Autopsy Slated On Dead Baby

New London, Aug. 15 (AP)—An autopsy was scheduled to be performed today on a 3-months old baby who died this morning under what police termed "suspicious circumstances."

The child, Earlene Denise Littlejohn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Littlejohn, 37 Federal St., was carried to police headquarters by the mother at 7:30 a.m. from their home only a few steps away.

From there the child was taken to Lawrence Memorial Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival. The autopsy was ordered by Medical Examiner Harold H. Irwin after bruises were found on the baby's body, police said.

The mother, Mrs. Joan Littlejohn, 17, was questioned this morning by detectives. The father is a crewman on the submarine Dogfish at the Submarine Base in Groton.

Johnson Calls for Pay-Go Medical Care for Elderly

Folsom Urges U.S. to Develop Aged Aid Plan

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—Former Secretary of Welfare Marion B. Folsom said the federal government should develop a sound program of health insurance for the aged.

Folsom spoke at exercises celebrating the 25th anniversary of the signing of the Social Security Act on Aug. 14, 1935, against a backdrop of congressional controversy over medical care for the elderly.

The former secretary said the kind of health insurance program he feels should be developed would provide protection "only for that part of the risk which is very difficult to handle on a private basis."

Now a director and management advisor at the Eastman Kodak Co., Folsom was secretary of welfare from 1955 through 1958. Earlier he served as a member of the Advisory Council on Economic Security which assisted in drawing up the 1935 social security act.

He said the social security system has been kept on a sound basis and has been "very useful in our efforts to prevent dependency which arises from unemployment, death or disability of the breadwinner, and old age."

But employers and individuals have continuing responsibilities in helping provide for such times of need, Folsom said.

While various programs sponsored by the government and by employers can provide basic protection against life's major economic hazards, he said, the individual to obtain the protection he desires should have a plan of systematic savings.

"Fortunately," the secretary said, "this philosophy has long been accepted by our people and evidenced by the substantial growth in the many forms of savings and insurance."

Folsom called on employers to improve their pension plans or inaugurate such programs if they do not have them. He also urged employers to make greater efforts to stabilize production in order to reduce unemployment. If employers are not doing so already, Folsom said they should contribute toward the cost of health insurance plans, adopt adequate plans for sickness allowance and encourage savings by employees.

GOP Senators Accused Of Obstructive Tactics

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas said today Congress can have a brief and productive session if Republicans don't use obstructive tactics. But he made it unmistakable that he wasn't predicting.

With tongue in cheek, Johnson told a news conference: "I believe that the progress made during the first week of this session has indicated that we can have a brief and productive session which will continue the work of the 86th Congress. But it is equally obvious that if concerted efforts are made to inject extraneous issues, we could be here a long, long time."

Republicans have threatened to offer filibuster-appealing civil rights amendments to bills they oppose.

U.S. Successes Hailed 'Surprises' Promised By Soviet Space Chief

Stockholm, Aug. 15 (AP)—The world's top space scientists today hailed the latest American satellite successes and coming Soviet surprises at a cosmic congress take-off party here which lasted until early this morning.

Russia's No. one Sputnik expert, Prof. Leonid I. Sedov, drank to the American Discoverer XIII capsule recovery and the Echo globe-orbiting relay station.

Dr. Werner von Braun, German-born rocket pioneer heading the American space-conquering Saturn project, toasted the great Soviet lunar probes.

It was a warmup "booster" assembly for the 11th International Astronautical Congress which opened here this morning. More than 550 delegates from 32 countries were present, with the American delegation outnumbering the Soviet 150 to 7.

Russians present included Sputnik expert Anatoli Blagonravov and Alexander Mikhailov, head of the Leningrad Observatory. American delegates included Teodor van Karman, astronautical adviser born in Hungary; Andrew G. Haley, former president of the International Astronautical Federation; and N. W. Snyder of the Institute for Defense Analysis in Washington.

Sedov, President of the International Astronautical Federation and head of the 7-man Soviet delegation, flew into Stockholm promising "surprises." He assured newsmen that his large brown attache case was "full of secrets."

But Sedov brushed away all technical questions with a friendly smile and a vague reply. "Everything is going as we planned," was his favorite answer. Asked if the Soviet Union is

Americans Go Home Laotian King Names Neutralist Premier

Vientiane, Laos, Aug. 15 (AP)—King Savang Vatthana has agreed to the demands of the military rebels in Laos and named one of the nation's leading neutralists as premier, the rebel command announced today.

Vientiane Radio said the king had accepted the resignation of pro-western premier Tiao Somsanith and his cabinet and asked Prince Souvanna Phouma, president of the National Assembly and the rebels' nominee for premier, to form a new government.

The rebel leader, 35-year-old Capt. King Le, said rebel negotiators in the royal seat of Luang Prabang, 120 miles north of Vientiane, had cabled him news of the king's action. He said they planned to return to Vientiane with Somsanith and members of his cabinet, who were promised safety.

Announcement of the king's action was cheered by a crowd of about 3,000 outside the rebel command headquarters.

Somsanith's government began toppling Saturday night when the National Assembly in Vientiane adopted a no confidence resolution as a crowd of 5,000 outside yelled "Americans go home."

This first open demonstration against the United States was the main economic prop of this Asian kingdom — occurred when the crowd spied foreigners among the bystanders.

"Americans go home, we don't want you," youths in the crowd shouted. Some carried banners saying "Let's kick out Americans and those who follow them."

A critical stage in the week-old seamen's strike comes when the Cunarder Queen Elizabeth docks at Southampton from New York tonight. If her crew joins the strike, hundreds of American tourists will be stranded.

Police, Doctors Disagree Drugged Girls' Mother Possibly Mentally Ill

Cleveland, Aug. 15 (AP)—Medical and hospital authorities believe the 29-year-old mother of this city's "sleeping beauties" is in need of mental treatment.

But police, who say Mrs. Lillian Frantantonio admitted feeding her two small daughters sleep-inducing drugs, want to press for criminal charges against her.

A series of conferences today by city and county officials may determine the outcome of the strange case. The plight of Bernadette Frantantonio, 3, of Venita, 5, drew nationwide attention when they were thought to be medical mysteries.

Physicians were baffled over why the girls would drift into a coma at unexplained intervals. Then the explanation came late last week: Traces of barbiturates were found in the veins of the girls.

Sgt. Norman Ferris said the mother admitted Saturday night she had been feeding the girls drugs—for 11 months in the case of Bernadette and since last month for Venita.

"This is strictly a mental case," said County Coroner Samuel R. Gerber. "She cannot be considered a criminal." A similar observation was made by Dr. Earl E. Smith, pediatrician of the drug-saturated

But Detective Inspector Richard R. Wagner had different ideas. "It is not my job to provide alibis for persons who commit felonies," he said yesterday. "It is up to the courts to say that it is to submit to mental examination and treatment."

"Remember that these children almost died. I have no other course to take."

Hamilton Sets Production of New Propeller

Windsor Locks, Aug. 15 (AP)—A new propeller that the manufacturer says can give prop-driven aircraft more power in taking off and climbing has been announced by the Hamilton Standard division of United Aircraft Corp.

A full scale prototype of the new propeller should be ready in nine months the company said yesterday.

George Rosen of West Hartford, the Hamilton Standard aeronautical engineer, who came up with the new design, described it as a variable-blade type with two adjustable blades on a single hub. Chamber is the curvature of the propeller blade.

"The double blade," Rosen said, "puts a flap on a propeller much as a flap would be put on an airplane wing to increase takeoff lift and cruising speed."

High-speed transports could increase their range by as much as 30 per cent and 60 miles per hour could be added to the speed of low level attack planes by such propellers, he said.

Hamilton Standard said the new propeller is the first to employ adjustable camber to increase or decrease lift.

Committee Bill Hit as Inadequate

Washington, Aug. 15 (AP)—Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas called today for a pay-as-you-go system of medical care for the elderly.

Johnson, the Democratic vice presidential nominee, joined Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the party standard bearer, in criticizing terms of a bill approved Saturday by the Senate Finance Committee.

"The committee measure is inadequate and does not meet the problem of medical care for the needy," Johnson told a news conference. "We should put this on a pay-as-you-go basis, linked to the social security system."

The committee-approved measure would provide for federal grants to be matched by the states for medical care of indigent elderly.

Kennedy has announced he will fight on the floor to change the committee-approved bill.

Johnson said the provision calling for state matching of funds would subject the program to the vagaries of annual or semi-annual meetings of state legislatures. He said this would make the problem of caring for the elderly "very complicated."

Johnson said the medical care bill will be considered by the Senate after it concludes work on a pending measure to raise the \$1 minimum wage to \$1.25 and expand the coverage of the law.

He said, however, that if a mutual security appropriations bill is ready first, it will get priority over the medical care measure.

The Democratic leader said he believes the people are willing to meet the medical care problem on a "pay-as-you-go" basis.

"At the time I was notified she was becoming weaker," Mrs. Kay said. "We felt it was probably mediated, she would be all right."

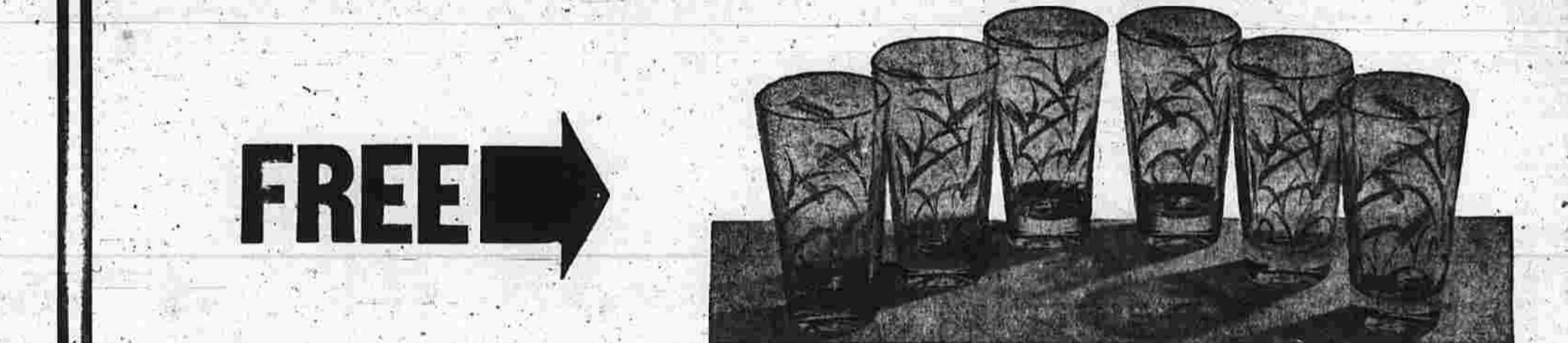

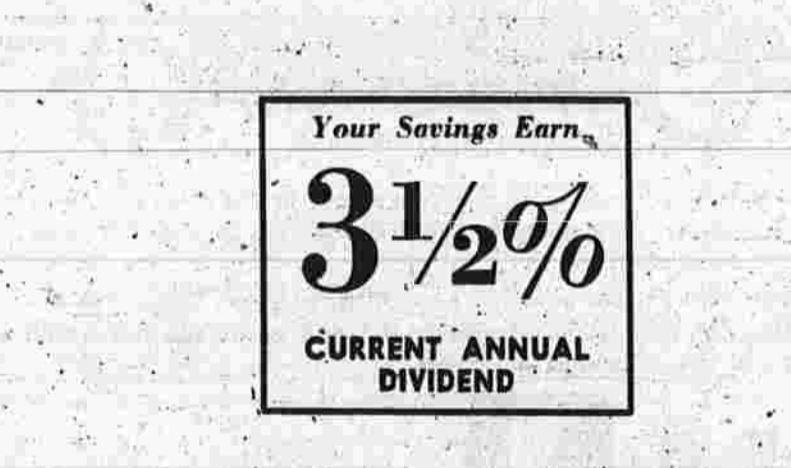

**Behind In Our Homework**

In his news conference of Aug. 12, President Eisenhower repeatedly and passionately to the "disappointing and discouraging" record of the nuclear test ban negotiable since Geneva, and hinted that he might soon be about to order a resumption of underground nuclear testing for us.

The import of his comment was clear enough. He was blaming the Russians for lack of progress at Geneva.

In the New York Times of Aug. 12, A. M. Rosenthal, that news analyst of the status of the Geneva negotiations to date and concluded that "Western nuclear diplomacy is frozen in Geneva. It will remain so until a struggle is resolved in Washington."

The struggle in Washington which Rosenthal outlined was the continuing struggle between those members and agencies of the Eisenhower administration which believe in negotiating an international treaty banning nuclear tests and those which oppose any such treaty under any conditions because they want the United States to remain free to conduct as many test explosions as it pleases.

This battle has never been more than tentatively resolved with a decision that we would go to Geneva and see what the Russians would agree to. But that has happened, according to Rosenthal's analysis, been any clear administration decision that we should ourselves present at Geneva, just as we would agree to, for our part, hence his conclusion that there can be no real showdown in Geneva until Washington decides just what it itself will or will not do.

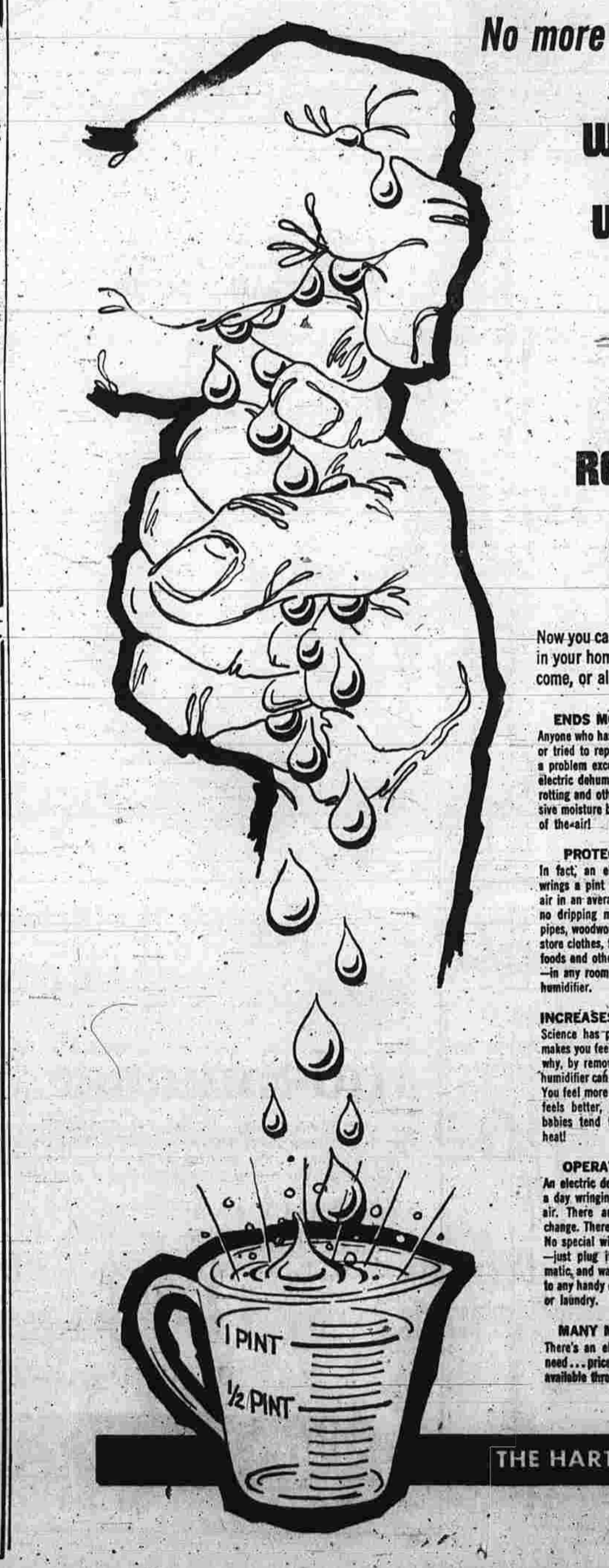
A new chapter in that success story which is also the outstanding American failure story is about to be written. By Department of Agriculture latest estimates, the farm of America in the year 1960 are going to surpass all previous production records. This will be the biggest year ever. Give us very favorable weather for the rest of the summer; and it will be the greatest by far.

Within the framework of our agricultural and economic policy as it stands, the area of production success is also news of costly failure. 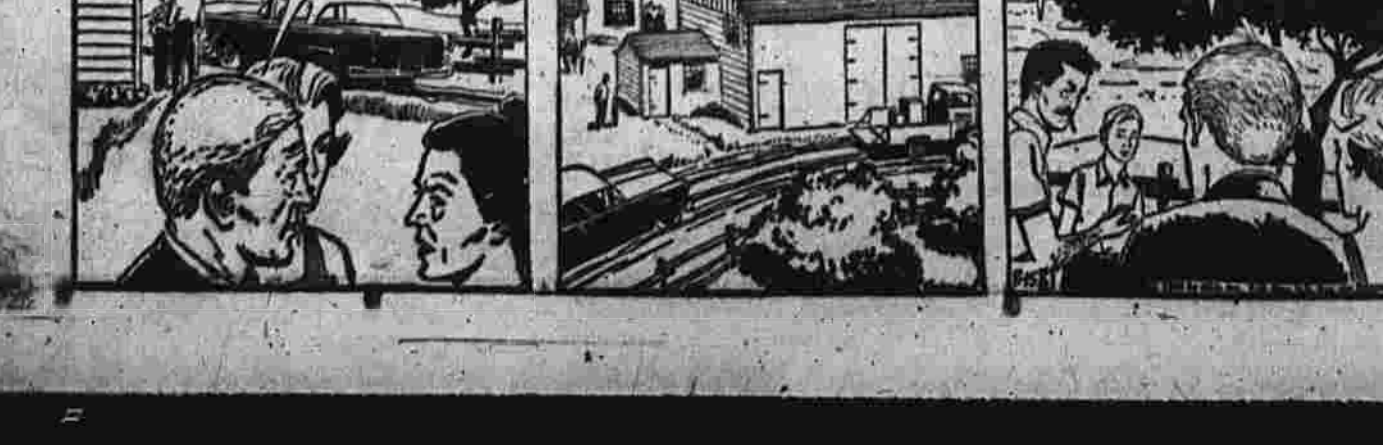

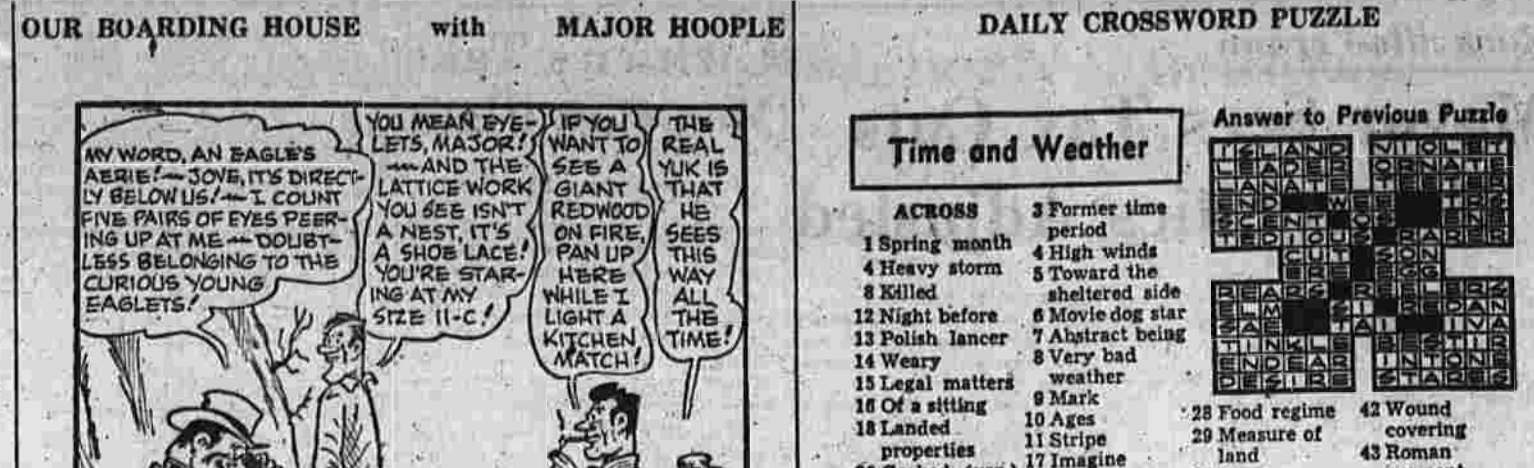

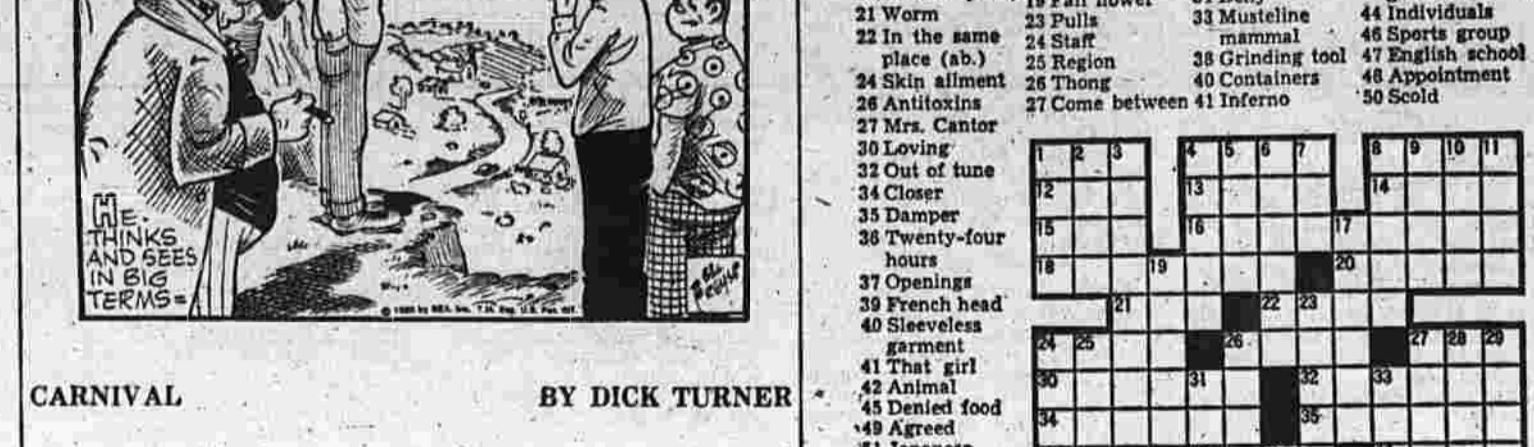
