### Town's Book Use Tops U.S. Average

Circulation within Manchester libraries is seven books a year per capita on the basis of a population of 41,300, compared to a national average of four books a year per capita of the national population. This is one of the facts revealed in a two-year study of library service needs for the town of Manchester, Conn., conducted by the League of Women Voters. The survey also revealed that the book use has doubled since 1937 when books were moved from the East Side Recreation building into the Mary Cheney Library. The population has increased from 25,000 in 1937 to 41,300 today, and the area of the library has remained at 18,800 square feet.

### Rockville-Vernon Sadlak, Democrats 'Elected' In High School Mock Voting

Democrats scored a comfortable victory yesterday, except in one election, when results of the mock election at Rockville High School showed students favoring Senator John F. Kennedy for President. The margin of 84 votes—about 10.1 per cent of the vote cast.

At Sykes Junior High School, the race was much closer; with Sen. Kennedy winning 248 to 227. The totals were counted twice to make sure.

In the high school election, 779 votes out of a possible 840 were cast. Junior election only involved the two Presidential nominees. The high school election involved the whole ticket in each party.

Retired Allen of Rockville, Democratic candidate for State Representative, was the high school favorite. He pulled 445 votes. His running mate, Ray Raymond E. Pieman, got 430.

The Republican candidates for the Legislature, Donald B. Lovell and Arthur M. Bateman, got 284 and 281, respectively.

Anthony Sadlak of Rockville, GOP candidate for Congressional Representative, was the only Republican to enter the winning column. He received 205 votes to 227 for his opponent, Rep. Frank Kowalski of Hordens.

### Rockville-Vernon Jurors Find Man Guilty On 3 Counts

Under the statutes, Nickerson can get a maximum sentence of six months in jail on the larceny charge as amended by the jury. He has been convicted of the original charge, he would have faced a maximum sentence of 20 years.

**Legislature Hopefuls Tell Views on Issues**  
 Candidates for state senator have been asked by the Manchester League of Women Voters for their views on four questions.

The candidates are Fred J. Doocy, incumbent, the Democratic nominee from Wapping; and Republican Ken Geyer of Wethersfield.

Manchester's General Assembly candidates were asked the same questions by the LWV in September before the town elections.

The Herald, in cooperation with the LWV, presents the questions, the answers by the two candidates, and a brief biography of the state senate hopefuls.

**Questions**

1. Do you favor increased state aid to education? If so, what form of state aid would you support and how do you think the revenue should be raised?
2. Would you meet the rising costs of government by a State Income Tax? By increase in the existing taxes? By other means?
3. Do you approve of the present Probate Court system? If not, what changes do you suggest? Are you in favor of the establishment of a Family Court in Connecticut whose jurisdiction would include all matters relating to the family and over which specialized judges preside?
4. The State Constitution empowers the General Assembly, in the session immediately following a Federal election, to alter senatorial districts if found necessary to preserve a proper equality of population in each. Inasmuch as the largest district now has more than 5 times the population of the smallest, do you believe the 1961 Legislature has a moral obligation to pass a redistricting bill?
5. The present Probate Court system requires many extensive improvements. All the existing probate courts should be integrated into a system where the total number of courts is reduced and each court would have approximately the same amount of business before it. I believe that the judges should not be rotated so that the same family and those cases will continue to exist between the judge and the people involved in probate matters. The fee system should yield eventually to full-time judges on a salary basis. I am in favor of the family court but I would not urge some of the matters presently within the Probate Court jurisdiction such as trusts.
6. The 1961 Legislature has both a moral and legal obligation to provide for the redistricting of the senatorial districts. The founders of the state, as well as the federal government, provided for two integral parts to the

**Anti-trust Law New**  
 Brussels—Belgium recently enacted an anti-trust law. It empowers the government to curb economic activities which tend to limit the normal interplay of competitive forces, or thwart the economic freedom of producers, distributors or consumers, or the development of production or exchange.

**The Evolution of Unions**  
 There are growing indications that some of the giant unions in the American industrial complex are beginning to encounter, from their members, the old political question the constituent asked the senator: But what have you done for me lately?

When the answer is that the union has not done anything particularly important or vital lately, and can for that matter, not even chart any big necessary thing that seems to be in the immediate future, then the union member begins to forget the accomplishments of the past, and the days when the advent of strong unions did actually do good to the workers who were sincerely going to come to stage.

In that stage, the union member got his dues and he got his job security, and he got, again and again over a long span of years, those conditions which were not even when combined with a companion advance of inflation, have raised the average living standard of Americans so spectacularly in the past three decades. In this era, belonging to a union, and supporting it with dues, and extending its membership, and taking its orders in strike, were all things for which there was a tangible and visible return. If union dues were to be paid directly for tangible benefits, it would be a good thing. Sometimes, however, the dues were paid for a little less feeling that it was a fine investment for the future. There is another way to say all this. It is to say that the unions have now won their big battles, and discharged their big, necessary function, and that the main reasonable function and role left for them is the non-dynamic role of guarding gains that have already been won.

Union leadership, of course, fears relaxation into any such role as stagnation and weakness for which labor, later on, might pay hard penalties.

So, to keep union morale and strength high, the leadership keeps trying to prospect for new gains, and new crusades, and new battles to be won. It too, wants new frontiers. But all it succeeds in producing falls far short of the elemental bread and butter that the unions attacked when they first came into their great modern power. There is a dynamism in every situation which is never to be found in jurisdictional, seniority, or even anti-union disputes. The big labor unions seem fated to subside and grow mild and flabby and less rich and powerful, always proscribing, of course, that ownership and management do not mistake the new condition as an opportunity for turning back the clock. We are not automatically entering any toolless millinery. We do seem to have come to a time when state ownership on the part of government and management is likely to find union leadership showing fewer fangs and making fewer lungs, when leadership battles will not even have to get started.

**Truman's Ex-Aide To Leave Prison**  
 Washington, Nov. 4 (AP) — Malcolm J. Connolly, a White House secretary under former President Truman, gets out of prison tomorrow.

His release on parole comes a week earlier than the 300, 12 days previously announced, the Justice Department said yesterday, because of allowance for good behavior. He is in the Federal Correctional Institution in Danbury, Conn.

He entered prison May 4 to start a 2 1/2-year sentence imposed on charges of conspiring to prevent filing of an income tax event.

**No Uninvolvement**  
 The other day, in Parliament, Prime Minister Macmillan told his people that his government had agreed to allow the United States to establish a support base for our Polish submarines in Scotland. He also seemed to tell his people that the agreement his government had with some provision that Britain should be fully consulted about any possible launching of the Polish submarines by any submarines using this base.

That interpretation by Prime Minister Macmillan caused the White House and State Department at Washington to express their surprise. Since interpreting the reaction in Washington said that Britain might be consulted, such consultation proved possible, but that such consultation was not in any sense guaranteed.

The result of this difference of interpretation of the Scotland base agreement is to expose Prime Minister Macmillan to further domestic attack, which he has never placed in the position of having tried to get started.

**Legislature Hopefuls Tell Views on Issues**  
 Candidates for state senator have been asked by the Manchester League of Women Voters for their views on four questions.

The candidates are Fred J. Doocy, incumbent, the Democratic nominee from Wapping; and Republican Ken Geyer of Wethersfield.

Manchester's General Assembly candidates were asked the same questions by the LWV in September before the town elections.

The Herald, in cooperation with the LWV, presents the questions, the answers by the two candidates, and a brief biography of the state senate hopefuls.

**Questions**

1. Do you favor increased state aid to education? If so, what form of state aid would you support and how do you think the revenue should be raised?
2. Would you meet the rising costs of government by a State Income Tax? By increase in the existing taxes? By other means?
3. Do you approve of the present Probate Court system? If not, what changes do you suggest? Are you in favor of the establishment of a Family Court in Connecticut whose jurisdiction would include all matters relating to the family and over which specialized judges preside?
4. The State Constitution empowers the General Assembly, in the session immediately following a Federal election, to alter senatorial districts if found necessary to preserve a proper equality of population in each. Inasmuch as the largest district now has more than 5 times the population of the smallest, do you believe the 1961 Legislature has a moral obligation to pass a redistricting bill?
5. The present Probate Court system requires many extensive improvements. All the existing probate courts should be integrated into a system where the total number of courts is reduced and each court would have approximately the same amount of business before it. I believe that the judges should not be rotated so that the same family and those cases will continue to exist between the judge and the people involved in probate matters. The fee system should yield eventually to full-time judges on a salary basis. I am in favor of the family court but I would not urge some of the matters presently within the Probate Court jurisdiction such as trusts.
6. The 1961 Legislature has both a moral and legal obligation to provide for the redistricting of the senatorial districts. The founders of the state, as well as the federal government, provided for two integral parts to the

 Hamilton Standard today announced the formation of a scientific laboratory at the Windsor Locks plant for research on existing and advanced product programs.

Dr. Charles F. Squire, new division director of research, will head the laboratory. He is a former professor of physics and research director at Rice University.

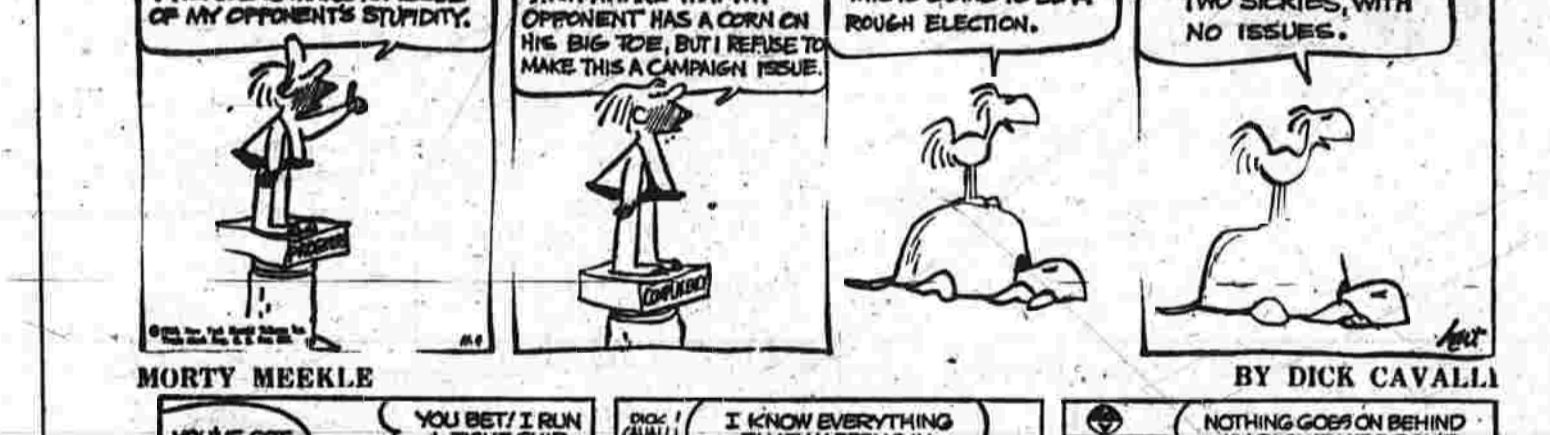
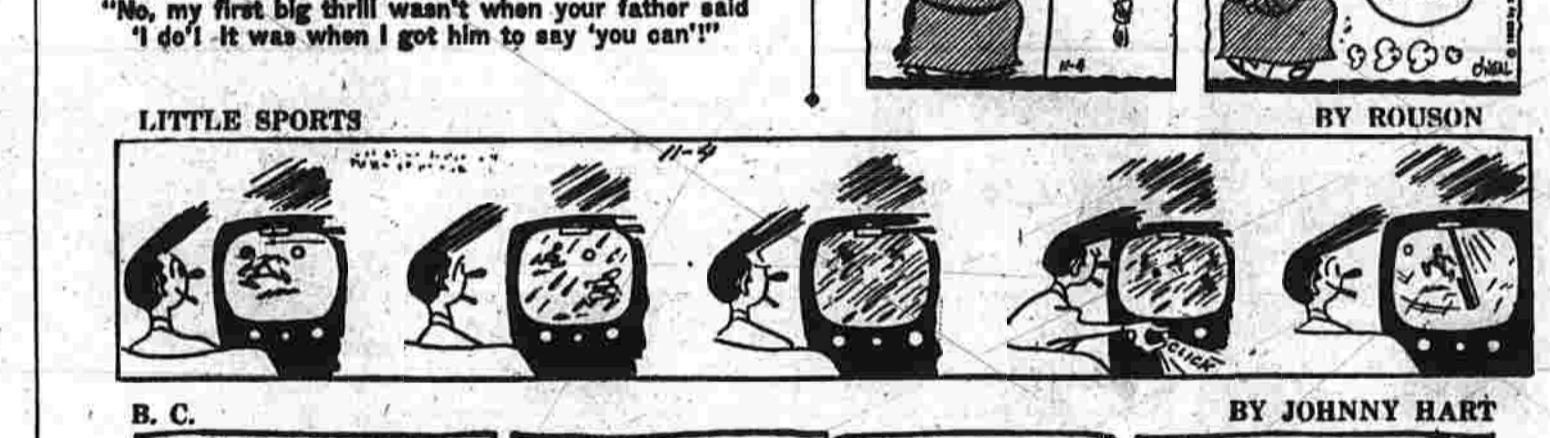
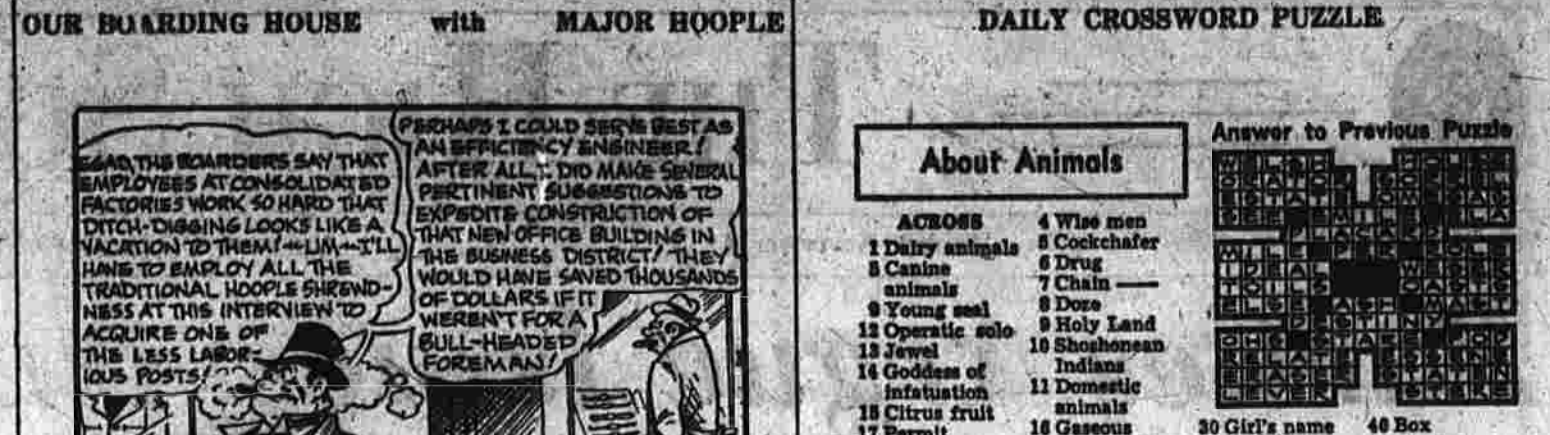
