As You Like It

We've just had the pleasure of reading Manchester Director Theodore Powell's book, "The Long Rescue." Published by Doubleday, it is the story of the Adolphus Greely expedition to Ellesmere Island in the Arctic in 1883. The small band of men had to spend three winters there, although it had supplies for only two winters. Powell has drawn from a wealth of material, including the diaries kept by the men during the period of starvation. He achieved dramatic effect by simply relating fact after fact on a day after day basis.

His stayed as close as possible to the words used by the men, especially in the passages of dialogue which he had to piece together from different versions of the same incidents. At times, Powell's own choice of words and his chopped sentences are unconformably similar to the diaries, but the general tenor of the writing helps to build the tension.

His central figure, Adolphus Greely, is not an easy one to understand or sympathize with. About as dedicated to duty as the man gave few indications of his emotions in his own diary. And the references to him in the diaries of his men were frequently critical, or at least unkind. It is a father figure in more than one way to his men, and in that role something to plot against and blame conditions on. Those who have some way of life to which they are wholly dedicated, are the envy of the rest of us.

Powell has lived his account of the day to day progress with mentions of details that make the time intimate. For instance, he tells of the time the men were about to make camp at Cape Sabine for the winter, and had uncovered a cache of supplies wrapped in newspapers. The men were delighted not only with the supplies, but with the newspapers themselves.

Now, from a scrap of newspaper which had been wrapped around a lemon, Greely learned the President (Garfield) had died. Powell has not withheld anything of the animal deaths to which the men fell, including the doctor who stole food from a man he was treating. The squabbling between those who were dying and those who had a little more life in them, the pleasure of the men when there was one less mouth to feed.

Now he is sited on his account of Sgt. George Rice, a man of great physical courage and loyalty. Rice was a combination of all the good qualities a man can have: intelligence, physical ability, compassion, restraint. Powell's admiration of the man reveals itself all through the book and with good cause.

In addition to the account of the expedition, Powell has interspersed the story with accounts of what was going on back in this country in the way of rescue attempts. We recommend the book to anyone who likes his history stories to read with the same verve of today's paper.

of some \$6,000,000 of the bond issue which was needed to pay the bonus. In 1959, a total of \$40,000,000 in new bonds at a 4% interest rate to the state. It was charged, the \$6,000,000 in bonds was sold by the state at a loss of some \$557,500 in order to put the money into the general fund. The report by the two auditors brands this transaction "questionable investment policy."

It further charged "less than prudent judgment" was involved in the overall handling of these funds. The auditors said the comptroller was criticized for his handling of the bonus funds account because the bonus account was not segregated but was included in the general fund account.

The auditors listed several improvements which they said should be made in the operation of the comptroller's office. The annual report should be revised to include "complete and accurate statements of the financial position and operations of individual units of the state" because the information relating to individual funds "is not discernible."

Also, the report urged "establishment of a truly coordinated and integrated system of centralized accounting and processing of data" to include other departments such as the treasurer, finance and control, personnel and auditors.

KILL BY KINDNESS TO WIN AT BRIDGE. Sometimes the best way to kill a bridge hand is by kindness. Give your opponent more than he expects and most important, more than he really wants.

Directors Can't Agree On Rules for Hearing

A discussion of rules last night for hearing allegations against General Manager Richard Martin turned into the hearing itself, as some Democrats fear will be the nature of the hearing itself.

Mayor and Board Chairman Eugene T. Kelly tangled with his own Democratic majority led by Thomas F. Powell, over what form the hearing will take.

And after six hours of wrangling, it was still unknown whether the Board next Tuesday night will have a formal hearing limited to Democrat John Hutchinson's specific criticisms of Martin's accounting procedures, as Martin has requested, or whether it will meet for a "discussion," as Powell wants.

The meeting ended in a standstill with Kelly and Republican Thomas Bailey demanding that question be limited to a bill of particulars against Martin, which would be found true or false, after testimony by a Board vote.

Instead, Powell, backed by fellow Democrats Francis Mahoney, Alton Lamson, and Philip Freeman, wanted a "discussion" in which all the questions about administrative procedure in Hutchinson's July statement, as well as the specific criticisms of Martin, could be sounded out. This, he argued, would be a means of finding ways for possible "administrative improvements" as well as satisfying Martin's desires.

Kelly said this could amount to a way of turning Martin's request into an investigation of Martin himself. The mayor added that he was unfamiliar and against all known procedure not to be held in advance, as in a bill of particulars, what questions will be asked of Powell.

Kelly plan in general, Kelly said, "You can use all the fancy language you want, or you can have it still not holding the hearing, the manager has requested into what he feels are charges against his competency, sincerity, and honesty."

For the hearing, a "bill of particulars" had been drafted by the town council's office setting forth Hutchinson's charges that Martin gave out inaccurate information, concealed unneeded and unintelligent accounting procedures, and that an effort was made to sabotage a prediction Hutchinson had made of the 1959-60 budget surplus.

The Democrats last night repeated that Hutchinson didn't really intend to make any charges, but just used unflattering phrasing in his statement released simultaneously to Martin and the press July 29.

Mahoney said Hutchinson was upset over a report which Martin gave at an hour when most Directors are "too groggy to understand, and subsequent 'big headlines' which said Hutchinson's surplus was only \$11,000 without pointing out other income would also be received this year, too late to be classified as "surplus."

However, the majority following that report, and the report itself, made these facts clear. Mahoney today acknowledged that this might be true. But he contends that an unfavorable impression was still created that apparently made Hutchinson "a little nervous" to inform the public.

Mahoney said the matter is being blown up into a "big play of words all over the place" . . . "a Perry Mason, Alford Hitchcock thing."

Butley said things would be different had Hutchinson "investigated the facts and used care with his words. He also said the criticisms were serious enough to compel the Board to grant Martin's request for a hearing on them to keep the public from having to guess as to their truth."

The Democrats did not disagree with this, but at, during or before any hearing, they want Hutchinson's questions to be given the spotlight to the same degree as his criticisms. Martin has since publicly answered the questions Hutchinson raised on procedure, but not under questioning by the Board, or personally to Hutchinson. So far as Powell was concerned, no "charges" have yet come before the Board of Directors—technical, and in calling for a "discussion" instead of a "hearing," he refused to recognize the existence of any.

One suggestion last night was that Martin write a letter answering Hutchinson's questions, and that a formal hearing then be held Tuesday.

Bailey agreed the manager could be asked to do this, but he said he commented that Martin should repeat Hutchinson's statement as an "insult" and refuse to answer it.

Added today, Martin said he would answer the questions if the Board adds this.

This suggested the plan because the board appears to be divided 4 to 4, with Kelly and the Republicans against Powell and the Democrats.

Other suggestions tossed about last night were that no hearing be held at all (Mahoney); postpone the hearing (Mrs. Lamson); that Martin and Hutchinson get together personally and answer differences "like gentlemen" (Mrs. Lamson); that the formal procedure set down by the town council, providing for testimony under oath and the like, be followed (Bailey); that Hutchinson make a public apology (Bailey); that a committee be appointed (Mahoney); and that more meetings be held to discuss things further (Mrs. Lamson).

Hutchinson himself is on vacation in Milquam, N. J., beginning in touch by phone.

Senate Rejects GOP Second Bid to Soften Kennedy's Wage Bill

Washington, Aug. 18 (AP)—The Senate today rejected a second Republican attempt to water down Sen. John F. Kennedy's minimum wage bill.

It defeated 56-41 a substitute offered by Sen. William L. Proxmire (R-Vt.) which would have trimmed benefits and added only 280,000 workers to the wage-hour measure.

Proxmire's proposal was much closer to the version approved by the Democratic presidential nominee yesterday by Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (R-Ill) which was beaten 54-38.

Proxmire argued his substitute amounted to a realistic compromise which would have some chance of winning acceptance and finally becoming law.

He said he was accepting some things in the Kennedy measure which he did not personally agree in order to take a middle-of-the-road position.

But Dirksen contended the substitute would deprive the most underpaid workers in the country of some of the most important benefits of the law.

The Proxmire substitute would have exempted from the Labor Standards Act coverage about 400,000 employees of auto dealers and 407,000 workers in hotels, motels and restaurants.

U.S. to Join Venezuela In Condemning Trujillo

San Jose, Costa Rica, Aug. 18 (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter was expected to throw the weight of the United States today behind a Venezuelan move to condemn the Dominican Republic for aggression.

But Herter may caution the other foreign ministers in the Organization of American States (OAS) against the total quarantine from the dictatorship asked by Venezuela.

With a private meeting scheduled this morning, Herter was to be the speaker of the occasion. The Foreign Ministers were gathered on a crucial phase of their 3-day-old meeting, judging Venezuela's charge that Dominican officials conspired in the attempt to assassinate Venezuelan President Romulo Betancourt.

Venezuelan Foreign Minister Ignacio Luis Araya called yesterday for a virtual quarantine of the Dominican Republic after noting that the special OAS investigating committee had accused Dominican officials of backing the abortive June 24 plot against the president.

Araya asked for a breakthrough in diplomatic relations and communications with the Dominican Republic as well as a suspension of Dominican intervention in the affairs of other nations.

He also appeared to leave the door open for lesser measures than the total quarantine, saying the United States should have done so in San Jose 60 hours ago if the measure were applied.

Police Plan Ring Around New London

New London, Aug. 18 (AP)—State Police will throw a ring of troopers around this city Sunday afternoon virtually sealing it off from outside traffic.
