The UConn plays will be "Clemens" Oct. 21; "Romeo and Juliet," Nov. 16; "Harvey," Dec. 2; "Rashomon," March 14; "The Crucible," April 1; and "Guys and Dolls," May 6.

The film series will feature "Member of the Wedding," Oct. 10; "Oedipus Rex," Nov. 20; "Cyrano de Bergerac," Feb. 20; and "The Barretts of Wimpole Street," March 20.

For \$8.00, non-students may attend all the plays and all of the movies.

Nine States Pick Slates Gov. Furcolo Defeated In Bay State Primary

(Continued from Page One)
major candidates were unopposed in their parties and the races shaped up as tests of relative party strength.
Here are the other state outcomes:
Minnesota
Democratic Gov. Orville Freeman won a fourth term nomination by a more than 7 to 1 margin over a political unknown. Sen. Hubert Humphrey, unopposed, was leading the top Republican candidate for his seat. Mayor P. Kenneth Peterson of Minneapolis led the total GOP vote was bigger than Humphrey's.
Wisconsin
Freeman's GOP opponent, Elmer Anderson, who was unopposed, was trailing the governor in the popularity poll.
Former Rep. Coys Knutson, fighting to regain the seat she lost two years ago, had a slim margin over State Sen. Roy Wise for the Democratic nomination on the basis of incomplete returns.
Another popular contest, this one an apparent standoff. Democratic Gov. Gaylord Nelson and his opponent, former GOP state chairman Philip G. Kuehn, both were unopposed. They appeared about evenly matched in the light voting.
New Hampshire
Gov. Wesley Powell won another close victory in the Republican gubernatorial nomination race over former Gov. Hugh Gregg. With returns almost complete, Powell led 48,201 to 45,241. It was a virtual repeat of a Powell-Gregg photo finish two years ago. A third candidate trailed badly.
Bernard L. Levin, former Democratic national committee member, walked away with his party's gubernatorial nomination. Sen. Styles Bridges (R) and two incumbent GOP congressmen, Rep. Chester E. Murrell and Perkins Bass, won re-election easily.
Prof. Herbert W. Hill, a Dartmouth College history professor, had a harder time disposing of two rivals for the Democratic nomination.
Gov. Robert T. Stafford won the GOP nomination for Vermont's only seat in the House. Rep. William H. Meyer, the first Democrat elected to Congress from Vermont in more than 100 years, won re-nomination to oppose him.
Youthful State House Speaker F. Ray Keyser Jr. won the GOP nomination for governor, edging Lt. Gov. Robert E. Hobcock by 86 votes. The 4-way race was so close the official canvass of votes could possibly change the picture.
Colorado
Franklin Stewart, a Pueblo attorney, won the Democratic congressional nomination in the third district, defeating veteran Fred M. Betz. In the only other congressional race, Robert D. Reininger defeated Carl S. Becker for

Truman Reports 'Dirty Pamphlets'

New York, Sept. 14 (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman said today he thinks the Republicans have a nationwide campaign to circulate all the dirty pamphlets they can find on religion.
Truman made the assertion during his customary morning stroll while on a visit here. At one point he remarked:
"In my home town the Republicans are sending out all the dirty pamphlets they can find on religion."
A reporter among those accompanying him asked if he thought the campaign was part of a nationwide one and Truman replied:
"Yes, I think so."
Truman described the pamphlets as "very sheets" resembling "the dirty sheets" which they used against Al Smith in the 1928 campaign, the tightest race in the otherwise calm primary.
There were no Republican contests and only five Democratic contests for state offices on the ballot.

Science At Work

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

Prospecting for flowers, searching for diamonds, drilling through space on solar winds, here is news of science at work:

Oases of Ore

Flowers and plants, reaching down through surface soil, offer bring up hints of what secret minerals and ores lie underneath. Certain plants and mushrooms, plants for instance, indicate the presence of zinc. Other plants, plants and mosses may predict copper.

When present in large amounts, metals may act as poisons, making plants ailments possible indicators.

Starchy roots, leaf scorch and spotting may mean aluminum. Queen sheeps foot may mean uranium.

Plants can also be analyzed for minerals they contain, an indication of the soil that nourished them, reports geologist Helen L. Cannon in the Journal of Science.

This Way, Progress

Are American children any more honest than children from other lands?

Yes, says Dr. Harold and Gladys Anderson, husband-wife research team from Michigan State University.

They put this simple test to 8,000 children in the United States, Europe and Latin America. Finish the story—two boys playing football in a forbidden field, broke a window with the ball.

Children from other countries most frequently refused to group boys ran away, concealing their identity and their deed. U.S. children usually saw the boys come, confessing and offering to pay for the window—though sometimes after a delay.

Winds in Space

The Echo balloon satellite has reported contents that it would be possible to sail through space, propelled by the solar wind.

Echo is pressed some 14 miles nearer the Earth each day by the push of solar radiation, data from the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory.

However, though the idea intrigues, it isn't likely to be practical, says Dr. James Van Allen, director of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Space may be needed to escape some hazards in space.

Hardly Ever-Land

An Atlas of the unseen side of the moon will be published by the Soviet Academy of Sciences before the end of the year.

The Atlas contains a detailed map of the moon's hidden side, and many photos from the pictures taken during the flight of the Soviet lunar that circled the moon.

Fire-Water Traffic

Dams harness the mighty Columbia River in the Pacific Northwest to create electricity. But they create problems too.

Salmon and steelhead trout that instinctively swim up river to spawn must pass the dams. Up to 20 per cent of a fish's cost may be needed to provide avenues to get through fish past the dams.

But an far no way is provided to get fish down past the dams. Numbers are destroyed in turbines and spillways. Now Paul E. Fields of the University of Washington has devised a system of lights to guide fish away from dangerous areas.

The fish are apparently attracted by light, so lights can lead them to fish ladders and other safe avenues of escape.

Invisible Fish

An invisible fish—only one or two inches long—has been found in the loose coral sand at the sea bottom around the Marshall and Mariana Islands of the Pacific.

The fish, called a sand diver, has a body as clear as the clearest glass. Only two black dots—the eyes—can be seen easily.

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




