Combine the salt and reaining cinnamon and rub into the duck thoroughly, inside and out. Place the duck on a roasting pan. Combine the syrup with soy sauce and ginger and mix well. our over the duck.

Roast in a 425 degree oven until golden in color, basting frequently, Reduce the heat' to 350 degrees and roast until tender, about two and a half hours in all, including browning time. Add additional water if the pan becomes too dry, and baste frequently. Cut the duck into small pieces to serve. The chinese serve the duck with a sauce made by mixing one-half cup of vinegar and three minced loves of garlic. The duck bits are dipped into this sauce. education is not part of an ac-ademic education. I think Mr. Mactoxo has already answered the first objection with his statement of the grading sys-tem employed in physical educa-tion in the high school. The second objection is hased upon the idea that for some rea-son physical education is no long-er a necessity . . . This is an-swered by the deep and grave concern evidenced by the Presi-dent when he established a na-tional council on physical educa-tion. We face a future world (whose) luxuries and rapidly in-creasing leisure hours will con-tain an immense opportunity for boredom and sloth. Many of the skills (such as badminton, danc-ing, golf, tennis, and archery) learned in physical education classes can provide a healthful and enjoyable use for the abundant njoyable use for the abundai ure time of the present and future. How well will this country meet the challenges of tomorrow — the ideological battle for the minds of men, the chal-lenge of space — if we are physically inept, soft, with the idea that only the mental aspect of humanity is important. However, poor physical condition can and does reduce mental effectiveness. Physical education is important to every child and it should be part of his education. Then it should be important to every parent to see that his child gets the best phys-ical education possible. A grade in physical education is necessary to

in attitude receptive to teaching Since our whole society functions on an incentive system, it is not surprising that our schools refel this with the grading system. Where grades have not been given the caliber of the program and the student interest fall to such a level that the physical education program is the victim of the sneers of the pseudo-intellectuals who feel that they are above such considerations as taking physical edu-cation with the rest of the educational community. This statement is borne out by my own college experience and that of many of my acquaintances. Only the maximum incentive will produce the maxi-mum return from physical educa-

tion classes. The final objection is perhaps the strongest: That only "aca-demic" subjects should count toward the honor role. By academic subjects it is assumed that the reference is to those sub-jects which have formed the core of the so-called "classical" educa-tion; in other words subjects found in the curriculum B.D. (Before, Dewey). The critics of the present method of determining honor standing maintain that this of a necessity deletes physical educa-Physical education has always

been a part of the Western classi-cal education. Indroduced by the Greeks, it has remained a basic educational concept ever since. The Greek (Athenian Greek) ideal. of a "sound mind in a sound body" could only be achieved by the inclusion of physical education in both the primary and secondary schooling. Plato and Aristotle commended it as a necessity, and, commended it as a necessity, and, perhaps very strangely, according to the views of many this stress on physical education did not seem to adversely affect the Athenian intellect. John Milton, in his essay "on Education," placed physical education in the curriculum of his ideal school. These might seem to be merely scattered instances in Western educational bistory, but Western educational history bu investigation will prove that physical education of some sort was part of every "classical" sys-
