There are storm sewers, sidewalks, a swimming pool—all part of a beefed-up capital improvements program this year.

About \$45,000 worth of permanent paving is being put on 13 streets by Frank Kapla, of Hartford. The Jarvis Construction Co. holds an \$11,000 contract for regrading between Bolton St. and Schaller Rd. and one for a \$16,000 Main and Leonard St. storm sewer. A \$58,000 storm sewer is being installed for the North Junior High School by the Maskel Co. of South Windsor. Charles Ponticelli is putting down \$5,000 worth of sidewalks on Porter St. and Rudd & Murray, N. Attleboro, Mass., is building the swimming pool at the Verplanck School for \$29,000.

The senator from Washington charged that the "mask of respectability" slipping from the vice president.

Jackson said the people had hoped that "The Mr. Nixon of 1960 had abandoned the lower road of his previous campaigns for the high."

Jackson said Nixon was trying to "incite the loyal opposition of the Democratic party with diabolicality."

Other programs I have discussed. Some of that increase can be financed from savings on other programs—cutting down our farm surpluses and reducing waste in the Pentagon, for example. Some of it may have to be financed by a shift in our spending programs until our priority needs have been met. Others can be financed through closing tax loopholes and better enforcing our tax laws.

Some programs—such as medical care for the aged and self-liquidating power projects—are not a burden on the taxpayer.

Above all, I am convinced that a nation on the move, growing at a more rapid rate than we have for the past eight years—with many people working and more industries operating at full capacity—will produce far more revenue without an increase in taxes. But there is no doubt in my mind that the American people would need any sacrifice asked of them if it meant the difference in our survival and national security.

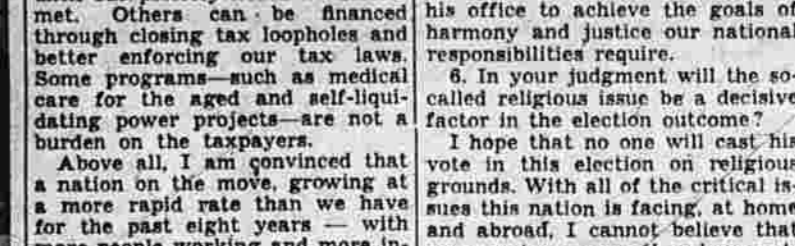

The Congo crisis touched off the heavy Soviet attack on him and he said he would be asked the privilege of replying to the Assembly by his position. He recalled that he had received a Security Council mandate to restore peace and order in the Congo, and an over-riding confidence on his activities there. Without mentioning either Congo or his Soviet attackers, Hammarskjöld told the Assembly he was facing a choice.

"It is not a question of the man but of the instrument," Hammarskjöld said. "A UN force cannot be permitted to become a party to any internal conflict."

He indicated he may speak again as the session's historical debate.

"Independence, impartiality and objectivity must be the attributes of the Secretary-General and he must find clear expression in the UN charter," Hammarskjöld said.

"I would rather see that office break on the basis of independence, impartiality and objectivity than drift on the basis of compromise."

He said the Assembly faces a question of principle and not merely a matter of convenience for the moment.

A star-studded cast of government leaders listened, including Khrushchev, Indian Prime Minister Nehru, Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic, and British Prime Minister Harold Wilson. Hammarskjöld is expected to play a large part in carrying the Western counter-offensive against Khrushchev's proposals and maneuvers.

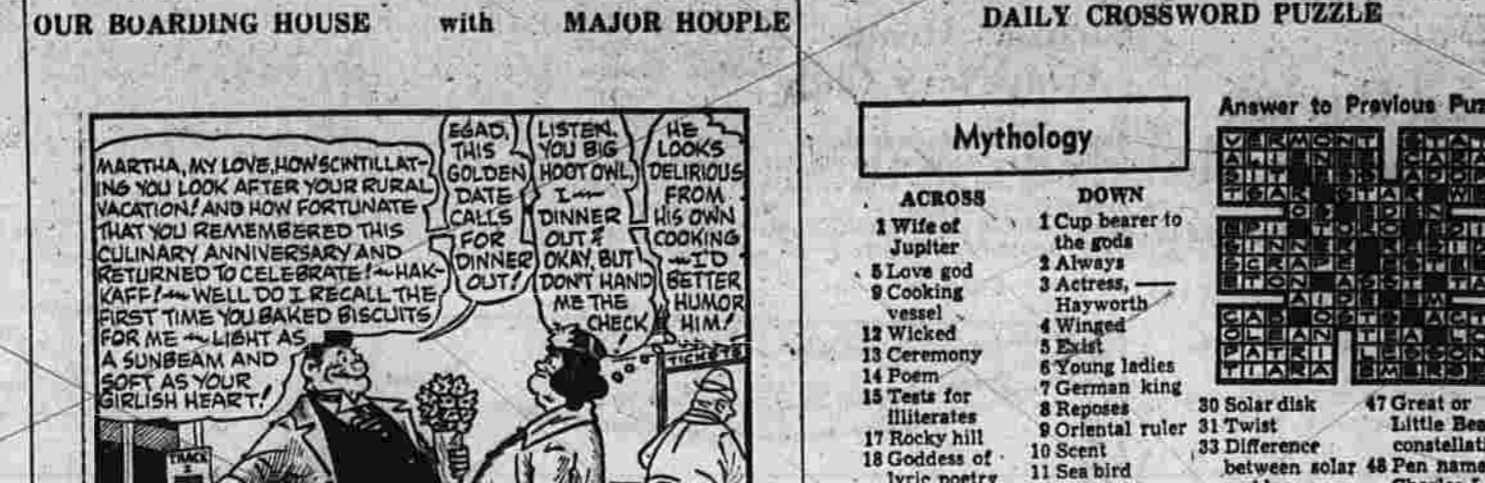

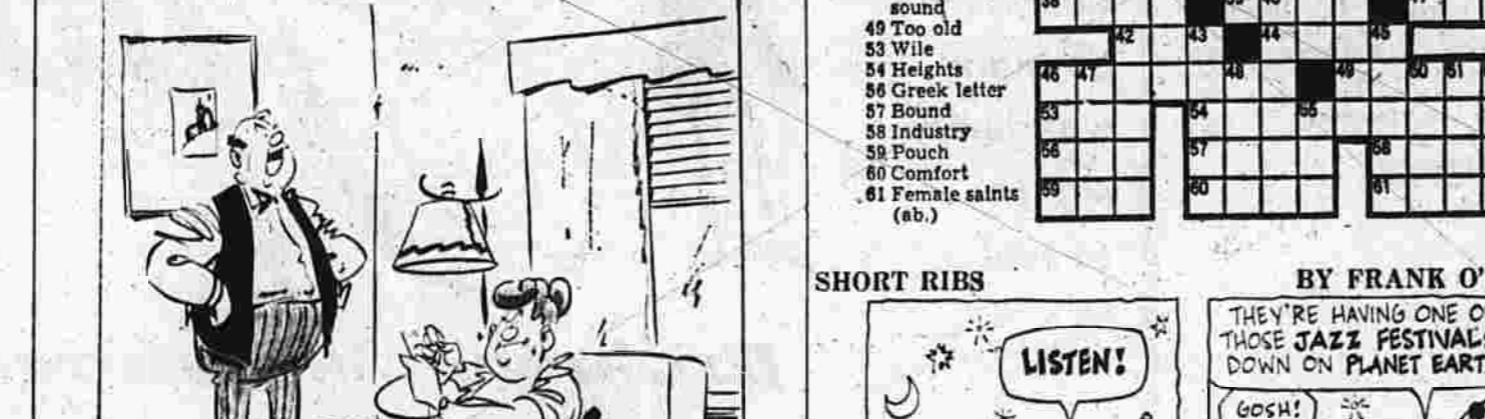

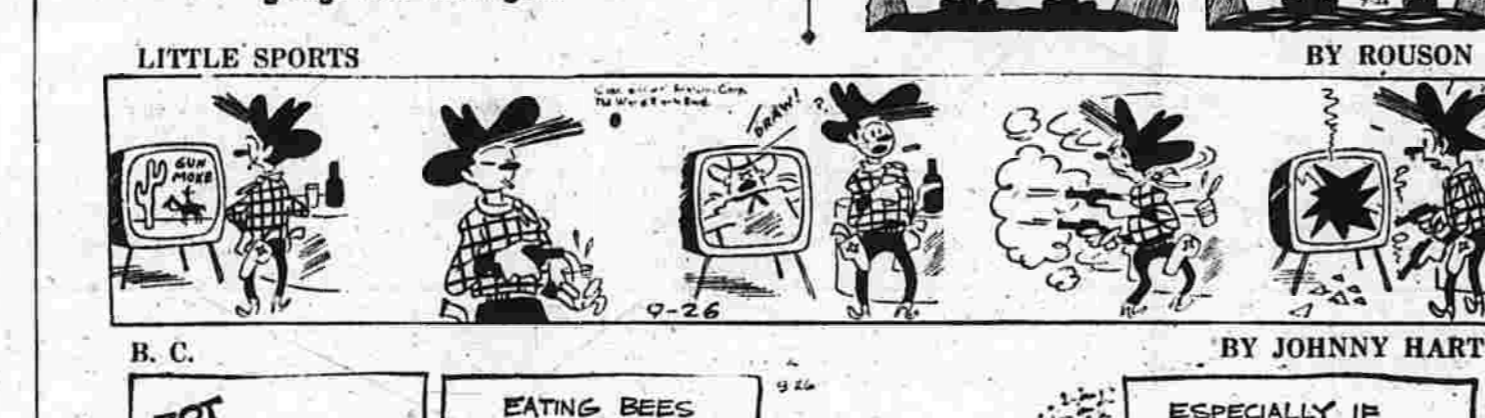
