charged that the East-West talks in Geneva earlier this year had been used by the western powers to try "to railroad through the 10-nation committee their plans for control over armaments dangerous for the cause of peace and directed, in fact, at creating a system of international espionage."

This was happening, he said, while the United States and its partners in military blocs were simultaneously speeding up military preparations, setting up new military bases, were completing preparations for the treatment of nuclear and rocket weapons to the West German republics.

"Moreover, they took the policy of open military provocations against peace-loving states not stopping short of sending the military aircraft into their air space."

Despite all this, he said, the Soviet Union is to undertake another attempt to reach agreement on disarmament. He made it clear, however, any such agreement would have to be on Soviet terms.

Retirement: Happy Times

Louise in Their 50s Are Not Overlooked Here
"I'm 50. I can't join a golden-age club until I'm 60. Why aren't there organizations for people my age?"

This is a common complaint in big cities. Recently I visited a golden-age center which believes that people in their 50s, as well as those over 60, need such a center. This is Little House in Maple Park, near San Francisco, recently shown off proudly to experts on aging from all over the world. The group was in San Francisco to attend the 1958 International Congress of Gerontology.

"We believe in eating our people into the 60s," I was told. "And those members over 60 enjoy having the younger people with them."

Little House is far more than a clearing house on housing and on jobs. It is one of the members of Little House wants to find someone to share an apartment. The Little House know. If a resident of the area needs a part-time gardener or a practical nurse, Little House is notified.

Little House is the project of the Peninsula Volunteers, a group of volunteer-minded women of San Mateo County. The women raised funds to build the project and continue to support it.

Now they have a new project. They have acquired land for a residential housing project near Little House. It will have 30 single and double apartments.

Little House has no dues. But members drop contributions into a slot in the wall. And already Little House members are working busily at articles they will sell at a fall bazaar that will raise funds for the center.

There are classes in weaving, bridge, and oil painting. There is a book lending library. There are suppers and lively dances.

"Here we don't feel we are growing old," one member told me. "We're having such a good time."

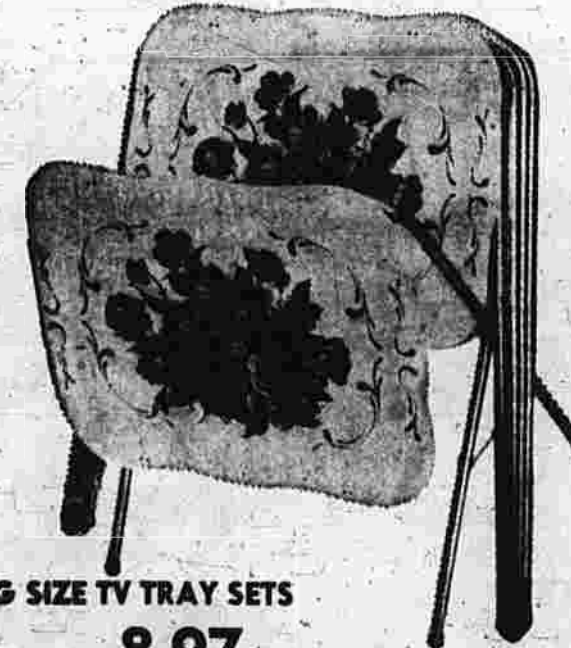

Rockville-Vernon Assault Case Brings Fine

Hal Boyle—Unopened Books Tell Volumes About You

New York (AP)—It is said you can tell a man by his library. But this assumes he has read the books in his library. Often he hasn't.

A true appraisal in most cases probably is that you can tell a man's library what he *wants* to be—by the books he has.

Most men's libraries aren't made up of the books they have read and treasured. They are made up of the books they intend to read someday—some day when there isn't something more pressing to do.

To be literate a man doesn't have to read a large number of books. He needs only to know a few choice books well, and to increase his understanding by re-reading them.

Even three books can produce a well-stocked mind. These books are the dictionary, the Bible, and a collection of Shakespeare's works. No one who knows those three books will be less learned than he who has skimmed 10,000 other books.

A man's reading taste is usually a prisoner of the age. In youth he prefers romantic fiction, but as he grows older he likes to read factual material because life has taught him there is nothing more romantic than the truth, or more novel.

The trouble with a library is that if you have a really good book, it somehow gets away from you. You either lend it deliberately or

Water Pressure Hike Sought For Fire Safety of Patients

Town Directors last night took a step toward preserving the safety of some 40 to 45 elderly patients, many of them bedridden, at the Ghibli Convalescent Home on Cottage St.

According to officials the Cottage St. water supply hasn't adequate pressure for the home's sprinkler system. Fire Chief Clifford Mason sees the situation as "one of grave concern," according to General Manager Richard Martin.

The Directors scheduled a public hearing for Oct. 26 on appropriate \$4,000 to replace a 6-inch main in Cottage St. with an 8-inch main from Oak St. to Birch St. According to Mason, this would remove the danger and Martin said "it would do a satisfactory job not only for the convalescent home but for the whole area."

Other appropriations scheduled for public hearings Oct. 26 in the Verplanck School are \$150,000 for West Side sewer project, \$45,000 for a swimming pool at the Ghibli's Pond site, and \$380,000 for the Mary Cheney Library.

Proposals to issue bonds for the sewer and library addition would be put to vote as questions in the State and presidential election Nov. 2.

Although it will be the subject of a hearing, the fate of the swimming pool plan initiated by Democrats will be uncertain after the newly elected Republican-controlled Board takes office Nov. 2. The Republicans have already called for an overall study of park and recreational needs before specific projects are started.

Plan Experts On Scene For Master Study

Representatives of Planning and Renewal Associates of Boston have come to Manchester to continue an 18-month survey of this town which began Sept. 1.

Norman Brand, partner in the Boston firm, and Norman Abend with General Manager Richard Martin and Planning Engineers Edward J. Rybsky yesterday in Martin's office.

They reviewed past and future work of P & R Associates in regard to Manchester's traffic patterns, business and industrial locations, land use, planning, zoning, population densities and analysis of needs and recommendations for future town planning and development.

Brand said that aerial photographs will be taken, sometime next month for new maps of the area. Land requirements for population growth and a study of roads and traffic will be major factors in the comprehensive study, Brand said.

Charles Woodman and Harold Kramer, two other members of the Boston firm will also come to Manchester soon to assist in the master plan study which will cost \$21,000, plus \$15,000 for the survey. Federal funds allocated to the Connecticut Planning Commission will act as a coordinating agency, directing planners to make periodic reports will be made available to the public and general manager's office.

The Boston firm, now doing surveys here and in Bloomfield, have completed surveys in Torrington, Waterbury and Stratford.

Shea Attacks Fiscal Policies Of Legislature

Atty. John F. Shea Jr., Manchester Republican candidate for the General Assembly, struck out today at fiscal policies under Gov. Abraham Ribicoff and the 1959 Democratic-controlled state legislature.

He termed these policies "irresponsible" and said they threaten Connecticut's "fiscally sound history of responsibility," established by years of Republican control.

With a program "motivated by political expediency and a desire to avert a party-sponsored tax increase," the Democrats, Shea said, left the state facing "dire financial troubles."

He said the latest figures from the state finance commission indicate there will be an \$8 million budget deficit by June 30, "despite repeated instances of bonding to pay current expenses."

Shea said Gov. Ribicoff and the 1959 legislature bolstered the general fund \$30 million by diverting funds from the highway department; issued \$12 million in bonds to make annual payments formerly paid out of current income on school construction grants; issued \$4 million in bonds for state building improvements and repairs; issued \$1 million in bonds for the Hartford Bridge Authority debt and picked up another \$2 million for the general fund by abolishing many special funds and appropriating their proceeds.

Shea continued, "After all these maneuvers, however, the general fund now faces the... deficit because of politically inspired optimistic revenue forecasts."

Concluding, Shea said, "A continuation of these policies can only lead to financial ruin. The next session of the legislature faces a difficult task in attempting to correct the economic blunders of their predecessors."

Emphasis On Health

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
Health concerns this week range from sudden deaths of babies to Soviet advance for avoiding heart disease.

Infants' Sudden Deaths
"Babies sometimes are found mysteriously dead in their cribs or carriages. Most doctors think the reason is undetected respiratory infections, and not suffocation from too many blankets."
A new theory comes from a British physician, Dr. Francis E. Camps of London. He finds evidence many infants are allergic to milk and may accidentally inhale small quantities of it. This sets up an inflammatory reaction in their lungs. Later, if they inhale more milk, fatal allergic shock may occur.

Flu Resistance
In outbreak of influenza, the virus apparently invades many persons but a majority of them do not become ill. They produce protective antibodies quickly enough to be resistant.
The evidence comes from studies measuring antibodies in the blood before, during and after flu epidemics. Dr. G. O. Brown and associates of St. Louis write in the Archives of Internal Medicine.

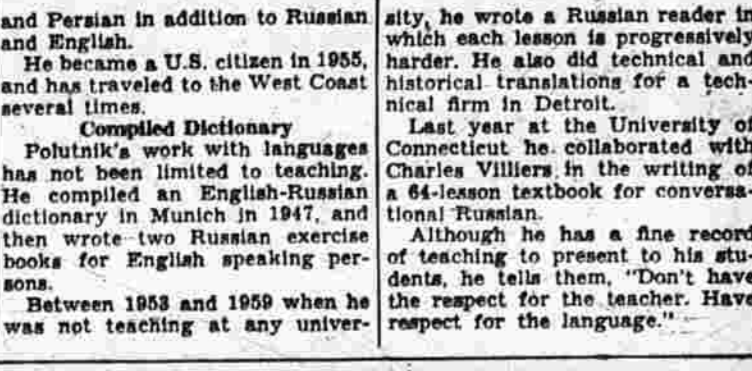

UN Troops Find American's Body At Congo River

Leopoldville, The Congo, Oct. 19.—Mark Higgins, 20-year-old architecture student from North Brookfield, Mass., who tried to hitchhike through the Congo at the height of the post-independence violence, has been found dead in Kivu Province, U.S. embassy announced today.

His body was found by James Havertock, an American Presbyterian missionary, at Luluabourg on July 16. He had gone to the Congo from Luluabourg, where he worked briefly at Dr. Albert Schweitzer's Hospital.

An American embassy official said U.N. troops found the body at Kasaongu a few days ago and identified it as Higgins. The official said there was no information at present on the cause or date of his death.

The embassy broadcast an appeal for information on Higgins whereabouts after his family in the United States reported him missing early in September.

He spent a week with friends in Leopoldville during the independence celebrations which began June 30. He then traveled by Congo river craft and train to Luluabourg, where he spent a few days at the Rev. Mr. Havertock's mission station.

He left Luluabourg July 16, planning to hitchhike across hundreds of miles of chaos-riven bush country to Umuamba in the Belgian-controlled territory of Ruanda Urundi.

Havertock reported that Higgins ignored all warnings against venturing into the savage interior, which was then mostly in the hands of marauding mutineers of the Congolese army.

U.N. troops came across Higgins' decomposed body on the banks of the Lualaba River, more than 50 miles from Luluabourg to Umuamba, a distance of nearly 1,000 miles.

An embassy official said Higgins did not carry much money on him and it was unlikely that robbery was the motive for his death.

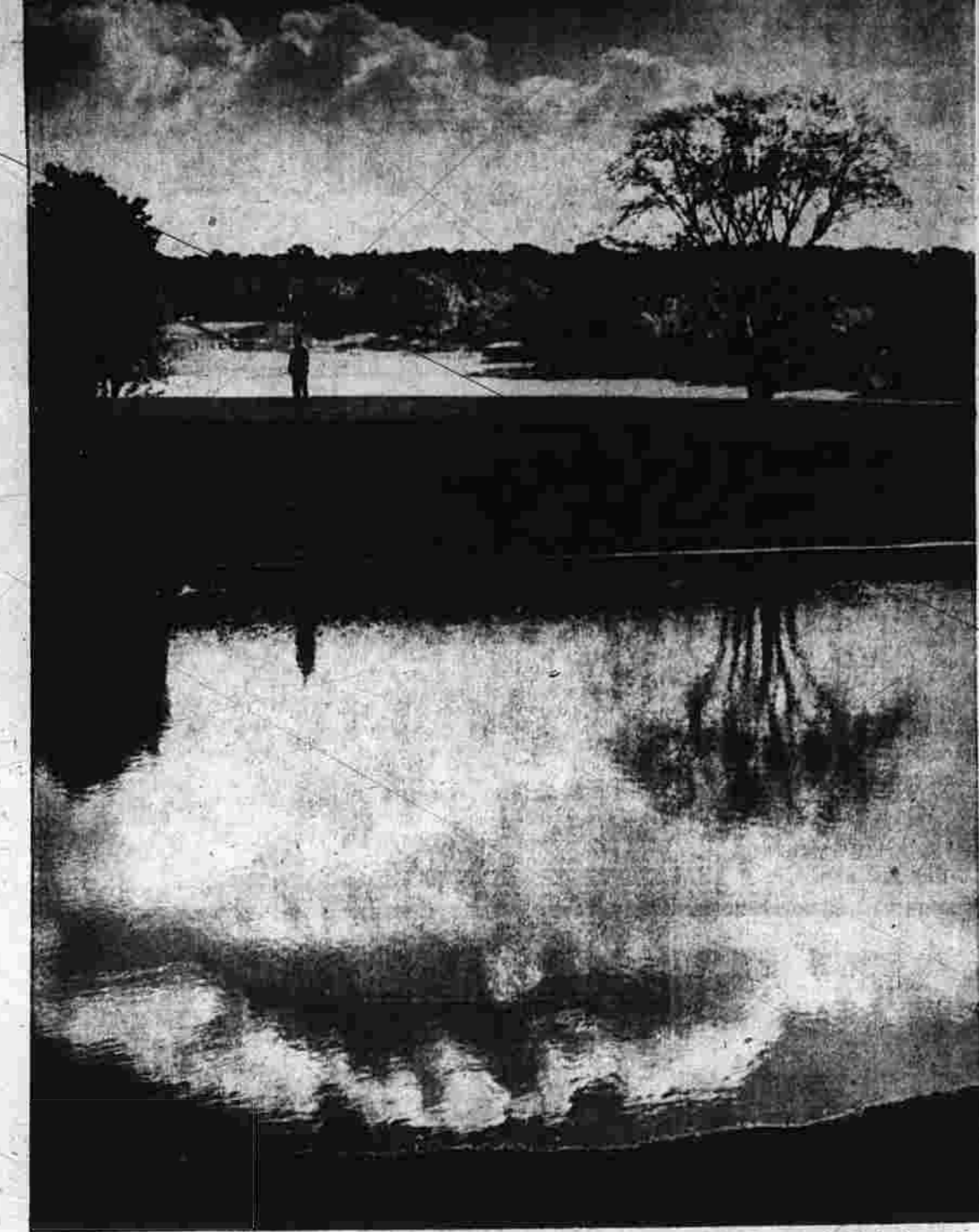
