd., Old State Rd., Rt. 6, Old State Rd., Pine Ridge Dr., Aspinall Dr., Hickory Hill, Elm St. and other smaller roads in that section.

United Aircraft said they had reported hundreds of complaints to the NLRB of alleged vandalism, malicious damage to property and threats to non-strikers.

Pappas, meanwhile, said a major stumbling block toward a settlement was the question of rehiring strikers. The company has been reluctant to re-hire strikers who allegedly participated in picketing violence.

The Machinists represent workers at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft plants in East Hartford and Manchester and at the Hamilton Standard Division in Windsor Locks and Broad Brook.

In another development, the company said it had been informed by the NLRB that a hearing on a decertification petition filed by a group of workers at Sikorsky could not be held until the company's unit labor practices charges are settled.

The disunion group of workers is seeking to oust the UAW as bargaining agent at Sikorsky. The NLRB was also quoted as saying election to determine the bargaining agent could not be held "in the present emotional atmosphere."

The company employs about 81,000 production workers in the seven plants originally struck by the unions. About 4,000 UAW members at a Pratt & Whitney plant in North Haven accepted a new contract earlier this month and returned to their jobs.

Wages are not as lopsided as in the dispute. The scales at the plants vary.

Chief issues are demands by the unions for a union shop, better job security, full abolition of discipline, the right to investigate grievances on company property during working hours and automatic pay increases instead of raises on a merit plan.






