**Election Issue**  
Is garbage going to be made a political issue in the forthcoming campaign?

There are rumblings in that direction. Republicans and Democrats fought last year over whether the town should buy its own garbage trucks to get more control over collections which had become haphazard under former contractor Samuel Lombardo.

The Democrats, with a 1958 platform plank calling for improvements in the service, voted the new trucks over Republican arguments that the town shouldn't "get involved in garbage collecting business." A new contractor, the Connecticut Carting Co., was hired to provide laborers and drivers for the trucks and things went smoothly for awhile.

Now, a kind of crisis looms, less than two months before the town election.

The daily complaint rate is low, indicating that service is as good as it has ever been in past years, but General Manager Richard Martin has called for curb pickups to solve backyard collection problems and also to combine trash with garbage collections, at little extra cost.

Looking at it one way, the Democrats are in a spot. The idea of curb pickups isn't likely to be popular, but it's one-way to fulfill another part of that platform plank—to "provide for regular town collection of trash." Trash is picked up only twice a year now, and combined trash and garbage curb pickups are in use in East Hartford and West Hartford, Martin says.

Members of both parties looked alert when Martin made his recommendation at a Board meeting this past week.

Republican Gilbert Barnes re-

marked that, for him, "Service is considerably worse since we changed over from Lombardo."

Democrat Alice Lomenzo fired back, "For me, it's never been better."

However, Democrat Theodore Powell raised a nonpartisan question about Martin's curb pickup plan: "What about people who live on hills?"

Powell himself lives on a hill, but we can presume safely he wasn't thinking only of himself.

**Fill Trade You**  
General Manager Richard Martin appears to have settled himself solidly in defense of the Park Department tool shed on E. Middle Pike, which, from some angles, substitutes dust and machinery for views of the new North End junior high school and Town Court building.

The manager has indicated he'll be as hard to move from his position as the shed itself, whose foundation, Mayor Eugene T. Kelly thinks, has been sunk all the way to sea level by a Park Department, fearful of losing a place for its tools.

Kelly two weeks ago urged Martin to "get it out of there"—to anywhere—and Francis Mahoney suggested the woods in Center Springs Park. Mahoney also suggested conversion to a hot dog stand, if the shed must stay.

Martin yesterday came up with a better idea. He said he's going to put up a sign on the shed, and have it featured along with the school and court building in guided tours of the area. Thus, a strong hint of permanency.

But there seems to be one out. Martin has indicated he might soften up if the Directors vote to

build a new garage for the Town Engineer's Division to relieve crowded conditions in the present garage on Harrison St.

**For the Record**  
We can't say yes or no, but the way it looked to us, General Manager Richard Martin this week let loose with a stiff rebuke of a stand the Republican party took last May on West Side sewage needs.

The rebuke, if it was a rebuke, was oblique, of course, and named no names.

It was a paragraph in a report Martin wrote on the new sewage disposal plant being planned, to serve two West Side schools and some other properties.

The roughly \$40,000 project is the alternative to a \$160,000 pump station, force main, and trunk sewer proposal which voters rejected in last May's referendum.

The \$160,000 proposal was highly unpopular on the West Side and, after previously supporting it, the Republicans staged an eleventh hour turnabout and opposed it just before the referendum. GOP chief John P. Shea termed the \$40,000 alternative "perfectly acceptable," and Republicans' Director Gilbert Barnes questioned the need for any long range project on the West Side.

These opinions swept aside others that the \$40,000 proposal would be a short-sighted step toward West Side needs.

The paragraph in Martin's report to the Directors this week said, "It should be understood . . . that this piecemeal approach to solving . . . problems in this area is not a satisfactory substitute for the proposal that was defeated at referendum . . . The piecemeal approach will increase the cost to everyone."

It is anybody's guess today, but the three strongest possibilities are State Comptroller Raymond S. Thatcher of East Hampton, House Speaker William O'Brien of Portland and Atty. William St. Onge of Putnam.

Others have been mentioned, notably Rockville Mayor Leo B. Flaherty Jr., and former secretary of state Dr. John Satti of New London, but Thatcher, O'Brien and St. Onge are conceded to be the three men the 16 members of the State Central Committee will consider when they meet—probably today.

The procedure for filling the vacancy is to have the 16 members of the State Central Committee from the counties of Tolland, Middlesex, New London and Windham meet and elect a nominee.

One source close to state Democratic party leadership mentioned the three most likely candidates "because we want the strongest possible candidate" to face Horace Seely-Brown Jr., of Pomfret, the Republican nominee who wants to return to the post he held for 10 of the past 14 years. Seely-Brown has been defeated only twice in his congressional career—last year by Bowles and in 1949 by Mrs. Chase Going Woodhouse.

Edwards Started at 15 With Show Biz Career

By PAUL GERARD We spoke to Ralph Edwards in New York this summer the very day he left with his family for a vacation in Europe.

Having spent his early years on a farm in Merino, Colo., and then in Oakland, Calif., he was a natural for the usual reply: "Nice place to visit but I wouldn't want to live here."

York; it gave me my Barbara (his wife Barbara Sheldon) and my first big break in radio. And, as a result, I lived here for many years and came to know and like it as any native New Yorker does."

This real success that Ralph speaks of came after many more years than to most people in show business — mostly because he had so early a beginning in the field.

As early as 15, Edwards had already decided on a show business career. He wrote and acted in his first play at the age of six in the first grade when he lived on a farm near his birthplace of Merino.

Wrote Sketches

When his high school presented an hour entertainment on the local radio station, Ralph was chosen to write the sketches. His work so impressed the station manager that he hired Ralph as a script-writer—at a dollar a script.

At 16, Ralph was, perhaps, the youngest script writer in radio doing a five-day-a-week, 15-minute show. It was called "Alvin and Betty," and concerned the comic antics of a young married couple.

An impromptu title hung on him at the station was "world's youngest marriage consultant."

Ralph majored in English at the U. of California and received his A.B. degree in 1935. He also attended Merritt Business College in Oakland, where he studied typing, shorthand and general business.

While attending college, Ralph paid his expenses by working for radio station KTAB (later known as KSFC). Ralph served as announcer, actor, producer, writer and sound effects man, among other duties.

Following graduation in 1935,

Ralph worked for one year at KSFQ's San Francisco studios. Then he auditioned at KPFO, San Francisco, and won a post there from February to July 16, 1936. At that time, Ralph received a card from a former classmate, Sam Taylor, saying if he came to New York, he could get him a walk-on in a play.

After three months of unemployment, Ralph's hopes brightened when CBS announced auditions for a staff announcer and he won the position.

Within two years, he was one of the highest paid announcers in the country, doing 45 network shows a week. In 1939, he sought for a single show "of his own."

"Truth or Consequence" was recorded one afternoon in New York when Edwards held a children's show audience over to try out his new program idea.

Edwards' national reputation as host-emcee was established on this show. During World War II, he used the program to help sell over a half billion dollars in war bonds.

His highly successful "This Is Your Life" program was actually an outgrowth of one of the features on "Truth or Consequences."

Ralph broadened his scope in

1955 to include a "This Is Your Life" series in Great Britain with Eamonn Andrews as his English counterpart.

He has five production companies, four of which are named for the zodiac birthday signs of his daughters, his wife and himself.

Ralph is an enthusiastic church member and spends much of his free time aiding the YMCA or appearing at charity functions.
