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South Windsor Town Adopts Charter In Decisive 6-1 Vote

Council-manager town government for South Windsor was given overwhelming approval Monday by voters at a special charter referendum. Of all ballots cast, 84.6 per cent favored the change. About 42 per cent of the town's 4,900 voters turned out.

Of the 1,901 voters who turned out, 1,582 voted in favor of the change to council-manager government, with 285 opposed. The town now operates under the town meeting-board of selectmen system.

The new form of government will go into effect in October of 1961 following an election on the first Monday of the month to choose members of the council and all other elective offices.

John Madigan, chairman of the committee which drafted the charter plan, members included William Couglin, Jr., R. Chase Lauby, Edwin A. Looman, Leroy F. Leonard, Jr., Fred W. Lewis, and George W. Stone.

Joseph Miles was election moderator.

Considerable public interest in the charter referendum was shown here Saturday as 156 new voters enrolled during a registration drive in the town hall.

Mrs. Joseph Granger, Democrat registration officer, said that included 74 Democrats, 44 unaffiliated, and 38 others.

The new form of government in South Windsor as of Oct. 1, Mrs. Granger added, is 448.

Lifer Wins Appeal for Deportation

Hartford, Oct. 4 (AP)—A New Haven man who was sentenced to death for the 1948 hold-up-killing of a New Haven jeweler had his sentence commuted yesterday by the State Parole Board.

The action was taken after Philip Tomasi, 70, pleaded for his freedom so he could be deported to Italy to die. Some years ago the board commuted Tomasi's death sentence to life imprisonment.

Major condition of the commutation was the immediate deportation of Tomasi to Italy, where he had 77 habeas corpus writs pending before him.

The board was told there was a deportation warrant for Tomasi outstanding at the prison.

The board declined mercy petitions for these other convicts who sought freedom:

George Lovin, 33, Stamford, who was sentenced to a life term for the hold-up slaying of Grover Hart, night watchman at the Indian Harbor Yacht Club, Greenwich, July 23, 1942.

James Buteau, 42, and Albert Bernard, 46, both of Meriden, who shot and killed an assistant manager of a Meriden department store during a robbery Oct. 28, 1948. Buteau was spared from the electric chair by a 1950 commutation.

Robert Rapp, 37, Bridgeport, serving nine and a half years for assault with intent to rape.

Johnnie M. Walker, 45, Stratford, serving four to seven for a 1939 robbery.

Walker asked permission to speak to State Atty. Gen. Lorin W. Willis, who had prosecuted him in 1939.

Housing Bias Hearing In Recess to Oct. 17

Hartford, Oct. 4 (AP)—The State's first formal public hearing under Connecticut's new private housing discrimination law is in recess until Oct. 17.

The action was brought by DeWitt Jones, a New Haven Negro who claimed he had been prohibited from purchasing a home in a Hamden housing development. Named defendants in the case were Albert Swanson, Inc. and his wife, Mrs. Edith F. Swanson, the major stockholder of EPS Inc. Or does he hope, by thus threatening and alarming behavior, to obtain some concessions which he can carry with him when he returns to his own country?

But Khrushchev laid down a clearly implied threat.

"If he himself, meanwhile, keeps holding the United Nations in the only hope of the world. Then he throws more mud at that hope. The one thing he has not done consistently, is to show consistency to date. This is what he has been doing.

GOP Accepts Victory With Complete Poise

The Republican party last night took victory with the same aplomb with which it accepted defeat two years ago.

There was cheering and hand-pumping and victorious Director candidate Harold A. Turkington declared himself "happy as a kid."

But Manchester Republicans are an unperturbed lot compared to their opponents.

The small group waiting at Republican headquarters at 218 Hartford Rd. after the polls closed at 8 p.m. was calm and confident.

"We're winning big," said Atty. John F. Shea Jr., GOP town chairman, as the first telephone and radio reports came in.

At about 8:25, John Bowen brought in the returns from District 5 which, combined with the returns from District 4, secured the present administration.

"The answer is good candidates," opined Director Gilbert Barnes, who did not run for reelection. "All the hopes and the rest of it doesn't amount to a hill of beans if there aren't good candidates."

By 10:30, Democrats outnumbered Republicans at the GOP celebration and post-mortem were flying thick and fast. But one comparatively silent Democrat was Mayor Eugene T. Kelly, who bowed out of this year's race.

The affection and sympathy in the attitude of Republicans who approached him was equalled only by that shown for Cavagnaro.

Asked for comment, the mayor shrugged and said, "What could I say that wouldn't be 'corry'?"

Credits Vice Chairman Don Bates, Form Motorcade.

Turkington burst in, exuberant, shaking hands, making kisses and departing kisses. "I'm so happy," he said, "happy as a kid happy as anyone could be."

The crowd grew and some of its members put on "Vote Republican" hats and went off on a motorcade. Meanwhile, the GOP victory celebration was getting underway, and compared to the Democratic celebration in 1958 in atmosphere and length, it was a diplomatic reception to the Mardi Gras. But Democrats came filtering in to live it up, including Democratic Town Chairman Steve Cavagnaro, with defeat and resignation written in his face.

He checked up his loss after 1958's triumph to Manchester's higher Republican voter registration.

Democratic incumbent William E. Buckley (5,992) retained their seats. Newcomer Mark Kravitz, a Democrat, lost out with 5,717 votes.

The Board term beginning in November, 1961, Republican Christie McCormick (6,716) retained his seat and Republican Theodore Barnes (6,542) and Democrat Ted Cummings (5,921) were elected. Democrat Robert S. Tomass (5,721) lost.

These townables were elected: Republicans James Duffy (6,690), Theodore Barnes (6,542), and Felix Green (6,596) and Democrats Cummings (5,921), Harold Keating (5,921), and Joseph Germaine (5,716).

The district breakdown of the 1958 vote of 12,448—all the records for a town election—was 2,810 in the first, 2,694 in the second, 2,683 in the third, 2,604 in the fourth, and 1,498 in the fifth.

In 10 other municipal elections around the state, the Republicans also returned to power in Southington, where the Democratic incumbent, Joseph K. Lutz, 3,139 to 2,178.

In addition, the GOP elected 13 selectmen in these communities: Windham, Woodbury, Harland, Kent, Barkhamsted and Lebanon.

None of these victories were upsets.

The Democrats were elected first selectmen in Middlefield and Praston. In Middlefield, Democrat William J. Scanlon Jr. won a third term by defeating Republican Kenneth W. Buses, 763 to 684. Democrat Leo

New Jersey's appearance on a continuation of the Eisenhower administration has held the line against inflation and that he will continue these policies.

This represented a change of political pace from that year's election in North Carolina and Virginia when he talked up Republican conservatism, plugging for state's rights and beat the drum about the accomplishment of President Eisenhower.

Nixon told a howling, applauding crowd of about 13,000 persons in the Charlotte Coliseum that "Democrats by the millions are going to vote for our ticket and not the other ticket."

The Vice President got his warmest applause when he defended Eisenhower in the President's dealings with Soviet Premier Khrushchev.

The crowd was about the same size as that which had turned out two weeks ago here for Kennedy. Nixon's plith in Virginia and North Carolina was for a total of 26 electoral votes, compared with New Jersey's 16. In addition, the Vice President predicted he would win the majority of the nine members.

Nixon's invasion of Virginia which Eisenhower carried in the last two elections was confined to Republican Richmond. His political cavalry raid into North Carolina, which Eisenhower couldn't swing, was pointed solely at conservative, Republican Charlotte.

Truth Squad

St. Louis Oct. 4 (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy missed 331 Senate roll calls in seven years, says the Republican "Truth Squad" trailing the Democratic presidential nominee.

At a news conference yesterday, Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., displayed a long printed sheet which he said was a list of roll call votes missed by Kennedy since 1953. He said it was a "truth squad" of the Massachusetts Senate was ill in 1955.

Scott also charged that Kennedy was absent during most of the recent senate debate on medical care for elderly persons and added: "He was on his feet at Hyannis Port. This (the presidency) is no job for a plodder."

The "Truth Squad" was established to follow Kennedy and counter what the Republicans regard as distortions and "unfactual statements."

In addition to Scott, the members are Sen. Roman Hruska of Nebraska, Sen. Kenneth Keating of New York, Rep. Donald L. Jackson of California, Rep. Charles F. Goodell of New York and Rep. Gerald R. Ford Jr. of Michigan.
